Ottawa Weekly Letter.

Government in a Panic!

Sir Wilfrid Flies to the Rescue, Becomes a Candidate in Ottawa to Save one of the seats.

Timber grabbers 'Undesirable'—Then what about Burrows, Sifton, Turiff and the rest.

Pugsley's overdrafts—Situation in Ottawa and Quebec—Members Escaping into Office.

OTTAWA, Oct. 3rd, 1908. A remarkable sign of the times is the forged retirement of Mr. A. W. Fraser, government candidate in Ottawa city, who was nominated with a great flourish of trumpets a few weeks ago. In order to get him out of the way, it has been found necessary to withdraw his colleague also, and to drag Sir Wilfrid Laurier into the field as a candidate with a fresh English-speaking associate. This was felt to be the only chance the party had to save either one of the seats in a constituency which the party carried four years ago by 1,400 majority. Out of 39 Ontario seats carried by the government in 1904, Ottawa gave the largest majority, and this is the place which the premier himself must rescue. It is doubtful whether even Sir Wilfrid will hold one of the seats, and it is pretty certain that he cannot save them both. He is protecting himself by running in Quebec east.

IN RUSSELL, TOO.

The next largest government majority in Ontario was obtained in Russell, where the Liberal candidate was 946 ahead. This year desperate means are necessary to hold the stronghold. First Sir Wilfrid had to call off the regularly nominated candidate. Then he made Mr. Murphy a minister and sent him to try to hold the constituency in order to strengthen his colleague and give him a chance.

THE REST OF ONTARIO.

But what is to become of the other three dozen Ontario constituencies. Ministers cannot be provided for them all, though Sir Wilfrid has promised to create a new department for opp of the candidates. They cannot withdraw all the candidates and run Sir Wilfrid in their places. The fact is that the best hope of the government is to hold a scattering few of the very strongest government seats, where the candidate is personally strong. It seems certain that the provincial election sweep will be repeated, and that the government will be practically driven out of the province. This means a loss of more than twenty seats, and a conservative gain of more than forty seats on a division.

EFFECT OF THE TIMBER SCANDAL.

But there is another lesson in the Ottawa substitution. The government press explains that Mr. Fraser's connection with western timber limit deals made him an "undesirable candidate." That is true. Mr. Fraser was mixed up with Mr. Burrows and the Imperial Pulp Co., in the transactions partly exposed last session, and since explained by Mr. Ames in his campaign against the Lord Grifters. Mr. Fraser put in most of his work on behalf of these western politicians, who hold today the pick of the western lands. He did some smaller business for himself also, and has just been sued for a division of the profits. On one spot where he got timber land from the government for \$4,000, he sold it for \$100,000. It is not surprising if these deals have made Mr. Fraser an impossible candidate.

THE BIG FOUR.

How about the larger dealers in the same line, men with whom Mr. Fraser was connected, and whom he assisted to make millions, while he made only hundreds of thousands? What about Sifton and Turiff, who as minister and chief commissioner have themselves been dealt, and who have come suddenly rich? What about Burrows, Sifton's brother-in-law, with his score of timber limit deals, and a dozen in other names, the member of parliament concerned in more than 1,000 square miles of the best timber in the west, obtained for five per cent. of its value, and worth many millions? What about Adams' of

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there, it was post-marked March 6th, more than a week after the date. Did the minister wait until his friends had been defeated and then write his letter dating it back a week, or did he write it on the date given and hold it back until he saw how the elections would go. In either case, would the letter have been sent and the money paid, if the government had not been defeated? Would not the whole affair have been kept in the dark, as it had been for the previous six years? These are things the people are curious to know.

CHALLENGED TO EXPLAIN.

Meanwhile Mr. Hazen, the present premier of New Brunswick, has challenged the minister of public works to meet him on the platform and discuss these financial transactions. This challenge has been made not only in New Brunswick, but in Ontario and Quebec, and it has not been accepted.

MR. BORDEN'S GREAT MERTINGS.

The opposition leader had a great reception in Ontario. The Toronto meetings were the greatest political demonstration ever seen in that city, and smaller cities and towns were no less enthusiastic. It is believed that the Conservative victory in this province will be more complete than that of 1878. There is not a single absolutely safe government seat in the whole province.

IN QUEBEC.

