## POSTAL TELEGRAPHS.

### Reduction of Fifty per cent to Great Britain.

On and after January 1st, 1912, the Newfoundland Postal Telegraphs will transmit, subject to the conditions of acceptance, messages written in plain language at a reduction of 50 per cent. from the charges for an ordinary message.

The message must be written in French, or in the language of the country of origin, or in the language of the country of destination. The sender must declare which of these languages is used. The sender must write before the address and pay the charge on one word for the letters L, F, L, C, O, or L, C, D, according to his declaration. This is a stipulation of the European Governments, and of the Postmaster General of Great Britain.

The message must have an address and a text; a signature is optional with the sender, but we will not be able to make unpaired enquiries about the senders of unsigned messages.

The messages will not be subject to artificial delay in transmission or delivery; their transmission will only be delayed until full rate messages have been despatched, and not more than twenty-four hours.

Under these provisions a cable message of four chargeable words may be sent for a minimum charge of fifty cents, eight words for one dollar, and twelve words for a dollar and a half.

Registered addresses admitted and recommended.

Until further notice only messages for Great Britain and Ireland can be transmitted at the reduced rate, but it is hoped to announce extensions to other countries shortly.



## Piccott's Ultimatum.

Yesterday we had a few words on the latest political picnic. We showed that the Picnic Party had not yet exhausted its possibilities in the way of providing outings for its leading spirits. We mentioned the fact a row had occurred as to the politician who should take charge of the job of getting the dredge the Government had determined to purchase.

Since that time we have obtained a report of what are rumored to be the particulars of the conflict. Hon. M. P. Cashin, Minister of Finance and Customs, had determined on a visit to the old land, and wished to take charge of the dredge business on the other side as a side show to his trip. Mr. Arch Piccott, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, put up a fight against this proposal, and as we mentioned yesterday eventually got a place on the ticket for himself, for it is persistently stated that both will have a hand in the job. Quite a number of racy stories are current around the bay as to the way Mr. Piccott has been struggling to hold up his end of the plank during the past six months. His friends in the bay are striving might and main to save him from the general debacle which they apprehend. They know there is a strong feeling in the District of Harbor Grace which finds expression in the declaration that this crowd has got to go, and Piccott has got to get out with the crowd. To counteract this they are busy telling how "Arch" is fighting Morris and Cashin.

These stories have been particularly rife since Mr. Piccott paid a convivial Xmas visit to his friends in the bay. As to the fight for the "dredge" picnic, Piccott was handicapped from the fact that he is not in the Executive Council, and could not use its committees as an arena in which to fight his battle. But he fought it all the same. He insisted that the purchase of a dredge was the business of the Marine Department, and as head of that department he was not going to let anybody, executive man or non-executive man, to usurp the prerogatives of his office. He determined on a fight to a finish, and threw down his resignation as a sage of battle. His antagonists were not prepared to take up the gage, caved in, and let Mr. Piccott go.

The incidents provide a racy story, so far as the record of the battle goes, but it illustrates forcibly the ineradicable propensity of the People's Party for picnicking. It shows that its members cannot be cured of extravagant expenditure of public monies. While they are in power they intend to get what they can, and the only remedy left is for the people to turn them all out, neck and crop, at the General Election.

## Romance in Finance.

The world of finance contains no more thrilling romance than that in which the central figure is Sir Ernest Cassel, whose recent gift of a park to Newmarket in memory of King Edward, whose friendship he enjoyed for many years, is but one of many splendid acts of munificence.

His father was a small banker at Cologne. At sixteen young Cassel came to England to earn his own living. He started in Liverpool, and then he went to London, and perhaps scores of people who read these lines will recall the time when he was a junior clerk, getting fifteen shillings a week. When one of the London financial houses got into difficulties, the task of disentangling the complications was entrusted to the young man, and he did his work with such marked ability that he at once made a name for himself. Since then his progress has been phenomenal.

Sir Ernest provided most of the funds for the new Radium Institute in London, which was opened a short time ago, and he gave the \$1,000,000 with which the late King Edward founded a sanatorium for the victims of tuberculosis; whilst he gave another \$1,000,000 for the establishment of an Anglo-German Institute.

How self-reliant Sir Ernest is is proved by the fact that in none of his colossal financial enterprises has he ever had a partner.

