MAGISTRATE GIVES EVIDENCE IN CASE BEFORE HIMSELF

Mr. Ingalls, J. P., of Thamesville, Delivers the Oath to Himself in his Own Court, and Gives Evidence in a case in which he himself will give judgment.

The trials of the officers who have to enforce the liquor laws of Ontario are notorious. In Kent County they have had more than their share. During the past year or two some three people have lost their licenses for committing a third offense, and one man was sent to jail for the second offense of selling liquor without a license.

On the 29th of December, 1904, Joseph Clark, a storekeeper of Craton, was fined \$100 and costs by Judge Houston of Chatham, for a first offense of selling liquor without a license, the case being an aggravating one, and the fine being the highest that could be imposed.

On the 9th of March, 1906, an information was laid by Inspector Booth of East Kent, against Clark for having on the 7th of March sold liquor without a license, setting up the previous conviction. Clark was moved to appear before W. Ingalls, J. P., of Thamesville, on the 13th of March.

On the 13th, Mr. Clark did not appear and a bench warrant was issued for his arrest. On the 12th of March Clark appeared before the J. P. and wanted to plead guilty of the first offense, and acknowledged that he sold liquor during the time set forth in the information. The magistrate told him that he would deal with the matter on the day appointed for the trial and told him to come then. Clark in the meantime got advice and did not appear.

On the 12th of June a local constable at Thamesville with the bench warrant arrested Clark and brought him to Thamesville. While the constable was telephoning Crown Attorney H. D. Smith of Chatham, Clark slipped away, and the constable could not find him.

On the 27th of June another constable arrested him, and the trial was started. When he was arraigned Clark refused to plead, hiring Gilbert G. L. Lewis, of Chatham, to bring him on to testify the following day. It was claimed that the prisoner could not be called upon to plead to the information, inasmuch as he was charged with selling liquor on the 7th of March, and 30 days prior thereto; that the man was illegally arrested, and did not inform the prisoner what he was arrested for, and the prisoner was in the court against his will; that the magistrate was not qualified to try the case, as he was not qualified to take the information, and that although he subsequently got more property, he had taken no oath and had no jurisdiction.

The magistrate over-ruled the objections and entered a plea of not guilty for the defendant, and the case proceeded.

In the meantime, owing to the length of time between the laying of the information and the apprehending of the prisoner, the crown witnesses could not be got, leaving the chances largely against the crown proving sufficiently strong for the

A VALUABLE HORSE

Every horseman in this vicinity will be interested to learn of the recent purchase of Messrs. Gilbert, Donovan and Leithridge. They have bought the elegant cherry bay stallion "Shadland Nutmaber," formerly owned by Powell Bros., of Shadland, Penn. The purchase was made through Mr. Frank Oates, of Detroit. A Planet reporter, while in Mr. Walt Leithridge's livery barns yesterday was shown this magnificent animal. Shadland Nutmaber is without a doubt one of the most superb specimens of horseflesh that has ever been owned by local men. He stands 16 hands high, weighs 1,300 pounds, and has an unblemished pedigree which dates back as far as 1700.

The new stallion was bred by Wilkes Nutwood, and his dam was Amber. His sire's record was 2:24 3/4 and two of his colts, Carl Wilkes and Nur Wilkes, have records of 2:04 1/4 and 2:16 1/4 respectively. Several other colts have records under 3:20. Nutwood, the grandsire of Shadland Nutmaber, holds the record for being the only horse ever able to make one mile at the enormous fee of \$1,000.

Those who may be interested may see this fine horse at the Rankin barns, where the proprietors are at present keeping him.

End of Atlas Loan. Toronto, June 30.—The master-liquorists yesterday received a request from the National Trust Co., that the Atlas Loan accounts, as passed by Referee McLean, be accepted by the court and the company's remuneration fixed. A dividend of 45 cents on the dollar is declared to creditors and debenture-holders, which is 5 cents more than the interim dividend. As no dividend planing the accounts, as passed in evidence, had been sworn to, there will be some further delay. The gross amount realized on the assets has been \$1,185,172, and the net amount is a little over \$426,000. From contributors \$47,494 was realized, of which \$12,000 was claimed to be due to the careful audit of the books made by the liquidator.