An independent French paper points out that the great feature of the contest in that province is the list of strong men who have come out as Opposition candidates, many of them persons who have hitherto refused to enter political life. Hon. J. A. Oudet, a former minister, has retired from the bench, and is a candidate. Ex-Judge Doherty, Mayor Sker is among the new candidates in Montreal. Hon. J. C. Gasgrain is back on the field. Hon. Mr. Pelletier is a candidate. Mr. William Price, one of the leading merchants of Quebec has accepted nomination. All of the Conservatives in the late house, are candidates again. Then Mr. Bourassa, a former Liberal, whose brilliant campaign in the Provincial election marked him as one of the most influential men in the province, has signed the nomination of the Conservative candidate in the Montreal riding which he captured. It looks like twenty-five Quebec seats for the Conservatives.

THESE ARE SAFE.

The list of members who have escaped into office is growing. Following is the record of the last few weeks: Macpherson, of Vancouver, now postmaster at a salary of \$3,250. Parmelee, of Shefford, King's Printer, salary, \$5,000. Greenway, of Lisgar, Railway Commissioner, salary, \$8,000. Wright, of Renfrew, postmaster. Then there are more to follow, including Logan, of Cumberland, who is going to the Senate, Finlayson, of Richmond, who will be a judge.

INCREASE OF DEBT.

The government organs are publishing comparative statements showing that the national debt has increased only one and a half million a year since the Liberals took office. This is an old story. Why not bring the statements down to date? What is the good of saying that the debt increased only \$19,000,000 in twelve years down to 1908, when it has increased \$27,000,000 last year? The increase of August alone was \$3,253,601—and the debt is growing steadily at the rate of three to four million a month. At this moment Mr. Fielding is trying to borrow \$25,000,000 in London.

A Bad Record.

According as the Federal election campaign progresses, it becomes more and more evident that the Premier of Canada and his colleagues and supporters base their hope of success on their ability to deceive the electorate and conceal from general knowledge the real facts in connection with the great public questions of the day.

Well, let us see wherein these great achievements consist; let us see what Laurier has really done for Canada. Sir Wilfrid and his associates, when in opposition formulated a platform in 1893. In that platform Free Trade, as it is in England, was a prominent platform. Reduction of expenditure and lessening of taxation were also among the foremost planks of the platform.

Now, at the end of twelve years, they have not reduced; but increased the expenditure to \$112,000,000 with a prospect of \$140,000,000 the present year. Instead of cutting down taxation, they have increased it from \$27,000,000 to \$78,000,000 with a prospect of an additional increase this year of \$20,000,000.

"I say with confidence born of what I have seen and what I know of the situation between here and the Pacific coast that five o'clock on the evening of Oct. 26 will proclaim as the premier of Canada the cleanest, brightest and best man in the public life of Canada today, Mr. R. L. Borden."—Hon. W. J. Hanna in his Ottawa speech.

"What we want is good, honest, and faithful government. I want to see the day when, as soon as a government is found wanting, every man in this country will be ready to declare: 'I will step over the line, regardless of what either side may say, and turn it out.' I want to see the day when we will be a united, virile and truly Canadian race whose only object will be the advancement of this great confederation."

The statement of revenue and expenditure for September and the first six months of the current fiscal year, is one of the most depressing documents issued by the Finance Department for some months. For September alone the revenue showed a decrease of \$1,095,352 and the expenditure an increase of \$1,475,290.

the extent of hundreds of millions of dollars. What is the status of this large undertaking? In 1904 Laurier and Fielding both declared its ultimate cost to the people of Canada would be only \$13,000,000. Last session the minister of Railways admitted the thirteen millions had advanced to \$38,000,000. But Mr. Borden showed that the actual cost and obligation which the people are to pay and assume in respect to this undertaking will be nothing less than \$250,000,000.

When Sir John McDonald was laying deep and solid the foundations of Canada and building the Canadian Pacific Railway, he was denounced, opposed and thwarted at every point, as far as possible, by Laurier and his friends. Now, after profiting by the statesmanship and sagacity of Sir John and his colleagues, Laurier would like to make the people believe he made Canada.

Laurier has proved false to every trust reposed in him; he has deceived the electors on every question of public policy; he has wasted and squandered the people's heritage on political favorites, and trampled under foot every right held sacred by the people. In the face of all this he wants to be allowed to finish. To finish what? To finish giving away whatever is left of the public domain; to finish enriching his henchmen at Canada's expense; to finish involving Canada in ruinous bargains like the Grand Trunk Pacific. Are the electors of Canada desirous of allowing him to finish in this fashion?

