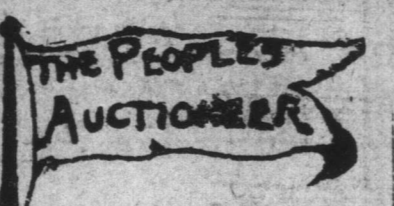

More than 250 voters of Petty Harbour, Madrox Cove and the Gouls gave a right royal welcome to Sir Michael Cashin at Petty Harbour last night when he was known in the settlement. ### What Sir Michael Cashin Stated at the Great Victory Meeting at Petty Harbor Last Night.

More than 250 voters of Petty Harbor, Maddox Cove and the Goules gave a royal welcome to Sir Michael Cashin at Petty Harbor last night, when they assembled in St. Andrew's Hall. It was known in the settlement that the Premier would visit there during the evening to meet the people, and when he arrived accompanied by Hon. John R. Bennett, and Messrs. Mullaly and Martin, the voters were present to receive him. At 8.15 a meeting was called in St. Andrew's Hall, the chair being taken by Mr. Thomas Whitten, sr., one of the most highly respected fishermen of the settlement. sixteen years, to realize that an important time in the country's history had arrived, when a covert attempt was being made by a political combination without experience, or anything else to recommend them to force their way into the House of Assembly in order that they could satisfy personal ambition and benefit private corporations. In Sir Michael Cashin, Mr. Bennett continued, you have a man-true and true, a friend of the fisherman's son. Who is more capable to look after your interests, he continued. Sir Michael Cashin has come up from the fishing punt to the highest position the country could offer him, and a few paid hirelings and busy lawyer politicians, are seeking to oust him and his colleagues from power. Hon. Mr. Bennett in conclusion, said he was glad to be present in Petty Harbor with Sir Michael, because he believed that no other man ever took such an interest in the fisherman. When Hon. Mr. Bennett finished, he was cheered to the echo, just another reminder of his strength in Petty Harbor.

Mr. Mullaly was the next speaker. In opening, he impressed upon the Petty Harbor voters that the 11th hour was drawing near, and that they be sure and stand by their tried and trusted representative, Hon. J. R. Bennett and his colleagues, Mullaly and Martin, on polling day; and to roll up such a majority of votes in their favor that would show to the whole country that St. John's West was true to its traditions, and welcomed for the first time a fisherman-Premier. He had known Sir Michael Cashin for many years, and felt justified in saying that if given a chance to rule the destinies of Newfoundland for the next four years our Island Home would be more prosperous than ever in her history.

Mr. Martin then briefly addressed the meeting, and warned the people against committing the country's destinies into the hands of the political desperadoes of Squire-Coaker-Guppy gang. The uniting together of Squires and Coaker must have had some ulterior motive behind it, and probably the only one to explain it away was Sir W. D. Reid, who gave Squires a private letter written by his brother, Coaker called Squires a "black rascal," but what could be more blacker than to publish private correspondence? The man capable of doing this kind of thing was equal to anything to suit his own purposes. After paying tribute to Sir M. P. Cashin, Mr. Martin asked the straight ticket for Bennett, Mullaly and Martin on Polling Day.

The Chairman then introduced the Prime Minister, and on Sir Michael coming forward, such a cheer was set up that if a Squiresite, a Mosdellite, a Campbellite, a Brownriggite, or a Guppyite was within 20 miles around he would have died with the fright. After the applause subsided, Sir Michael opened his address, and reviewed the political situation since he was first elected in Ferryland 27 years ago, up to the present day. He also carefully covered the financial situation of the country, from the dark days of the Crash in 1894 to the present. In 1895 the fishermen of the Colony had about \$1,000,000 in savings in the banks, and to-day they have \$25,000,000 with \$10,000,000 of Government debentures, and \$5,000,000 invested in the Liberty Loan, besides private investments. This was indeed a splendid showing. In the first place it showed the great recuperative powers of Newfoundland; in the second, the exceptional prosperity during the last ten years, and in the third, the thrift of our people. These are the conditions the Coaker-Squires combination want to change you from,

