KENTVILLE NEWS.

Mr. Geoffrey Woodworth the sixteen year old son of Dr. Percy Woodworth is now at Bramshott Camp England, where he is in training in a reserve battalion. Though so young he is as stalwart as a man, weighing over 160 lbs and standing 5ft. 11 3/4 inches. This young man has set a worthy example in patriotism to many others who prefer to remain at home in ease and comfort rather than brave the dangers necessary in defence of ones country. He will seek the first opportunity to take his position in the lines in France.

Miss Marguerite Woodworth has a splendid position with the C. P. R. at Fort William, Ont. She is one who proves competent in all the work she undertakes and her recent promotion in office work gives her a large monthly salary.

LOCAL REGISTRARS APPOINTED.

The Government has appointed George E Corbitt of Annapolis Royal as Provincial Registrar to take the man and woman power of all persons between the ages of 16 and 60 years.

Mr. Archibald McNeil of Millville has been appointed the local Registrar for Kings Co. Assistant deputy registrars will be selected in every section of the County and the registration work will all be done in one day.

The registration board states that it is desirable that all persons to offer voluntary assistance to assistant deputy registrars on the day of registration should offer their services to the registrar for their electoral district. As registration day will probably be on a Saturday, it is hoped that school boards will offer to the registrars use of school buildings in which to take the registration.

If the school houses are available for this work it is likely that the divisions of the county into school sections will be observed and, if so those of the teacher who would be available for the work would be suitable persons for deputy registrars.

ENLISTED AT 46 YEARS OF AGE.

Mr. Todd C. Woodworth formerly of Kentville Joins His Two Sons.

Our Military news this issue has considerable reference to the Woodworth family and it is a family that has set a precedent in patriotism. Elsewhere will be found a reference to Horace Woodworth son of Todd C. Woodworth and his escape from a torpedoed vessel. Another brother Douglas is also in the service being with the famous "Black Watch" and now the father, though 46 yrs. of age and a busy man in many enterprises, has caught the war fever and has passed over from the United States and is now in Canada enlisted as a private seeking to join his son in England as soon as possible to go forward for service in France. Todd Woodworth is a man of fine physique and the training already acquired has, "he says" taken ten years from his age.

DEATH OF TRUMAN A. PORTER.

The death occurred at the Lynn (Mass.) Hospital on Thursday, April 18, of Truman A. Porter, formerly of Nova Scotia. Funeral services were held at the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. L. Foster, 4 Liberty St., Saugus, Mass., on Saturday April 20. Interment was in Riverside Cemetery, Saugus.

Mr. Porter was born in Cornwallis, Feby. 25, 1839. In 1863 he married Hattie R. Strong, (a sister of S. S. Strong of Kentville), who passed away in 1910. He moved to Massachusetts with his family in 1890, and has resided in Saugus since that time.

The death occurred at Windsor, N. S., Sunday of Ezra Churchill, son of the late Geo. W. Churchill, of G. W. Churchill and Sons, shipbuilders, Hantsport, one of the best known men in Hants County. Mr. Churchill was ill for about six weeks, during which time he went to the United States for treatment but without avail. Deceased was 55 years of age. His eldest son Alfred was killed at Vimy Ridge while serving with the R. C. R. His son George is with the 63rd and another son is on his way overseas with the Royal Flying corps. He also leaves two daughters, Mrs. Ralph Parsons, and Miss Churchill at home. Mrs. Sircom, wife of Colonel Sircom and Mrs. Rod McDonald, of Halifax, are sisters of the deceased. His son the late Lieut. Alfred Churchill was for a time in charge of the detachment of the 40th Battalion which drilled in Yarmouth.

CAPT. JOHN HIRAM MARSTERS.

A well known and highly respected citizen of Hants County Captain John H Marsters, passed to his reward at noon last Sunday, April 21st, at his home on Chestnut Street, following a second attack of paralysis.

He was born in Burlington, Hants County, in 1832, and had reached the ripe old age of 94 years and 7 months.

After spending twenty years at sea, he took up his residence at Summerville where he conducted a general business. He was always interested in shipbuilding and anything that advanced the commercial, social or spiritual interests of Hants County. He was a member of the Baptist Church, but he was interested in good work any where, as evidenced by his public bequests.—Windsor Tribune.

BOTTLES ARE SCARCE.

Fredericton Mall.—Maple sugar makers report that they are experiencing some difficulty in securing a supply of bottles. Light colored beer and whiskey bottles are largely used by honey makers but the source of supply having been greatly curtailed by the prohibition act. It is very difficult now to procure them. Empty beer bottles which used to sell at 20 cents a dozen are now worth five cents each and the difference has been added to the price of the honey.

Foster of Saugus, with whom he has resided since the death of his wife, and V. Alice Porter of Boston, Mass., three sons, Dexter R. Porter of Hartford, Conn. Albert G. and Avery M. Porter, of Providence, R. I. and four grandsons.

