#### WIMAN ON TRIAL.

#### Interesting Sketch of His Rapid and Successful Career.

NEW YORK, June 13. - Gen. Tracy questioned Mr. Wiman in regard to his early life. He said that he was born in Toronto 60 years ago, and that he began life at 16 years of age as a printer, earning \$1 50 a week. Four years later found him working as a reporter on the Toronto Globe salary of \$6 a week. Continuing his story Mr. Wiman said: "I rendered some service to the city of Toronto at that time, and was presented with a gold watch as a testimonial. After that I was employed on the Toronto Board of Trade, and while there was made the Toronto correspondent for Dun's agency. I got \$4 a week from them for my work. I was made manager of the Toronto office after a while at a salary of \$1,200 a year. After that I was made manager of Canadian business and the name of the firm was changed to Dun & Co. I remained in Canada until 1865 when I came to this city to take charge of the general business." "Why were you called to New York?" was asked. "Because," said Mr. Wiman, "I was making about \$30,000 a year for the firm in Canada and the business in this country was not paying expenses. When I came to New York in 1865 the business was being run at a loss. When I was put out a year ago the annual profits exceeded \$500, 000. That is the result of my work for R. G. Dun & Co. He said that he conducted most of the business of R. G. Dun & Co. that he had signed at least 75 per cent of all the checks that went out of the establishment, and that in every way he was held responsible for the conduct of



Agitator Corkery Sont to Jail for Year-The Judge Doubtin How to Class the Prisoner.



#### MEREDITH'S MEETING.

Conservatives of Ward I and 6 in Westminster Rink.

Addresses by Messrs. J. A. Thomas, P. Bartlett and Mayor Essery-Many Empty Seats-Mowat's Government Proncunced Good by the Chairman.

The much-heralded "mass meeting" of the Conservatives of wards 1 and 6 took place last night in Westminster rink, with Mr. J. A. Thomas in the chair. The rink was laid out in amphitheater form, eight rows of chairs encircling the platform at the south side. The rink was so large that the chairs seemed lost, and the crowd was just large enough to be lost in the chairs. The chairman after considerable coaxing managed to secure the following attendance on the platform: Mayor Essery, John S. Dewar, Hume Elliot, Major Beattie, Henry Macklin and J. H. McConnell. Several

ladies were present during the evening.

In his remarks Mr. Thomas calmly admitted that his bias was in favor of Conservatism. He said that after Mr. Meredith spoke in the Opera House he was surprised to find that very many intelligent Reformers could not see anything in his speech. When he came to think of it, he knew that the reason of that was because they had not followed up the lines of the Grit orators, or in other words, had not abused the Government of which they were the Opposition. In the course of his speech Mr. Thomas said that when he heard the Free Press and other Tory organs talking about the sale of timber limits, he did not think it very much of a matter, but, like Mr. Meredith, he viewed it not in the manner of dollars and cents, but in the principle involved. Touching on religious matters and speaking of the Pope of Rome, Mr. Thomas said: "We don't propose to have him or his emissaries dictating in civil matters." The text books of the separate schools helped to make the rising generation "not to be true and loyal subjects of the British Empire, but to be true and loyal subjects of the Pope of Rome." (Ap-

plause.) "There is no question about it," Mr. Thomas admitted further on, "that in times past Sir Oliver Mowat has given us good government in Ontario. There is only one man who can possibly give us better, and that man is W. R. Meredith. (Applause.) We have prosperity, we have a fine Province, and we have had a very good Government, considering; but we offer you something better." Mr. P. Bartlett excused himself when

he got up to speak on account of his extreme nervousness and modesty. He then went on to tell that moss-backed story about the little boy who disclaimed any complicity in leading the children of Israel through the wilderness "because he had just moved in from 'Mizzouri'" But Mr. Bartlett calmly attributed the scene to a Strathroy Sunday school, and the boy in his story had just moved in from Metcalfe. A couple of little boys who had not heard the story before laughed outright, but the ominous looks of several voters of mature age squelched the laugh at the second giggle. Mr. Bartlett's moral was that ward six voters had just moved in from Westminster, and he assured them that they would not lead Mr. Hobbs
Shareholders whose postoffice address is this through the wilderness. No; they would Kelly and W. Wheet, Hurlburt. Their inassuredly leave him to die there. If the electors intended to do so they did not by any sign make their fell purpose known. Mr. Bartlett then proceeded with the aid of a large book to attack the method of buying asylum supplies. His tongue glibly ran over the Meredith organ's stock in trade of "phenomenal," 'fried liver' and "charity ties," to the infinite amusement of the boys on the back seats. The license systemalso received ablanket tossing and the speaker groaned in virtuous suffering at the awful timber slaughter, and fairly wept when he reached the separate school question. "Principal Grant furnished Mr. Mowat with a certificate of character. said the youthful man of briefs, "and I know he was very much in need of it. (Applause.) But Mr. Meredith and the Conservative party do not need a certificate of character from any priest or presbyter in