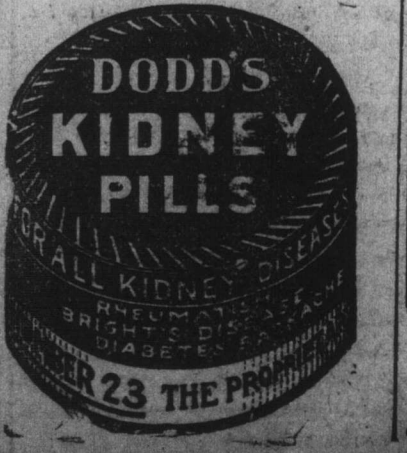

### MORE GERMANS ON DEATH LIST.

BRUSSELS, Oct. 29.  
The Belgian Minister has given his approval to a list of 1,150 Germans, soldiers and civilians, who will be prosecuted on charges arising from violation of laws of war at the time of the invasion of Belgium and during the occupation of this country by German troops, according to "Independence Belge." The list is to be sent to the Peace Conference.

### RIOTING IN EGYPT.

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, Saturday.  
Two rioters were killed and ten others injured and twenty-seven policemen were hurt in a serious Nationalist demonstration yesterday. The trouble arose when the police attempted to suppress a peaceable demonstration, such as recently been weekly features of political activity in Alexandria. Sticks, stones, bottles and police batons were first used. The arrival of the Governor restored order for a time. Then two motor lorries with troops appeared on the scene and eventually shots were fired at the crowd. To-day there was some recurrence of trouble at harbor side but it was of a comparatively minor character.

### CAIRO, Saturday.

"Follow Alexandria," shouts of "We don't want the Milner Commission," interrupted the band playing God Save the King at the public gardens yesterday, giving the signal for the Nationalist demonstration. The trouble was quelled by the authorities, who placed a number of students under arrest.

### A Great Five-Year-Old Salmon.

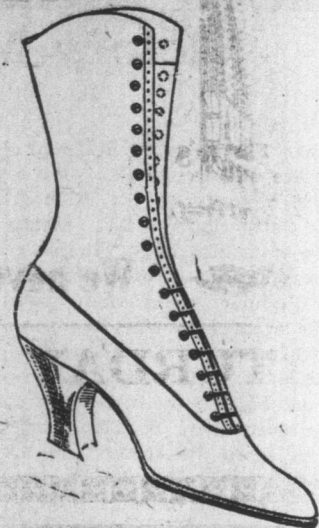
Last spring a very large salmon was caught at Shield Hill, Kincairdineshire, Scotland. It was a male and measured 4 feet 3 1/4 inches in length, had a girth of 2 feet 4 inches, and weighed 56 pounds, or exactly half a hundred-weight. The size of the fish would be in any case make it remarkable, but its age, as determined by "scale-readings," makes it more so. One would expect such a fish to be very old, since it is well known that plaice and cod and lobsters may reach thirty or thirty-five years, or even more. According to a letter from Mr. Pryce-Tannatt, the inspector of salmon fisheries, which is published in the "Fishing Gazette" (of London), the scales show that the fish was only five years old—viz, only one year of river life, in the early stage followed by four years of life in the sea. Another remarkable fact, as brought out by the scales, is that the fish was a confirmed bachelor. The scales showed no "spawning mark" so that the fish had never returned to the fresh waters to perform its sexual function. One sometimes wonders if the scale readings are always as trustworthy as is claimed for them.

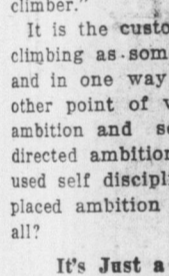
## Side Talks by Ruth Cameron

### ON SOCIAL CLIMBING.



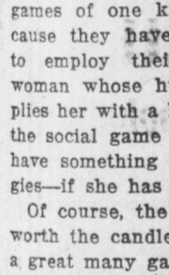

"There's a thing about her," she does stick by her old friends and doesn't go in for social climbing in spite of all the money her husband has made," said one of her friends. "Of course, she doesn't," came the answer. "She's too inert for that. She hasn't the 'pep' to be a social climber."