## Death of Mr. John B. Ayre

Mr. John Bulley Ayre, a well known business man of the West End, passed away yesterday afternoon at the advanced age of 77 years. He was born at Hant's Harbor, September 30th, 1834, and came to St. John's when only 12 years of age, and went to work at Lash's Bakery. In 1853 he went to Canada, and next year sailed for England where he enlisted on H. M. S. Creedy and went to the Baltic with the blockading squadron and fought through the Crimean War of 1854 and 1855, remaining there till Sebastopol was taken. Mr. Ayre returned to England with his ship in 1857 and was given the Baltic medal. He left England and came to Boston, U.S.A. in 1858 and spent seven years at the baking business in the firm of Parker & Co. He returned to Newfoundland in 1866 and started business for himself. It was in the "hard times," and half the shops on Water Street were closed up. In 1868 he went back to Boston and remained there till 1872 when the times in Newfoundland improved. Coming back to St. John's Mr. Ayre opened a bakery and confectionery business on Gower Street, and soon his name as a baker was a household word all over the country. By industry and integrity and an even disposition to all men, rich and poor, he soon became very prosperous and started a fine store on Water Street which besides carrying the products of his bakery and confectionery was a depot for crockeryware, which soon became one of the most popular stores on Water Street. The place went down to an ash heap in the fire of '92, but the enterprise of the deceased quickly built up a better store. Mr. Ayre invested in the seal fishery, putting his money out at great risk on the S. S. Labrador and S. S. Leopard. He was a very lucky man and every investment that he touched became prosperous. Speculators liked to have him in all their enterprises believing that success would surely follow. He was a shareholder in many of the local industries to a large amount, including the Nfld. Brewery, Gas Co., Nail Factory, two of the Whale Factories, as well as several sealing steamers. Deceased leaves one son, Mr. G. W. B. Ayre, L.L.B., and one daughter, Mrs. J. C. Baird, to whom the Telegram extends sympathy.



Gibbons, who comes from St. Paul, and is but 29 years old, has boxed with Hillard, Laing and others in the Northwest, but it is only within the past two months he has become known in New York, where he engaged in three bouts with Sherman, a former sailor; Willie Lewis and Walter Coffey. He has returned to St. Paul for the Christmas holidays, and on his return to New York next month he will be ready to meet all-comers." The New York Sun says:

"The remarkable feature of Gibbons' ability is the fact that he combines boxing skill with hard hitting. Corbett, Erne, Griffo and other star boxers of olden time lacked punching power, but they won bouts on points. Gibbons, on the contrary, can slug with both hands if necessary in addition to piling up points with wonderful skill and rapidity. Abe Attell, the featherweight champion, also a great boxer, after watching Gibbons trim Coffey, said:

"Gibbons has a head. He is one of the fittest men I have ever seen. One of the secrets of his success is the way he makes the other fellows miss. He doesn't jump away so far that his opponent misses him by a yard, for that would be discouraging. He avoids blows by so small a margin that his antagonist constantly believes he can land if he keeps on trying. In that way Gibbons makes his man fight just the way he wants him to, which is something few boxers can do. His feinting is a treat. His footwork is marvellous and when he starts to punch he doesn't miss. He has a wonderful pair of eyes and is a quick thinker. He likes to box, but if quick thinking is necessary he's there, with an awful kick. Just say for me that Gibbons is a wonder."

### Dying, Directs Rescue Work.

**Foreman Crushed to Death Under 20 Ton Boiler.**

Brooklyn, N.Y., Dec. 19.—Porter Kinsman, 60 years old, foreman of a gang of workmen, was slowly crushed to death under an immense boiler which his men were installing in the candy factory of Levine Brothers, at 32 South Ninth street, to-day. While he lay dying and in terrible agony, pinned between the boiler and the brick bed in which it was to have been placed, he kept his nerve and calmly directed the workmen who were trying to extricate him. He died a moment after the great weight was removed.

Working with him as assistants on the job were his two sons, George and Bert Kinsman, and they were compelled to stand by powerless and see their father crushed to death.  
The brick fire on which the boiler, an enormous one weighing twenty tons, was to rest, had been prepared for it. The boiler itself was on props nearby. The idea was to raise it by means of a hydraulic jack and gradually swing it into place.

Kinsman stood by the end of the boiler and between it and the brick firebed directing the work. One of the hydraulic jacks slipped, and the big mass rolled from its props and pinned Kinsman helpless. "It lay across his stomach. But he did not lose consciousness, and while the men rushed toward him he told them just how to rig up a tackle to remove the weight.

They worked frantically under his directions, for with every instant that passed he was growing feebler. A hurry call had been sent in to the Williamsburg Hospital, and just as Ambulance Surgeon Eckert arrived, the workmen succeeded in getting the foreman from beneath the big mass of metal.

