


I HAD been teld to expect a transformation; that a new order of things was being born in Southern Alberta; that a new system of farming was taking the place of the old. I was told that the days of "scratching

Fifteen years before, I had travelled through this country and had seen only a few scattered farmsteads set out on the "bald-headed" prairle, four square to all the winds that blew. There were no trees, only stretching expanse of prairle that merged into white-topped mountains on the west and meeting the sky on the east in an unbroken horizon. A few homesteaders were straggling in. Old cattlemen, trying to saye their great range, were spreading stories that farming could never be a success in Southern Alberta.

But the homesteaders cama. Then later the big farmers arrived with their tractors and ushered in the era of the thousand acre wheat ranch. A series of "west years" made Southern Alberta famous. Nowhere had such crops ever previously been heard of. The Noble-Foundation, one of the largest farming corporations in the world, brought in a crop of wheat from one thousand acres that threshed 54,000 bushels! The country was thick with elevators. In 1915 and 1915, Southern Alberta resched the peak of prosperity. A series of unproductive years followed when rainfall was scant. Some farms were abandoned, but, mostly, men held on, buayed, up by the worder harries of other years.

The color is uniform throughout, with very little gritty matter in the main body. The material can be burnt to produce a variety of colors from reddish brown to black. Prospecting is still going on.

Canadian Pacific S.S. "Metagama" westbound from Glazgow via Belfast, recently docked at Montreal and Quebec with the record number of 382 cabin and 1,078 third class passengers. This constituted a record only for ships of the size and type of the "Metagama," the Canadian Pacific Empress liners often having a far larger list.

Canadian Pacific Railway officials estimated that 61,000 men would be required to harvest the western crops this year. They expected to supply only 9,000 from the prairie provinces and British Columbia and made arrangements to carry over 50,000 from Ontario, Quebec and the east

The recent Stampede was attended by 137,800 people.

Only once in the history of Canada was the gold production record set in 1922 exceeded, and that was in 1900, when the Yukon places reached the peak of their minimum 1922, 1.263.24 ounces gold were mined in the Dominion. The value is set at \$26.116.050, an increase of 36% over the previous year's figures. In 1900, 1.350,657 ounces of gold were mined and the value was \$27.908,153.

Canada's trade is climbing ahead. Total trade in the three months ending June was \$462.544,438, an increase of \$110.841,056 over the corresponding three months of last year. For June alone total trade was \$179.720,516. an increase of \$44,944,732 over last year. Domestic exports in the three months increased approximately \$50,000,000 and imports approximately \$61,000,000.

COMPENSATION RATES BOOSTED

An extra edition of the Royal Ga zette contains notice from the Work addition in rate of assessment upon carlovers and industries of Class it has been known for some con siderable time that claims in cer tain classes were too great in aggregate to be met by the assess ment. The increase varies from 50 cents for sub-division 1., which includes minor woodworking industries, to \$4 for logging; driving etc. Opposition to the increase was strong in certain quarters.

The details of the increase are as