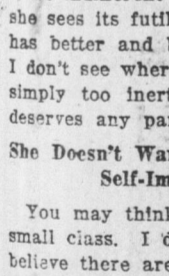

It is the custom to think of social climbing as something to be decried, and in one way it is; but from another point of view doesn't it show ambition and self discipline? Misdirected ambition, of course, and ill-used self discipline—but isn't a misplaced ambition better than none at all?



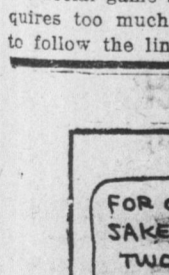

It's Just a Kind of Game. The way I look at social climbing is this: it is a kind of game. And just as children are always playing games of one kind and another because they have to have something to employ their energies, so the woman whose husband's means supplies her with a lot of idle time, plays the social game because she must have something to employ her energies—if she has any.

Of course, the game may not be worth the candle, but that is true of a great many games. And while one honors the person who is big enough to be indifferent to the game because she sees its futility, and because she has better and bigger things to do, I don't see where the woman who is simply too inert to play the game deserves any particular honor.

She Doesn't Want to Bother With Self-Improvement. You may think I am describing a small class. I do not think so. I believe there are hundreds of thousands of such women who do not play the social game simply because it requires too much effort. It is easier to follow the line of least resistance

and keep her old friends, not because she has any deep affection for them but because they are at hand and will accept her as she is without any effort at self-improvement—and also because with them she has the joy of being a big toad in a little puddle. It is easier not to try to make herself agreeable to people; that implies self discipline, and self discipline, implies character. It is easier to lie around and eat candy and read silly love stories than to follow the rules of the game.

Women Will Find Better Games to Play. It is my hope that as the world changes for women (and surely there is a new earth for women, these days, if not a new Heaven) they will find so much better games to play than the social game, that a smaller number each year will care to play it. The social game has never meant to men what it has to women, not because they are any less snobs by sex, but because they have had other games, other ways in which to demonstrate their power to win.

Of course, we shall always have this desire to demonstrate superiority and we shall always have stratas of society until all men are indeed born equal in endowment as well as before the law. But I do think that as the years go on we shall leave the social game as it is now played to the ever smaller proportion of women who will remain incapable of playing the more absorbing games of life.

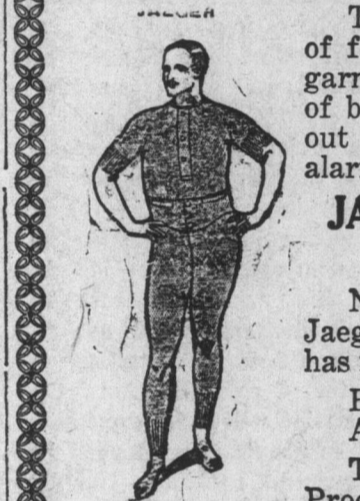

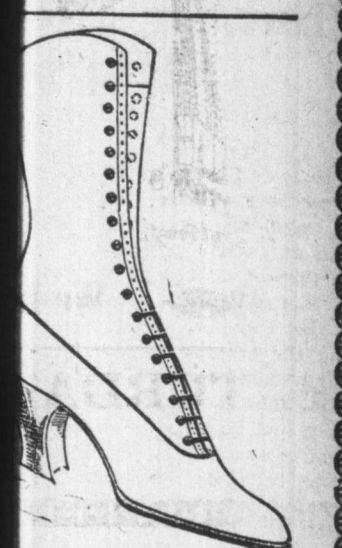

Of course those who had previously gauged the character and record of the Opposition leaders, knew that in their mad attempt to seize the country, no methods, no matter how questionable or how despicable, would be shunned, in the effort to gain their base ends, and thus we are not surprised at but only contemptuous of the vile literature sent out by the Opposition in order to stir up sectarian differences for the achievement of a determined but impossible result, and the dirty propaganda of the Opposition has knit the Liberals of Newfoundland more closely together, and made them the more determined than ever not to throw the country away by voting for Squires and Coaker.

