

Don't be too ready.

Of course, I know you are anxious to begin using all that newly acquired knowledge, but a few weeks or a month or two spent in resting and taking your time about getting a really good position, isn't going to send you to the poor farm.

And by the right position, I don't mean the one where you'll get the most money immediately. There are several things more important than your initial salary. One of them is the salary you can get later.

There are lots of places where the business simply can't pay a stenographer over a certain amount. I know a girl who went to one of these places eight years ago at ten dollars a week. She was a good stenographer and a very clever business woman. With her ability she ought to be getting at least twenty or twenty-five dollars a week now; but she's getting just fourteen. She has learned a good deal about the details of the business and is almost invaluable to them, but they can't pay her more because the money simply isn't there. There wasn't a great deal of dictation so her stenography has gotten rusty, and the business details learned there would not do her much good elsewhere, so I imagine if she took another position she would hardly get more than ten or twelve dollars.

That's the kind of place to keep out of, niece, no matter if the initial salary is pretty good.

I have two stenographers and one clerk working for me now, Joan, so

maybe what I'm going to say next will sound rather queer; but I'm going to say it just the same. Don't get a place where you have to work for a woman. I don't like to go back on my sex, but honesty compels me to admit that women are usually about half as pleasant to work for as men. A man boss never thinks of being jealous, because no matter if you do three quarters of his work, he's too conceited to even consider you as a rival, but a woman boss is perpetually afraid you're going to creep up on her, and so she has to be perpetually showing her superiority. As you value your peace of mind and your chances of success don't get a position where you have to work for a woman.

Don't take a position without inspecting the material conditions under which you are to work. I know a girl who refused a good position with chances for advancement, for just one reason—artificial light. I think she did right. Obliging anyone to work by artificial light ought to be forbidden by law, just as making girls stand up all the time at their work is prohibited in some states. But as long as it isn't, make that your own law.

See what kind of a typewriter you're going to have. There's no worse handicap than a poor machine. And last, if you are to work for one man, pick that man carefully. In some ways, business man and stenographer is a closer relation than man and wife. It can't help but be. Many business men see their stenographers eight hours of the day, their wives four.

Wish I could lend you my experience for this important performance of getting a position. Then again, maybe it would make you too cranky and critical and you'd get along better without it.

Here's hoping anyway. But whatever kind of blank or prize you draw in the lottery, niece, be sure to write straight off quick about it to.

A Confirmation.

In further confirmation of what we wrote on Saturday relative to the intention of the Government to send twenty teachers or so to Canada for training, we had sent us by to-day's mail the Montreal Gazette of the 20th inst. containing the following item:

"Dr. Robertson said that Sir Edward Morris and all his colleagues are determined to do all in their power to promote a more elevated taste for agricultural pursuits amongst the people of Newfoundland. Scientific training is also to be introduced into the present school system of the colony; all denominations taking great interest in the movement. In a very short time he says the Government will be in a position to send twenty or more teachers of both sexes to Guelph, Truro and to the Macdonald Colleges, where they will be trained so as to carry back to their island home the most valuable notions possible touching the development of agriculture on every hand. In fact, he thought that the authorities would be soon ready to offer scholarships, so that the knowledge obtainable at the Canadian institutions may be placed at the disposal of the young men and women who will soon be coming up from the Ancient Colony."

A New Athletic Club.

A new club called the Terra Nova Athletic Association was formed on Saturday night last with rooms on Beck's Cove over Mr. M. A. Barrow's, including reading room, music room, and boxing room and general gymnasium. Mr. Leo Murphy was elected President, Mr. W. J. O'Neill, Vice President, Leo O'Dea, Secretary, and T. Walsh Treasurer. The personnel of the society includes several old St. John's boys, oarsmen, runners and walkers. We wish the new club every success.

Tinsmiths' Wages.

Mr. W. J. Clouston's Side of the Question.

