Details of Disaster from the Gulf Coast.

Appalling News from Sections of Louisiana.

Fully 100 Lives Lost-Scores of Boats and Largor Craft Sunk-The Beach Strewn With Wiecks.

New Orleans, La., Oct, 5.—The first definite news from the Gulf coast reached the city this morning. The financial loss along the entire coast will foot up not less than \$1,000,000, and fully 100 lives were lost. The news is almost as appalling as that from the coast of Louisiana. At Beloxi nothing escaped the fury of the elements. On every side could be seen the wrecks of boats, piers and bath houses, and in many instances the fronts of houses on the beach were totally demolished. The canning industries were completely wrecked.

Out of more than 100 boats of the front

Out of more than 100 boats of the front Out of more than 100 boats of the front bay only three rode the atorm safely, and the beach is strewn with wrecks of all descriptions. On the back bay there were only one or two that weathered the gale. Not a single wharf is left standing on either front or back bay. The damage was not confined alone to the water front, but all through the city, in every direction, the through the city, in every direction, the effects of the storm can be seen in fallen trees, fences, and here and there a house is

offects of the storm can be seen in fallen trees, fences, and here and there a house is partially unroofed.

At Deer Island, just opposite Beloxi, 40 head of cattle were drowned. When the storm came up, which was a genuine cyclone, there were many boats in the Louisiana marsh oyster fishing, and it is aimost certain that a number, if not all of these boats went down with all on board. Of eight schooners, known to be there Sunday evening, three have been picked up bottom side up, with masts and rigging all gone and not a soul on board. It is believed the loss of life will not fall short of 100.

At Ship Island, previous to the storm, there were seven vessels loading for other ports. The Norwegian bark Simon, Capt. Gunderson, 734 tons for Cape Town, to load for Buenos Ayres, lost her mast, rigging, and suffered other damage. The British bark Rosella Smith, 509 tons, for Havana, Capt. Hunterman, was found bottom up drifting outside, and is a total wreck. The mate, carpenter and cook were drowned. The German bark Margaret is, 1,287 tons, from Now York, Capt. Koster, lost two anchors and 120 fathoms of chains, and suffered other damage. The Austrian bark Annie E. B., from Santos, is a complete wreck. Of the crew of thirteen men and two stevedores aboard, the captain, three sailors and the two stevedores were drowned.

Considerable damage was done on the island, the warchouse, fort, keepers' house and lazaretto at the quarantine station being completely washed away and the lighthouse keeper's house being badly damaged. The Jury Empaneled and Witnesses Called.

Constable McDonald's Description the Tragedy.

Mr. Osler's Searching Cross-Examination-The Lines of the Desense partially Disclosed-Highly Interesting Testimony

The Raleigh township murder case came The Raleigh township murder case came up for hearing at the assizes yesterduy. Wm. Lount, Q.C., assisted by James Mages, Q.C., appeared for the crown and B. B. Osler, Q.C., Toronto, and Hugh Pegley, Q.C., Chatham, were counsel for the defense. The court room was packed with a curious mob. The prisoners were in the box ten minutes before the appointed time, and before the general public was admitted. Alexander had a few minutes conversation with his Chatham solicitor Mr. Pegley, before the judge arrived. While swearing in a panel the judge asked the constables to allow Lemuel Freeman to sit outside the box as he looked crowded. Lemuel had been supplied with a chair and replied that he was comfortable.

Constable Archibaid Hugh Skirving took the stand, and produced a cordwood stick about two feet six inches long with a significant blood stain in the center of it. The wood and an axe handle were found together. The cordwood stick was covered with frozen snow and blood and some dark brown hair was found on the sharp edge of it. The hairs were the same color as the dead man's and about the same length. The axe handle was covered with blood from end to end. An axe was found in Jeremiah Freeman's house. Near the head the handle had split and had been bound with wire. From appearances the axe had been cleaned, but blood was found in the interstices of the wire, where it was impossible to clean it out. COUNTY CONSTABLE M'DONALD.