the Province of Ontario." Mr. Bartlett was startled in the midst of a magnificent quotation from Bonaparte by the ominous tolling of the rink bell. He thought for an instant of Mr. Meredith's coming funeral on the 26th, and he became suddenly dumb. Mayor Essery flew to his rescue, and informed him that it was the funeral of the other party. ended by accusing Abe Lincoln of being the author of the late P. T. Barnum's pet expression: "You can fool some of the people some of the time, all the people part of the time, but you can't fool all the people all the time." Then Mr. Bartlett saw the force of his own argument and sat

down. Mr. Essery began with the statement that hundreds of London Reformers were Meredith men-"men who believed in fair and equal rights to all, whether they be white or black, Protestant or Catholic." He accused Mr. Mowat of coming to London this time because he will never come again in the same capacity. The AD-VERTISER received Mr. Essery's attention s he recited the same little "piece" that he gave from Mr. Thomas Meredith's balcony and in the Opera House. From the ADVERTISER Mr. Essery turned his remarks to the Party of Purity, "and," said he, turning to the little black bag that has figured so often on the mayor's civic junketing trips, "I have a specimen of their purity here." Then he unearthed what he claimed to be a shocking evidence of depravity. in connection with the purchase for the Agricultural College at Guelph of a poor, lone bull. Mr. Essery then detailed the amount of goods which he said the Hobbs Manufacturing Company supplied to the Mowat institutions, and said that possibly Mr. Hobbs had got enough profit out of those transactions to pay the election expenses, because he (Mr. Hobbs) had got to be recouped in some way. During the remainder of his address on woman suffrage and temperance it was doubtfu! whether Mr. Essery was talking on behalf of Emanuel T. or W. R. Meredith. It did not become Archbishop Cleary, a man who toiled not and spun not, to malign a man of the calibre of W. R. Meredith. Then, said Mr. Essery, in advocating what he called "National School," "I believe that God reigns in heaven, and all the churches are like the great railway stations that run around our land, and any man, if he believes in Christ and has faith and becomes the member of any church whatever, he will at last reach a haven of rest and peace."

(Applause.) The audience got very tired during Mr. Essery's speech and a number of people left before its conclusion, considerably after 11 o'clock.

Chesen Moderator.

ST. JOHN, N. B., June 13 .- The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada convened here to-night. After the retiring sermon by Rev. Dr. Sedgewick, the roll was called.

Rev. George Leslie McKay, D.D., for 22 years missionary to Formosa, was unanimously chosen for moderator, and was led to the chair amid great applause. This is the first instance in which a mis-

sionary of the church has been called to occupy the high position of moderator of the General Assembly. The reverend gentleman said he hesitated to accept at first, but he had been greatly pressed, so that at last he made up his mind to accept if asked. He had his ideas of how business should be conducted. All church business should be done in a business way and in a Christian-like spirit, no matter what burning question may come up, so that a good effect may be produced on all who hear or see. He thanked them for his election to the chair.

Dr. Sedgewick reported the reception of replies to the loval addresses sent by the last assembly to the Queen and Governor-Generals Lords Derby and Aberdeen. He also read a personal letter to the assembly from Lord Aberdeen. He also reported that he had commissioned Rev. Dr. Marton, of Trinidad, to represent this assembly before the assemblies of Britain; also to Rev. Mr. Houston, of the Church of Ireland.

A vote of thanks was tendered to Dr. Sedgewick, retiring moderator. Dr. Cochrane reported from the business committee. St. David's Church was completely filled at the opening service this evening.

HARTLEY WAS POISONED.

The Prisoner Ling Confesses - Mrs Hartley Told Bim She Had Poisoned Her Husband.

BRANTFORD, June 13 .- Startling developments were made yesterday at the inquest being held at New Durham on the cause of the death of Caleb Hartley. Prof. Ellis' analysis showed the presence of a quantity of arsenic in the liver, and the local doctors testified that the symptoms of death were the same as poisoning by arsenic.

The most sensational evidence was the confession of the hired man, Ling, the prisoner, who stated to a local preacher, the Rev. Mr. Best, that Mrs. Hartley had told him she had poisoned her husband with arsenic, and had offered Ling \$1,000 to say nothing about it. Mr. and Mrs. Ling, the parents of the

prisoner, testified that their son, a few days ago, had told them the same story. Ling's evidence to-day completely substantiated the truth of the evidence adduced yesterday by his father and mother and by Rev. Mr. Best, Baptist minister, to whom he made a confession, stating Mrs. Hartley had offered him a reward of \$1,000 to keep silence as to the fact that he knew that she had administered poison to her

husband. Ling contributed evidence of a damaging character as to his relations with Mrs. Hartley at frequent intervals during the absence of Mr. Hartley.