Another of the despicable tactics of the Opposition press has been the continued abuse of the Government candidates, and all to no avail, except to make the people, the voters, forget that Squires and Coaker were today living under false impressions and living under suspicions that would make any other man acknowledge his guilt or get out of public life. Squires and Coaker have accused each other of deeds which put in plain words mean bribery and perjury, and yet they today laugh, as they see how some of the voters take their present coalition seriously, and unthinkingly promise to support them. We say, some of the voters, but there is still in Newfoundland that spirit which animated so many of its sons, aye, and even daughters to fight on the battlefields for true democracy. The few followers led astray by the apparent sincerity of Coaker and Squires have decreased rapidly since the formation of the Squires-Coaker combination. It is a pithy saying, yet nevertheless true, that "one has killed the other." As the strongest possible proof of this we quote the sectarian cry raised by the Opposition and the confederation cry over which the Opposition papers still make such a hue and cry. The confederation cry, according to the Star, was the pivot that would turn the tide in favor of Squires, and W. D. Reid's private correspondence was given Squires for the purpose of proving how the Reid brothers were confederates. Not a word was said as to what Squires paid for the use of the said personal correspond-

ence nor was the relation which that correspondence had with the present Government shown up. Of course it did contain the statement that Cashin is strong for it, and that the chief impediment to confederation was the prosperity of our island. But that letter was written in 1916. Our prosperity has increased greatly since then, and Cashin proposes now, after his reelection, to not only keep our country in its present general state of sound finance, but to augment our revenues by the development of our mines, by re-forestation, and by multitudinous other developments, which spell defeat and not success to the confederation plans of Reid or anyone else.

It has been pointed out that this country cannot federate with Canada or any other country, except by the consent of the people, and while our country retains its present sound, strong financial condition, its people will not ask for confederation; but under the Squires-Coaker regime, were such a combination to obtain control, our revenues would be immediately decreased by the proposal of Squires, and the revenue collected would be more than expended on guaranteeing the price of fish and the other Coaker schemes, so that very soon there would be an utter collapse of our whole financial fabric, and the good name of our country besmirched by inexperienced politicians and political aggrandisers of the Squires and Coaker type. The confederation cry therefore is only another evidence of the losing game that the Opposition are playing in order to keep the few remaining Squiresites and Coakerites in spirits until Monday. But this cry is worn out. The people understand who are the real and not the imaginary advocates of confederation. Confederation will be brought about by the people being forced into it through reckless gambling with our finances such as is planned by Squires and Coaker, should they be elected, but they will not be, for the voters will use discretion and intelligence and vote for their true independence.

The Opposition papers said little or nothing about the share Squires took of the fifty million dollars of revenue while he was in the Government, but the Post makes a big talk over the alleged financial supporters of Cashin. Will the Opposition organs, controlled by Squires, publicly affirm that their master is not being partly financed by the corporations on Bell Island? Of course we do not expect the truth as it is customary not to expect anything of veracity in the organs in question. Will the Squiresite organs also tell us how many of the merchants on Water Street are supporting their master because of his promise to repeal the Income Profits Tax; and also tell us why it is that they are supporting him for the reason named if the Profits Tax meant nothing out of the said merchants

