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

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

OTTAWA HAD BIG STORM.

OTTAWA, June 1. A terrific storm broke over Ottawa this afternoon, when two buildings were hit by lightning and destroyed, and the electric services were interrupted. Many windows were broken by hail, awnings and trees blown down and the street car service stop ned. In twenty minutes, during which the storm raged, at one point forty-three inches of rain fell, which is the highest ever recorded in this city. Lightning and rain came with a strong southwest wind, which before it was over had blown from practically every point of the compass. The Bell Telephone Company announced that a thousand phones are out of order in the city, as a result of the storra, mostly caused by wires being broken by falling trees. and by underground cables grounding owing to the flood of water.

FUTILE PERSECUTION.

COPENHAGEN, June 1. A despatch received here from Budapest says the Hungarian Minister of Interior has issued a decree dissolving all Free Mason lodges, the funds of which will be confiscated and devoted to "humanitarian purposes." The despatch said that it is alleged that Lodges, even before the war, were revolutionary centres.

FIFTY TO TWELVE.

DUBLIN, June 1. Twelve soldiers, comprising the guard of a public building here, were surprised this afternoon by a party of armed men, and took away their arms and two machine guns. The Senate rules against demonstrations, raiding party consisted of fifty men, and the building attacked was the office of the Registry of Deeds. The raiders were armed with revolvers, and first disposed of the soldiers on guard, whom they compelled to surrendered their rifles and equipment. Nobody was allowed to leave the building until the raiders had accomplished their purpose and departed. This was the first daylight raid in Dublin on a Government building.
