



The Mining Capital of Newfoundland.

The extent of developments a Wabana Mine are known only to few, and it is disappointing that is the summer season just passed ver few visitors, either local or foreign found their way to this interestin. mine. The loss is entirely theirs and it is to be regretted that so man; have let an opportunity like this slip by. The majority of St. John's peo ple know very little about Wabana in fact most Newfoundlanders know that it is situated at Bell Island, Conception Bay (not Belle Isle, as some would have it), and no more; while not alone is Wabana Mine a feature of Newfoundland, but even a feature of all North America, and we are not going to extremes in saying that it is a feature of the world.

The facilities of reaching Bell Is land are good, and after enjoying a refreshing drive to Portugal Cove and a short trip across the Tickle, the visitor a few hours after he has left St. John's finds himself with torch in hand wading around the immense Dominion No. 2 Dominion Slope, or the Nova Scotian submarine Slope, which extends far out in Conception Bay. These are the two principal mines to be visited, and here, under ground, under water, we see hundreds toiling for their daily bread.

Here with the waters of Conception Bay roaring o'erhead we have an immense mine, not a mine, but a town, similar to the little town in the main

Here we see tracks crossing tracks, pipes aid upon pipes, valves working, compressed air finding its way from the compressors many feet above the sur ace to the farthest depths of the nine; drills going at full force, cars running to and fro, the sound and clash of the shovel as the men en gaged as shovellers load the cars wit the mineral, characteristic of Bell Is and ore; while ponies, now red fror the ore dust but which were onc white, are to be seen drawing the car of ore from the different rooms to the landings (it must be understood that the mine is divided into several larg rooms where drills are constantly at work loosening the ore, making way for the blasters, who blast at night, and the report of which can often be heard many miles away from where it actually occurred), where the cars are trammed to the main entrance where the main cable is attached to the car, and worked by a steam or electric hoist pulls the cars to the surface, where passing through the crusher the ore is crushed, then going through the picking belt the rock is picked out, and the ore being placed in the stockpile is shovelled out by the steam shovel, sent in cars to the pier, where it is thrown in pockets till the steamer is ready to load, then by means of conveyors it is carried out to the ship and starts on its voyage for Sydney or foreign ports,

where it is smelted and converted ino the many uses that attend it. Such is a brief and rather vague tescription of the working of the Iron Mines at Wabana. To the average person visiting Wabana for the first time all is a novelty. The mines are situated at the rear of the Island, facing Harbor Grace, and are about two or three miles' walk from the Beach, the Nova Scotia "side"—as heir mining quarters are called-being the furthest away. Both compan ies have huge piers at the front of the Island where the ore is sent daily by means of iron cars, each holding two tons of ore, and dragged by endless cable. Over two thousand of these cars reach the pier on a daily average. The merry-go-round at the D.

I. & S. Co. pier for dipping the ore in the pockets is quite an invention, while the method of loading a steame see the Marion steam shovels eating away the huge stockpiles of ore, some at one time this 'year conthe cars for transportation to the pier is something worth viewing. There are also many surface mines, where the rock is stripped off the ore, the latter then being ready for shipment. The D. I. & S. Co have at present four urface pits working. Trutly, then, Wabana Mine is worthy of a visit, and next summer when the N. S. S. & C. Co. have their million dollar electric plant installed, and the D. I. & S. Co. have two ten thousand ton steamers olving between Wabana and Sydney. this little iron rock, lying placidly in the middle of Conception Bay, will be much greater hive of industry than t has been in the past.

Berries in Demand.

Almost every craft coming from the orthward and westward bring shipments of partridge berries, and the Portia yesterday brought 100 barrels from Fortune Bay and the Fogota 300 barrels from Elliston and Bonavista. The price paid for the Fortune Bay fruit was \$4. These berries are being sent to New York in constantly increasing quantities as the years go by. They are highly relished by Europeans in the States for making jams and preserves, and the industry progressing in the same ratio as at present will soon be an important one and should engage the earnest attention of our outport people. It is said that last year one outport firm cleaned up \$3,000 in dealing in these berries.

Takes Crew Here.

Plant That Blooms Once in 70 Years.

At the London Zoological Gardens, says a correspondent, near the eagles down, but all the rest of the stocl aviary, visitors may now see the rare sight of an aloe in bloom.

The specimen, which stands about 24 feet high, and is shooting upwards rapidly, is a plant of symmetrical growth, with huge fleshy leaves, furnished with large spines, and dispos ed naturally in the shape of immens: rosettes. The leaves contain a strong fibre, which is valuable for rope making, and the expressed juice may be used as a substitute for soap. It may also be manufactured into a liq-

uor like cider. It has been called the "century plant," from the belief that it flow ers only once in 100 years. It is fact that it takes many years to come to maturity, in some cases ex tending to seventy years. It flow ers but once, and then dies. The Zoo is fortunate in having a second example of this very rare flowering plant, for it is just four years ago since a similiar occurence took place

A specimen of the aloe bloomed in Victoria Park ten years ago, when it was found necessary to remove a pane of glass from the roof of the louse in which it was growing, so that the stem might have space to grow upwards. The crown of blossoms in this instance towered above the roof. At Kew Gardens, about twenty four years ago, a similiar method had to be adopted when the alog bloomed there.

The flowers when in full bloom will be a sight worth going a long way to see not only on account of the magnificent golden blossoms, but also ecause of the rarity of blooming in this country.