But he only lived a moment after the physician arrived. Every bone in the middle part of his body was crushed. The physician said that the wonder was that he could have kept his senses and lived for the few moments that he did.

### Scores U. S. Society Women.

**English Writer Can See No Good in Them.**

The American society woman is severely criticized by Wilson Young in an article on American characteristics in a current English interview.  
"Her life, since most American men are closely occupied with business, is lived almost entirely among women," writes Young. "The American favorites of the harems crowd together in noisy restaurant luncheon parties, chatting endless nonsense at the top of their voices, this being almost their sole distraction, poor things, since for women, no more than for any one else (except for children and servants, who have the liberty to be insolent and inefficient), is there any true liberty in America.

"Just at a moment when women in American Society become mature they cease to live and grow, and remain half children, half dolls. Before marriage they may do as they please; after marriage they surrender both individuality and liberty of thought."

My Dear Friends,—

But if not surprised I can truly say I am pleased and delighted to accept such a token both on account of the worthy and respectful feelings which prompted the Donation, as of the truly artistic and precious nature of the gift itself. Again thanking you most sincerely and wishing you every success and happiness, and especially all the graces and blessings of this Holy Christmas tide I give you, for yourselves and all the members of the Society and your friends and relatives, my Episcopal Blessing.

**Cable News.**

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Jan. 3. The Peking correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says that the situation in China was never so chaotic and internationally dangerous. Bankruptcy in Peking is so acute that railway administrations are borrowing a few thousand pounds from various British coal mining companies against freights. Revolutionary bands have penetrated the province of Shan Tung and Shan Si. Mutineers are again fiercely offensive, and bad reports are coming from every direction. Tang Shao Yi has been impeached by the Imperial generals, who, determined to fight, have filed an ultimatum over their signatures.

Special Evening Telegram.

PEKIN, Jan. 3.

China's destiny must be worked out in blood, after all hopes of a National Convention which would settle the form of Government for the country have vanished, and a continuation of the civil war is impending. This unhappy outcome of the four weeks of negotiations between the Government and the Republicans is due to Premier Yuan's determination to support the monarchical principle. There is no reason for suggesting that his decision is due to other causes than honest conviction. On visiting the palace yesterday the Premier made a demand that the mandarins and princes should part with some of their vast hoards of gold to enable the Government to carry on the war. He received contributions to the war fund, with promises of further subsidies. The actual sum obtained was small, but Yuan, convinced of his ability to dip into the Imperial hoards, is resolved to carry on the war. He notified the foreign legations of this intention, declaring that the Imperial Army is well able to hold the country north of the Yang-tse-Kiang. There is a possibility of intervention, or some eleventh hour development, averting a bloody struggle, but nothing of that kind has appeared thus far.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Jan. 3.

The Morning Post has started an agitation against the proposal of the United States' Government to grant a preference to American shipping on the Panama Canal. It declares that such discrimination will be a violation of the Hay-Pauncefote Treaty, and says: "By no sophistry can the American Government pretend it is not bound by the terms of the treaty. Evasion of the obligation to which it entered would prove to the world that its pledges are meaningless." The Post gives interviews with various shipping authorities in different British ports, most of whom refuse to believe that the Washington Government has any such intention. Sir Walter Runerman thought that if the report were true the British Government had been caught napping, but doubted if such discrimination, even if adopted, would have the expected result of encouraging traffic in such a manner as to make the canal pay. Mr. Turner, agent general of British Columbia, agreed that discrimination would be a violation of the treaty, and would seriously injure British Columbia, and also injure the canal itself, as it would be many years before the United States could build up a mercantile fleet.

BELFAST, Jan. 3.

The Unionist Council of Ulster issued a statement this morning that a provisional government will be constituted for Ulster immediately after the Home Rule Bill passes the British Parliament, and that most extreme measures will be resorted to for the defence of Ulster by the Loyalists.

CHARLOTTETOWN, Jan. 3.

The Conservatives nearly made a clean sweep in the Provincial Elections to-day, carrying every seat except two, which are yet in doubt.

LONDON, Jan. 3.

The Daily Dispatch says that King George, upon return from India, will be asked to allow the Prince of Wales to pay a short visit to Canada. As Prince Edward and his brother Albert will be making a tour of the Empire, including Canada, in 1913, it is unlikely that an earlier journey will be undertaken.

Mr. Harvey Jardine won the Victoria trophy at the Curling Rink last evening, and Mr. F. Alderidge carried off the Wright Medal for Juniors. About 80 members of the Club took part.