HOME AND SANITORIUM FOR TUBERCULAR PATIENTS

Dr. J. H. Duncan Discusses This Important Subject in a Well Written Letter to The Planet, Dated at Valmore Ranch, Watrons, New Mexico.

The following letter very kindly written to this journal by Dr. J. H. Duncan is self explanatory and provides excellent food for thought on a subject which is of vital importance to the people of this country.

Valmore Ranch, Watrons, N. M., June 25, '06.
To the Editor of The Planet:
Dear Sir—In our counties of Lambton, Kent and Essex the establishment of a Home and Sanatorium for tubercular patients has for some months been under discussion. In this matter members of Municipal Councils must act, but with an awakened public behind them they cannot—say they probably dare not act. I address this letter to you, with the object of awakening public interest, hoping that you may lend the aid of your wide circulation to the good cause. The most intelligent communities in the world have aroused themselves to the consciousness that as a matter of self preservation as well as of philanthropy, they must take care of the tubercular patients in their midst who either cannot or will not take care of themselves, and they are not shrinking from the expense necessarily involved. While the least intelligent communities are sleepily folding their hands or greedily clinging to their purse strings and allowing the source to spread.

The following considerations require to be clearly understood:

1. Tuberculosis is an infectious disease which is communicable to the healthy and unaffected are constantly being exposed.
2. Tuberculosis is in its early stages, a distinctly curable disease.
3. In the more advanced stages the disease may ordinarily be arrested, life prolonged, and contagion limited.
4. In all but its earliest stages, the patients who suffer are a source of risk to others, while in its latest stages the disease becomes a source of intense public danger.

From the above facts, as a matter of personal, family and public interest, we may draw the following conclusions:

1. Tubercular patients should be removed to health as promptly as possible, for when cured all danger to the community ceases.
2. All patients in a more advanced condition should have the disease arrested, and be carefully educated as to their conduct so as to minimize the dangers of spreading the infection.
3. That cases hopelessly advanced should be so taken care of that they may not only spend their declining days in comfort, but should be so looked after that they cease to be a menace to the public.

Fortunately the people of the above mentioned three counties are for the most part able to look after their patients. The early cases can be sent to Sanatoria in high altitudes with clear, dry atmospheres and then be restored. The more advanced but still hopeful cases may be sent to conditions less stringent, or may, under proper instructions be nursed at home to arrest the disease even though the process be exceedingly costly both as to time and money. Even the hopelessly advanced cases may, in comfortable homes, be so taken care of that little risk is incurred either by those in the home or by the general public.

Unfortunately, however, all the dwellers in these counties are not financially able to care for either the cure of the curable or the proper care of the unhelpful cases.

The question then arises what is to become of those cases which cannot be properly dealt with by private resources? The answer at present is, the incipient cases will become serious, the serious cases will become hopeless, and all along the course of melancholy, death will be the necessary result of ever widening infection, affecting alike the rich and the poor.

There are young people in our midst suffering from tuberculosis who have no home but a boarding house, or, as the case may be, the home of his or her employer. There are families that cannot send their children away from home if they be infected. There are fathers and mothers who are in a position to do so.

THE LORDS DAY BILL.

A large part of the time of the Dominion Government last week was devoted to the Lord's Day Bill. The measure was in the hands of Mr. Aylesworth, minister of justice, to whose charge it fell on the retirement of Mr. Fitzpatrick. Many amendments were made enlarging the number of works of supposed necessity allowable on the first day of the week. Among these are operations connected with fishing, the saving of crops under certain conditions, the manufacture of maple sugar and syrup, the hiring of teams and small boats by persons for their own use or that of their family in driving or sailing on Sunday. The clause permitting Jews and Seventh Day Christians to work at their own occupations in secluded places on Sunday, provided they have consistently observed Saturday as the Sabbath, was struck out after a long and animated debate.

But the most important change in the measure is that introduced and rushed through on Friday. Several days before Mr. Piche, one of the Montreal members supporting the Government, tried to amend the principal enacting clause of the bill by providing that any law, now or hereafter in force in any of the provinces should not be set aside by the Lord's Day Act.

