Niagara Falls, March 11.—A car jumped the track on the steel arch bridge of the Grand Trunk over the river, tore up the wooden filling between the heavy stringers, broke away from the train about the middle of the bridge and tottered on the edge Saturday.

Car Jumps the Track.

As the engine passed the water-tank switch, about 600 years from the eastern end of the bridge, an empty refrigerator car about the middle of the train left the rails. It bumped along the ties, across Lewiston avenue, tearing up the planking and ballast.

There being a sharp curve around the postoffice at the American entrance to the bridge, the engineer did not hear the cries of spectators nor see the signals of the crew. The train kept on over the bridge, the derailed car staying well within the rails, but simashing the railroad deck.

The car broke loose when about half were cares. It supposed to come wide.

The car broke loose when about half way across. It swerved to one side, ripped through the pipe railing and hung as if in a balance.

Stops At Edge of Bridge.

The next car, jerked from the track by breaking of the train, veered off. One of the trucks caught in the bridge and the car stopped at the edge, one end swaying over the river.

The wrecking crews of both the New York Central and the Grand Trunk hauled off the forward and rear ends of the train. They they carefully pulled the two cars back, jacked them up and put them on the rails.

Canadian Parents' Great Sen.
Sixty years ago Feb. 11, 1907, Thoa.
Alva Edison, the "electrical wisard,"
was born in the little town of Milan,
Ohio, of Canadian parents. At this
time electricity was known, but known
rather as a thing to fear than as a
thing to use. At the age of 12 young
Edison became a railroad newsboy,
and began in his spare moments to
experiment in chemistry. Gaining the
exclusive right of selling newspapers
on his line, and coming into possession of some old type, he began editing and publishing a paper of his own,
The Grand Trunk Herald, the first
newspaper to be printed on a train,
A stationmaster became interested in
the boy, and taught him telegraphy.
It was Edison's initiation into the
mysteries of electricity. He experimented with the machine and with
the wonderful fluid, and soon succeeded in producing an automatic repeater by which messages could be
sent from one wire to another without the intervention of the operator.
His next invention, perfected while
he was an operator at Boston, was
his system of dupler telegraphy. The
quadruplex and sextuplex systems
followed later. In 1871 he invented
the printing telegraph or the broker's
"ticker," and established a workshop
at Newark for the manufacture of
these instruments. His inventive faculties now got full play, and he turned out one invention after another in
quick succession. His list of patents
includes the megaphone, the phonograph, the carbon telephone transmitter, the incandescent light, the
kinetoscope, various metallurgic methods and a number of improvements
to steel railway motors. His inventions total over five hundred, and
of these about a quarter refer to telegraphy.

Moving Canada In France Monsieur Leo Lefebvre of Paris, rance, sent to Canada by the French France, sent to Canada by the French Government in order to secure moving pictures for public exhibition there, has sailed for Europe. The only Toronto picture he secured was the busy King and Yonge street corner. He has been in Canada four months and a half, and will return to this continent next year, when he will take mining pictures from Seattle northward, and will test the rigors of the Alaskan climate.

His present trip has been devoted chiefly to the lumbering industry. He has taken pictures of timber in every stage of manufacture in the various mills, and has visited some of the greatest mining camps of the West. His experiences in British Columbia were somewhat arduous. He had his delicate instruments carried to camps to which a footpath was the only means of access. The roads were at times rough and dangerous, but he believes the pictures secured will be well worth the trouble.

Besides these very instructive views, Mr. Lefebvre has taken a number which illustrate the beauty of Canada. These include views of Niagara and other Falls, the Thousand Islands, the Rockies from a C. P. R. train, etc. He has also a set illustrative of the codfishing industry.

The trips being taken by this French Commissioner are a sign of the progress of France along the lines of free education. The pictures are to be exhibited at what are known as the "conferences populaires," which are free illustrated lectures, to which any citizen may gain admittance. The subjects treated include many branches of study, agriculture, geography, the aris, and should grove most useful in raising the standard of national intelligence. "People in France have no idea that Canada is so big." declares Mr. Lefebvre, whose views will be a splendid immigration agent for the Dominion wherever they are shown.

Good Land In the North

Good Land in the North.

