WONDROUS MIXTURE OF COLOR AT THE FINAL CEREMONIAL AT WINDSOR

The Pathetic Grief of the Queen Mother Was the Central Figure in the Great Historic Picture in St. George's Chapel.

London, May 20—After a funeral progress through the streets of the Capital of his Kingdom, unparalleled in history, and after a picturesquely beautiful return to the old Castle which is above all places today the home of British Royalty, the dead King sleeps tonight in the crypt of St. George's Chapel, Windsor, into which his coffin body was lowered after the last services of the Church of England had been read before the most distinguished congregation that has ever gathered in any temple of God at any time in the history of the world.

THE CENTRAL FIGURE

Then walked King George, leading the Queen Mother by the hand. She, with pale strangely composed face and simple flowing black costume, was throughout the central figure in this great historic picture. Her pale face turned now to this side and now to that side with a slight gracious, but, as it seemed, an unseeing bow. The standing congregation ranged vis a vis along the chapel bowed in return. There was something weird and uncanny in this sad exchange of courtesy. It seemed a farewell rather than a greeting.

The altar was simply decked with two white vases containing white lilies. Behind it, a dim confused mass of white and scarlet, stood the choir. On either side was a group of military and naval officers and Garter officials. Before it were the Archbishops and Bishops. In front of them stood the plain, purple-covered catafalque, three or four feet high. On this was laid the coffin and panel with the regalia.

KING EDWARD'S FUNERAL

Might Loyalty Observed Here as in Other Towns of the Province.

Friday, the day of the funeral of King Edward was loyally observed here by all classes. Business was suspended, except most necessary acts. All denominations paid special honor to the departed sovereign's memory. In St. Mary's Roman Catholic church the memorial service was at nine a. m., a very impressive service being conducted by Rev. T. Maguire, who spoke in highest terms of late King and loyally pledged allegiance to the new. The C. M. B. A. band marched to and from church playing appropriate music. At 11 a. m. the Episcopal church held its service, conducted by the Rector, Rev. W. Nicoll, who spoke very feelingly of the Empire's loss.

At 2.30 a union service was held in St. James' Presbyterian church, on the platform being the pastor, Rev. S. J. MacArthur; Rev. Dr. Cousins, Baptist, and Rev. W. J. Deane, Methodist; and a large choir from those three churches. The Mayor and Town Council attended in a body, as did also the local Orangemen with their band. The congregation was large. The three clergymen each took part in the service, the principal address being given by Rev. Mr. Deane, who spoke of the late monarch in the most eulogistic terms as a righteous ruler and world-renowned peace maker. He was followed by Rev. Mr. MacArthur who spoke more briefly in the same strain.

In the evening Lieut. T. H. Whalen of the 12th Field Battery, with a detachment of six artillerymen and two cannon fired a sal-

THE ROYAL MOURNERS

At the head of the coffin was the purple velvet prie dieu, beside which the Queen Mother took her stand. On her left stood the Kaiser, looking stern, old and grey faced. King George stood a little behind his mother on the right. Before him on the Queen Mother's right was the Dowager Empress of Russia. Behind, five abreast but not ranged with any precision, stood the rest of the company of Kings and Princes behind whom stood other special envoys and their suites, with officers representing every foreign regiment of which King Edward was an honorary colonel. They now completely filled the choir and the nave, and the chapel blazed with a riot of color in which the black costumes of the women were lost.

LOWERED TO THE TOMB

Presently King George stepped forward and placed on the coffin a square dark crimson cloth. This was King Edward's "company color" of the Grenadier Guards. As the choir chanted "Man That is Born of Woman" the coffin noiselessly and swiftly disappeared. People remarked afterward that they had seen it on the catafalque at one moment, and then the next they realized it was no longer there. Doubtless attention was more riveted on the notable group living near the grave than on the casket of the great dead, who was to descend there.

As the sentence "Ashes to ashes and dust to dust" was uttered, a military officer stepped forward from a group near the altar and crumbled a handful of earth into the grave.

The churches, Town Hall and other public and many private buildings were handsomely decorated with black and purple and the citizens generally observed the day as became the solemn occasion. HARRY WAUGH ENDED HIS LIFE BY HANGING HIMSELF

Press Despatch Tells of Tragic Death of Former York County Man who Became Famous as a Prospector and Miner—Hanged Himself in a Rooming House Last Friday.

Fredericton, May 18—The Gleaner has announced the death of Harry F. Waugh at Chicago on Sunday, and since then the following despatch from Chicago has been received, dated May 16:—Harry F. Waugh, of Seattle, Washington, prospector and member of the Arctic Club, and leader of the Waugh Sledge Expedition to the delta of the Mackenzie River, hanged himself at a rooming house here Saturday. Pawn tickets were found in his clothing.

