Stockholm, June 6, via June 7.—One man was severely wounded and a second slightly hurt in the clash between the workers and police before the Rikksdag and police before the Rikksdag building on Tuesday. Some agitators openly advocated violence.

Hialmar Branting, the Socialist leader, attempted to stem the mis-chief by appealing to the Socialist Democrats for peaceable demeanour. Many factories stopped work at one o'clock on Tuesday afternoon and the employees marched to the Rikk sadag. They found the approaches to the building and to the Royal Palace guarded by police and soldiers. The crowd was noisy and threatening, and tried to overturn street car. The mounted police charged and drove the crowd back, while M. Branting emerged from the Rikksdag, and vainly attempted to persuade the demonstrators to leave the vicinity. The mob made an at tempt to rush the police, who char-ged fiercely, with drawn swords. Many heads were slashed and other rioters were knocked down and trampled upon. The platoon of sol-diers guarding the Bridge leading to the palace fixed bayonets and loaded their rifles, but did not fire.
There was much bottle and stone throwing but ultimately the triumphed and the mob melted away The police estimated that the rioters including onlookers numbered 16,

000, mostly youths. The Left Socialists later decided to demand a general strike through-out Sweden, but the men who went out on Tuesday from the large fac-tories, are reported to have resumed

Demonstration in Norway.

Paris, June 7.- Roumania has re-organized her army and is ready to resume the fight according to a statement made by Premier Bratiano in an interview with the Petrograd correspondent of the Pariesienne.

"The Russian democracy," said the Roumanian Premier, "has launched a new peace formula, 'neither annexations nor indemnities' and she wishes to impose that formula on her allies, Roumania finds the formula acceptable as far as she is concerned. She did not enter the war to make conquests. Her single object was and is the liberation of Roumanian territories enslaved by Hungary, which never had the right to dispose

"My country is keeping its promises under the most diffi-cult circumstances. It has been cult circumstances. It has been invaded by an enemy superior in numbers, it has lost its capital and more than half of its territory; it has suffered famine and disease, but it has made a great and manly effort to re-organize its army and it has never given up the struggle. has never given up the struggle. To-day Roumania is ready to resume the fight, its army is perfectly trained and it has material such as it never had before. "In the crisis we are passing through, at the moment when the war seems to be approaching its final phase, Roumania, who kept her engagements toward the allies, has the right to expect that the allies will remain faithful to the terms of the treaty, binding them to her.

Progress Continues After British Open Sweeping Attack Against Sharp Foe Salient Near Ypres---Many Prisoners Taken in Opening Drive

Bulletin, London, June 7.—The British opened an attack on a nine mile front between Meissens and Wytschaete and have taken all their first objectives. The official statement says that the British progress is being continued and that a number of prisoners have been

The new British offensive is against a sharp German salient three miles south of Ypres. For several days the British have maintained a tremendous bombardment for almost thirty miles on this portion of their front. The salient itself is about three miles in width and the same distance in depth. An effective advance in this sector would seriously menace the German hold on Lille, which is about five miles from the nearest British position.

We have everywhere captured our first objectives and further progress is reported to be satisfactory along the whole front of attack. Action of Liberal Leader in Rejecting Proposal of Sir Robert Borden For Union Cabinet Compels Government to go to the People

Toronto, June 7.—A despatch from Ottawa to the Daily News

"The proposals made by Sir Robert Borden for a union cabinet have been decisively rejected by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. As a result a general election is certain and will be called as soon as the necessary steps can be taken. The situation was explained to members of the house this morning when both parties held a caucus.

"Sir Robert Borden will now endeavor to secure a group of liberals for the government from inside parliament or if necessary from outside parliament.

Ottawa, June 7-The Conservative Caucus today after hearing a report from the Premier on the failure of coalition negotiation gave what is said to have been practically unanimous approval to a proposal of Sir Robert Borden that the conscription bill should be brought down next week and forced through the house. So far as known there is no intimation of a general election but that may eventuate from development after the bill is introduced.

Correspondence on the coalition negotiations showed that the Premier had made his proposal to the leader of the opposition, who had replied in effect that it should have been broached before conscription was announced. The Premier suggested a cabinet of eight liberals and eight conservatives, with himself as the odd member, giving the present government a majority of one. The Premier also suggested that the coalition bill should be introduced with the pledge that it would not be given effect until the coalition had gone to the country and asked for a mandate on the measure.

The two leaders were unable to agree upon the composition of the cabinet and finally negotiations came to an end yesterday and the deal was declared off.

Copenhagen, via London, June 7—A leading article in—the Berlin Vorwaerts, to-day, signed by the Socialist deputy, Herman Wendel, argues that the only possible solution of the Alsace-Lorraine question is the formation of the two provinces in the Federal state on the same hasis as the other states of the Empire. Herr Wendel does not even contemplate the possibility of a voluntary return to the provinces of France. He rejects the principle of a plebiscite to determine the fate of the provinces, owing to the difficulty of those entitled to vote. Though admitting that Lorraine is largely French, he says that the Socialist solution is autonomy within the German Empire.

"Italian Theatre: The enemy yesterday exhausted himself in fruitless attacks between the Vipacco Valley and the sea, intended to wipe out the defeat he suffered in the last few days on the Carso plateau. His assaults were snattered. Our troops, by storming a height near Jamiano, enlarged their success and in fierce battles maintained all ground won.

"According to preliminary reports the prisoners in the last three days have been increased to 256 officers, including four staff officers, and 10,000 men. Some Italian regiments 000 men. Some Italian regiments fell into our hands unwounded, with nearly the whole of their effectives. For instance, the eighty sixth regiment with 2,686 men, the sixty-nineth regiment, with 1,932 men. and the seventy-first regiment, with 1,832 men. The brigades of Verona. Syracuse, Puglia and Ancona, in whose ranks these units fought were annihilated. In a tunnel near San Viovans, a large field hospital was captured. The battlefield is covered with Italian corpses.

"On the moonlight night, we visit-ed towns and places far behind our front. In the Austrian interior they came as far as Laibach in the Tyrol as far as Bozen, in addition to raiding the coastal district and Carinthia. Some inhabitants were killed, but there was no material damage.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years. cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm labourers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been hon ourably discharged, receive one day priority in apply ing for entry at local Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.