"I come here to tell you what we are doing in the Ottawa valley and to say that on Oct. 26th a voice of condemnation will be heard from every riding along the C. P. R. beginning at Nipissing and extending to this city, and we want Ottawa to do the same."

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Sir Wilfrid Laurier is reported as exclaiming, in reference to the charge that grafters live on his government: "I care not for this scandal, for this petty discussion in the press today as to whether Mr. Merwin got 50c more upon that or 50c less upon this. What I care for is the broad inspiration that will come to the Canadian people from the policy which we have adopted and maintained for the last twelve years."

"If there was no other indictment, the Civil Service commission's report should be sufficient to drive the Laurier government out of power. I am confident that such an indictment against a government in the British Isles would force it out of power within one week. It spoke of the unblushing waste of the people's money. An official in one department made the statement that \$200,000 of the people's money was wasted each year by the evils of the patronage system.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. Fielding, and other members and supporters of the Government attempt to make little of the stealings and misappropriation of public money in the different departments. They brush these matters aside and call them trifling irregularities. This flippancy is well answered by Mr. Hanna, Provincial Secretary of Ontario, who, in the course of a speech at the great Borden meeting in Ottawa, a few days ago, discussed the matter in this fashion:—We found robberies by the hundreds of thousands of dollars in departments. Ten million dollars, according to the civil service commission, was pilfered from the pockets of the people.

It is fair to take the department of Marine and Fisheries as an example of all Government departments. Now, this department lately received the special attention of Messrs. Courtney, Fyche and Bazin, the prominent Liberals, appointed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. In their report these commissioners set forth as their conviction, after investigation, that the only purpose which seems to actuate the Marine and Fisheries Department is "that of spending as much money as possible. Zeal for economy and good management is not visible. There is not only a lack of efficient organization and method in the department; but there would seem to be an utter lack of conscience."

The Ottawa Liberals find it very difficult to get one of their number sufficiently clear of graft to run as a candidate for the House of Commons, First Stewart was set aside, in consequence of some blood-lusting transactions with the

Government, in which his son was involved. Fraser was taken; but it was discovered that his grafting operations were so notorious that he could not hope of any success in the election; therefore "he was set aside as an "undesirable candidate." Sir Wilfrid Laurier himself then stepped into the breach and took as his running mate H. B. McGiverin. Now it is discovered that Mr. McGiverin has had his paw greased. It is shown that he was employed by the Government as a middleman to purchase premises that had gone into liquidation. The liquidator wanted \$50,000 for the estate; he set it up at auction; but received no bids. The Government wanted the premises and asked Mr. McGiverin to make their offer to the liquidator. The offer was \$40,000 and this was accepted. For making this offer Mr. McGiverin received \$1,000. The Government could have made this offer through the mails for 2 cents. This is another case in which \$1,000 of the people's money has been thrown away upon one of its pets, and now this favorite is Laurier's colleague contesting the city of Ottawa for a seat in the Federal Parliament. He may have to be shelved beside Mr. Fraser as an "undesirable candidate."

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Pickings and Stealings.

If Sir Wilfrid Laurier would descend from the lofty pinnacle of complacency on which he has placed himself, and condescend to explain to the mystified people of this Dominion what his idea of "honesty" is, he might relieve the minds of many anxious and doubtful voters.

It is there more than one meaning to the word "honesty" and if so, is the particular brand of honesty which Sir Wilfrid Laurier promised to introduce at Ottawa the kind that is so prevalent there?

Possibly we differ on the definition of honesty. Our own idea of honesty is partly defined by the Globe, when in an editorial of June 22, 1896, it said "The Liberal leaders propose to see to it that public money is spent for public purposes, with fair profits to contractors and fair wages to workmen but with no pickings or stealings and no toll for intermediaries."

The Blairmore Toronto deal, by which a party favorite cleared \$100,000. Payment of double prices to the contractors who outfitted the Montreal. The stalling of investigations into departmental mismanagement and irregularity.

The endorsement of men who have become millionaires by a few years of active participation in Canadian politics. The reason the Grand Trunk Pacific will cost this country \$300,000,000 instead of \$13,000,000.

If the Globe or Sir Wilfrid or Mr. Fielding would state frankly and fairly that there have been no pickings or stealings or toll for intermediaries in connection with any of the above matters, it would relieve our troubled minds.

The Last Ditch. Sir Wilfrid Laurier is fighting in the last ditch. All the bridges over which he once marched to victory have long since been burned behind him.