Fuller particulars than are contained in this despatch will be awaited with interest. Mr. Waugh left here two weeks ago on Saturday for Montreal, and the following Monday left Montreal for Chicago en route to Seattle. He is known to have had a large amount of money with him on his leaving Montreal. The fact that

he was reduced to pawning some of his personal effects in Chicago would indicate that he had been the victim either of some pickpockets or a class of other designing men in that city.

Mr. Waugh had put all of his own personal resources into the enterprise in which he had lately been engaged on the Peel River and with the assistance of friends got together some additional money. It was while on his way back to the Peel with this additional equipment that his funds disappeared at Chicago, with the result of suicide.

UNMATCHED SCENES HOMAGE IN A PAGEANTRY OF SOLEMN SPLENDOR

The Magnificence of the Imposing Spectacle as King Edward's Body was Borne to the Tomb at Windsor has Never Been Approached.

London, May 20—King Edward VII. passed today into history amid scenes of homage such as no man ever before received from his fellows.

Death was never clothed in a panoply more sublime; dignity in grief never received expressions more stately or more exalted.

Rulers of men never have assembled in such numbers to do honor to the greatest among them all, and yet nothing in the stupendous spectacle has been so imposing as the spectators themselves. Mankind in such vast aggregate as was seen in London today becomes the individual personification of the race, and never, even at the obsequies of the beloved mother of the dead monarch, has a human assemblage typified so completely the unity of the nation.

A BRILLIANT SPECTACLE

Far surpassing the ceremony attending the removal of the King's body from Buckingham Palace to Westminster Hall, the procession today included nine Sovereigns, the former President of the United States, Theodore Roosevelt, who alone was unraried in uniform, the heirs to several Thrones, the members of the Royal Family, Field Marshalls, Generals and Admirals whose names are synonymous with British achievements in war; detachments of troops of all the British arms and representatives of foreign armies and navies in variegated uniforms.

A PATHETIC SCENE

At Westminster Hall the widowed Queen who spent a last minute beside the body of the King, was assisted from her carriage by

the German Emperor upon whom the loss of his Royal uncle has lain heavily. The Emperor kissed the hand and cheek of Alexandra and passed her to her son, King George.

Here the Queen Mother glancing up caught sight of the King's charger, waiting to follow his master to the bier, and near at hand the King's favorite dog led by a girl, and she faltered, gripping the arm of the King, and pathetically gazing upon the animal Edward loved so well. Then she entered the hall with King George, Emperor William and the Duke of Connaught, there to offer a silent prayer and watch the removal of the coffin to the gun carriage.

KING GEORGE'S MESSAGE TO DOMINIONS

London, May 23—On the occasion of the anniversary of the Empire, King George has issued two gracious messages to the Colonies and India, somewhat similar in style to the message which he addressed yesterday to the nation. In both he refers to his previous tours through the respective Dominions, promises to follow in his father's footsteps, uphold constitutional government, safeguard the liberties of the Colonial Empire, and devote himself to the Indian people. With reference to the rumors that it is the intention of the Queen Mother Alexandra in the future to reside in Denmark, a court circular announces that Alexandra will always look upon England as her home.

FUTURE OF THEIR APPARENT.

Prince Edward, the heir to the throne, will no doubt, be created Prince of Wales and Earl of Chester in the course of time, probably during the next few months.

He succeeds at once, however, to the Duchy of Cornwall, which has a clear income of \$400,000 a year, the property having appreciated in value enormously in recent years in consequence of the falling in of leases on the estates in London.

This \$400,000 a year will accumulate for the Duke, so that by the time he comes of age he will have an independent fortune from this source alone of \$2,500,000. It may be recalled that the accumulation from this source during the minority of King Edward enabled him to buy the Sandring estate.

THE DUCHY OF CORNWALL

The Duchy of Cornwall is a sovereign duchy, and was, with various rights of regality, created by charter dated March 17, 1337, in favor of Edward, the Black Prince, who, in the words of the charter, was "to have and hold

the said duchy to himself and to his heirs, being the eldest born sons of the King of England."

It is understood in the court entourage that the course of education of their apparent, the Duke of Cornwall, will undergo an important revision in consideration of his added responsibilities. In view of the presumption that the coronation of King George will be appointed for June of next year the contemplated cruise round the world by His Majesty's eldest sons will be deferred until after that event.

ADDITIONAL BUOYS FOR RIVER

A desirable improvement on the Miramichi has been the placing of several additional buoys at various points. A great aid to navigation will result from the recent steps of the Marine department. There will be a total of sixteen buoys between Newcastle and Redbank. In a few instances, larger buoys have replaced the small ones. The superintending of the work was placed in Mr. John Russell's hands. William Bryenton has the contract for the work on the north west branch, where four new buoys will be installed. Six buoys were placed by Mr. Russell between here and the North West Bridge. There have been nine buoys placed on the south west branch.