Reports have been received by the Department of Lands, Forests and Mines regarding the work of surveyors in northern Ontario during the past season. In all 35 townships in the Districts of Algoma and Nipissing have been outlined or surveyed. Messrs. Speight and Van Nostrand located the boundary lines of eight townships in the former district, while Surveyor Niven performed a similar task between the Missanabio and Metagami Rivers. Both parties found that from 75 to 90 per cent. of the land could be converted into excellent farms. In Nesbitt and Aubin, laid out by E. D. Bolton, of Listowel; Dargavel and Lennox, surveyed by Surveyor Hutcheon, Guelph; Reid and Carnegie, laid out by Surveyor Fitton, Orillia, and in Lucas, Duff and Calder, where the work was done by Messrs. Cavana and Watson, there are good prospects for the agriculturists, as a clay and clay loam soil prevails. Sydere, surveyed by J. W. Tyrrell, is heavily wooded, and is only a medium one, therefore, for agricultural purposes. The Townships of Bradburn and Beck, laid out by Mr. Fitsgespld, of Peterborough, are in part timbered with spruce from 12 to 16 inches in diameter. About fifty per cent. of the two areas would be suitable for immediate settlement. It is supposed that the Grand Trunk Pacific will pass through the Township of Clute, which was surveyed by Mr. Galbraith, of Bracebridge, and it is estimated that 85 per cent. of it will be suitable for the farmer. Fournier and Ottoway Townships were learned by O. L. S. Code, of Alvinston, to consist of from 70 to 80 per cent. of critile land. The former is covered with bush. J. J. Newman, Windsor, did the work in the Townships of Marathon and Sherring, in the district of Nipissing. The soil there is of fertile loam, with spruce, popiar, deal tamarac and balm of Gilead. J. H. Smith found Sweatman and Stimson Townships in the great clay belt to be of good agricultural land, fairly well timbered and watered.

Ottawa, March 9.—Canadians far away from the capital will have some difficulty in figuring in their mind's eye the scene in the Commons yesterday afternoon. With it went the last vestige of self respect that the popular chamber is supposed to have been possessed of. It declared by its action, or want of action, that the reputation of the House, the reputation of the Government, the reputations of Ministers, were each and all of them of no concern to any one in it.

The feature eyident was the treatment of the House of the Fowler charges involving the "wine, women and graft" connections of Ministers of the Crown.

Incidental, was the conduct of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in regard to the inforcement of the charter rights of the people along the Grank Trunk to be given a pennya-mile service. By his indifference Sir Wilfrid showed his contempt for public rights and his friendship for Charles M. Hays in his defiance of the sacred undertaking of a great railway, franchise and an immense national subsidy in the an immense national subsidy in the early days of the Grand Trunk.

Came Out With Credit. The man who came out of the after-Few outside of the political arena can imagine the courage necessary to go into a fight of this kind and, standing in his place, call upon the head of the Government to clear his Cabitation

of the Government to clear his Cabinet of charges, even of insinuations, leveled against them. Mr. Bourassa did his work courageously and put it right up to Sir Wilfrid, and, for that matter, up to the Opposition, and having done his work, sat down, amid a cold resentful silence.

Mr. Bennett also showed courage by standing up and asking Mr. Carvell, who had thrown charges at him, to make them good. True, Mr. Carvell was away, but he should have been there. Mr. Bennett was there, and he was ready, and he wound up by telling the Premier that not only had Mr. Fowler not withdrawn his charges of "Wine, women and graft," but Mr. Bennett repeated them in substance as against at least one Minister.

Mr. Bourassa Stirs.

Mr. Bourassa recalled the statement made some days ago by the first Minister. He then had said that the session could not close without the charges made by Mr. Fowler, either being withdrawn or thoroughly investigated. He had only stipulated for delay until the report of the insurance commission should be received. This report of the insurance commission contains matter of the highest importance, and that newspapers are charging members of this House with conduct improper for members of Parliament. In this House innuendoes and charges have been made respecting a certain land deal against Messrs. Foster, Fowler, Lefurgey and Bennett. On the other hand, Mr. Fowler has said in the House that if he were attacked on account of anything connected with the insurance investigation, that he would show improper conduct on the part of Ministers and members involving women, wine and graft. If not attacked he would conceal his knowledge; if he was attacked he would expose them.
Both the first Minister and the leader of the Opposition had promised that the session would not be allowed to close without Mr. Fowler's charges being investigated. He called upon them to make their statements good.

