Disingenuous Journalism.

An illustration was given in the leading Tory organ a few days ago of the eagerness with which anything that can be tortured into evidence in their favour is seized upon, and of the unscrupulousness with which it is manipulated.

The words in italics were omitted; whilst the following, which immediately preceded the extract given, and will be seen to materially affect its meaning and to be part of the context, was also left out.

The Canadian Opposition may console itself for its defeats during the Session by saying that the Session is not ended, the report of the Pacific Railway Commission being yet to come. Bitter partisanship alone can desire the condemnation of the Government when the condemnation of the Government would involve the dishonour of the country; but, should the charges be proved, we shall not be behind the bitterest partisan in calling for justice on the offenders.

We should add that the July number of the Canadian Monthly, from which the foregoing extracts are taken, was issued before the publication of Sir Hugh Allan's letters and his subsequent affidavit.