Suddenly of heart failure, at Cardigan Bridge, on the 4th inst., John McIsaac, formerly of China Point. The funeral took place from the residence of his sister, Mrs. Angus Morrison, launching on the 7th, to St. George's, where, after a Mass of Requiem, he was laid to rest in the adjoining cemetery. May his soul rest in peace.

LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

At Glace Bay, C. B., Frank Morgan, aged 23 years, was killed by contact with a live electric wire, carrying five hundred volts.

The women's mission conducted in the Cathedral during last week came to a conclusion on Sunday afternoon. It was very largely attended, the church being crowded morning and evening.

Four Italians were killed by illuminating gas which leaked into their sleeping rooms in an Italian boarding house at Waterbury, Conn., on the 8th. In addition to those killed eight men and two women were found unconscious, or partly so from the gas fumes.

The submarine Emeraude arrived at Charlottetown on Friday after a run of eighty-one hours, in which she covered a distance of 693 miles under water. The vessel maintained a regular speed of nine knots an hour.

John Richardson, aged 80 years, while in the woods gathering firewood at Sable River, N. S., was shot by John Chivers, who had gone moose hunting.

In the Supreme Court at Ottawa the appeal of Francis Abbott, life waiter for the Dominion Government at St. John, against being taxed by the city upon income, was dismissed with costs.

A fatal accident occurred on the Grand Trunk on the 7th, seven miles from Bradford, Ont. As a result, three are dead and two badly injured.

The international balloon race from Semmering, Germany, was the occasion of a thrilling incident, two American aeronauts having a wonderful escape from death. The American balloon carrier, Augustus Post, less than two minutes after the start, burst at an altitude of 4,000 feet.

Charles Livingstone, an engineer on the National Transcontinental railway, was instantly killed and thirteen persons had a narrow escape through an engine running off the track about fifty miles east of Winnipeg Thursday afternoon.

A remarkable performance was brought to an end on Tuesday last and a transatlantic record established by the arrival in Quebec of the Empress of Ireland, of the C. P. R. The liner left Liverpool, Friday night, 2nd, and reached Quebec at four o'clock Thursday morning.

We deeply regret the very serious accident suffered by Mr. O. C. Sanderson, son of Mr. F. H. Sanderson at the St. Peter's Bay starch factory on Tuesday of last week. While working about the machinery, his clothes caught in the set screw of the stirring shaft.

An explosion due to dust and gases in a grain elevator owned by the Canadian Pacific and Boston and Maine Railways caused the death of thirteen persons at Richford, Vermont, on Thursday last.

The Turnover in Ottawa

The scarcely credited rumor of the change in Liberal candidates in Ottawa has turned out to be well founded.

The new move is a remarkable confession of weakness. As understood it was a foregone conclusion that the Conservatives would carry both Ottawa seats.

But regarded from a national standpoint the low development has a serious bearing. It will be recalled that on the occasion of the last bye-election for the Dominion, Sir Wilfrid Laurier personally interceded to prevent the candidacy of a prominent young Liberal because he regarded some of his transactions in connection with one of the departments as not being exactly creditable.

When the local Liberal association had occasion to nominate candidates for the general elections in August the sitting member was set aside and Mr Fraser supplanted him as the nominee of the Liberal convention.

Mr Fraser's name had figured prominently in connection with certain timber limit deals during the past session of parliament which the opposition had alleged were most discreditable, and the government had defended as being clean and above board.

It is fair to take the Department of Marine and Fisheries as an example of all other departments because that Department has lately received special attention from Moore, Courtney, Fyvie, and Bazin in their report on the Civil Service.

Ever since Mr. Fraser's nomination by the local Liberal association it had been understood that Sir Wilfrid Laurier looked upon him with disfavor as a candidate, in the same way that he had regarded the other proposed candidate in the by-election, and it was freely predicted that he would interfere to prevent Mr Fraser going to the polls.

In his public speeches he has denied that the administration of the department has been inept or corrupt, and he has denounced the criticisms of the opposition as the emanations of "rakers." Before a large audience throughout the country he has waved aside the charges of the opposition with scorn so professed that he would not even attempt to answer them.

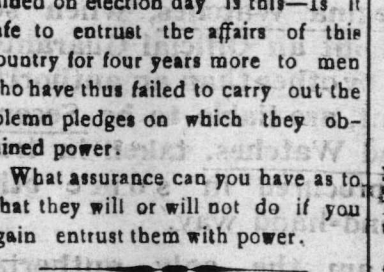
