IRISH AFFAIRS.

When the massacre of Syrian christians took place in 1859, Lord Palmerston sent out Lord Dufferin to chastise the Mohammedans, and though his confederates chided him for "sending a boy on a man's errand," he was firm in his contention that "one can never tell what stuff there is in a man, till he is tried."

And as regards the condition of the country he said:—"He had just come from Ireland, where he had spent the whole of the month of January, and he could testify to the constitutional and hopeful character of the agitation now carried on there."

Lord Dufferin is about to enter now into another position, the most difficult, doubtless, he has filled yet. Mr. Goscheva was sent out to Constantinople to purify Turkey, and return the Turk. He has failed. His place is now vacant at Constantinople, and the suave, and far seeing Earl of Dufferin is to fill it. His chief work is the purging and reformation of the wretched province of Armenia.

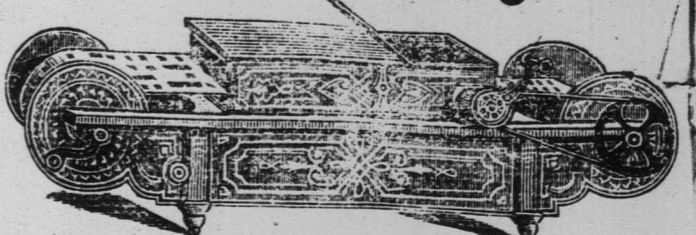
