Factories in This City Are Being Held Back From Making Extensions by Fact That Houses Cannot be Found for Workmen

The Chamber of Commerce dealt with the serious situation which has arisen in connection with house scarcity, at a meeting last night and resolutions were passed looking to the bringing about of a remedy.

John C. Notman, of the McKinnon Industries, stated that in the last few years his company had been unable to carry out needed extensions in its business simply because there were no houses or men to live in should they be brought to St. Catharines.

 A PRACTICAL SUGGESTION

With the aggravated situation that exists in St. Catharines with regard to a shortage of houses, why would it not be a good thing if the new Chamber of Commerce would encourage the trades and labor council of this city to bring forward some such proposal as that submitted to the City Council of Toronto by the Building Trades Council there. The features of the scheme were announced in the papers, but briefly the principal idea is that the building trades are in a position to supply the necessary labor and skill if the municipality will supply the land and buildings. There is a capital outlay and obligation of course, on the part of the municipality but if ways and means are to be found to build up St. Catharines and meet some of the urgent needs, this idea might help solve one of the most acute problems.

So far as actual experience is concerned the scheme has had little trial although Manchester, Eng. is quoted, but newness should not in any way interfere with a fair trial on a moderate scale.

It is true, that the building trades of St. Catharines have not made a similar request to the Council of this city but we feel confident that one of the greatest works that the new Chamber could do would be to seek the co-operative opinions of the leading men in the local Trades and Labor Council and through that means bring something practical before the City Council.

If by supplying labor and skill and cutting out the profits, a house suitable for a workman or artisan could be erected at a saving of \$600 or \$800 surely it would be a boon to the city. The Chamber of Commerce has already displayed its enterprise and interest in civic matters, for which it was created, by discussing the building problem last night and taking steps to find a solution. The Journal knows of none that is more practical or sensible than that suggested by the workmen themselves in Toronto.

GERMANS PREPARING WORLD PROPAGANDA

PARIS, March 24—Germans are preparing a formidable world propaganda in favor of a revision of the Versailles treaty and the holding of a new international conference, at which vanquished nations might be represented, for the object of changing or eliminating many clauses of the present treaty between the allied nations and Germany, according to a Geneva despatch. A book entitled, "The Greatest Crime of Humanity," has been prepared, and 10,000,000 copies printed for free distribution, especially in England, France and the U. S., and it is said that millions of other pamphlets along the same line will follow.

Growth Shows Desire To Extend Army Work

Commissioner W. J. Richards, chief of the Salvation Army in Eastern Canada, has completed his fifth year in that capacity. During that time the Army has seen one of its greatest periods of usefulness. This period takes in the "war years." The great war had been under way since Aug. and new problems presented themselves to the organization when he assumed command. These problems required a large measure of initiative to overcome. The task of rendering the highest and most efficient service was shouldered and Canada paid tribute to the success which attended those efforts, by over subscribing the amount asked for during the Red Shield Drive.

Commissioner Richards is a forceful man. He is a man of few words. He believes in doing things. During the five years, more than 11,000 persons are recorded as having sought salvation. Notwithstanding the losses due to war, there are today nearly 2,000 more names on the Membership Roll than there were in this territory five years ago.

In July, 1915, Canada East was separated from Canada West, the dividing line being Port Arthur. Ever since that time, there are now only

forty-one fewer officers in active service in the Eastern territory alone than there were in the combined territories five years ago.

In the Field Report two very striking indications of financial growth are given. In 1914, the Self-Denial total for the combined territories was \$43,726. In 1919, for Canada East alone, it was \$75,591. Harvest Festival returns have been doubled.

CONDITIONS IN WEST AND SOUTH ARE BAD

LONDON, March 24—The Dublin correspondent of the London Times describes the situation in Ireland in the darkest colors. He says the outlook is serious. Conditions in the west and south are extremely grave. The position, bad last week, is now definitely worse. Public feeling is so fiercely inflamed as to become quite irrational. The most outrageous charges against the government are accepted as gospel truth.

The correspondent says the Sinn Fein asks the country to accept the monstrous theory that Lord Mayor MacCurtain was killed by actual agents of the government. He describes the overnight riot in Dublin as another danger signal, and says it is impossible to get an impartial account of the incident, the popular version being that the soldiers provoked and assaulted civilians. The correspondent learns that the soldiers were stoned by a crowd because they left the theatre singing the National Anthem as a protest against the failure of the theatre orchestra to play it. He adds that public opinion throughout the country is exasperated by a wild charge against the police and soldiers who hardly would be human if they did not resent the campaign of murder and calumny.

WORK RESUMED

BERLIN, March 24—The strike committee has unanimously proclaimed the strike ended. Work will be resumed today.

Major General von Luettwitz, the military commander in the Kapp revolt has been placed under arrest, it

wig, was held up by the citizens guard of Eckernforde, but a truce was established as a result of negotiations with the Schleswig committee of action. The detachment will be allowed to proceed to Dugenstadt, near Rendsburg.