The effect of this change would be to enable Mr. Piche's province, or any other, to set aside the measure in its application to any matter within the scope of provincial powers. The general power of the Dominion to legislate for Sunday observance would so far be abrogated by the parliament itself and delegated to the provinces. Mr. Piche's motion was rejected at the time. But by Friday the minister in charge of the measure had changed his mind, and when Mr. Piche proposed a re-consideration of the clause which had long before been adopted, and followed the motion by renewing his amendment in another form. Mr. Aylesworth to the surprise of many supported the motion, declaring himself a life-long advocate of provincial rights. It was pointed out by Mr. Borden that the amendment gave the provinces power to repeal or destroy the Lord's Day Act in so far as the measure prohibited work, labor and business on Sunday. The portion dealing with Sunday amusements and recreations might be left, and that was the part which should go under provincial control if any were transferred. Different provinces and races had their own ideas about Sunday recreation, but all should be agreed on the necessity of preserving the Lord's Day as a day of rest. Sir Wilfrid Laurier supported Piche's amendment, which was adopted.

FASHION HINTS



GIRLS' BOX-JACKET.
 No. 4162.

The little girls' box-jacket pictured here is made of dark blue summer cheviot. Shoulder and under-arm seams are used in shaping the garment, while the two-seam coat sleeve is completed with a fancy cuff, and gathers adjust the fullness at the armhole. The broad scalloped collar is trimmed with a band of the material, machine stitched, and the closing is made with buttons and buttonholes or cord loops. Two pockets are inserted, one on each side of the center front, though their use is optional. The lining is cut the same as the outer portions, and the fronts are faced with the material. Pongee, taffeta, light-weight cloth, linen, duck, crash, pique, and cashmere are a few of the fabrics recommended; and for trimming, broad, stitched bands of contrasting material, or linen are a few suggestions. A coat of this kind may be worn with odd dresses, or made of the same material to complete a costume. The pattern is cut in five sizes from 4 to 12 years. Size 8 will require 2 yards of 42-inch material, while the quantity of trimming depends entirely upon the mode of applying. Five sizes, 4 to 12 years.

LADIES' COSTUME.

There is nothing prettier for outing wear than a sailor costume, and the one portrayed here is of blue linen, trimmed with braid and a sailor knot of blue silk. The blouse is made to slip over the head and left to pouch slightly all around over the belt, though if preferred the waist may be drawn down at the back. The applied yoke, which is a pretty feature, may be used or not, and choice is given between a square sailor collar or one that is in round effect. In the full-length sleeve narrow tucks confine the fullness at the cuff, and reversed cuffs finish the shorter length. A removable shield is supplied, and this may be of the same material as the dress or of white goods. Seven gores are used for shaping the skirt which is in round length, and the closing is at the back underneath the inverted plait. Among the suitable materials suggested for making a costume of this kind are light-weight flannel, serge, cashmere, pique, linen, chambray, gingham, cotton cheviot, mohair and pongee. Bands of contrasting material, or braid will be found serviceable for trimming. Any style of belt may be worn. The pattern is cut in five sizes, from 32 to 40 inches bust measure. Once a Nest of Pirates.
Lundy, in the Bristol Channel, is an island where one may see an earthquake at any time. There is nothing alarming about these "earthquakes," however. They are simply certain crevasses in the west of the island, which the local people call by that name. Lundy in former centuries was a notorious nest of pirates. In King Henry III's time William de Marisco, a traitor to the king, built a castle there and set up as an early Captain Kidd. And so it went on through the centuries until in the middle of the eighteenth Thomas Benson, a Barnstable merchant, who was then lessee of the island, was convicted of piracy and smuggling and expelled. He had a contract for carrying convicts to the American colonies and used quietly to land them on Lundy and see their labor there.

FIRST CASE OF LYNCH LAW.
The Hanging of a Murderer By His Father in Ireland—Thackeray's Description of the Tragedy.

So many different versions and explanations of the term lynch law have arisen are even yet added to that it seems fitting to recount the tragic incident which has since given a name to so many calamitous occurrences not only in our land, but on occasion also in that of others.