The tinsmiths are asking for \$2 a day, and if not given this wages on October 1st they say they will go out. It is well always to hear the side of the employers as well as that of the men. In an interview with Mr. W. J. Clouston on Water Street we find that he employs five men and already is paying \$9.50 a week and gives them a \$20 bonus at the end of every year. On half holidays and other holidays he allows their pay to go on, the total coming to \$25 for each man during the year. He also gives a Xmas box of \$5 every year to each employee. He is often at his wit's end to find work to keep the men employed, such as making up tinware that is not needed by the trade and which will lie on hand for years. If all the journeymen in the city were treated like Mr. Clouston's men we do not think that they would have much grounds for complaint. He could close down his journeyman shop to-morrow and make a living and do a good business in selling imported tinware. He has always treated his men the best he could and they should consider before doing anything that would not be square and for which they would be sorry afterwards. Mr. Clouston will have the sympathy of his customers and friends in the struggle that he is up against and we hope he will arrange matters satisfactorily with his men.

Canadian Representative at Washington.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.

The State Department officials believe that the appointment of a representative of Canada at Washington, to which post Geo. W. Gail, has just been appointed, will materially expedite negotiations between the Washington and Ottawa Governments. While the State Department has not yet been officially advised of Mr. Gail's appointment, the creation of such an office was determined upon with the knowledge of the United States Government. The title which such a representative will have has not been made known to the Department, but he will be the mouthpiece of the Canadian Government, with wide discretion in his intercourse with the State Department, but of course any such things as Treaties can be signed only by the usual diplomatic officers. The substitution of direct arrangements through the permanent representative here instead of the present round about method through the British Embassy is expected to save a great deal of time in the handling of important business.

"How to Come Down Safely."

Special to Evening Telegram.

PARIS, Sept. 24.

The old problem of how to come down safely is yet to be solved by navigators of the air. This is emphasized by the accident to Chavez yesterday. The French aviators and constructors are intensely interested to discover the exact cause of the Peruvia's mishap, which, they consider, is proof positive of a weakness of construction in aeroplanes, which must be corrected according to the accounts of experts printed here. Today a wire snapped permitting the wings to collapse, as Chavez restrained his motor later having planned down a distance of half a mile. His speed as he approached the aerodrome is estimated at fully 68 miles an hour. The constructors agreed that the glide earthward after the motor had been stopped subjects the stays of the wings to a tremendous strain and they believe that Chavez's machine gave way when suddenly put to the extra tension caused by the re-starting of the motor.

Fatal Garage Fire.

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.

Eight persons were injured and 2 perhaps fatally in an early morning fire which destroyed \$200,000 worth of automobiles, at a 41st Street garage here to-day. Most of the cars were the property of wealthy residents of the nearby avenues and were waiting to be overhauled for use in the Vanderbilt Cup Race meet next week. One of the garage employers, a foreigner, is missing and is believed to have been burned to death.

Dissolution of Finnish Diet

HELSINGFORS, Finland, Sept. 24.

The dissolution of the Finnish Diet appears imminent. The President had declined to submit two Imperial Bills on the ground that the measures are the direct proposals of the Russian Ministerial Council instead of the Emperor. The Bills relate to the rights of Russian subjects in Finland and to a tax in lieu of personal military service. The attitude assumed by the President was decided upon at conference of the Finnish leaders.

Abandon Loan Negotiations.

PARIS, Sept. 24.

It is understood here that the English syndicate headed by Sir Ernest Cassel has abandoned the negotiations for a loan of \$50,000,000 to Turkey, in deference to the objections of the French and British Governments.

Chavez Cheerful.

DEMODOSSALA, Italy, Sept. 24.

Chavez the aeronaut, who flew across the Alps yesterday, and was seriously hurt in landing here, is doing nicely at his hotel, although weak he is in a most cheerful mood.

Ancient Building Imperilled by Ants.

The Castle of Wakayama has been found to be in a state of ruin due to the attacks of African white ants. The main supporting pillars have been entirely hollowed out by the insects. On examination it has been discovered that the barracks in Awa and the Miyama fortresses in Kii district are also being ruined by these harmful insects.

