

EAST NORTHUMBERLAND ELECTION TRIAL.—This case closed on Tuesday, when Mr. Biggar was unseated, and the seat declared vacant, through bribery by agents; the respondent to pay part of the costs, but exempted from payment of the rest on the accounts of the faultiness of the petitioners. The personal charges of bribery by Mr. Haines were dropped.

The writ for the Lincoln election has been issued, and will probably be in the hands of the Returning Officer in a few days.

The Reform Association of the County of Monck met at Wainford on Tuesday, when Mr. Haines, the present member, was their unanimous choice as candidate for the Local Legislature at the next election.

Mr. Blake and the Reform Party. (From the Halifax Recorder.)

The *Express* pretends to think that the Reform party is alarmed lest Mr. Blake intends to desert from its ranks. But here is just where the shoe pinches. Gladly, indeed, would they see the great Reform champion desert his colors—gladly would they see him give the lie to his past life and ruin his position and prospects; but the real trouble is that Mr. Blake remains in thorough accord with the party with which he has ever associated—whose principles he has assisted to form, and whose success he has helped to achieve. Doubtless, there was faint hope in the breast of these former dismembered and demoralized Tories, that the Reform press would take issue with some of Mr. Blake's utterances; but it was a mistake to think that the Reform and glory of the Liberal party of Canada is found in the fact that they are not tied down to any stern dogmas. They are ever ready to progress with the wants and enlightenments of the age. If Mr. Blake or any other respectable Reformer propounds any such doctrine, the Liberal party is not afraid to accept it because it is novel and advanced. The whole Reform press of Canada has with one voice endorsed Mr. Blake's advanced ideas, and never before—not even when his thrilling eloquence and irresistible logic gave the death blow to the "Twenty years of Corruption" did Mr. Blake stand so high in the confidence and esteem of the Reform party. False hope! The Reformers have not given up Mr. Blake, and Mr. Blake has not yet given up the Reformers. It is cruel to take away the last faint gleam of consolation; but all of us have to bow to the irresistible logic of facts. Destitute of any leader or any respectable man whom they dare ask the people of Canada to support—with the few men of ability they had hopelessly tainted with corruption—the Tory remnant may well envy the Reformers the possession of such a man as Edward Blake. But their envy will not injure him, nor illumine by a single ray the deep gloom which over shadows their own dark and dismal condition.

Palmerston Correspondence.

The Thanksgiving day service will be held on Thursday, at 10.30 a.m., and in the Presbyterian Church, at 2.30 p.m. Rev. D. Anderson will deliver a lecture in the Presbyterian Church on Thursday evening, 29th inst.—responsibility, giving day—on Man's Responsibility specially for his belief. A collection will then be taken up in aid of the Building Fund of the Church. Afterwards an effort will be made to organize a Young Men's Christian Association, or a Literary or Mutual Improvement Society.

The new Presbyterian Church, in this village, was opened for Divine service last Sabbath. It is of stone, 40 x 50 ft., and two stories high. The upper story is completed with the exception of the painting, and will be used for ordinary Sabbath services. The ceiling is 14 feet high at the sides, and rises from the base of the rafters, forming an angle in the centre, where it is about 21 feet high. The windows are large and give plenty of light. The seats are plain but comfortable. The pulpit is also plain. A spire, which is sixty-nine feet in height, surmounts the building and gives it a fine appearance. The basement ceiling is about ten feet high. When completed it will be used for lecture room, Sabbath School room, &c. The cost of the building is about \$3,000.

Three services were held in connection with the opening, the first at 10.30 a.m., by the Rev. J. McMillan, of Mt. Forest, who preached from the 2nd verse of the 129th Psalm; at 2.30 p.m., Rev. R. J. Forman (Wesleyan), of Drayton, preached from the 29th verse of the 73rd Psalm, and at 6.30 p.m., the Rev. J. McMillan again preached, his text being the 20th and following verses of the 15th chapter of Luke. All the sermons were able and practical. The church was crowded at each service, but especially in the afternoon, when there must have been nearly two hundred people in the church, although it is only intended to seat about three hundred. The collection amounted to \$87.

Change of Gauge on the Erie Railway.

Count Von Arnim's Health Declining.

Commercial Convention.

An Attack on Iron by Carlists. Don Carlos to Direct Operations.

London, Oct. 27.—Capt. Tyler estimates the cost of the change of gauge on the Erie Railway, at \$850,000; the improvement of gradients, \$800,000; iron bridges, \$1,500,000; and new depots, \$700,000. The bulk of these sums he thinks might be expended in about three years, and he advises the laying of 20,000 tons of steel rails within the same period.