REAL CAT FACTORY STARTED AT PUEBLO

PUEBLO, Colo., Mar. 25.—A "Cat" factory to produce hides that sell for \$1.50 each is Pueblo's latest "industry."

Sergt. Charles Colvin of the Pueblo police department established the industry, and he utilizes a method of "perpetual motion" to keep it a going concern.

Colvin feeds his cats on fish caught in the Arkansas river, and, after he has skinned the animals for the hides, he uses the entrails for bait to catch the fish.

Colvin declares there is an excellent market for cat hides.

FIGHT SMUT AND SCAB

Treat Wheat, Oat and Potato Seed Before Planting.

A Dilution of Formalin or Formaldehyde Recommended, by Immersion or Sprinkling—Corrosive Sublimate Also Used for Potato Scab.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

GREAT losses frequently occur through the prevalence of smuts in the grain crops. Numerous experiments have been conducted in the Field Husbandry Department at the College in years past in making a practical application of the treatments recommended for killing the smut in grain. As the result of five years' experiments with five treatments with wheat and seven treatments with oat it was found that very complete work was obtained by immersing the grain for twenty minutes in a solution made by mixing one pint of formalin or forty per cent. formaldehyde in forty-two gallons of water.

In preparing wheat for treatment care should be taken to separate the broken smut balls from the wheat, either by cleaning the grain or by placing the seed in water and removing the smut balls as they float on the surface. Not only is it necessary to treat the grain but the formalin solution should be used to kill the smut spores which are lodged in the bins, on the barn floors, on the bags, in the grain drills or wherever the living spores have an opportunity of again coming in contact with the grain.

The immersion process is so complete in its results that it does not need to be repeated every year, providing care is exercised to prevent a further introduction of the smut spores.

The sprinkling process was also used in the test, and this method is followed by some farmers. It needs to be conducted with greatest care, however, or the smut will not all be destroyed, and as a result it is frequently necessary to treat the grain every year. One of the best sprinkling methods is to carefully moisten twenty-five bushels of wheat or of oats and by moving the grain over on a barn floor when it is being sprinkled with a mixture of one pint of formalin and from fifteen to twenty gallons of water. When the grain is uniformly moistened, it should be covered with bags or blankets for three or four hours and then spread out to dry. Varying quantities should be treated proportionately.—Dr. C. A. Zavitz, O. A. College, Guelph.

Control the Potato Scab.
For seed select smooth, sound potatoes, as free as possible from scab, and disinfect by soaking them before they are sown for two hours in a solution made by adding half a pint of formalin to 15 gallons of water. A couple of barrels with plugs in the sides near the bottom can be used to advantage in treating the seed. The potatoes can be placed directly in the solution or first put in crates or coarse sacks and then immersed.

After treatment spread the potatoes out on a clean floor or on the grass to dry. Wash all crates, bags, etc., which are used in handling the potatoes with the formalin solution. The same formalin solution can be used to treat successive lots of potatoes. Fifteen gallons is sufficient to treat from 20 to 25 bushels if ordinary precautions are taken not to waste too much of the fluid as each lot of tubers is dipped. If the potatoes are not all treated the same day it is advisable to make up fresh formalin for each day's work.

Corrosive sublimate (mercuric chloride) can be used also to treat potatoes to prevent scab. Soak the seed tubers for three hours in a solution of two ounces of corrosive sublimate to 25 gallons of water. Corrosive sublimate is a deadly poison, and potatoes treated with it are rendered unfit for food for man or beast.

Formalin is a clear liquid disinfectant. It is a 40% solution of formaldehyde gas and water. It can be purchased from almost any druggist. It is sold under the names of formalin and formaldehyde. It is important that the purchaser, whatever name he buys it under, secured a guaranteed solution of 40% formaldehyde. The stock solution should always be kept in a well-corked bottle, and should not be allowed to freeze.

If possible plant the treated seed potatoes on clean soil, that is soil that has not produced a crop of scabby potatoes. Practice a rotation of crops. If scab is very bad it is not advisable to plant potatoes on the same land oftener than once in five years. Heavy applications of barnyard manure should not be made to the potato crop, but if necessary given at some other point in the rotation. Plant potatoes after clover sod if possible. Avoid alkali fertilizers such as lime and wood ashes.—Prof. J. E. Howitt, O. A. College, Guelph.

Planting the Cultivated Crops.
To ensure good crops of carrots, mangels, sugar beets, potatoes and corn, the land should be well prepared and seed should be secured of the highest quality. Under average conditions the Irish Cobbler variety (early potatoes) and the Green Mountain (late potatoes) are recommended for Ontario. To secure best results with the potato crop, it is always better to plant them not later than the 15th of May. This year plant half your seed ten days earlier than you have been accustomed to doing, and plant the other half at the usual time. The experiment will prove to your satisfaction the value of early planting. If the potato planter and sprayer has not already been overhauled, a rainy day may be very profitably employed in this work.