SON OF FORMER KENTVILLE RESIDENT AMONG SURVIVORS OF STEAMSHIP TORPEDOED.

The following from a Boston paper refers to Horace C. Woodworth the 18 year old son of Mr. Todd C. Woodworth and grandson of Douglas B. Woodworth former M. P. for Kings Co.

Included among the six survivors of the guard of the Amer-

ican steamship Florence H., which was blown up in a French port on the night of April 17, is a Boston boy, Horace Campbell Woodworth, son of Mr. and Mrs. Todd C. Woodworth, of 34 Pleasant street, Hyde Park.

A telegram received yesterday by the boy's parents from the Navy Department stated that the young man had been rescued, and was slightly injured. The second telegram also made known that the Woodworth boy had been appointed a chief radio officer, something the lad did not know himself. He had recently taken an examination to become chief electrician, and has been promoted by the Navy Department, who referred to him in the telegram as chief electrician.

Young Woodworth is but 18 years old, and graduated last June from the Hyde Park High School, receiving his diploma in uniform, having enlisted two months previous to graduation

ay. He enlisted in April of last year as a second class seaman, was assigned to the U. S. S. Virginia, and was in Halifax close by when that terrific explosion between an ammunition ship and Belgian relief ship wrecked part of the city of Halifax and killed many.

JAILED FOR NOT SAYING DAYLIGHT.

KINGS COUNTY MAN RETIRED FROM TEACHING.

Progress—Enterprise.

Last Wednesday Mr. B. McKittrick, B. A., tendered his resignation of the position of Principal of the Lunenburg Co. Academy and the Public Schools of the Town of Lunenburg, to take effect at the end of the present year in July next. When the present school year ends, Mr. McKittrick will complete twenty-eight years of earnest and effective service as principal of our schools and he will have the satisfaction of knowing that in this long term of office he has succeeded in bringing the County Academy and our whole school system to a high state of efficiency. A clear proof of the accuracy of this statement is found in the fact, that in the last provincial high school examinations, the Lunenburg County Academy made the best showing of all the County Academies in Nova Scotia, its students securing the highest percentage of success in obtaining the grades applied for.

Mr. McKittrick's career as teacher and principal is a remarkable one. Graduating from Dalhousie University with the degree of Bachelor of Arts in 1877, he taught in country schools successfully for a few years. In 1879 he was called to the principalship of the Co. Academy of Sydney, a position he filled successfully for eleven years, with the exception of six months, during which he was principal of the County Academy at Truro. In 1890 he accepted the position of Principal in Lunenburg, when Mr. McIntosh resigned to become Inspector of Schools for the District of Lunenburg and Queens Counties. From 1890 till the present time, this service has been continuous, with the exception of a few months when the state of his health required leave of absence, which was readily granted by the Board. Thirty-nine year of continuous service as a County Academy

Principal probably constitutes a record for the province, if not for the Dominion. During his twenty-eight years service in Lunenburg, Mr. McKittrick has taught and supervised the education of the children of many of his earlier pupils in this town. A majority of the present staff of our public schools has been educated under his wise, kind and stimulating instruction, and it is no ed to them the fact of his resignation some of them were moved to tears.

It is needless to say that his resignation which was prompted by a wise resolution to retire before advancing years and the severe strain of the work impaired his efficiency, was accepted by the School Board with sincere expressions of appreciation and regret. And the Board did a wise as well as a kindly act when it unanimously voted him a retiring annuity of \$200.00 in view of his long and faithful service. He has earned the right to this recognition by a service that has not only been long and faithful, but has never been adequately recompensed, financially. Happily for the community he has never been actuated by pecuniary motives. He has taught earnestly and successfully, because he is a born teacher and has always loved his work. He has taken a warm interest in the progress and subsequent careers of his earnest pupils, and he has spent much nervous force in stimulating pupils who did not realize the value of an education. The people of Lunenburg owe him not only a pension, but lasting gratitude in addition. We believe Mr. McKittrick's retirement does not mean his removal from the community. In addition to being a successful teacher, he has been an all round good citizen and it is a source of satisfaction to believe that for many years to come the town will have the advantage of his presence and his influence in all movements tending to its progress and betterment.

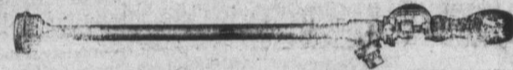

Wolvin, both of Montreal, visited Halifax last week and made a careful examination of the harbor, and are understood to have chosen a site, the location of which, was not announced, on which to build a modern drydock, and in addition a shipyard. It is reported that they consider the prospects of business with a drydock to promise as great a profit as from a shipyard, and it is thought that the drydock is their main proposition, and the shipyard an auxiliary enterprise. They returned to Montreal Sunday afternoon, and it is understood that they will return shortly and conclude all necessary arrangements.