Mr. Moberley, one of the engineers in charge of the Transcontinental Railway survey, gave them some samples of wheat, oats, and barley which he grew at White Fish River, a river flowing into the Abitibi Lake at the northeast corner. Vesuvian Astronomer Matteucci Fears Comet Will Ignite Atmosphere. Comet Will Ignite Atmosphere.
London, March 11.—The approach of a new comet which will imperil the world has been announced by Prof. Lorenzo Matteucci, of the Royal Observatory on Mount Vesuvius, who with his more famous brother has recorded for years the eruptions of that volcano. He and his brother are both agreed that if the actual nucleus on the comet is merely crossed by the earth the danger will be brief, though necessarily acute. Mrs. Peter G. Morgan, of Camden Township, has received news of the death of her uncle, Mr. John Hoy, Brightlingssa, England, who has had a somewhat interesting history. Eighty-one years ago John Hoy was born at what is now No. 42. Station Road, having been bedridden for about four years.

As a young man he entered the navy, and he was one of the gun's crew which fired the first shot in the China War of 1840-42. He was in the Crimean War, and was on the only British ship off Balaclava, which survived the terrible gale in the Black Sea on Nov. 14, 1854. On Dec. 22nd of the same year he was in another severe gale in the Gulf of Lyons, and was one of the comparatively few who escaped.

He was the means of saving tenlives from drowning at different times, and he held a bronze medal for saving life, which is dated June 7, and 17, 1848.

Mr. Hoy went out in the Northern Star in search of Sic John Franklin's expedition. The ship was frozen up for ten months. In releasing, the ship they had to cut through ice nine feet thick, and it was found that during their bondage the food which the crew fiad eaten and the coals which had been burnt had raised the vessel in the water two feet. As may be gleaned from the above record, Mr. Hoy possessed the medal dated 1842 for the China War, the English medal dated 1855 for the Crimean War, the medal for saving life.

Upon leaving the navy he transferred to the coastguard service, from which he was invalided about 19 years ago. He married about 57 years ago, and his wife still survives him.

Notwithstanding his long illness, his mind was alert and keen until the last, and he took an interest in all that was going on, each day either reading or having read to him the news of the day. In the early part of the week of which he died he read in a London paper a report of the death of "the last survivor of Balaclava," and he at once remarked, "Well, that is wrong, for I know I am not dead yet."

The funeral of the late Mr. Hoy took place in the parish churchyard. The Rev. A. Pertwee (vicar) officiated. The coffin was carried by six coastguardsmen, Mr. Donovan, the chief officer of the station, also being present. The flowers were beautiful and costly.

EDMUND KEAN.

To See Him Act Was Like Reading Shakespeare by Lightning. Before the third century after the

birth of Shakespeare had reached its first quarter there was born in England to a stage carpenter and a strolling actress a child destined to grapple with the poet's highest thought and interpret it with a vividness that to this day stands unrivaled. Coleridge's terse comment, that to see him act was reading Shakespeare by lightning, reveals him with the fullness of a volume. Ed-mund Kean, along with most people early trained to an art, nad note a education of the schools. He was when a boy provided with instruction by early trained to an art, had little if any some benevolent people whom his smartness and beauty attracted, but he rebelled against the tasks of study and went to sea. But life there was too rough for his fine nature. He returned to England and at the age of seven began the study of Shakespeare's characters with his Uncle Moses. This he continued with an actress named Tids well, who taught him, besides, as well as she knew, the principles of her art.
At an early age he had the credit of originality so surprising as even then to challenge the supremacy of Philip Kemble. At fourteen he played Ham-let. King George had him recite at Windsor castle, and it is said this incident led some gentlemen to send him to Eton, but there is no record of it. At twenty he was in a provincial troop, a member of which he married, and for six years thereafter, until his glorious night at Drury Lane, his life was one of hardship, struggle, obscurity, but, thanks to the faith in himself, not hopeless. His London debut was made at twenty-eight. He had fought for it hard and long and would then have missed it but for the falling reputation of the theater. London debuts in first roles are not easy for provincial ac-tors, and none knew better how hard they are to get than Henry Irving. Kean seems to have been at his full splendor and made a hit. After that his habits were altogether prejudicial to the refinement of taste or the acquisition of knowledge.