pockets? 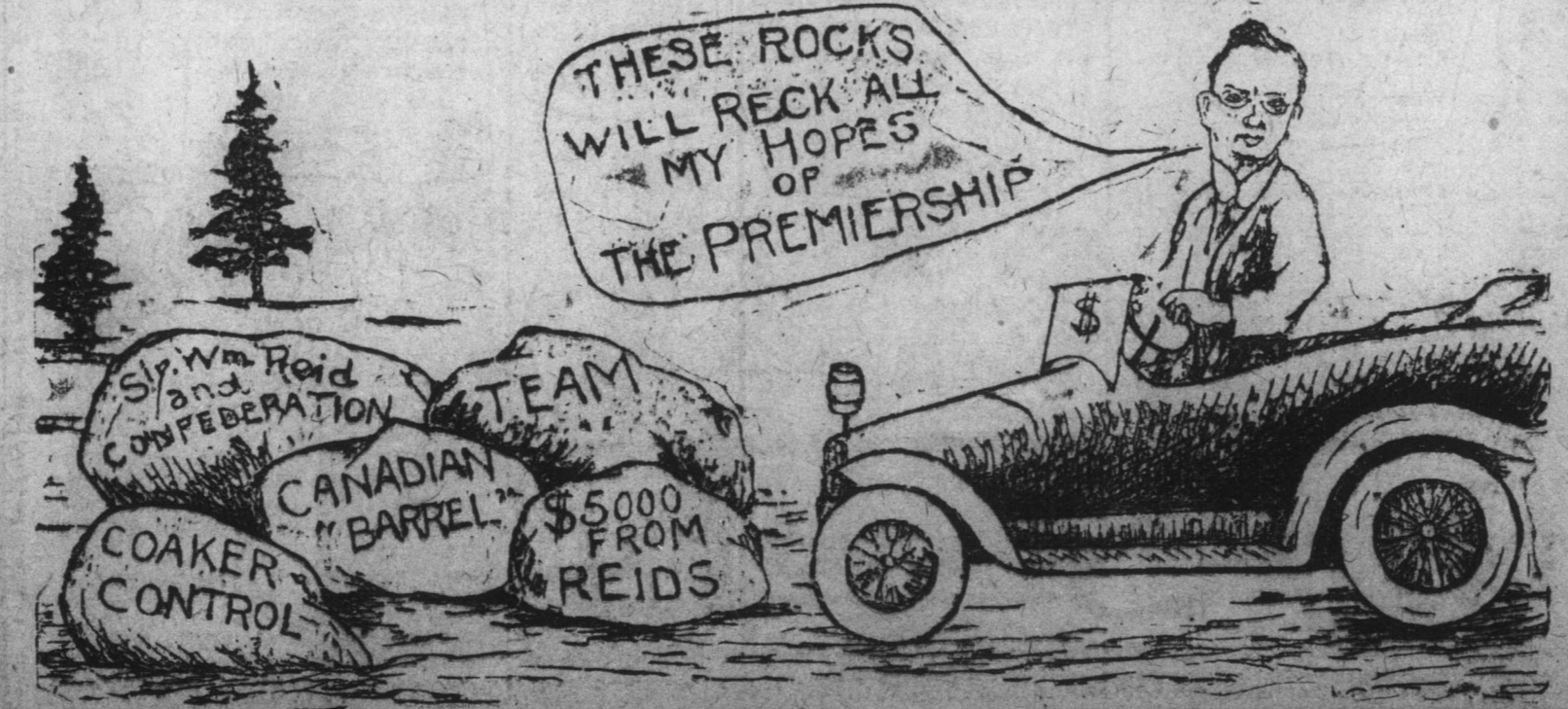
**Lashings of Cash in Squires' Barrel.**

**Three Meetings Last Night.**

TORBAY ROAD, MAJOR'S PATH AND PORTUGAL COVE, FOR THE FIGHTING TRIO, HIGGINS, VINCOMBE AND FOX.

In pursuance of the programme outlined for this week's campaign, the Fighting Trio, Higgins, Vincombe and Fox, last night visited and held bumper meetings at Torbay Road, Major's Path and the Kenny's Pond section of the Portugal Cove Road. Despite the boisterous weather, the three meetings were exceedingly well attended practically every voter in the different localities being present. This was particularly noticeable in the case of the Major's Path meeting, which was the direct opposite of the fiasco conducted there by the "Reform" candidates last Friday night. The Torbay-Road and Major's Path meeting were held in their respective school houses and the Portugal Cove Road meeting in the house of Mr. Richard Kenny. The meeting at the Torbay Road school house was the first of its kind ever held in that building. At Major's Path a similar rousing ovation awaited the candidates. Their reception was quite the opposite to that accorded their opponents last week, and dispelled all shadow of doubt, if any existed, in the minds of those who were present as to the Major's Path favorites. As one of the audience remarked last night, "Here are three men whom we can look upon with pride as our representatives." Mr. Thomas Butler acted as chairman to the satisfaction of all.