The very name of "Lynch" gives the direct clue to the land of its origin—Ireland. Thackeray in his "Irish Sketch Book" in Chapter 1, which treats of Galway, thus speaks of an occurrence within its precincts which in 1842 bore the gruesome "momentum" so grimly described in the words following:

"Then there is Lombard street, otherwise called Dead Man's lane," with a raw head and crossbones and a memento mori over the door where the dreadful tragedy of the Lynches was acted in 1493. If Galway is the Home of Connaught, James Fitzstephen Lynch, the mayor, may be considered as the Lucius Junius Brutus thereof. Lynch had a son who went to Spain as master of one of his father's ships and, being of a wild, extravagant turn, there contracted debts, drew bills and alarmed his father's correspondent, who sent a clerk and nephew of his own back to young Lynch's ship to Galway to settle accounts. On the fifteenth day young Lynch threw the Spaniard overboard. Coming back to his own country, he reformed his life a little and was on the point of marrying one of the Blakes, Burkes or Boddins or others when a seaman who had sailed with him, being on the point of death, confessed the murder in which he had been a participator.

"Hereon the father, who was chief magistrate of the town, tried his son and sentenced him to death, and when the clan Lynch rose in a body to rescue the young man and divert such a disgrace from the family it is said that Fitzstephen Lynch hanged the culprit with his own hands. A tragedy called 'The Warden of Galway' has been written on the subject and was acted a few nights before my arrival."

Those infected who cannot leave those under their care will be spared the death itself is upon them, and by that time the whole household probably, and the house certainly are bearing the burden of the fatal infection. New York, June 29.—Harry Kendall Thaw was indicted yesterday for murder in the first degree for the killing of Stanford White last Monday night in Madison square Roof Garden. His wife, Evelyn Nesbitt Thaw, appeared as a witness before the grand jury, but begged to be excused from giving any testimony whatever. Assistant District Attorney Garvan and the jurors did not insist that she should answer any questions. Thaw will plead to the indictment in court to-day.

Threw Stone At Train.

Port Arthur, June 29.—Louis C. Rioux, arrested for throwing a stone at a Canadian Pacific train near White River a few days ago, was yesterday morning sentenced to three and a half years' imprisonment in Kingston Penitentiary. The stone which Rioux threw struck a passenger on the head, necessitating his removal to Port Arthur Hospital.

Eva Booth Ill.

New York, June 29.—Miss Evangeline Booth, commander of the Salvation Army in the United States, is seriously ill at her home here, and all her public engagements have been cancelled.

Business Methods.
Great numbers of vast fortunes in this country have been and are being built up on the very ignorance of the masses in regard to business methods. The schemers bank on it that it is easy to swindle people who do not know how to protect their property. They thrive on the ignorance of their fellows. They know that a shrewd advertisement, a cunningly worded circular, a hypnotic appeal, will bring the hard earnings of these unsuspecting people out of hiding places into their own coffers.

Slovenliness In Speech.
Do not drift into careless habits of speech. Slang, which is slovenliness in speech, is as contemptible as slovenliness in dress. Many people use slang because they are too lazy to think of proper forms for the expression of their thought. The clothing of our minds certainly ought to be regarded before that of our bodies.

SERIOUS BLOW TO CZAR

Life Guards Treason Profoundly Affects His Majesty.

Nicholas Orders Name of His Favorite Regiment Stricken From Rolls—Decision to Dismiss Goremykin Cabinet—Nothing Would Be Surprising Now, and Czar is Virtually a Prisoner—Bomb Misses Mark.

St. Petersburg, June 30.—The crushing blow inflicted on the Emperor by the discovery of disaffection in his favorite regiment, the Probrejensky regiment of Life Guards, as shown by its adoption of resolutions recently upholding all the actions of Parliament and announcing that the men wanted no more police duty entailing the slaying of brothers or fathers, has so affected His Majesty that he has ordered the name of the disloyal first battalion to be stricken from the roll of the Imperial Guards. In addition, the soldiers and officers of the battalion have been deprived forever of the special rights enjoyed by guardsmen hereafter. The battalion will be designated "the special infantry battalion."

The general staff no longer conceals its fear that the morale of the entire army is profoundly shaken, and that with Parliament championing the cause of the mutineers in each instance as it arises the first big test may find troops in line up as the French guards did two days before the Bastille fell, on the side of the people and against the monarchy.