A TREE OF ILL REPUTE.

The Fresh Juice of the Upas Acts as a Deadly Poison.

An evil reputation has long been borne by the upas free, Ant'aris toxi-caria, which grows in Borneo and other East Indian islands. It is still a common belief that birds flying within the influence of its poisonous pors instantly perish and that it is fatal for animals or men to rest be-neath its shade. It resembles certain rhus plants (like the poison ivy) in emitting a volatile substance which affects the skins of certain susceptible persons, though others are unaffected. The sap is very poisonous and is the chief substance used by the Dyaks of Borneo for poisoning the tips of their darts.

In this process an incision is made in the bark of the tree and the milky exudation collected on a palm leaf and dried first in the sun and then over a fire until a thick brown mass is left. In this state it can be kept without deteriorating, and when required for use it is made into a thin paste with the juice of "tuba" root, which is used to stupefy fish, or with obacco or lemon juice, and the ends of the darts dipped into the mixture and dried. These darts are made from the middle stem of the palm leaf and are about six or eight inches in length and of about the thickness of a knitting needle.

They are used with a wooden sumpi-tan, or blowpipe, which is about seven or eight feet in length and has an internal diameter of about one-quarter inch. A bird struck by one of these little darts is instantly killed, and a pig dies in about twenty minutes. The fresh juice of the upas tree whether swallowed or injected into the blood, acts as a violent poison, causing convulsions and death.

Larvae Nests.

By breaking open rotton logs one can find in midwinter the grubs or larvæ of beneath logs and stones near the margins of ponds and brooks hordes of the maggots or larvæ of certain kinds of flies may often be found huddled together in great masses. The larvæ of a few butterflies also live over winter beneath chips or bunches of leaves near the roots of their food plant or in webs of their own construction, which are woven on the stems close to the buds whose expanding leaves will fur-nish them their first meal in spring.



A Wall Workbox For the Bedroom A Handy Arrangement. Every woman and mother knows

how frequently a stitch is required somewhere, perhaps just at the last moment. As few, too, keep their work-box in the bedroom, there is often a frantic rush for needle and cotton, or else the stitch in time is left undone, to require more than nine later on. A housewife like that sketched would

The manufacture of such an article is very simple. The housewife is suspended either by a ribbon or a sifk cord. A BIG FIRE IN TORONTO

Premises Entirely Destroyed

Toronto, March 11.—The most destructive fire in a long time totally wrecked the premises of the Toronto Plate Glass Importing Co., 135 to 148 Victoria street, early Saturday after-

Wrecked the premises of the Toronto Plate Glass Importing Co., 135 to 143 Victoria street, early Saturday afternoon. The building was of four storeys, going back 117 feet to a lane. The loss is estimated at \$185,000, with insurance of \$145,000.

Falling walls and flying glass were a menace to the firemen and several were more or less hurt. Capt. Wm. Crawford of Hose 4, Berkeley street, had his collar-bone broken. He was struck by a ladder, which was thrown over by the collapse of a wall.

Delay in sending in an alarm doomed the building before the firemen arrived. It is stated that when a boy, an employe of the building, ran to the corner of Queen and Yonge streets to send in an alarm a policemen refused to credit that there was a fire, and would not let him pull the box. One man says he stood in the lane in rear of the building for over 10 minutes watching the fire spread. He took it for granted that somebody else was calling the fire department.

Was Full of Fire.

FIVE MILLIONS INCREASE.

Canadian Revenue For Eight Months Shows Substantial Growth.

Ottawa, March 11.— The financial returns of the Dominion for the eight months ending with February shows a revenue of \$57,986,513, an increase of over eight million dollars, as compared with the same time in the previous year. The expenditure was \$37,629,000, an increase of about a half million dollars, so that there was a betterment in the finances of over seven and a half millions. In the capital expenditure there was an increase of one and a quarter million. This leaves a total increase in revenue of five millions. The figures for the month of February show an increase in the revenue of nearly two millions and an increase in the expenditure of about one million.