Leaving Major's Path, the "Trio" proceeded to the house of Mr. Richard Kenny, where, although somewhat fatigued by their evening's work, they addressed the large gathering present. Mr. Richard Lawlor, the oldest resident of the road, being in the chair. As at the other meetings, the candidates dealt with the policy of their party in all its phases, giving particular attention to matters of local importance. They also criticized the proposed, but meaningless, manifesto of the Opposition, and passed after debate was scored against the Reform Party. The rafters fairly rang with applause. The candidates all made rattling great speeches at each meeting, and the applause which greeted them served to show their popularity with the people. 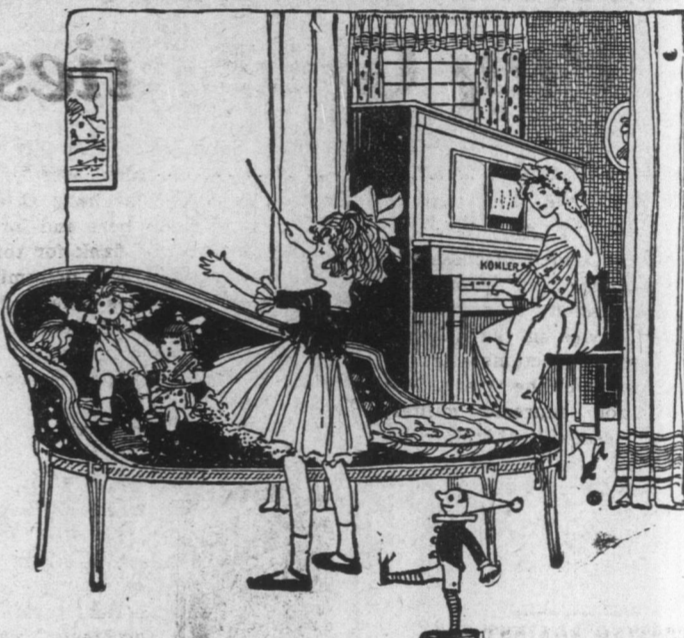

## Canada Cannot Pay Gratuities.

TO CREATE A MILITARY COMMISSION.

PARIS, Oct. 29. The Supreme Council discussed today the creation of an Inter-Allied Military Commission to direct the movement of troops in the occupied area and plebiscite sections after the formal ratification of the treaty. With such ratification supreme military command will cease, it therefore becomes necessary to create an organization to supervise the military movements provided for in the treaty. If the Inter-Allied Military Commission is created Foch will undoubtedly be chairman.

PROTESTING AGAINST SALE.

ST. THOMAS, Virgin Islands, Oct. 29. The Chamber of Commerce of the British West Indian Islands representing producers, merchants and other residents of these British possessions are urging a movement for the adoption of a set of resolutions objecting to the proposal of Lord Rothermere, British Peer, that some of the British West Indian Colonies should be sold to a foreign power to help liquidate the British war debt. Those interested in the movement are convinced that increased production, closer interrelation, brought about by the British Empire will result in unparalleled prosperity which would render it unnecessary to part with any portion of the Empire.

REJECTS PROPOSAL FOR GRATUITIES.

OTTAWA, Oct. 29. The Parliamentary Committee on the Soldier's Civil re-establishment rejects the proposal for the general distribution of grants or gratuities on the grounds that the country is financially unable to pay. The findings will likely be submitted to Parliament.

THE SITUATION ON SERBIAN FRONT.

OMSK, Oct. 29. The military situation on the western Siberian front has not changed materially the past few days except regards the left flank of the third

army of the all Russian Government forces. The Bolsheviks have thrown in two new divisions here and forced the retirement on this flank for thirty miles. It has not yet been determined whether this constitutes a new offensive on a large scale. General Dieckrich the Commander in Chief has gone to the front making an inspection of the situation.

FIZZLED OUT.