MEMBER FOR WEST LINCOLN OUTLINES PLATFORM AND SAYS DRURY POLICY IS IN THAT OF LIBERALS.

TORONTO, March 24.—New ideas are being difficult to find and the debate on the reply to the speech from the Throne in the Legislature begins to lag. Yesterday afternoon and at the first night session last evening or the present house it was carried on. The outstanding speech made by Sgt.-Major MacNamara, the Independent soldier candidate for Riverdale. Sgt.-Major MacNamara lives up to his title of "independent soldier." He sits on the Government side of the house, but he spoke against Premier Drury in the Halton by-election and yesterday much of his criticism was again levelled at the Premier. He quoted exhaustively from statistics of various countries and left no doubt that he was for protection by a substantial tariff. It was on this ground that he criticized the Premier. His remarks were applauded by the conservative members.

J. W. Curry, Liberal member for Southeast Toronto, reached a high level in his contribution to the debate. He had sincere praise for the new Government and appealed for a higher form of political endeavor. Thomas Marshall (Lincoln) Dr. Forbes Godfrey, (West York) and Col. W. H. Price (Parkdale) three veteran members of the House who survived the general disaster of the last election also spoke in the debate.

Liberal Platform Adopted.
Thomas Marshall, Liberal member for Lincoln, outlined the platform of the Liberal party and ended by declaring that practically every item in the Government platform had been advocated by the Liberal party for years. Why the U.F.O. clubs could not have contented themselves with backing up the Liberal candidates he could not understand. "It was not necessary to form a farmers' party to get farmer sin the House," he stated. "The farmers are in the majority in the rural ridings. Had they turned out in force at the party conventions they could easily have nominated one of their own class."

Party-Line Consideration

A Two-party line is a single circuit, shared in common by two subscribers. It is not reserved for a single user and should be used on the share-and-share-alike basis.

On a two-party line it is impossible for both users to try to use the same circuit at the same time. There is also the liability of both being wanted at the same time to receive incoming calls.

Therefore, there are special considerations which we urge a party-liner user to keep in mind:

1. Long conversations prevent the use of the line by the other subscriber, therefore party-line talks should be as brief as possible.
2. Whenever another party-line subscriber requests the use of the line for an emergency, courtesy should be prompt, the first user temporarily to give up the use of the line.
3. Whenever a party-line subscriber takes the receiver from the hook and ends the line in use, the receiver should be replaced at once in a careful manner.
4. At the end of a conversation the receiver should be replaced upon the hook immediately, otherwise the other subscriber cannot signal the central office.
5. Be sure always to give the operator the letters W or J in calling a party-line subscriber.

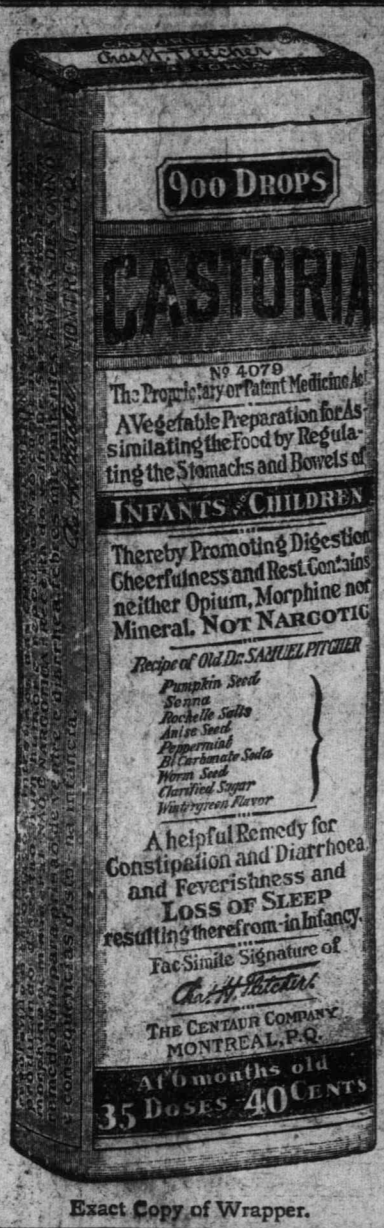

**Commonwealth Accepts
Destroyers From
Trained Personnel
Policy is Formulated**

OTAWA, March 26.—The British Government and the two torpedo boats which Canada is to receive as a gift from the British Government will be of the latest type in their classes.

These vessels will serve as the nucleus of a fleet until such a time as a permanent naval policy is formulated for Canada. In the meantime, moreover, they will enable the Dominion to retain the nucleus of trained personnel for service in any policy developed or in any emergency. The cruiser, accepted of which Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Minister of the Naval Service, announced in the Commons this afternoon, is a vessel of from 4,500 to 5,000 tons displacement, having a speed of 20 knots and armed with six six inch anti-aircraft guns and two anti-aircraft gun and torpedo tubes. Her crew will consist of 100 officers and men.
