

In Memoriam.

W. T. STEAD DROWNED IN THE WRECK OF THE TITANIC, APRIL 15th, 1912.

Just a year ago to-day, the Titan-ic, steaming along in the arrogance of a false security, suddenly became the scene of an assemblage of horvere struggling in the ice-cold water, and sending up to Heaven vain cries for help, their shouts and groans blending in a long-drawn chorus of anguish that slowly sank into the si-

In W. T. Stead the world has lo one of her great men. Journalism has lost a leader and an example When he founded his 'Review of Re-views,' he concluded his foreword with this desire "To establish a pe dical, read as men used to read their to discover the Will of God and thei duty to man," and after twenty-one years he was able to say "Nor can snyone discover in these forty-two volumes a page which does not ring true to the key-note sounded in the first number of the Review."

He was taken from school at the He was taken from school at the age of fourteen and for seven years remained in a merchant's office at Newcastle, leaving it to accept an editorship, and from that time giving his life to journalism. To him the Press was a sword to cut down the foes of righteousness, a platform from which to hearten and inspire the armies of the Lord, a desk at which he could expound his policy for making a new heaven and a new earth. In 1877 he said: "I see more clearly than ever that the moral sense of the nation is the measure of its power, and all that lowers its morality saps its empire. I must be a preacher of righteousness if I would do my country any service." In him, like Lincoln, the enthusiasm of humanity was incarnate. Men and women who had lost faith in themselves regained it as they felt the throb of his sympathy. Certainly women had never a braver knight. No movement that gave promise of help to woman called in vain for his chivalry and devotion. He was one of the first editors to engage a woman on his staff at the same terms as to work and wages as men, and his views on the equality of the seves were shown by his refusal age of fourteen and for seven years

Poultry Association.

The members of the Newfoundland Poultry Association held their monthly meeting last evening in their rooms (beck's Cove). The President, Mr. Gushue, was in the chair and a large and enthusiastic meeting afforded visible proof that the Association is a live one and has come to stay. One of the attractions promised for the meeting was a discourse by Mr. Walter Read, who, a short while back paid a visit to the New York Poultry Show and afterwards spent a considerable time on one of the best known poultry plants in the United States. Mr. Firchell is the well known owner of this plant and he has 120 acres devoted almost entirely to the breeding of White Plymouth Rocks. After some interesting remarks on the exhibits and other attractions of the Madison Square Show, Mr. Read passed on to the more important and more practical part of his visit to the U. S. A., namely his experiences of life on a great poultry plant

We were all glad to learn that our 'Ambassador' was treated with the utmost kindness and good comradeship; that Mr. Firchell's influence obtained for him the full run of whatever shows he attended and that he has brought back with him the most pleasant recollections of American Poultry breeders.

Mr. Read's own experience as a poultry keeper enabled him to pick out the right things to bring forward in his lecture and it goes without saying that he and all who heard him have profited by his experience. It may surprise many who regard the hen as a very humble biped indeed that her value is rated as highly as \$10,000 sometimes, while Mr. Firchell possesses birds at from \$5,000 to \$3 (his lowest price). But he also has birds which no money could buy, unless he were selling his entire plant. At the close of his address Mr. Read passed round some interesting mementoes of his visit and questions were asked and readily answered.





Further on the lecturer remarks, "as regards the existence of coal in this country, I would ask the question. Why should there not be coal here"? and then goes on to assert that we have "the same series of rocks which contain the chief coal deposits of the world are found here."
