England Fights for Life Says Lord Haldane. ASKS FORBEARANCE OF AMERI-CANS WHILE BRITAIN IS PROS-ECUTING THE STRUGGLE-EXPLAINS THE BLOCKADE. Chicago, April 1 .- Edward Price Eell sends to the Daily News, an interview with Viscount Haldane, the British Lord Chancellor, on the progress and promise of the world war: "From first to last," Mr. Bell says, "the words of the Lord Chancellorcarefully chosen words-seemed to me full of force and fine feeling, deeply serious, unembittered, eloquent, illuminating. I hasten to quote him on an urgent topic: "We ask you in America-all, whether for or against us, heirs of the early struggles of our races-to realize that when we say we are fighting for life we use no figure of speech. Hyperbole there is in plenty of course but this is not hyperbole. We are fighting for life, and we ask the forbearance of America while we prosecute the struggle. If we appear in a wholly new situation to go beyond some of the rules of the books, we shall not violate the dictates of humanity, and shall not turn back the clock of civilization. We take it that, our interest in ending the war quickly-ending it in the only way in which the Allies can afford to see it ended at all-is also the interest of the United States. "Germany's submarine warfare on belligerents and neutrals alike is a thing with no analogue. We are compelled to meet it. In devising a plan we have given anxious study to the interests of neutrals. We have settled upon certain general principles that seem to us more favorable than are the hitherto sufficient principles of-international law. "If we had recourse to the full rigors of the conventional blockade, we could claim to confiscate ships and cargoes seeking to evade it. What we wish to do is to spare neutrals all possible inconvenience and 'injuryspare their crews, ships and cargoes -and still throw the last ounce of our naval strength into the effort to break the system that despotism has

(From the London Advertiser.) By a large section of the American press the newly launched United States super-Dreadnought Pennsylvania is being hailed as the greatest of all battleships. Magnificent fighting machine that she is, however, she is lacking in one vital factor, that of speed. The Pennsylvania is a 21knot vessel, which is several knots slower than half a dozen battleships of different nations that have been placed in commission during the last year or so. In point of armament and defensive features, the Pennsylvania is the very latest thing in naval fighting monsters. Only the Queen Elizabeth is her equal in these respects, but the British vessel has the advantage of the American in speed by four or five knots, and the war has demonstrated in a sensational manner the prime necessity of speed in naval operations. Other powers have grasped this fact, and even Russia a and power, is rushing to completion a half-dozen battleships that will carry the hitting power of the Pennsylvania, but will be speedier by at least six knots. Japan, too, is building a super-Dreadnought that will have a speed of 22 knots, and Great Britain before the year is out, will have launched a half-dozen more of the Queen Elizabeth type that will be much faster than the latest and best ship of Uncle Sam's navy. The Pennsylvania as a fighting craft is one of the most formidable things in existence, but because of comparative slowness she cannot be called the greatest fighter afloat.

EASILY EXPLAINED.

Moving pictures have unlimited possibilities, apparently, for the study of rapidly moving objects. An apparatus capable of making pictures at the rate of 100,000 a second has been made. With it seventy-two pictures of a revolver bullet were taken while moving 10 inches. Pictures of a bullet passing through a stick of wood showed a curious condition. The bullet passed completely through the thin stick, and was well on its way before the wood gave any signs of distress. Then some tiny splinters started out, following the bullet; the stick began to split, and after the bullet had proceeded some distance the stick suddenly fell to pieces. No camera shutters are fast enough to take pictures at anything like this speed, so no shutter was used. Instead, a series of electric sparks was flashed, the sparks following one another at the rate of 100,000 a second, each spark making a picture. The film was mounted on a wheel about 3 feet in circumference, and the wheel was revolved at the rate of 9,000 revolutions a minute. When all was ready the bullet was shot, the spark flashed, and the wheel revolved, the actual exposure being limited to a fraction of a second, so as not to pile up pictures one over the other.
