



SERIOUS BLOW TO CZAR

Life Guards Treason Profoundly Affects His Majesty.

Nicholas Orders Name of His Favorite Regiment Stricken From Rolls-Decision to Dismiss Goremykin Cabinet-Nothing Would Be Surprising Now, and Czar Is Virtually a Prisoner-Bomb Misses Mark.

St. Petersburg, June 30.—The crushing blow inflicted on the Emperor by the discovery of disaffection in his favorite regiment, the Probrejensky regiment of Life Guards, as shown by its adoption of resolutions recently up-holding all the actions of Parliament and announcing that the men wanted no more police duty entailing the slaying of brothers or fathers, has so affected His Majesty that he has ordered the name of the disloyal first battalion to be stricken from the roll of the Imperial Guards. In addition, the soldiers and officers of the battalion have been darnived forever of the special rights

and officers of the special rights enjoyed by guardsmen and hereafter the battailon will be designated "the special infantry battailon."

The general staff no longer conceals its fear that the morale of the entire army is profoundly shaken, and that with Parliament championing the cause with Parliament championing the cause of the mutineers in each instance as it arises the first big test may find troops in line up as the French guards did two days before the Bastille fell, on the side of the people and against the



FISHING FOR BIRDS.

Catching Gulls and Albatross With Rod and Line.

Curious though it may seem, it is a fact that birds are caught with rod and line in many parts of the world. The pastime is declared to be almost as fascinating as fishing. Gulls in Newfoundland are caught in this way in large quantities. In New England fishing for gulls and petrels is an important in-

The method of bird fishing is practically the same as that of ordinary fishing. Two men go out in a dory and throw pieces of cod liver on the water. When large quantities of birds have been attracted to the spot more cod liver is thrown out on a hook. This the birds greedily swallow and thus fail easy victims.

Albatross are fished for in the same way off the Cape of Good Hope. A piece of pork is attached to a long line and thrown overboard. The bird will eye it for a long time, gradually and cautiously making toward it. Suddenly he will seize it and hold it in his beak. When he discovers that he is caught he will sit on the water and vigorously flap his wings. However, he will be drawn into the boat and made a cap-

Albatross fishing is good sport, since the bird requires careful handling. So long as he pulls against the line it is easy enough. The moment, however, he swims forward the hook will drop from his beak unless it is skillfully manipulated, and the bird will find him-

A CURIOSITY IN BOOKS. The Famous Chained Library of

Wimbourne, Ireland. Wimbourne, Ireland, is noted for many things, but its famous chained library is perhaps the most notable of its curiosities. The library possesses unique interest as being one earliest attempts to disseminate knowledge among the people. The collection was made accessible to the people in 1686 and numbers some 200 volumes. The scarcity of books and the value of the collection are both indicated in the care taken for their preservation, and especially against loss of such treasures by theft. By means of chains and rods the books were securely fastened to the shelves, and these chains, it is rather surprising to learn, ware not removed until 1857, when the library fittings were repaired. Among the interesting works of the collection is a copy of the first edition of Sir Walter Raleigh's "History of the World," 1614. TO REPEAL PENSIONS

Finance Minister Introduces Bill in the Commons.

Unpopular Measure to Be Repealed Although Minister Introducing It Thinks Principle of Act Repealed Is Right and Will Yet Be Accepted by the People-Lord's Day Amendment to Cause Confusion.

Ottawa, June 30.—In the House yesterday Mr. Fielding introduced his bill to repeal the act respecting annuities to certain Privy Councillors. The measure sets forth that the act of last session is repealed from July 1, 1906. In reply to a question for an explanation, Mr. Fielding recalled the fact that near the certain terms of the certain terms. the end of last session a series of fin-ancial measures were presented to the House. For all these measures, he thought, reasons more or less forcible could be given. Nevertheless, it must be confessed that the whole of these be confessed that the whole of these financial matters, coming forward at that stage of the session, had not been received with any wild enthusiasm by the general public. This particular measure had been the subject of very special criticism, and the Government had come to the conclusion to present to the House a bill repealing what was regarded as an obnoxious measure. The measure was right in principle, and, while it was the present very unpopular, he believed the time would come when it would be received in a different way.

Question of Vested Rights Mr. Foster inquired whether the Government had taken into consideration ernment had taken into consideration the matter of vested rights, which might have been created under the bill. Cer-tain action might have been taken by the beneficiaries of the act which in-volved others. Had any provison been made to meet such cases.

Mr. Fielding replied that having re-

Mr. Piche next moved that clause 2 be amended by validating all laws now in force or hereafter to be passed relating to the observance of the Lord's Day which came within the exclusive jurisdiction of Provincial Legislatures.

Mr. Aylesworth said he was glad to see the amendment proposed. It was

Mr. Aylesworth said ne was glad to see the amendment proposed. It was a recognition of the principles that ought to be on the face of the statute, a recognition of the co-ordinate powers of the provinces to legislate on the subject. That amendment, he believed, would make the bill less disagreeable to the neople of Ouchec. eople of Quebe What Amendment Attempts.

Mr. Borden said the amendment at-empted to place in each Provincial egislature the power to legalize buying, selling, laboring and causing oth-

ers to labor for gain on Sunday.

Armand Lavergne: Can this Parliament delegate to a province any jurisdiction over criminal matters?

It was proper for this Parliament to fix a day of rest, but details as to observance should be relegated to the provinces. He expressed no opinion as to the constitutionality or the efficiency of the proposed amendment.


