BUILDING OPERATIONS IN GUELPH IN 1867.

(CONTINUED.)

ALLAN'S MILLS.

Last year Mr. David Allan commenced to take down the last remaining portion of his mill which was built of wood, and to rebuild it of stone, so as to make it uniform with the rest of his extensive premises. The season being too far advanced to admit of finishing it, the work was suspended till this year. Accordingly shortly after the season opened operations were begun, the half built walls were carried up to their full height, the roof put on, and now as far as the work externally is concerned the building is finished. The mason work, was done by Mr. Thomas Pobbie, and it is as next and well finished a piece of work of the kind as can be found in Guelph or anywhere lese. Mr. Allan has shown good taste in putting up a couple of projecting turrets on the gable facing the railway, which are after the fashion of the turrets that adorn many ancient castles in Britain, and help very much to set off the appearance of the building. This wing like nearly every other portion of the building, is covered with slates. Only one of the wings is now covered with slingles, and Mr. Allan intends in another year to roof that with slates also, when the whole building will be completely fire proof as far as its external exposure is concerned. The internal arrangements and fitting of these mills are of the best kind, and done in the most substantial manner. The recently finished wing is devoted mainly to the receiving and storing of grain, from which it can be conveyed into either of the mills for though both are under one roof, and communicating with each other, yet they are distinct and worked separately. In the one are four run of stones, driven by water, and in the other are three run, driven by a powerful and well made forty horse engine from the foundry of Messrs. Evat, Ingles, & Co., which was put in last spring. The engine room and boiler house c cupy the lower ground fronting the river, and are admirably planned for convenient working. Indeed it is rarely we find a structure of such dimensions, put up at different periods,

Francis Joseph, the Emperor of Austris, arrived at Paris yesterday evening, and was received at the railway station by the Emperor Napoleon. After exchanging congratulations, the emperors entered a state carriage and were driven to the Tuileries. The Moniteur says this visit of the Emperor Francis Joseph adds a new pledge of amity to the cordial relations established between Austria and France.

A feeling has got abroad in this seccautionsness of the Post Office authoristics here in refusing to take its bills on Tuesday, that the Gore Bank was not altogether in a safe condition.

The following from the Hamilton Times of last night, will allow the first time issue of it, it is certain that the changes which would ensue in the equilibrium of European power could not but be favorable to us. France with her brilliant army and her almost unlimited credit in every market in the world, is, in fact, a vary on in consequence partly of the over-nutiousness of the Post Office authorof those who may have doubts with regard to its solvency : - "To-day there was a slight run on the Gore Bank in this city, and upon the Royal Canadian in Toronto, arising from a vague apprehension among small deitors and bill holders, caused by the failure of the Bank of Upper Canada and the recent suspension of the Commercial Bank. Somehow it got of a war with France more powerful than whispered round that the Gore Bank was a considerable loser by the suspension of the Commercial; but this is not the case. The Gore Bank is in no wise affected by the suspension of the Commercial. It has now in its vaults ample coin to redeem its whole circulation, and therefore, it is folly to make a run on it, for its notes are as good as the gold. We are informed that the same is true of the Royal Canadian. The following was the condition of the Gore Bank as officially stated on the 30th of September, 1867. Capital authorized by Act \$1,000,000, paid up \$807,280. Liabilities: Promissory notes, \$522,582; ba lance due to other Banks \$65,707 19; deposits not bearing interest \$374,237 10; cash deposits bearing interest \$52,687 25. Total liabilities, \$1,615,213 54. Assets: Coin, bullion and Provincial notes \$383,804 98 landed or other property of the Bank \$81,028 50; Government securities \$82,733 33; promissory notes or bills of other Banks, \$128,897 52; balance due from other Banks \$42,093 03; notes and other bills discounted \$1, 629,670 81; other debts due to the Bank, not included under the foregoing heads, \$238,289 07. Total assets, \$2,586,517 24.

There was a run on the Royal Canadian in Toronto yesterday, princi-pally by farmers, but it subsided in the afternoon. It is a matter of great regret that any one great monied institution should have almost sole control over the currency and finances of the country.

The cause is due to the reported losses which the Bank was said to have sustained in consequence of its relations with the Commercial. Not contented with abstaining from work themselves, they were in the habit of intimidating and molesting all independent workmen who, not belonging to the Association ought proper to continue work. They demanded that all journeymen should be ubject to their ipse dixit, and work or as the Trade Union should decree. and pickets were placed in all directions, be, or bully any workman who might on his road to or from the different ng establishments for the purpose or taking work home
