



McAtee has collected a list of 244 alleged cures for 'ky'' poisoning. Among the vegetable sub-stances recommended to be taken internally are extracts or infusions of sweet fern, snakeroot, pasque dower, aconite, spice bush, coffee, poison sumach (?), pipsissewa, yel-iow jasmine, belladonna and bryony. It is pointed out that "poison ivy probably has a reputation for harm-fuiness all out of proportion to its abilities; a few people are rather severely poisoned by it, but the ma-jority seem to be immune or nearly so". We should like to add that a great deal of supposed "ivy" poison-ing may be due to other plants, since there are scores of plants that are capable of causing more or less severe dermatitis in susceptible peo-ple.
