Waterdown

School Course in Agriculture

Waterdown Will Be Scene
 of the Experiment

Ontario Government Be-
 hind the Innovation

A high school course in agriculture, the first in the province, has been arranged by the department of agriculture, to be held in Waterdown during the months of December, January and February. The venture, which is intended to give the young people interested in farms and farming an opportunity of studying the various phases of agriculture, is largely an experiment, and upon the success of this school and similar schools to be established in Peel, Middlesex and in Huron, depends whether further courses will be available.

At a meeting held at the office of the district representative in Hamilton last Saturday afternoon, when representatives of the different Agricultural organizations of Wentworth were present, Lionel Stevenson, secretary of the Ontario department of agriculture, outlined the curriculum of the proposed new school. Instructors will be supplied by the department. The local committee will be asked to provide a suitable building. The subjects which it is proposed to teach are, Field husbandry, Animal husbandry, Horticulture, Apiculture, Poultry, Agricultural botany, Etymology, farm forestry, Veterinary science, Farm engineering, Dairying, Farm management.

The course for girls will include English, mathematics and the agricultural subjects, such as poultry, gardening, agriculture and dairying. Besides the general course, specialized work for each month will be taken up. In December, foods and cooking; in January, sewing and millinery; in February, home nursing.

At the conclusion of Mr. Stevenson's address a general discussion took place as to the several points at which this excellent course might be held. It was finally decided to ask the department to conduct the school in Waterdown, as the representatives from this section offered to provide suitable rooms and promised to give every assistance possible.

Mr. W. G. Marcit, district representative, will be the principal in charge of the school, and students desiring to take the course, or any part thereof, may enroll at the government office, 18 Market street, Hamilton.

A public meeting will be held in the auditorium of the Public school here next Tuesday evening when the Hon. Manning Doherty will be present and further explain the new school.

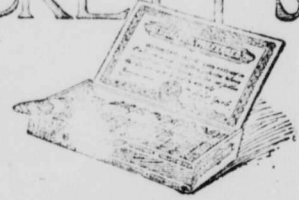

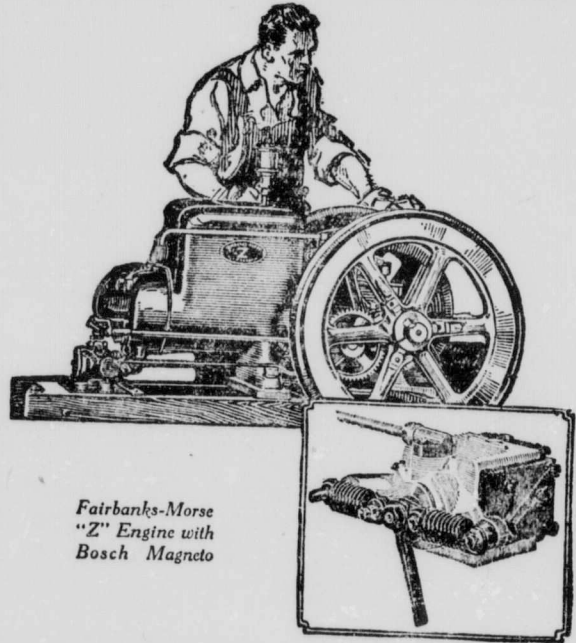

Mullein, under the name of ver-basum, is used medicinally in leaf and blossom. The leaves are thought to have anodyne, or pain-killing properties, and also yield a soothing oily substance. In Europe, an infusion of the flowers, strained to take out fibrous substance, is given in catarrhal troubles; and a mild oil, like olive oil, when saturated with mullein flowers, is used to allay inflammations of the mucous membrane. The dry leaves, smoked, are said to soothe irritated membranes.

Dockage

(National Crop Improvement Service.)

"It is difficult to understand why grain is not more frequently cleaned in the country, the dockage ground and fed at home. In some years there is scarcely a car of No. 1 or No. 2 grain received while car after car of No. 4 and No. 5 and no grade grain is sent into market. This always lowers the price," says H. A. Foss, weighmaster, Chicago Board of Trade.

"Besides freight must be paid upon the refuse contained in these cars and moreover the dockage must be charged back against the shippers.

"It would seem that farmers' organizations should undertake to ship nothing but the very finest grain available and insist upon a high price for it, feeding the poorer grades at home.

"Millers will always pay a premium for clean grain, and it may readily be seen that the lower grades cannot fail to cheapen the whole crop if sent to the market. If nothing but clean grain were shipped, thousands of cars could be released for other duty. The attention of co-operative societies is urgently called to this phase of marketing."

Most women think that bread-making is too hard work. That is only because they make it so. Whatever their recipe may be they should not laboriously knead the air out of the dough with vigorous punchings and pokings, because it is better to fold air into the dough which is a very simple process, occupying but a few minutes.

The quality of the bread depends largely upon the quality of the flour. Canadian spring wheat flour has long been a favorite because it excels in the proper kind of gluten. Soft wheat contains gluten which is not elastic and rubbery and while such flours may absorb water, the gluten cells do not retain the moisture, most of which is driven out by baking.

Do not waste your time kneading your bread. Fold it over. Mix your sponge into dough, folding in dry flour and air until you get the loaf of the right consistency. Treat it gently. The same dough will make beautiful rolls.

Blankets are named after a Flemish weaver called Thomas Blanket, who lived in Bristol, England, in 1340.

Remedies for Poison Ivy.

The American Botanist records that W. L. McAtee has collected a list of 244 alleged cures for "ivy" poisoning. Among the vegetable substances recommended to be taken internally are extracts or infusions of sweet fern, snakeroot, pasque flower, aconite, spice bush, coffee, poison sumach (?), pipsissewa, yellow jasmine, belladonna and bryony. It is pointed out that "poison ivy probably has a reputation for harmfulness all out of proportion to its abilities; a few people are rather severely poisoned by it, but the majority seem to be immune or nearly so." We should like to add that a great deal of supposed "ivy" poisoning may be due to other plants, since there are scores of plants that are capable of causing more or less severe dermatitis in susceptible people. Copious information on this subject was published in 1887 by Dr. J. C. White in his book "Dermatitis Venenata."
