



uted in large measure to the operations of homes like these. These waif and stray and orphan children do not come from London alone, but from all over the kingdom. There is hardly a city, town or village which has not at some time or other contributed its quota to the great army of destitute children under Dr. Barnardo's care. As a matter of fact, of the children annually admitted to the homes, nearly cne-third are from the metropolitan

area, and at least two-third come from the provinces, from Wales, from Scotland and from Ireland, the whole kingdom thus being indebted to these national institutions.




