The four locomotives for use at the tunnel are the largest ever built in the world, and were built at the Baldwin locomotive works in Philadelphia. An idea of the enormous size of the monster engines may be formed from their weight. The rails upon which they will run will weigh 100 pounds per yard. The length of the tunnel track which they are built to run over is only about four miles. ic Discourse by Rev. Dr. De Witt Talmage.

New lork, April 12.—Dr. Talmage preached tlarge audiences to-day on "The Plague of Gime." He took for his text Exodus vi, 90: "All the waters that were in the rive wer turned to blood."

Among il the Egyptian plagues none could have been worse than this. The Nile is the wealth of Egypt. Its fish the food. Its waters irrigate gardens and fields. Its endition decides the prosperity or the doom of the empire. And now in the text that great river is incarnadined. It is a red gash across an empire. In poetic license we speak of wars which turn the rivers into blood. But my text is not a poetic license. It was a fact, a great vimson, appalling condition described. The Nile rolling deep of blood. The modern plague which nearest corresponds with that is the plague of crime in all our cities. Its halts not for bloodshed. It shrinks from no carnage. It bruises, and cuts, and strikes down, and destroys. It revels in the blood of body and soul, this plague of crime rampant for ages, and never bolder or more rampant than now. The annual police reports of these cities as I examine them are to me more suggestive than Dante's Inferno, and all Christian people, as well as reformers, need to waken to a present and tremendous duty.

First come the public criminals. You

First come the public criminals. You ought not to be surprised that these people make up a large portion in many communities. The vast majority of the criminals who take ship from Europe come into our own port. In 1869 of the 49,000 people who were incarcerated in the prisons of the country 32,000 were of foreign birth. Many of them were the very desperadoes of society, oozing into the slums of our cities, waiting for an epportunity to riot and steal the debauch, joining the large gang of American thugs and cut-throats. It is their business to committerime; no thought of the immortality strikes them.

Added to these professional criminals there is a large class of men who are more or less industrious in crime. In one year the police in this cluster of cities arrested 10,000 people for theft, and 10,000 for intoxication. Drunkenness is responsible for much of the theft, since it confuses a man's idea of property, and he gets his hands on things that do not belong to him. Ten million dollars worth of property stolen in this cluster of cities in one year?

You cannot, as good citizens, be independent of that fact. You might as well think to stand in a closely confined room where there are 50 people and yet not breather the vitiated air as to stand in a community where there is such a great multitude of the depraved without being somewhat contaminated.

We are all ready to arraign criminals. With great gusto we put on the handcuffs and the hopples; but what preparation are we making for the day when the handcuffs and the hopples come off? Society seems to say to these criminals, "Villain, go in there and rot," when it ought to say, "You are an offender against the law, but we mean to help you. Here are Bibles and tracts and Christian influences. Christ died for you. Look, and live." Of the 8,000 people arrested in that city in one year, only 3,000 were punished. These little matters were "fixed up," while the interests of society were "fixed down."

You know as well as I do that one villain who escapes only opens the door for other criminalities. It is no compliment to public authority when we have in all the cities of the country, walking abroad, men and women notorious for criminality, unwhipped of justice. There you find what are called the "fence," the men who stand between the thief and the honest man, sheltering the thief, and at a great price handing over the goods to the owner to whom they belong. There you will find those who are alled the "skinners," the men who hover around Wall street, with great sleight-of-and in bonds and stocks. There you find the confidence men," who borrow money of you because they have a dead child in he house and want to bury it, when the never have a house or a family, or they wut to go to England and get a large proarty there, and they will send you the

money back by the very next mail. There are the "harbor thieves," the "snoplifters," the "pickpockets," famous all over the cities. Hundreds of them with their faces in the "Rogues' Gallery," yet doing nothing for the last five or ten years but defraud society and escape justice. When these people go unarrested and unpunished, it is putting a high premium upon vice, and saying to the young criminals of this country, "What a safe thing it is to be a great criminal."

The police stations of this cluster of cities furnish annually between 200,000 and 300,000 lodgings. For the most part, these 200,000 and 300,000 lodgings are furnished to able-bodied men and women. When they are received no longer at one police station, because they are "repeaters," they go to some other station, and so they keep moving around. They get their food at house doors, stealing what they can lay their hands on in the front basement while the servant is spreading butter on the bread in the back basement. They will not work. I like for that class of people the scant bill of fare that Paul wrote out for the Thessalonian loafers. "If any work not, neither should he eat."

Again, among the uprooting classes I place the oppressed poor. Poverty to a certain extent is chastening, but after that, when it drives a man to the wall, and he hears his children cry in vain for bread, it sometimes makes him desperate. I think that there are thousands of honest men lacerated into vagabondism. There are men crushed under burdens for which they are not half paid. While there is no excuse for criminality, even in oppression, I state it as a simple fact, that much of the scoundrelism of the community is consequent upon ill-treatment. There is a vast underground New York and Brooklyn lite that is appalling and shameful. It wallows and steams with putrefaction. You go down the stairs, which are wet and decayed with filth, and at the bottom you find the poor victims on the floor, cold, sick, three-fourths dead, slinking into a darker corner under the gleam of the lantern of the police. There has not been a breath of fresh air in that room for five years, literally. The broken sewer empties it contents upon them, and they lie at night in the swimming fith. There they are—men, women, children; blacks, whites; Mary Magdalen, without her repentance, and Lazarus, without his God. There are "dives" into which the pickpockets and the thieves go, as well as a great many who would like a different life, but cannot thieves on a well as a great many who would like a different life, but cannot get it. 





A little more activity and enterprise, coupled with liberality, and less selfishness, would soon cause a big change in London, and bring mechanics to the city, whose families would fill the 600 houses that have been so long vacant.

On the other hand, Mrs. Weir claims to have had no suspicion of any unfaithful conduct on the part of her husband, and in giving an account of the matter this would gladly have been passed over, but our duty as public journalists is to throw all the light possible upon such a sad affair. "In the opinion of many of the most competent critics the work of Paul Peel, one of the younger generation of Canadian artists, places him head and shoulders above his contemporaries. Peel is a Canadian by birth. He lived during the most important period of his life in Paris, and his work is in most respects as French as his masters. He is principally a figure painter, although he often paints land-scapes with figures; and he has accomplished that which no Canadian artist residing in Canada has dared toattempt—absolute command over the plastic lines and tints of the undraped figure. At 30 years of age he is pre-eminently the best artist Canada has yet produced, and what he has done is only a promise of still greater things. He has been an artist since early boyhood, having begun his studies while still attending the public school in his native town of London, Ontario. At 17 he entered the Philadelphia Academy of Fine Arts, and the Royal Academy, shortly afterwards removing to Paris, where he remained for ten years studying under Gerome, Boulanger, Lefevere, Doucet and Benjamin Constant, being nearly four years under the tutelage of the latter. A short time ago, family affairs brought him to Canada, and he made his visit the occasion of an exhibition of some of his paintings. The collection was probably the finest by one artist ever seen in Canada. It was certainly the best exhibition made by a Canadian artist in his own country. Among the canvases was a magnificent nude, but it had all the delicacy and poetry with which such men as Sir Frederick Leighton and Soloman J. Soloman invest the undraped figure. The picture was exhibited with others in the Paris Salon in 1889, and excited considerable enthusiasm. It was a distinct success, and the success was recorded in London and New York at the time. In the recent exhibition there were also some delightful pictures of French peasant life, in which Peel is particularly happy—painted in Brittany, Normandy and Paris; and in addition to these were several Canadian subje
