The attempt to grow tobacco in this country which has been made by Messrs. Carter, the great seed merchants, on a farm at Plaistow, great seed merchants, on a farm at Plaistow, in Kent, has so far proved a marked success. The crop, which covers an acre of ground, is now being harvested, and is a splendid growth. The leaves are well grown, succulent, and large in size, some measuring as much as 27 inches in length by 13 inches in breadth, while the mid-rib is delicate, and not coarse in condition. In this, one of the difficulties of to-bacco growing has been overcome, for if this portion of the leaf grows large the leaf is unfitted, by want of flexibility, for its most important use, that of rolling up for cigars.

The plants were set out on June 16, the seeds having been obtained from America. The varieties of plants which have been cultivated are seventeen of the best sorts, including the Havana and Virginian, but those which appear to have flourished most luxuriantly are the Connecticut seed leaf, the yellow Pryor, the big Frederick and the Glasner. The to-bacco thrives, it is said, in valleys, and the site of the present tobacco garden is in a shallow depression, sufficiently sheltered from winds for the height of the plants. The whole of the produce has been bought by Mr. Cope of Liverpool, and in his hands the true commercial value of the English-grown tobacco will be speedily ascertained.



KING'S CRUEL DEATH.

The Story Partly Told by the Agentsed Boulak Museum. As we have seen, Sekenenra, the Theban hero of the legendary romance the Theban hero of the legendary romance contained in the first Sallier Papyrus, placed himself at the head of the national rising sgainst the Hykots tyranny, and began that famous war of independence which ended some generations later in the total rout and expulsion of the foreign invaders. Till the other day we knew not that the popular leader fell on the field of battle. Of these, Professor Maspero remarks in his report that "Ta-aken, first struck upon the jaw, fell stunned, whoreupon his enemies precipitated themselves upon him, and despatched him where he lay." He also observes that "the Egyptians must have been victorious in the combat which took place over the body of their chief, since they succeeded in rescuing it and bearing it off the field." ### PROTESTANT RIGHTS

Hon. Honore Mercier's Noble Sentiments.

An Answer to the Ravings of the Ontario Tory Organs.

The following patriotic words were uttered by the Hon. Mr Mercier at a dinner of the Letellier Club, in Montreal last week. Every Protestant should

read them :--Hon. Mr Mercier, in the course of a iengthy address, said: I cannot repeat it too often that our victory was not merely a party one, but a triumph of the people. We do not look upon it as a mere victory, for it was fought out under the flag of the national cause. The elections of the 14th of October were carried by the natriots of the two parties, who by the patriots of the two parties, who fought for the same cause and who are ready to follow the same programme. These elections resulted in the condemnation of a Government which was as remarkable for its impotency as it was for its faults, and which was, at the same time, unable to do good or to prevent evil. The elections were also a con-demnation of political misdeeds and financial extravagance of three successive Ministries, and of their organized pillage of the public coffers. They were finally a condemnation of a Government that showed itself to be nothing but a weak tool in the hands of the Federal Minis-ters, and that did nothing to protect the provincial rights against Federal encroachments. The defeated Ministry are trying by all means to remain in power against the verdict and will of the electorate. Nobody dares deny that the Opposition has won. It makes no differice what may be the component elements af the Opposition, the one great fact is there that the majority of the Ministerial condidates were rejected by the people. In the majority that we claim there is not a single member that has not been elected as an opponent of the Government, while in the minority Government, while in the minority which our opponents claims there are four members who refused up to the date of the elections, to admit that they were supporters of the Government, and who declared that they were independent. As proof that Ross is in a minority I may state that I hold a document signed by 35 members, who declare they have no confidence in the Government. And why have we signed this document? Because it was necessary to answer the false assertions of dishonest persons who stated that the

verdict of the people was not sufficiently clear; because systematic attempts were made to deceive the country and alarm the public mind, the majority of the representatives then deemed it necessary to take measures to place the verdict of the people in its true light.

That is all that the thirty-five members did, and it was right to do it, and as leader of the Opposition I had the right to receive that document. Notwithstanding the outrageous and systematic lying of our opponents, our fight was not directed in the slightest degree against the right of the Protestant minority in this province. There is not one amongst us who does not entertain the greatest respect for the rights of the Protestant minority in the province. Thank God these rights are not imperilled. But if ever they were it would be found that they would be safer in our hands and would be better defended and upheld by us than by our opponents. I am pleased to say, to the honor of our Protestant fellowcitizens, that the appeal to their fears met with no success. The results prove it. Our opponents tried to lead Protestant opinion astray, to arouse religious prejudice, and to create in their minds a false idea of the true character minds a false idea of the true character of our political movement. These miserable attempts may have succeeded in certain places, but I have too much confidence in the good sense and intelligence of my Protestant compatriots to believe that, as a body, they will fall into the trap so openly set by our opponents. They will not remain long without recognizing the spirit of justice with which I wish to treat all races and creeds and that I desire to be the loval with which I wish to treat all races and creeds, and that I desire to be the loyal and sincere friend of all good citizens, whether they speak English or French, or profess one religion or the other. In the words you have addressed to me you were kind enough to allude to the formation of the new Cabinet that will be covered this Province. soon be called to govern this Province.