BAD COLLISION OFF CAPE BRETON

Steamer Rammed by Trawler Which Later Sank Another Craft.

North Sydney, N. S., May 18.—The Reid Newfoundland Company's steamer Invermora, which has taken the Brno's place on the North Sydney-Port aux Basques route while the latter is in dry dock at St. John's, returned to port at 3 o'clock this morning with her stern twisted out of shape and a gaping hole in her bow as a result of a collision with the French steam trawler Beluga, off Loyd's Cove an hour previously, while the government steamer Zaidee is in the bottom of the harbor near Dominion as a result of being crushed by the big trawler.

As soon as the steamers parted, both headed full speed for North Sydney. The Beluga's hold being full of water, her captain sought a convenient place to beach her. He first headed her for Dominion wharf, but this spot being unsuitable, he swung his boat towards the terminus wharf a hundred yards east, and in doing so crushed the government harbor steamer Zaidee against the structure and sent her to the bottom almost instantly. Capt. Wm. Nesbitt, and Engineer Cogan of the Zaidee narrowly escaped with their lives.

THIRTY MAY HAVE BURNED TO DEATH

Only 71 of 100 Guests of Burned Arizona Hotel Accounted For.

Sions, Ariz., May 18.—Only seventy-one out of more than one hundred guests who were in the hotel Adams which was destroyed by fire yesterday, have been accounted for and fears are expressed that some have been burned to death.

The register of the hotel was destroyed in the flames, but a damage of \$275,000 by those whose names were recorded by the clerks of the hotel have not been found. The debris is now being searched for bodies.

It was testified that during the night he had climbed 110 feet on St. John's church steeple, from which 160 lbs. of copper sheathing were removed. From the sixty-foot steeple of the Baptist church, it is alleged, he obtained forty-eight pounds of metal.

\$200,000 FIRE IN ONTARIO TOWN

Carleton Place, Ont., May 18.—Fire which started in McGonigle's butcher shop, bridge street, shortly after midnight, rapidly spread and at the time of writing was still burning fiercely and had done damage estimated at fully \$200,000. The best business section of the town is in ashes, the finest residential district has been gutted and the handsome Zion Presbyterian church, recently renovated at a cost of \$20,000 is burned to the ground.

The disaster came swiftly, everything being peace and quietness at an early hour of the morning when the alarm was turned in.

PHILIPPINES LOOK FOR INDEPENDENCE

Washington, May 18.—Our desire for independence remains unalterable" declared speaker Sergio Osmena of the Philippine Assembly in a cablegram to delegate Quezon, who petitioned the house for immediate independence of the Philippines. The message was one of a number congratulating Mr. Quezon on his speech. Speaker Osmena said "the Philippine craved the advancement of the national cause by all possible means, that ten years of American administration showed that the Philippines were capable of maintaining an independent government and that justice of the American people would decide in favor of Philippine freedom."

COWARDLY ASSAULT ON SPRINGHILL BOY

It Was Only When He Cried "Don't Kill Me! That They Let Up"

Springhill Mines, N.S., May 18.—Joseph O'Rourke, a boy of twelve years, was brutally assaulted last night by three men. This ruffian used a club on the boy's head, kicked and otherwise ill-used him, so much so that the poor boy cried out "don't kill me!"

He is a native of the town, his father being out on a strike. Young O'Rourke went to work a short time ago for the Coal Company to make some money as he stated "to get some clothing." He was waylaid last night by his cowardly assailants and given an unmerciful beating. His face was covered with blood and he was in a comatose unconscious condition when discovered.

It is reported that the parties who committed the assault are known and that steps will be taken to bring them to justice.