Mrs. Hartley was put on the stand, but acting under the advice of her counsel, absolutely refused to make any statement or answer any questions.

Fred Hartley, her son, was compelled to own that he suspected his mother had poisoned his father. During his evidence the jury was melted to tears and the scene was dramatic in the extreme. Other important evidence was advanced. No arrests are made so far, but they are expected hourly. At midnight the inquest was still in progress.

The London Free Press indorsed the civic bylaw which has for years been on the books of the City Council. A VERDICT OF "MURDER"

In the Hartley Poisoning Case-The Corener's Jury's Finding-The Widow and Ling in Jail.

Norwich, June 14. - The verdict has at last been reached, and Mrs. Maria Hartley and Louis Henry Ling are now on their way to Brantford jail to await their trial for the wilful murder of Caleb Hartley, Colds, Coughs, Sore Throat, Influenza, husband of the female prisoner. At the night session only three or four witnesses were examined, the principal being Fred Allen, and his father, William Allen, county constables, and Miss Quigg.

Fred Allen deposed to spending an evening at the Hartleys' house about the end of April. Caleb Hartley was away, and his wife and Ling were alone in the house. During the evening Mrs. Hartley came into her bedroom from the kitchen and tried to unlock a drawer, but not being able to called witness, who forced the lock, and saw Mrs. Hartley take a package out, which was sealed up like a druggist's parcel. kitchen, hiding it in the folds of her dress. 

The Cedar Pencil.

The day is not far distant when the term 'cedar pencil" will become quite a misnomer. At present the annual average consumption of lead pencils is at the rate of about four for every man, woman and child in the country. During the last ten years the quantity of cedar which has been cut in Florida to supply the demands of the American and German pencil makers has been enormous, the product of more than 2,000 acres of ground being consumed every year. The cedar of Florida will not hold out many years longer against demands of this kind, and already experiments are being tried with other wood. Very cheap pencils are generally made of poplar, which answers fairly well, but which will never be so valuable for the purpose as the oldfashioned and long-tried cedar. Of course, Florida has not a monopoly of the supply of cedar wood, but in adjoining States, where some is to be found, the work of destruction has been going on quite as fast, and it is doubtful whether any of our children will use pencils made of the most durable and most easily polished and trimmed wood we know of at the present time.

On the Part of Government Leaders in Parliament

Pointed Out and Deprecated by Hon. Wilfrid Laurier.

The Question of Free Lumber Incidentally Raised-Fishermen's Grievances Unredressed.

(Special to the ADVERTISER.) OTTAWA, June 13 .- The unusual spectacle of two prisoners at the bar of the House was furnished to-day by the appearance of J. P. Prevost and O. E. Larose in the eustody of the sergeant-at-arms. These were the two witnesses who when summoned by the committee on privileges and elections to testify in the case against Mr. Turcette, the member for Montmorency, made default. The parliamentary method of questioning the prisoners by way of motion through the Speaker first in English and then in French, and receiving a dual reply in the dual language, was gone through, and elicited the explanation from both men that owing to illness and death in Larose's family neither he or his partner-Prevostcould get away from Quebec when summoned. They both protested respect for the authority of the House and willingness to testify before the committee, and on motion of Sir John Thempson were discharged from custody.

On the motion to go into supply. Mr. Bennett brought up the question of the imposition of an export duty on logs for the purpose of reading a Washington dis-patch to the Detroit Free Press in which extracts from a reply sent by Mr. John Charlton to a circular from the Senate finance committee to lumbermen were given. Mr. Charlton pointed out in his letter that the provision in the Wilson Bill aimed at placing lumber on the free list by stipulating that it should only be free from countries which did not impose an export duty on logs, would not be effectual in accomplishing the object aimed at, and advising that the proviso should be changed in its wording so as to read as follows: "That if any export duty is laid by any foreign country upon any any of the articles named in paragraphs 672 to 683 inclusive, then all said articles imported from said country shall be subjected to the dities existing prior to the passage of this ict." This proviso Mr. Charlton is said to lave pointed out would inevitably prevent the imposition of an export duty by the Canadian Government and so secure the ree entrance of lumber from Canada into the United States. This, in Mr. Charlton's view, could only be secured by a provision in the Wilson Bill putting a duty not only on lumber but on all the articles of wood from paragraph 672 to 683 if Camda imposed an export duty on any of them. This list included shingle bolts, irewood, railway ties, ship timer, spar timber, square timber, planks, and several other articles of wood, all of which are made free by the Wilson Bill on the condition that Canada should effort to make a reciprocal arrangement so as to secure for certain the concession of free entry into the United States of lumber, railway ties and all the otherarticles of Canadian produce, as a standing disgrace to Mr. Charlton. The only jerson to whom Mr. Charlton was comparible in Mr. Bennett's opinion was BenedictAr-

