A Notable American.

On June 3, 1808 was born in Kenucky, Jefferson Davis, the leader of he greatest civil war of modern imes. While yet a boy, his father, who was a planter, removed with his family to Mississippi; but the later civil studies of young Davis were conducted at Transylvania College, Kentucky. In 1824 he entered the United States Military College at came second lieutenant. In 1831-2 he served on the North West Frontier in the Indian War against Black Hawk, and in 1833 was employed as a first lieutenant of Dragoons against the Comanches and Pawnee Indians. On retiring from the Army in 1835, he settled as a cotton planter in Mississippi, but was again in the field during the Mexican War, when he was elected colonel of the 1st Mississippi Volunteers, and distinguished himself by gallant conduct at Monterey and Buena Vista. He had previously attracted some notice in Congress as an energetic supporter of democratic principles and measures, and had assisted in bringing about the election of Mr. Polk for the Presidency. As a reward Mr. Polk, in 1847, offered him the post of Brigadier General of Volunteers; but he declined it, on the ground that Volunteer commands ought to be vested in the States, and did not come within the prerogatives of the Federal Government. Having been elected to the Senate, at the conclusion of the Mexican War he was chosen President of the Military Committee in 1850-an office which he resigned in 1851, that he might stand as candidate for the Governorship of Mississippi, but in this he was unsuccessful. Under the Presidency of Mr. Pierce (1853-57) he held the office of Secretary for War, but during the Administration of Mr. Buchanan, he remained a private member of the Senate. Davis had long championed State rights and slave colding interests and gradually drew to himself a number of followers, who acknowledged his supremacy, and at length led to the secession of 1861, when he was chosen President of the Confederate States for six years. In 1863 the American Civil War broke out, but after the collapse of the South, Davis was taken pris-oner at Irwinville Georgia on May 10. 1865, and detained in Fortress Monroe for two years, but was included in the amnesty of 1868. He subsequently followed business pursuits, eschewing politics, and wrote a history of the war in which he played so conspicuous a part. He died in 1890.


