Gold for Corruption.

BUT NONE TO RELIEVE HUNGER... The Russian Government, if it can call it a government, cannot feed its starving millions, but it can and does find much gold with which to corrupt peoples residing in other lands. The Soviet Government cannot find means to feed the Russian nation. But it does find the funds, necessary to equip, feed and generally maintain a standing army of one and one-half million men. Lenin and Trotsky found the way to send both men and money—not worthless paper money but gold—to South Africa, in order to foment revolution and overthrow Government, and with their tongues in their cheeks beg for alms. This same pair of birds are able to maintain scores of Communist agents in the British Isles and act as general bankers for the Communist party of Great Britain, but it cannot save its starving population. As a matter of fact these relief funds are playing right into the hands of the Reds; in proof of which statement we print the text of a Communist circular which has been sent broadcast about London. It is dated March 6 of the present year and reads: "The Communist International regards famine relief work as of the utmost importance, and the raising of relief funds should therefore be entered upon in the spirit of an organized revolutionary task, and not merely from the humanitarian point of view. Our first duty at the present juncture as revolutionists is to secure the maintenance of the Russian Workers' Soviet Republic, and in securing this, unconditional famine relief by the workers of the world has the highest political and material value." "Exactly, if the world can only be prevailed upon to feed and clothe the Russian people, the Soviet Government can continue to maintain its huge army which is a daily menace to Continental Europe. Every dollar sent Russia means that Lenin and Trotsky can spend another dollar buying munitions and spreading propaganda. He is for God's sake, Russian relief has been but the cloak of Bolshevik propaganda. For months the Reds have been stumping this country, talking relief one minute and revolution the next; and incidentally making a fat living thereby.—Saturday Night, Toronto.

THE DANGEROUS YEARS.

How many things are you interested in? How many things interest you besides your work -- which, please God, interests you, because if it doesn't three quarters of your life is devalued. But that's another story. I'm thinking now of the interests you have for your leisure moments.

When are people unhappy? When are they bored? Conversely, when are they happy? When they are interested. In the early years of life it is easy to be interested because the great absorbing interests of sex and mating fill the spare moments of most lives with their direct or indirect claims on our attention (direct being courtship and flirtations, indirect things such as dancing, outdoor sports, the wardrobe, etc.)

That Vacant Space.

But as one grows older the claims of these all powerful interests lessen. One marries and the great game of mating is over as a diversion. How are we to fill the vacant space? With attempts to recreate, the sex stimulation by mild or not so mild flirtations? That is the common instinct. But if it doesn't lead merely to restlessness and reaction it leads 99 times out of a hundred to distinct unhappiness. FIFTEEN YEARS OF EXILE.

A woman novelist, whose life of adventure provides a romance as thrilling as any she has written, has returned to England after an absence of 15 years.

She is Miss Beatrice Grimshaw, and her years of voluntary exile have been spent in the South Sea Islands. Miss Grimshaw landed recently at Plymouth.

To a special correspondent she told a wonderful story of her life among the savages of New Guinea (she has penetrated places there never before trodden by a white woman), of cannibal ways and native customs.

Quite unemotionally she told grim tales of torture and man-eating by natives, who, cannibals as they are, are "well-mannered" and admirable workers, even though they regard killing as a "perfectly ordinary business."

"In the interior cannibals live by themselves, and it is only when they come under British jurisdiction that their cannibalistic tendencies are checked," said Miss Grimshaw.

"One gets so accustomed to this question of cannibalism that it is accepted almost as a matter of course. I know the cookery recipes now as to the best methods of preparing human food."

"In one part of the country there is a stone oven, 6 ft. long, dug into a side of a hill for the purpose of dealing with the victims. The inhabitants of one village may attack another. The prisoners are tortured terribly and then eaten."

"One method is to take out their eyes and then roast the body alive in the traditional three-legged cauldron. The cannibals break the bones and legs of their victims beforehand sometimes, and then let the body lie in a running stream, which method they believe makes the meat more tender."

"The odd feature of it all is that the most detestable cannibals are extremely well-mannered, and in all other respects are the best workers you can find. As to whether cannibalism springs from the love of human flesh or is merely a ritual one cannot say. I think the cannibals really like human flesh. But you cannot get them to talk about it, not because they are ashamed, but because they think you would be prejudiced and would not understand."

"Apart from eating human flesh they keep ghastly souvenirs. They will wear a human hand around their necks or keep skulls in their houses."


"Killing to these natives is a perfectly ordinary sort of business. The remarkable thing is that, some of the worst natives in the country are not cannibals at all. If one is to judge by the effect, cannibalism produces a better type."