To Dismiss Goremykin.

The Slovo yesterday says that the reactionary court camrilla, and have precipitated a definite decision, not only not to dissolve Parliament, but to dismiss the Goremykin Cabinet, and that in the meantime the Emperor has directed the Ministers to reply to all interpellations in Parliament.

Count Witte, from his self imposed exile abroad, has despatched several urgent telegrams here, emphasizing the necessity of putting a stop to the anti-Jewish outbreaks, the impression of which on the outside world has seriously affected Russia's credit.

An official denial is given in the report that the Emperor and court are leaving Peterhof and returning to Tsarskoe-Selo, owing to the discovery of a revolutionary plot among the palace servants.

Czar Virtually a Prisoner.

Since the revelations that disloyalty had invaded even His Majesty's Own Regiment (the Probrejensky Regiment of the Guards), it is asserted here that nothing would be surprising, Gen. Treponoff, commander of the palace, who is personally charged with protecting the safety of the Emperor's person, has redoubled his precautions. The garrison at Peterhof has been strengthened by a guard of Cossacks and the detachment of Cossacks about the palace has been doubled. The servants of the palace, as heretofore, are the Emperor's faithful Mamelukes and Tartars, some of whom do not speak the Russian language. The Russian servants are confined for the time being to their kitchens and valets, but among these the terrorists have frequently boasted that they had spies. Newsboys carrying sacks are forbidden to enter the grounds of the old palace, to which the public is admitted, and no one is allowed within the walls surrounding the grounds of the small palace, where the imperial family resides, without a permit.

Bomb Misses Mark.

Warsaw, Russian Poland, June 30.—A bomb was thrown at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon at the chief of railroad gendarmes. Col. Muradoff, while he was driving through the streets in a cab. The cabman and a gendarme who accompanied Col. Muradoff were severely wounded, the colonel was slightly injured, and the horse attached to the cab was killed. The man who threw the bomb escaped.

Passants Amazed.

Nizhni Novgorod, Russia, June 30.—The peasants of this province are not only annexing the land of the gentry, but are taking portions of the land of the wall-to-do peasants. Property in the vicinity of Samara, valued at about \$250,000, has been destroyed by the peasants during the past month.

Two Others Refused.

Moscow, June 30.—Special despatches to The Russky Sivo say that two regimentals at Tzlatsethopol have refused to fire on strikers.

Found Tied Near River.

Brandon, Man., June 30.—A man named Jack Berry was discovered Thursday night by some men passing, with his hands and feet securely bound, lying in the scrub near the river, just east of the Western Canada Flour Mills in this city. Berry had been drinking for several days, and it is thought that his companions led him down to the river and bound him, for the purpose of robbery, as he was known to have money. He can give little information as to his doings.

Stole Relief Blankets.

San Francisco, June 30.—Accused of selling large quantities of blankets and appropriating the money, John Clark, superintendent of Red Cross relief station at Golden Gate Park, and George Bryant, engineer at the children's playground in the park, who it is alleged, aided and abetted Clark, were arrested.

Discipline At R. M. C. Poor.

Kingston, June 30.—At the closing exercises in connection with the Royal Military College yesterday, Lieut-Col. Taylor, the first Canadian commandant of the college, reported that the health of the cadets had been fair; conduct fair, and discipline poor. The result of the examinations had been satisfactory.

Canada's New Zealand Fair Staff.

Ottawa, June 30.—The staff of the Canadian Exhibition Commission at the Christ Church, New Zealand. Exhibition will be as follows: Supt. W. A. Burns, associated with him T. H. Race, S. L. Broadbent, A. W. Despard and H. C. Knowlton. The Canadian exhibit is now being shipped.

Two Prominent Business Men Under Oath Give Each Other the Lie—Profits For Non-Workers.