London, Oct. 26.—A Berlin despatch to the Daily Telegraph reports that the physicians of the hospital, where Count Von Arnim is confined, decline to assume responsibility for the prisoner's health, if he continues shut up. They declare that he is worse in consequence of his confinement and his immediate release and departure South are imperatively necessary for his restoration. On the other hand, the Prussian Cross Gazette denies that there is any marked change in the Count's physical condition.

Prince Bismarck has written a note to Count Von Arnim, Barmen, politely deprecating his resignation, but the latter refuses to withdraw it.

The Daily News says Russia and Germany have notified the Porte that they intend to make a Commercial Convention with the Danubian Principalities.

The Times' Spanish despatches anticipate an attack on Iron by Carlists this week. Don Carlos is expected to direct operations in person, and troops and artillery are concentrating around his headquarters at Vera.

Paris, Oct. 25.—La Liberte is informed that Spain has withdrawn her demand for the extradition of the crew of the steamer Nive as deserters.

Berlin, Oct. 27.—The National Gazette says that the Municipal Tribunal of this city has summoned as a witness in the Von Arnim affair, Her Hauser, the editor of the Vienna Presse, and requested him to bring with him a copy of his paper, which contained the diplomatic revelations in reference to the ecclesiastical dispute in Prussia.

Paris, Oct. 27.—The Government has communicated to the papers an official note, for the purpose of allaying the disquieting rumors, which have been current on the Bourse and elsewhere, in connection with the Spanish memorandum. The note says that the memorandum refers more to the past than the present matters, and that the attitude of none of the great powers justifies the alarm felt by Spain, and which served as a pretext for sending the memorandum.

FASHIONABLE SHORT HORN COLORS IN ENGLAND.—From Mr. John Thorntol's Circular, it appears that the 1st, 2nd and 3rd prizes in the class of aged bulls were awarded to white animals, and the 4th and high commendation was given to the roans. In the two-year old class, the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th were all given to roans. In the yearling's ring 1st, white; the 3rd red, the others roan; and in prizes for bull calves, three were roan, and one red and white. For aged cows, two were white, two red and white. In two-year old heifers, one red, one white, and two roan. In a total of thirty-three prizes, five were red and white in color, six white, eighteen roan, and only four red. Thus what is unfashionable in color here is most fashionable there. Live Stock Journal.

THE LONDON SCHOOL BOARD.—At a recent meeting of the London (England) School Board, Sir Charles Reed, the Chairman, made a very interesting statement of the work that has been done by the Board since its establishment. The total number of children on the London School roll has increased from 208,520 in 1871 to 348,102 in 1874, and the average attendance at "efficient" schools had increased in the same time from 171,167 to 256,391 children; or a total increased school roll of 139,582 and an increased average attendance of 86,532. One may gather some idea of the size of London and of the magnitude of the operations of this, the largest School Board in the world, when we find more than a third of a million of children on the school rolls; and the Chairman of the Board yet lamenting that there are still, at a reasonable calculation, 190,060 children not subjected to efficient teaching.

A SHARP SPECULATION.—It is said that a sharp Yankee speculator, anticipating the adoption of the Reciprocity Treaty, has made very heavy purchases of lumber on speculation. He will have it taken to a yard in Whitehall, where it will remain in bond until the Senate and the Canadian Parliament decide the fate of the proposed Reciprocity Treaty. Should the Treaty fall through he will lose nothing, as the lumber has been purchased at its very lowest price, and should the Treaty be adopted he will clear a small fortune by the speculation.

AFFAIRS IN ASHANTEE.—News from the Gold Coast is important. Captain Lees—whom many in the Maritime Province may remember as an officer in the 76th Regiment—has come back to Cape Coast Castle from Coomassie accompanied by several Ashantee traders, who will enter upon commercial enterprises on the coast. In the main object, however, of most of their trading they will be frustrated; for the Government has entirely prohibited the importation of arms and ammunition into the Protectorate. This regulation will be applied with impartial severity both to our allies the Fantees and our late enemies the Ashantees. But the most important result of Captain Lees' mission is not the re-opening of trade with the interior, but the acquiescence of King Koffee Kaloelli in the secession of the King of Juabin from the union with Ashantee. It may be somewhat of an exaggeration to compare this to the effect which would follow on the secession of Scotland from England; but there can be no doubt that the influence of the Ashantee Kingdom will be henceforth much crippled.

Baudry, the decorator of the new opera house at Paris, was sadly bothered for an idea by which to represent the "Music of England" emblematically on his frescoes. He painted, finally, three little genii. One carried the Irish harp, the other the Scotch bagpipes, and the third paid the two first for playing, and tried to look as if he understood the music.