Alexander McDonaid, county constable, Kont county, had acted as county constable, for seventeen years. He recognized a warrant produced as one handed to him by Magistrate McNaughton, of Chatham, on Jan. 23 to execute on the person of Georgo Freeman. The warrant charged Freeman with carnally knowing and abusing Jane Lizzert, a girl under 14 years old. He took the warrant, and with a man named Best drove out to the Freeman's. It was 7 o'clock in the evening when he got there, and the door was opened a few inches by George Freeman. "I could see that he was not going to let me in," said the witness, "and I told him that the cutter was broken and I wanted some string to fix it. When I got inside I told him I had a warrant for his arrest. He said 'go out of here or I will kill you.' I tussled with him and threw him once or twice and called on Best to help me get him out. He shouted to a woman (I supposed it was his wife. I don't know.) standing by, to get an Alexander McDonald, county constable. called on Best to help me get him out. He shouted to a woman (I supposed it was his wife, I don't know,) standing by, to get an axe. She did not get an axe but she pounded me on the back with a stick. Between the two I broke my hold and George ran back to the house. I went back to town and saw Mr. Douglas, crown attorney, and his clerk."

From there he went to Constables Dezelis From there he went to Constables Dezelia and Rankin for assistance. They went to the next afternoon about 4 o'clock. Rankin and Dezelia were in uniform. Dezelia went towards the house and Rankin towards the barn. The witness went around the corner of the house and saw George Freeman running from the house and striking over the field. He crossed the road and climbed a fence and went to his father's house. As soon as George Freemen left the house he commenced to cry "murder" in a loud voice, aithough Freemen left the house he commenced to cry "murder" in a loud voice, aithough nothing had been said to him. "I wanted to run after him," said McDonald, "but Rankin replied, 'No; we will go slow and catch him at his father's house.' William Henry Freeman and Alexander stood beside the door. There were some others there, but I could not recognize any. I knew one was a little lighter than the other,"

The committee on law enforcement held that the Provincial Governments were responsible for the enactment and enforcing of laws dealing with the liquor traffic, and recommend that more attention be paid to the composition of municipal councils, which in some provinces have large powers for the enforcement of laws regulating the liquor traffic.

He spoke as a Catholic, as representative of a total abstinence and prohibition society of that church. There could be not denominational lines in this work. Whethere one signed his name with a cross or took his inspiration from the King James Bible, all stood as one man before the common enemy.

RINGING ADDRESS BY HON. G. W. ROSS.

A hearty round of applause greeted Hon. Geo. W. Ross as he came to the front of the platform. "They have the swing of conquest in them," the Minister said, was the comment of U. S. Grant upon the British troops he saw at Gibraltur, and never had he seen a convention which had more of the "swing of conquest" in it than the one just closing. Its success and power gave him the more pleasure in that he had been a temperance worker ever since 1857. (Applause.) They must stir up the indifferent, and when the ballot is taken all voters must be aware of the nature of the question. "I am confident we will have cause to rejoice over a victory," was his concluding words, "You will agree that it was well that we consented to consult the people, and that they had a chance to declare their convictions."

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

ILLEGAL COAL COMBINE.

Conviction of the Lockport Exchange
Members Affirmed.

ALBANY, Oct. 5.—An important case was
decided here by the Court of Appeals, the
question at issue being what constitutes a
conspiracy against the rights of the people
under the laws of New York State. J.
Carson Sheedon and four others were convicted in Nigara, county, and fixed \$50 Carson Sheedon and four others were convicted in Niagara county, and fined \$50 cach on an indictment charging them with conspiracy in having formed the "Lockport Coal Exchange," which organization, it was alleged, sought to raise and maintain the price of coal to consumers, and that it restricted trade in violation of the penal code of the State and of chapter 716 of the laws of 1893.

This was the first prosecution under the

This was the first prosecution under the latter act, which is entitled "An act to prevent monopolies in articles of general necessity." The defendants contended prevent monopoles in articles of general necessity." The defendants contended that proof of an overt act was wanting beyond the mere forming of the exchange. The Court of Appeals, however, affirmed the judgment of conviction rendered by the lower courts.