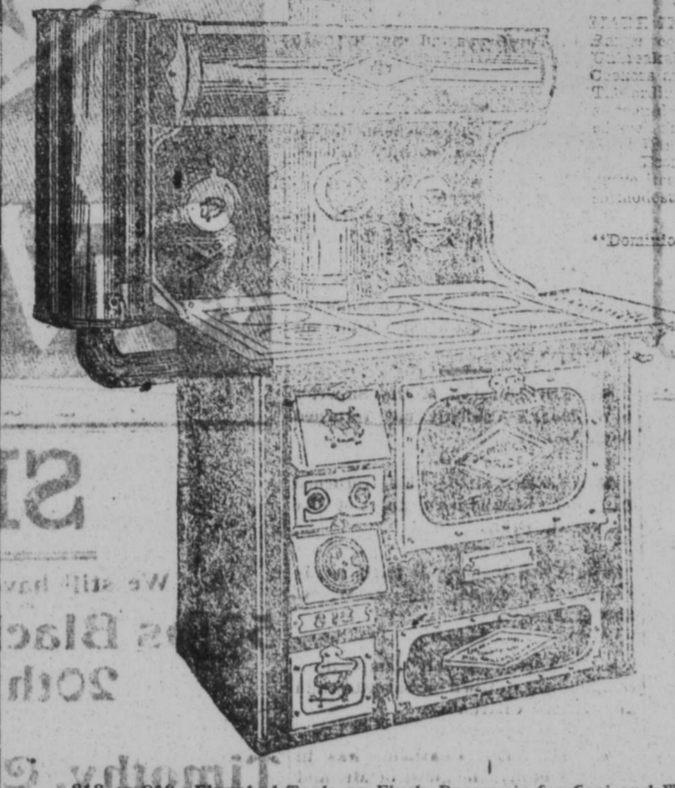
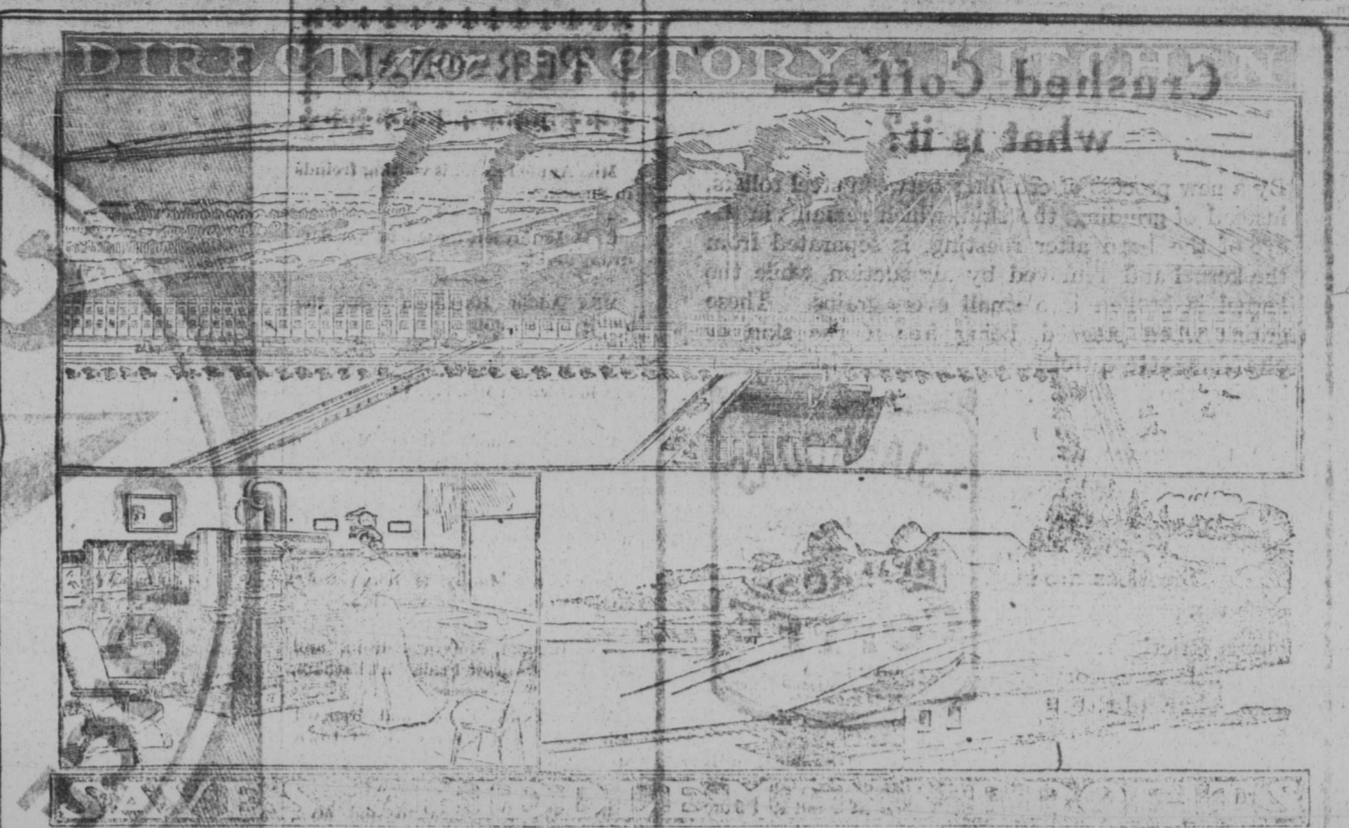
Hopewell Hill, May 18. - Grand Division Sons of Temperance resumed proceedings this morning with E. S. Hennigar, G. W. P., in the chair.

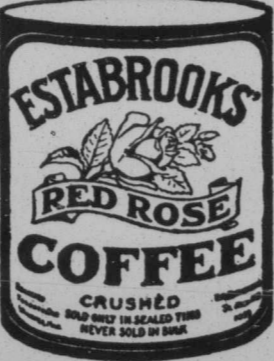

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