"But you must not suppose the whole country is given up to the doings of the cannibals. I certainly had cannibals working for me and the cannibal spirit is ever present, but virtually an improvement is being made in those parts where the ideas of the white man have spread."

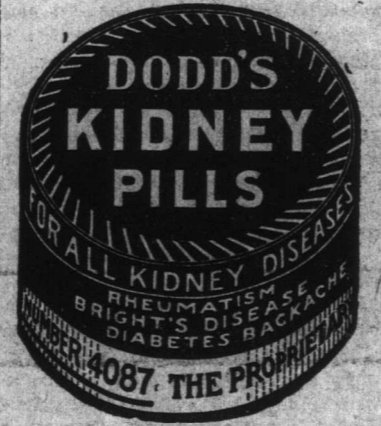

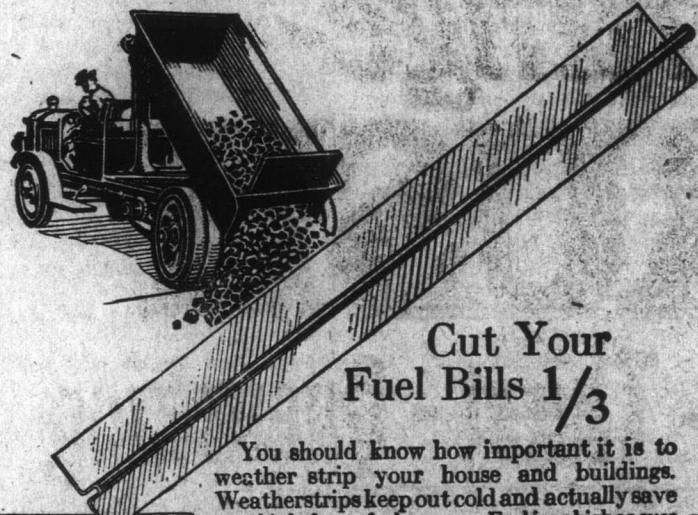

The Inca's Ransom.

The news that Sir Rider Haggard has recently presented to the British Museum a thick gold ring, known as the "Inca" ring, leads additional interest to the following story, for a Buenos Aires correspondent, of the Inca's treasure.

Somewhere in the Argentine Province of Jujuy, in a walled-up tunnel in a mountain of the Inca Andes, lies a king's ransom consisting of more than fifty million dollars in gold—at least it should be there if history and legend are to be trusted.

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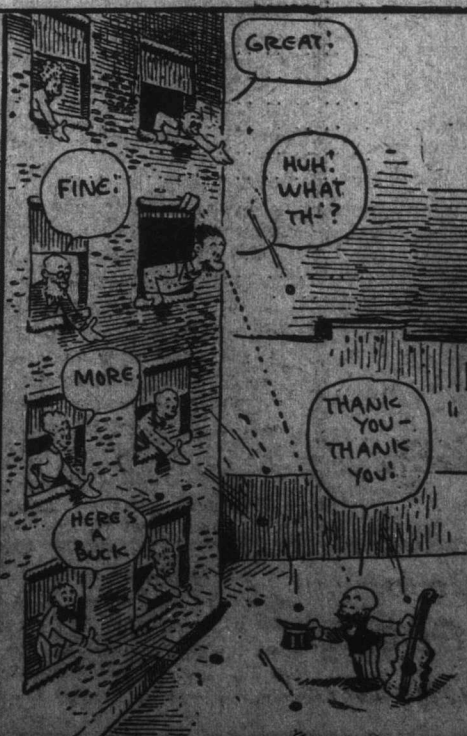
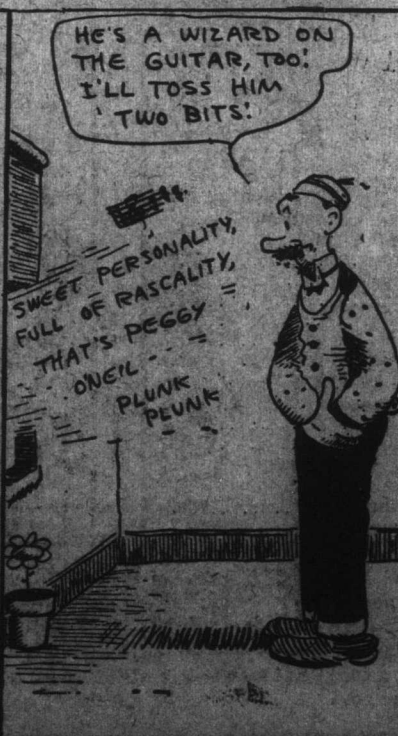
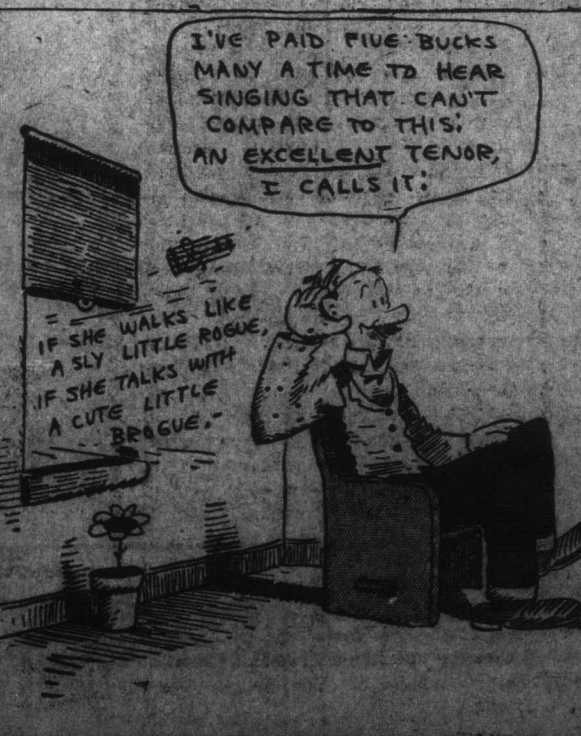