Toronto, June 29.—Perjury was committed yesterday afternoon in connection with the investigation of the Douglas-Douglas case. Two prominent Toronto business men gave each other the lie under oath. Thomas Douglas, roofing contractor on St. Lawrence Market swore he had several sums of money to Architect Beaumont Jarvis, who was in charge of the work. Architect Beaumont Jarvis denied it absolutely and positively. He swore that money had been offered to him by Mr. Douglas and he had refused it. Thomas Douglas also swore he paid sums of money to J. W. Siddall, another architect on the work. Architect J. W. Siddall swore that he had received the money which Mr. Douglas claimed to have paid to him. Some of the money was for legitimate work. Mr. Douglas corroborated this. John S. Champ, bookkeeper for Douglas Bros. swore that he had erased the name of Jarvis and changed it to Jones in the records of payments from the firm's books and that he had also erased the name of Siddall. He said he did it to save the architects from trouble.

Champ also swore he had taken envelopes which he supposed contained money from Architect Jarvis' office and that on one occasion he gave the envelopes to Mr. Jarvis, who put it in his pocket.

Architect Jarvis swore he refused money from the bookkeeper as well as from Mr. Douglas. And there you are.

Another fact brought out was that two tenders for the roof work at the north end of St. Lawrence Market got \$500 each for not doing the work. On the west pipe contract two tenders got \$250 each, two more \$200 each and the contractor who did the work did not make any money at all on it.

The above are the features which made the civic enquiry decidedly interesting yesterday. There is one more contractor, who is from Preston, to give evidence.

Crothers, St. Thomas, barister, make up the commission appointed by the Ontario Government to enquire into the question of the cost of the production of school textbooks. Premier Whitney made the announcement yesterday. The appointment arises out of one of the provisions of the new Education Act.

New Sheriff of York.

Toronto, June 30.—Mayor Daville of Aurora is the new sheriff for York County, in succession to the late Dr. J. H. Widdfield. Premier Whitney gave definite announcement of the appointment yesterday afternoon. Francis Turner Daville is a native of Wexford County, having been born in the little village of Middleford sixty years ago. Going to Aurora 27 years ago he established in a small way the Daville Tannery, which has since grown to large proportions and is still under Mr. Daville's management.

Bookies Go Up For Trial.

Toronto, June 30.—The following "hand book" operators were formally committed for trial yesterday by Magistrate Kingsford, while the cases against the frequenters were adjourned for a week: Richard Jackson, Fred Vose, Samuel Clapp, Frank Bees, Herbert Frankland, Frederick Allison, John Allison, and William Allison.

Saskatchewan Educational Council.

Regina, June 30.—The appointment of the following educational council is announced: William Grayson, Moose Jaw; T. H. McGuire, Prince Albert, both for two years, and A. H. Smith, Moosomin; W. H. Sparling, Battleford, and D. Gilles, St. Andrews, for three years.

Great Theologian Dead.

San Anselmo, Cal., June 30.—The Rev. William Alexander, D.D., LL.D., professor of church history in the Presbyterian Theological Seminary, died at his home here yesterday.

BLAME BELONGS TO WHOM? CHARGE OF THEFT

Gaol Physician Dr. Charteris' Position On The Myers Case

HE HAD NO APPLIANCES

In view of the publication in this journal of a report from the Toronto World in reference to the Myers case, it is only fair to Dr. Charteris, the gaol physician, to give publicity to the following information which has come out later in reference to the matter.

W. A. Thrasher, a Former Chathamite, is in a Pretty Serious Trouble.

Walter A. Thrasher, Collector of Inland Revenue, of Sarnia, was arrested in that place on Saturday. He was brought to this city yesterday by P. C. Tom Groves to answer to a charge of stealing \$200 from Robert Winters, of Leamington.

The charge dates back to 1898, when Thrasher was in the law business here. He acted for Winters in taking out two mortgages, one for \$200 and the other for \$500.

Thrasher was formerly secretary of the West Kent Liberal Association, and it was as a reward for his services to his party that he was appointed Collector of Inland Revenue at London, and afterwards moved to Sarnia.

Before Judge Houston, this morning, James Simpson was charged with using grossly insulting language to his wife and was fined \$3 and costs, \$8 in all.

There was also a charge of assault against the prisoner, but it was not proceeded with, it being understood that the prisoner and his wife intend to obtain a separation and that, providing the separation papers are drawn up this afternoon, the prosecution will withdraw this charge.
