If by supplying labor and skill and cutting out the profits, a house suitor \$800 surely it would be a boon to the city. The Chamber of Commerce has already displayed its enterprise and interest in civic matters, for which it was created, by discussing the build steps to find a solution. The Journal knows of none that is more practical or sensible than that suggested by the workmen themselves in Toronto.



lution of two ounces of corrosive sublimate to 25 gallons of water. Cor-rosive sublimate := a deadly poison, and potatoes treated with it are ren-

dered unfit for food for man or beast. Formalin is a clear liquid disinfec-tant. It is a 40% solution of formaldehyde gas and water. It can be purchased from almost any druggist. It is sold under the names of formalin and formaldehyde. It is important that the purchaser, whatever name he buys it under, secured a guaran-teed solution of 40% formaldehyde. The stock solution should always be kept in a well-corked bottle, and

should not be allowed to freeze. If possible plant the treated seed potatoes on clean soil, that is soil that has not produced a crop of scabby potatoes. Practice a rotation of crops. If scab is very bad it is not advisable to plant potatoes on the same land oftener than once in five years. Heavy applications of barnyard manure should not be made to the potato crop, but if necessary given at some other point in the rotation. Plant potatoes after clover sod if possible. Avoid alkali fertilizers such as lime and wood ashes.—Prof. J. E. Howitt, O. A. College, Guelph.

Planting the Cultivated Crops. To ensure good crops of carrots, mangles, sugar beets, potatoes and corn, the land should be well prepared and seed should be secured of the highest quality. Under average con-ditions the Irish Cobbler variety (early potatoes) and the Green Mountain (late potatoes) are recommended for Ontario. To secure best results with the potato crop, it is always better to plant them not later then the 15th of May, This year plant better years and ten days earlier than half your seed ten days earlier than you have been accustomed to doing, and plant the other half at the usual time. The experiment will prove to your satisfaction the value of early planting. If the potato planter and sprayer has not already been overhauled, a rainy day may be very pro-fitably employed in this work,



If the potatoes are not all treated the same day it is advisable to make up fresh formalin for each day's work. Corrosive sublimate (mercuric chloride) can be used also to treat potatoes to prevent scab. Soak the uncut tubers for three hours in a solution of two ounces of corresive.





All persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:

Every unmarried person, or pendants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year, 1919, received or earned \$1,000 or more.

CLASS 1 Forms to be used in filing

returns on or before the 31st of March, 1920: Trustees, executors, administrators, agents and assignees must use Form

Employers making a return of the names and amounts paid to all di-rectors, officials, agents or other employees must use Form T 4.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies making a return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1919, must use Form T 5. NOTE.—Individuals comprising part nership must file returns in their indivi-dual capacity on Form T 1 or T 1 A.

PENALTY Every person who is required to make this return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of \$10.00 for each day during which the default continues—and all such pen-alties shall be assessed and collected from the person liable to make the return in the same manner in which taxes are assessed and col-