Mr. Charlton in reply recited the hisory of the effort to obtain free entry into the United States of Canadian lumber. Herecalled the time when, having secured a promise at Washington to reduce the duty on lumber from \$2 to \$1, Sir John Macdonald authorized the Hon. Peter White, the present Speaker of the House, to quesion the Government as to whether under tiese circumstances they would repeal the expert duty of \$2 on logs. Sir John Macdolald had readily acquiesced, and subsequently that arrangement was carried out. The present American proposal was evidently acceptable to the Canadian Government as they had refrained from reimposing an export duty on logs in the hope of secuing the concessions under the Wilson Bill, and if he had been instrumental in safeguarding these concessions he was entitled to credit. He indorsed everything in the letter or memorial published in the Detroit Free

Mr. White, of Cardwell, argued that he provision in the Wilson Bill for which Ir. Charlton suggested a substitute, would have enabled the Canadian Government to evade the intention of it and have 'eimposed the export duty on logs and sill secured free lumber. It did not appear to strike Mr. White that this would have ben a gross breach of faith in view of the fict that the Canadian Government had pledjed itself to repeal the export duty on log if the American Congress reduced the dutyon lumber to \$1 per 1,000 feet, and how mich more is the Canadian Government bound to abide by its pledge when Congress mates lumber absolutely free?

Mr. Laurier told the House that Ir. Bennett would not have obstructed he motion to go into committee of supily without being authorized, if not instigaed by the Government. It was arranged and notice of it given that Mr. McMullen should to-day, on this motion, bring up the mater of superannuation abuses, but to-day he Minister of Finance had come over ad asked that it be postponed until to-morrow, and Mr. Laurier had consented. Nothing was said, however, of the Governmen's intention of springing this matter on he motion to go into supply, notwithstanding the practice of notice being given of such matters. Meredith Raised the Non-Resident Cry Against the Labor Man

Because He Lived in the Village of London West!

He (Mr. Meredith) referred to the fact that his opponents had gone outside the city to select a candidate, and said this was the first time such a thing had been done in London.

A Voice-Didn't Sir John go to the Pacific slope !

Mr. Meredith-He did; but this is the first time London has had to go outside its limits for a candidate. In reply to this allegation, Mr. Peddle

"Mr. Meredith has told you that this is the first time the people of London have had to go outside the city to secure a candidate. I say that I am a citizen of London because all my money has been spent was an Englishman, but now am I a Canadian, and such I shall live and die."



FARMERS AND SIR OLIVER.

Reasons Why the Premier Placed Agriculture Under the Charge of a Practical Farmer Minister.

At Toronto Junction Sir Oliver Mowat said: "Let me mention another thing which is an utter disqualification, which specially affects farmers, and through the farmers every other class of the people. In order that the great interest of agriculture should receive proper attention we have placed it in charge of a Minister who shall have no other department work to distract his attention. Every member of the Government is now fully occupied, without having anything to do with agricultural matters, except in Council, and only when the Minister of Agriculture brings such matters before Council. To provide, as the Conservative Opposition propose and desire the people to sanction their doing, that the agricultural work should be assigned to another department, which has already quite enough to do, is utterly absurd as a matter of public advantage. It would be a calamity that it should be so. (Applause.) The agricultural interest is the greatest in-terest in this country. It is not the only interest, but it is decidedly the greatest interest of this country, and it deserves special Minister, who shall give it all his thought and attention. The Patrons of Industry think that having 32 farmers, as we had in the last House, is not enough to secure attention to this class of duties, and they want to have 10 or 20 30 more farmers in the House, yet the Conservative opposition think that one farmer is too much to attend to such matters, and that he should be given another department to attend to at the same time. I necessarily studied out this question before we established a separate department for agriculture, and I speak that which I know and which experience has established, when I say that it is for the benefit of this country that that department should be separate from all others, that it should have a farmer at its head, a capable man, a skillful man, a successful farmer, in touch with our people, knowing personally what is needed in order that justice may be done to that great interest. The last census shows that the value of farm property, of farm implements and of live stock is over a thousand millions of dollars. The Conservative party have taken under their special care the manufacturing interests, but the value of the land and machinery used in the manufacturing interest is not one-fifth of the amount I have mentioned; it is only two hundred millions instead of a thousand millions.