The Military Department has despatched an expert to undertake the extermination of the pests. He says that should the authorities fail in exterminating the insects all the fortresses along the Kii and Awa rivers will be ruined, and should the insects once reach Kioto the temples and other ancient buildings would be lost in a few years.—From the Japan Advertiser.

Const. Power arrived here by Saturday night's train. He had three weeks' leave of absence and spent a very pleasant holiday with his relatives at Trinity.

TWO YOUNG GIRLS Leave by the Rosalind Under Circumstances That Alarm Their Friends.

Pauline O'Reilly and Katie Tremblett, cousins, of Placentia, who had been in this city in domestic service all summer, are now on board the S. S. Rosalind on the way to New York. Pauline was in service at the Presentation Convent, and Katie, her cousin, had a nice place with Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell, Queen's Road. Both girls appeared to be quite happy and contented till last Wednesday when a young "gentleman" appeared at the Convent saying that he was from Placentia, and wanted to see his cousin, Miss O'Reilly. The girls were out together that evening, and when they returned home both informed their employers that they were going to leave. On being questioned as to what they were going to do and where they were going they would give no information. Mrs. Mitchell happened to be out of town at the time but her sister who was at the house in charge knew that Katie had no wages "counting to her." The other girl, Pauline, made a bold demand for five dollars that would not be due her till the end of the month, and made such a rumpus that the Rev. Mother was constrained to give her the money and let her go. Neither Pauline nor Katie would answer any questions as to where they were going. Enquiry was made on Friday and it was found that the girls had purchased tickets to New York at Harvey & Co's, and had gone off in the Rosalind as steerage passengers. They had only \$5, and the tickets to New York would have cost them five times that amount. Their employers regard all the circumstances as being so suspicious, and knowing the girls to be good and innocent they informed the police. Inspector General Sullivan has been informed and is now doing some cabling to Halifax and New York, while Detective Byrne is about the wharves and schooners seeking information about the mysterious cousin who gave his name at the Convent as Mr. White. The circumstances of the case recall those of the White Slave Traffic, excite suspicion and call for the enquiry which is being made. Some people believe there is an agency in this city doing the devilish work and furnishing the funds to send innocent girls away to their ruin. All this goes to show the necessity of having a Working Girls Home established in the city where girls could get the protection they now so badly need, and where ladies who want girls or help would be able to get them. Hundreds of poor and innocent girls come here from the outports every year, and many of them go out of the Colony to destruction. We understand that the Rev. Mother of the Presentation Convent has a fund of \$3,000 on hand for the erection of a Home for Working Girls.

Baptized in Odd Place.

Two years ago a 'crypt christening' took place in Great Britain's Parliamentary palace, at which Archdeacon Wilberforce, chaplain of the House of Commons, officiated. This christening (by virtue of a privilege granted originally by the Pope to Edward III.) took place in the Parliamentary crypt chapel.

The infant baptized was the child of Mr. Bradshaw, the resident engineer, and was born within the precincts of the royal palace of Westminster. It was this fact which brought the baby within the privileges of the old papal grant (still preserved in the record office) by which the Pope presented a college of priests for his 'new chapel of St. Stephen' and also a font, in which the children of the royal family, as well as any other children born within Westminster palace, might be baptized.

The last case of the kind was a christening in the family of Viscount Selby when he was Speaker; indeed, there have been only three cases within the last century in which the privilege has been exercised by virtue of birth within the precincts of the Parliamentary palace.—The Strand.



Another Awful Tragedy.

Little Hazel Moore Terribly Burned Saturday Night, Dies Six Hours After Accident.