Don't recall the wild commotion of a little while ago, when we had a sort of notion that the profiteers would go? We resolved to prosecute them and to poison them and to shoot them, and to treat 'em rough and boot them; where's that movement, do you know? Where are now the learned attorneys whom we often used to meet, as they made their frantic journeys to the courthouse and repeat? How they used to roar and thunder, how they'd stamp the price hogs under, and deprive them of their plunder, in the name of Mike and Pete! Are the profiteers in prison, where we said we'd put them all? Is the hoarder getting his'n, dragging round a chain and ball? Is the market's greedy ruler resting in the moldy cooler, or is Justice but a drooler, with his picture to the wall? ## To The People Who Work in Factories.

The people who above all others have a special and deep interest in this election, are the large army of honest and industrious employees who work in all the factories. It is to them, therefore, that we wish to direct some solemn words of warning and advice, for unless they are up to the mark, they will be the greatest sufferers from Coakerism of all our St. John's dwellers. ### Confiscation!

LONDON, Oct. 26.—Papers of every political opinion are supporting Lord Beaverbrook's campaign in favor of taxing war profits to a point of confiscation. His prediction in to-day's Express that such a levy would produce \$5,000,000,000, finds general agreement. Most of the organs consider the argument irresistible that a war-fortunes tax would both reduce luxury-spending and help bring down prices.

It is broadly hinted that Lord Beaverbrook's attitude is governmental-ly-inspired, and that the Express campaign is intended to test financial opinion. Viscount Northcliffe's Daily Mail urges haste, as there is reason to believe that much capital is leaving the country. The treasury is asked to enquire into the status and ownership in Canada of what are known as "holding companies," which, with relatively small capital, are used to take over securities of rich men and thus conceal a great deal of income which may be liable to the war-fortunes' tax.

The Mail says it is known in Canada that a considerable number of wealthy Britishers are evading the income tax by this means. An ordinary capital levy, which is an alternative to the war profits' tax, now finds little support outside of labor circles, it being considered too dangerous a precedent to pass on to a socialistic government which would enforce this levy in times other than those of national emergency.

### Burmese Girls Woo Mates.

The women of Burma have unlimited freedom in comparison to the women of other eastern lands. Unlike the women of India, China, or Egypt, they may choose their own husbands and indulge in a period of courtship such as we of the western world so thoroughly understand.

From the time of the first great event in a young girl's life, the boring of her ears, which announces to the world that she is no longer a child, but a woman, until her betrothal, the Burmese girls look forward to the search for a husband as the one aim and ambition of her life.

Until her ears are bored she is a child and runs and plays freely with her brothers upon village streets. Finally the day arrives when her friends and relatives bring with them the ear-borer and the soothsayer, and the frightened girl must pay the price of gaining maidenhood.

Her cries are drowned by the music and the talk and laughter that seem so heartless; but the pain is soon over, and she herself will make the hole larger by every means in her power, because until the hole is large enough to receive the great round tube, nearly half an inch in diameter, she does not feel that she is indeed a woman.

This initiation of the girl into womanhood compares to the entrance of

her brother into the monastery or the fasting of his legs, the sign that he is no longer a boy, but may sit with men and chew betelnut and discuss the affairs of the world with wondrous wisdom.

After the ear boring ceremony, each man or maiden sees may be a possible husband, and she copies the coquettish sway of the hips that is so effective in her elder sister as she walks down the street with her mother, aunt or married friend, who carefully guard her from all improprieties, now that she has arrived at marriageable age.

### Discovered by Accident.

WE OWE BLOTTING-PAPER TO A WORKMAN'S MISTAKE, AND THE PERFORATED STAMP TO A WOMAN'S TEMPER.

Many wonderful discoveries have been made by accident, and one or two cases are very interesting.

In 1796 a ticket-stamper, employed at a Munich theatre, became the world's first lithographer. His name was Aloys Senefelder, and his work was to stamp the theatre tickets, the apparatus consisting of a polished whetstone (originally intended for sharpening razors), a stamper, and coloured ink.

One October evening he had drawn his cheque for salary, and had carelessly left it on a table in the room where he worked. A gust of wind suddenly blew the cheque off the table into a basin of water on the floor. Senefelder dried the cheque as best he could, and to straighten the paper out, he placed it underneath the whetstone, which had been resting on the printing-stamp, and left it lying there throughout the night.

