

It is Declared Constitutional by the Privy Council.

The "Labor League" in its effort to capture the municipal machinery of Rossland is buying votes. A number of the men who abandoned good positions last summer and have nothing better to employ their time are rustling voters and bringing in men to be registered as householders. registered as householders. Apparently the catch of bona fide householders is slim, and new tactics have been

esorted to. On Thursday and yesterday a num ber of men, about a dozen in the ag-gregate, were brought down to the city hall to be registered as householders. They had not paid their road taxes, however, and the necessary \$2 per head was passed over to the city treasurer by the "Labor League" canvasser who happened to be one of the

\$27.45 outfit. The remarkable feature about the transaction is that these would-be voters have—if their declarations are the truth and not perjury-lived in Rossland for 12 calendar months and have paid during that period not less than \$60 rent, yet have not sufficient money to pay the city road tax of \$2. The whole business smacks of crooked work, and it is safe to predict that many of the parties registered by the "Labor League" will have their cases

Another astonishing feature of the road tax proposition is that the "Labor League" tout who engineered the proposition did not seem to have sufficient confidence in the men he had rounded up to permit them to handle the \$2 intended for the city treasurer. In no instance did he allow the men to pay the money themselves, but personally placed the currency in the hands of the city official for whom it was intended. No explanation was vouchsafed as to why the men were not deemed sufficiently trustworthy to

STRAWBERRIES IN FRANCE. The strawberry is by far the most important of our small fruits. It is grown over a wide part of the country and it makes no particular difference in our markets whether the nearby crop is large or not. If the local crop is insufficient to supply the great cities they supplement the home crop by drawing upon other sources of production that may be even thousands of miles away. We are able to do this on account of the introduction of the practice of carrying strawberries in refrigerator cars.

Paris, on the other hand the greatest market for strawberries in France, has its entire supply from a region no part of which is more than 20 miles from the wholesale markets in the city by which the fruit is distributed to the small dealers. The greatest strawberry region around Paris is south if the city, extending within a wide triangle from within six miles of the central markets to Marcoussis, about 20 miles from the capital on the road to Orleans. This is known as the strawberry country, the soil being particularly favorable for the growth of the most delicious qualities of the fruit. In recent years the cultivation of the strawberry has also extended on a large scale into the region of the north and northeast of Paris, which now supplies about one-third of the quantity consumed in the city. Twothirds of the crop still comes from the daily by many carts, which have now been supplanted by the railroad, as many as 30 carloads being delivered to the central markets every night during the season from the southern strawberry fields.-New York Sun.