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Get Steam From Interior of Earth.
SCIENTISTS BELIEVE GREAT HEAT CAN BE UTILIZED.
Scientific men believe that the internal heat of the earth can be utilized for some practical purpose. It is merely a matter of getting to a question of the quantity that can be used. In the western part of the United States the heat has been drawn from wells and used to heat buildings. The Pittsburgh water wells are capable of doing the water left in them over the earth. It is not even if their depth were to turn the water to steam it would not be so many hours' waiting for the process of all com-

mercial value. In other words, there would not be the slightest difficulty in obtaining steam from the interior of the earth, because that involves only a little extra labor in boring into the hot area, and it is almost as easy to bore 10,000 feet as 6,000; but in order to give the steam commercial value a method must be provided for dropping the water to the hot area, allowing it time to heat, and yet having it returned to the surface as steam without interrupting the flow.
Two holes, if it is pointed out, might be bored into the earth 12,000 feet deep and perhaps 50 feet apart. There would be a temperature far above the boiling point of water. Then, if very heavy charges of dynamite of some other explosive were lowered to the bottom of each hole and exploded simultaneously a sufficient connection might be established between the two holes. The rock would be cracked and shattered in all directions, and shattering it thus around the base of the holes would convert the surrounding area into an immense water heater.
The water poured into one hole would be heated and turned into steam, which would pass through the second hole to the earth's surface. The pressure of such a column of steam would be enormous, for, aside from the initial velocity, the descending column of cold water would exert a pressure of at least 6000 pounds to the square inch, which would drive everything movable through the second hole. The problem is therefore a mechanical one, concerned chiefly with connecting the two holes. This accomplished, the water heater would operate itself and establish a source of power that would surpass anything now in use.—Washington Star.


Houses Shot From Three Inch Gun.
"Shooting" houses out of a "gun" is the latest wrinkle in concrete construction, writes Cleveland Gaines in Popular Mechanics. The gun consists of a nozzle-like affair at the end of a three-inch hose. Dry concrete is put into a container and water forced through it. The mixture is thus made at the last moment before it is applied.
In building the first of the houses in this fashion a one-sided framework of tar paper and chicken wire was erected. Iron-reinforcing rods were placed against this and the concrete shot against it with the use of a gun. A wall two inches was "shot" in this way, allowed to dry,

and the tar paper and chicken wire peeled off. The result was a solid concrete wall. Doors, windows and plumbing were put in place and the wall shot around them.
In similar fashion ceilings, floor, a fence around the yard and other parts of the house and yard were shot. Seats were shot into the wall at one place, decorative designs in another, and so on. The resulting house and yard was a complete home in one place—a month.
The second house built with the gun employed wallboard in place of tar paper and chicken wire, with even better results.—Kansas City Star.

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Birth of Billiards.
It is not generally known that billiards had its origin in an outdoor pastime. This was "paille maille," an old French game played like croquet. Exactly when the billiard table came into use is not clear, but reference is made to it in a manuscript dated 1581, the writer classing billiards with "dice and cards and other thriftless games."
For many years almost identical implements were used in the indoor game as in "paille maille." The cues were curved like hockey sticks, the balls were wooden and larger than those used nowadays and the table was fitted with hoops. Eventually the latter were replaced by pockets.
During the last 100 years the game has been played much as it is to-day, except in changing size of balls and tables.