The following morning, on taking the stamp off the cheque, he was surprised to see that the imprint from the stone was transferred to the cheque, and the thought struck him that by means of a larger stone he could "print" programmes and songs. He made experiments, and finally discovered—through this accident—the art of printing from stone.

This was the first lithographer. Perforation was quite an accidental discovery for our postage-stamps were not originally perforated. A

needle-woman, having one day lost her temper with her husband, sat "pricking" a pattern-book in front of her. During the "few words" she made quite a few holes one after the other, and irritably tore the paper along the line of pin-pricks.

Her husband at once conceived the idea of perforation for postage-stamps, and tried an experiment by hand. Shortly afterwards a machine was patented, and perforation was found through a loss of temper.

batch was considered useless. The proprietor, however, wishing to make a hurried note, picked up a piece of the condemned paper, but was annoyed to find that his ink ran all over it whilst writing. So successfully did the paper blot up the ink, that he made nothing else but "blotting-paper." Thus the accidental forgetfulness of an employee resulted in a large fortune being made for the firm.

 hunter, it bears inside the cover the  
 inscription: "For Services Rendered—

 ceived the watch as a reward for  
 spending eighteen months in the Ger-





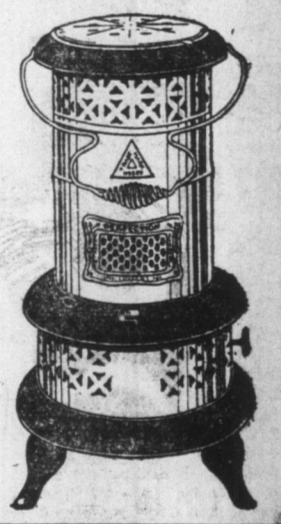

**The Wreck of the "Bohilla."**

At 4 o'clock a. m. on Friday, October 30, 1914, the British hospital ship "Bohilla" went ashore on the rocks near the ruins of Whitty Abbey in a violent gale. She was bound from France and Belgium. Signals of distress brought lifeboat crews and rocket brigades to the scene, but they could do nothing until the sea fell slightly after the arrival of daylight. By this time several bodies had been washed ashore. It was impossible to take the lifeboat out of the harbor mouth, and so with great difficulty it was dragged along the beach to a point opposite the wreck. Two journeys were made to the ship and two loads landed, but the lifeboat was then so badly battered that a third journey was impossible. A second lifeboat was in town, and it was brought to the top of the cliff and lowered 200 feet down to the water—a feat probably unparalleled in the history of the Lifeboat Institution. Unfortunately, nothing further could be done. The "Bohilla" soon afterwards broke in two. Rocket after rocket blazed out towards her, but fell short or were blown aside, and the seas were beating so hard on the rocks foreshore, that it was impossible to launch a lifeboat. The "Morning Star" of Scarborough appeared a mile out from the wreck with the Scarborough lifeboat in tow, but it was not able to render any assistance, the fury of the waves being too great. Night fell once more, and when morning dawned it was still found impossible to launch a lifeboat. The vessel was breaking up and signals reported that eight persons had died during the night. An answering signal was "risk it," and some jumped overboard and were drowned, but others managed to swim until they could grasp the ropes thrown to them. Several people on board undertook perilous rescues of unconscious swimmers from the surf, but when night again fell fifty people were still on the wreck. Just after 6 o'clock on Sunday morning a motor lifeboat from Tynemouth, which had arrived during the night, left the harbor and was successful in bringing off the survivors, who for fifty hours had been without food or drink, and exposed to bitter weather and surging seas, which continually washed over them as they clung to the wreckage. One man brought ashore a black kitten on his shoulder. When the vessel struck 250 people were on board, of which 150 were saved.

The schooner was badly damaged and the crew was taken aboard the steamer. The Fearn later being picked up by another steamer, which put a prize crew on her. The Capt. of the Floga admits all responsibility for the collision.

**Work of the Storm.**

The storm yesterday did a lot of minor damages along the country roads. Out Rennie's Mill Road a long strip of the guard fence above the Mill was blown over the hill, a broad cart was shifted about one hundred feet and a section of the roof of Rennie's stable was blown off.

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