It would seem to be a gruesome coincidence that the tragic death which overtook the unfortunate man Dillon of the South Side on Saturday night last when Little Hazel Moore, aged 12 years, of 55 Goodview Street, was burned so badly as the result of an accident at her home that death ended her sufferings at the General Hospital 6 hours afterwards. Shortly after the horrible affair had happened, a Telegram reporter was on the scene and learned the facts of the case from the broken hearted mother, who could not realize that her child was so terribly injured and whose cries and lamentations would move the most callous hearted. Just before the accident, which caused the child's death, occurred, about 7.45 Saturday evening, her mother left the house to go to the foot of Goodview Street to get a pail of water from the fountain. When Mrs. Moore left the little one, who was at her lessons, was heard to ask her little brother where her father was. The lad answered that he did not know, and the little one knowing that kindling was required for the morning prepared to go into the cellar to cut some. Her father, Mr. John Moore, and his brother, Diamond, had gone into the cellar without the children's knowledge to cut some wood. The cellar is under the floor of a room at the rear of the kitchen and is reached by going through a small square opening in the floor. The cellar is about 6 feet deep and is reached by means of a small ladder which stands almost upright. When the father and his brother went down in the cellar they left the hatch off the aperture above. The little girl not knowing of their presence took a lighted lamp from the table and walking into the room did not notice the open hatchway. In this she walked and fell head foremost, striking pretty heavily on her head and side. The lamp was smashed in pieces and burning oil saturated the child's clothing, which were instantly in a mass of flame. Terror-stricken at the sight, her father and



uncle ran to her aid and taking up some mats that were near, after great difficulty succeeded in quenching the blazing garments, but not before the little creature had sustained terrible injuries. Most of the hair was burnt off her head, her face, arms and legs were roasted, the flesh peeling off them, while the abdomen was in a terrible state, being literally baked by the fire. Mr. C. Moore, a neighbor, immediately phoned for medical aid from Mr. M. Duffy's grocery store near and Dr. Macpherson responded with commendable promptness. The mother had by this time returned, and though terrified and saddened by the sight of the sufferings of her little daughter, did everything to alleviate her sufferings, as she reclined on a couch, until the doctor came. He also did everything possible for the poor little sufferer, who bore her agony with wonderful fortitude. By the ambulance, which was quickly on the scene, the little one was conveyed to the Hospital, where she died at 2.30 a.m. yesterday. Besides the injury caused by the fire, the child was dangerously hurt about the head by the force of the blow received when she fell. Both her father and uncle in trying to quench the flames which enveloped the child were burned about the face and hands and they had to be attended to by the physician before he left the house. The remains of the dead child were confined and brought from the Hospital to her home at 4 p.m. yesterday. The parents are grief-stricken as a result of the tragic death of their little girl, and the sympathy of the whole community will go out to them in their bereavement.

Portia's Fishery News.

The Portia reports that six American tankers were at Burgeo in the outer harbor when she was there, all looking as if they had decent catches of fish. Squid, however, is scarce right along the coast. Thursday and Friday last the fishermen got plenty of squid for the first time in a month at St. Lawrence and down along the coast, and in that lengthy period, not 10 qts. of cod has been taken by the small boats. There has been no fall fishing to date at Law, L'Anse-au-Burin. At Cape St. Mary's no-boats have been out the past week, and this fishery will soon come to a close. It has been rough there all the week with gales of S. W. wind.

From the Barrens.

Fire Supt. Michael Dunne who was out on the Colinet grounds shooting partridge, arrived here by Saturday night's train, having captured 20 birds in two days.
Messrs. Frank and Arthur Donnelly also came back by Saturday night's train. They were out on the Witless Bay line near Holyrood, and captured 60 birds between them in two days. They found birds very plentiful, and report Mr. Bob Strang doing good work.

Typhoid Abating.

We learn from Magistrate Fitzgerald, who arrived in town from Grand Falls, Saturday, that typhoid fever is on the decline there. There are now 20 cases which came in principally from the shacks which are being destroyed as quickly as possible. Several wells in the town have also been closed up. Every precaution is being taken to stamp out the disease which the doctor hopes to accomplish in a few weeks.

Father and Son Missing.

Mr. Hutchings, K. C., Deputy Minister of Justice, had a wire from the magistrate at Trinity, Saturday evening: Adam King and son aged 15 of White Point, Bonaventure, while fishing out in the bay with trawls Friday, sheltered under Ragged Island. Leaving there for home, boat not seen or heard of since. Fishermen believe boat swamped owing to increased sea and occupants drowned. King leaves a wife and five children.

The excursion train which left here at 2.30 p.m. yesterday took out over 100 passengers.