 London, April 30—It was the British steamer Oronsa which was torpedoed with the party of fifty-seven American army Y. M. C. A. workers. The first public announcement here of the torpedoing of the Oronsa, which occurred early Sunday morning, was made in this morning's newspapers.

BULGARIA'S CONCESSION.

WASHINGTON, April 30—Bulgaria has agreed to let Turkey have the Adrianople Station on the Karagatch railroad, as well as the left bank of the Maritza River up to Kuledji Buzacs, according to a despatch today from France. These territories were claimed by Turkey in compensation for the Dobrudja.

GERMAN IN PARIS IN FRENCH UNIFORM.

PARIS, APRIL 22—Wearing the uniform of a French infantryman, a German was arrested in the streets of Paris yesterday. He told the authorities he was born in Alsace and had deserted from the German army after being brought to the western front from Galac. The police are of the opinion that the prisoner is a Gauleiter.

The Class on its entrance in 1914 had forty three male members of these 31 enlisted in the service of King and County. A few completed their course in engineering and Theology; only two have remained to graduate in Arts or Science with their Class. The Flag will be decorated with thirty-one Maple Leaves to represent the ones who have enlisted. Above four of these leaves will be, also, a White Cross to show that four members of the Class have paid the supreme penalty.

CIVIC ELECTION IN HALIFAX, N. S.

Dr. A. C. Hawkins Led the Poll in Three-cornered Mayoralty Contest.

Halifax, N. S., April 25—Dr. A. C. Hawkins, was Wednesday elected Mayor of Halifax by a majority of 852 over Dr. N. E. MacKay and with 858 more votes than those for James A. Halliday who fotted the pool. The total vote was 2,769, only 149 more than one-third for the whole number on the list, which is 7,862. The results of the plebiscite on the Halifax Power Company question is that the city is authorized to advance \$400,000 to the company in exchange for a mortgage of \$400,000 and fifty-one per cent of the stock of the company and the company undertaking to light the city for \$30,000 a year for twenty-five years.

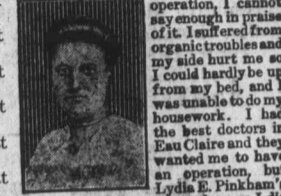

PREPARING AND FERTILIZING THE SOIL.

(By A. J. Turney Provincial Horticulturist N. S.)
Preparation of the soil is often started too soon. Hold some of the surface earth in the hand tightly—if it crumbles or falls apart readily after the fingers are relaxed it is ready for working, but, if the pressure of the hand leaves the soil in sticky sodden mass the ground is not ready for working.
If the garden is of such size and location that it can best be plowed and plowing was not done in the fall, cover evenly with good coating of well rotted stable manure, then plow six or eight inches deep and harrow well. Complete the smoothing and preparation of the seed bed with a hard rake on each bed or section before planting.

If the garden can not be plowed a spade or fork must be used and the soil should be well loosened to the depth of the spade or fork. Thrust the spade into the soil to its full depth and lift and turn the soil over so that the bottom soil is placed on the top, except where heavy clay or very inferior soil is found at the lower depth when the soil should be kept in its usual position. As soon as each spade or fork full of earth is loosened or turned break it up by two or three smart blows with the back or the implement. Dig one row about eight inches wide the width of the garden and place the second row on top of it. This will leave quite a trench in which a good application of manure four to six inches may be placed and covered with two more rows of soil. Continue this operation until the whole garden is

dug and manured. Do not dig more of the garden than can be raked the same day. Go over the freshly dug soil with a good rake twice first breaking up the lumps and dragging the hard ones to one side and pulverizing the ground as nearly as possible to the depth of the digging, and then smooth off the surface filling hollow spots and leaving a finely pulverized smooth seed bed from which hard lumps etc., have been removed.

In the small garden of the city and town difficulties are often encountered which are not present in larger gardens. Sometimes there is much rubbish such as old cans, broken pottery, pieces of cloth and wood, stones, bricks, etc. Its well to take the extra time and trouble to remove these thoroughly when working up the ground, otherwise they will be a continual source of trouble. Sometimes the plot available for the garden consists largely of clay or sand from the excavation for the cellar. Clean sand may be mixed with a heavy clay soil. Lime at the rate of 3-4 to one pound to every 10 square feet in the garden will help very much. Most important of all is the addition of well rotted stable manure, to be thoroughly worked into the top foot of soil whether it be clay or sand.

For garden purposes there is no fertilizer as good as well rotted barnyard manure applied as directed. In addition, unless the soil is very fertile, a commercial fertilizer compound of 10 lbs. of nitrate of soda and 25 lbs. of acid phosphate may be applied broadcast in the spring at the rate of one ounce per square yard. Rake the ground thoroughly after applying. A better way to use the nitrate of soda would be to water the young plants from time to time one teaspoonful dissolved in one gallon water. If manure is not available two to three times this quantity of fertilizer should be used.

Unbleached hardwood ashes and raked over at the rate of one pound to forty square feet will probably give very good results except on heavy clay soils.
