

Frozen Corpses Found on Italian Bark Castagna, Which Struck on Bar.

SEVEN MEN ARE RESCUED

Even These Were So Numbed That They Could Not Hang to Breeches Buoy.

[Canadian Press.]

Wellfleet, Mass., Feb. 17.-Four men perished when the Italian bark Castagna struck on the outer bar of Cape Cod, a mile and a half south of the Capoons Hollow lifesaving station today. Seven seamen, all badly frostbitten and nearly unconscious from exposure, were brought ashore by the lifesavers. The frozen corpses of Captain Garva and three sailors were left in the rigging, where the men had lashed themselves during the hours of darkness, to avoid being car-ried overboard by the seas that swept the decks.

A Blinding Storm.

The Castagna, from Montevideo for Boston, struck early today during a blinding snow storm, and a 60-rath northwest gale. The beach patrol sighted her at dawn, 300 yards off shore, with the surf breaking over her and threatening to pound her to pieces. The combined lifesaving crews from the Nausa and Capoon's Hollow stations set up their beach gun and shot three lines across the Castagna's deck, but the sailors were so benumbed by the cold that they were unable to hang to the breeches buoy

that the lifesavers had to wait some time before they could launch their ifeboat and pull out to the vessel. The lifesavers placed the living seanen in their boat and rowed back to shore. The curvivors were carried to the Marconi wireless station, where medical attention was given them. Al were so greatly overcome by exposure that none could give a coherent ac

is not often that prices reach the "It is not often that prices reach the point they have now," he said, "and when buyers are paying the figures that they are, the outlook for the general public getting cheaper beef is poor. The only bright spot I see in the situation is the large number of hogs that are being raised. The high prices that followed the scarcity of hogs has resulted in many more being raised than in some time past, and when heef prices soar, as they are more being raised than in some time past, and when beef prices soar, as they are certain to, I am expecting that many will turn to pork as the solution of the meat problem. There should be lots of pigs this year. In a few districts breeders have lost heavily through careless feeding, which has resulted in hog cholera outbreaks, but these cases are comparatively isolated, and will not in any way affect the general situation."

Convicted of Murder of John Representative Goes Over Sev-Benson, For Whom He Worked

PRIVATE BIG REALTY DEAL PENDING

ness Hanging-Death Pronounced in 20 Minutes.

Calgary, Alta., Feb. 17 .- Wm. Jasper Collins, who confessed he killed John T. Benson, a farmer, for whom he worked, but who later repudiated the confession and fought extradition from Kingston, Mo., where he was arrested, was hanged in the jail yard here early today.

Benson's house near Cereal was burned two years ago, and his charred body was found in the ruins. Soon after the funeral the authorities became suspicious when Collins disappeared. Later Collins was found in Missouri, where he and Benson formerly had lived. He was found guilty last November. Robbery was supposed to have been the motive for the

crime.
Collins walked to the scaffold and was pronounced dead twenty minutes after the drop was sprung. All except necessary officials were ex-cluded, no reporters being allowed to witness the execution

Echo of Wage Question.

Mr. Ryall contended that the market location would insure a much more desirable environment than out in Queen's Park. If the Ministerial Alliance wanted to institute reforms why didn't they get down to the root of the trouble, an under-paid living wage. The social survey had shown that the workers of London were receiving on an average \$100 less a year than they required to live under proper conditions.

The Attractions Offered.

Victor Leavitt, representative of the amusement company which proposes to put on the attractions enumerated them and declared that nothing objectionable would be shown, that there was not a "girl show" in the whole aggregation, but there were sensations galore, somersaulting automobiles, diving girls, and riding elephants, ocean waves and ferris wheels, Indian congresses, snakeland, "barrels of fun," but everything clean, entertaining and instructive. He even invited the Ministerial Alliance to constitute itself a board of censorship and he would close up any show they objected to, or they might appoint a representative to travel with or visit and inspect the shows on their tours the early part of the summer.



If Hon. Adam Beck does not go to London as high commissioner, the rivalry between him and Hon. Mr. Hanna for the leadership will become acute. It apparently looks to the Conservatives like good tactics to postpone the evil day of reckoning on the question of a new leader, and attempt in the meantime to get back to power under the old.

The whole proposal, however, reveals graphically the lack of unity in the Conservative party and at the same time a surprising want of confidence in a Government which has such a large numerical majority. It evident ly is afraid of the growing power and popularity of the Opposition under its present leader, and is anxious to have a general election at the earliest possible moment in the hope that it may get a renewal of power before th movement towards the Liberal party becomes overwhelming.

When a private corporation undertakes to build a railway the capital at its disposal is limited. The great object is to get the road built as quickly and as cheaply as possible. Defects are to be remedied later. Steep grades, sharp curves, shack stations, inadequate equipment, all these defects are permitted; anything to get the road in operation. Then, afterward, remedied. It would have been less costly in the end had the road been properly constructed at first. But circumstances compelled cheap and imperfect work at the outset.

The Liberal Government announced at the very beginning that this was not going to be its policy. It would construct a road that would not be calling for repairs a few months after the first contract was completed. Sharp curves and steep grades add to the running expenses of a railway; they were to be reduced to the minimum in construction, and not eliminated at a great cost afterwards. The road bed, the stations, the equipment, were all to be of a substantial and enduring character. The road was to be of a first-class character, and equal to any railway on the continent superior to most of them.

That money could have been saved by adopting the policy of cheapness and imperfection in construction is unquestioned. But it would not have

Scale on Fruit Trees. To the Editor of The Advertiser:

the cause is plain, sometimes it needs a good dear of looking for, but it is there, nevertheless, and a person of intelligence cannot rest until it has been discovered, and, if possible, removed. The insect trouble about to be described is not very but when present in large numbers would not be easily overlooked.

It is the oyster shell bark scale insect, and its shield, or covering bears on occasion a resemblance to an oyster shell. It is injurious to various fruit trees, as draining away the sap the plan is by draining away the sap the plan is weakened, or, where the scales occur in excessive numbers, it may be killed. The shield or scale covering the body of the insect in various stages is about one-twelfth of an inch in diameter, and is composed partly of the insect's moulted or cast-off skins, and partly of matter the insect. It infests apple. ted by the insect. It infests apple. pear, plum, cherry and allied fruit trees; it has also been found on currant as well as on thorn and heather.

I mately settling down to feed by inserting their sucking mouth parts into the bark. A secretion is given off which covers the larvae, and later the first moult takes place. The moulted skin is not thrown aside, but remains, to form part of the shield or covering of the insect, this covering being greatly added to and completed by secreted matter. In this second pleted by secreted matter. In this second stage the insect, anchored by its mouth parts, continues to suck up the sap, and the autumn hibernation takes place.

Infested trees should be sprayed in early spring with a wash composed of 2 gallons of coal oil, 1½ pounds of soft soap, 6 pounds of caustic soda, and 28 gallons of water. The soft soap should first be dissolved in one gallon of boiling water, and to this the coal oil should be added and to this the coal oil should be the mixture thoroughly churned until a cream-like emulsion results. The thorough churning is important. The six ough churning is important. The six pounds of caustic soda should then be dissolved in the remaining 27 gallons of water, and the emulsion added, the whole being well churned. The soft soap and coal oil emulsion will keep satisfactorily for some time, but the complete mixture for some time, but the complete mixture should be used at once. Yours faithfully, PARK GARDENER.














# WESTERNS BEAT THE SOCKS AND ARE TIED WITH A. M. C.

The jury was of the opnion that if the car had been equipped with airbrakes it could have stopped in time to prevent the accident, and recommended that the authorities insist on air-brake equipment for the London street railway. equipment for the London street railway

system.

The jury attached no blame to the crew of the street car for the accident, after hearing the evidence of the crew. All the evidence heard went to show that Clarkson had been struck by west-bound car 104 as he was aftempting to get out of the road of an eastbound car. The westbound car had struck him and he had been knocked up against the eastbound car, which in turn had thrown him on the corner of the fender of the

The jury was out about half an hour, when it returned its verdict.
