**FORCE AROUND HOME**  
TORONTO WHOLESALE TRADE  
DURING THE PAST YEAR.

A Glance over the Various Departments—  
They are in a Healthy State Generally—  
The Outlook is Rather Bright and  
Favorable. The Spring Trade Especially  
Ought to Prove Successful.

The year which has just closed was  
somewhat critical on the whole  
trade of Toronto. With the  
conditions ruling in other countries  
little else could be expected.

Our light crops of 1899 and the unsatisfactory  
prices for products did not tend to  
improve matters. To these deleterious influences  
was added a mild winter, which caused  
a perceptible falling off in the demand for  
seasonable goods.

Just as a vessel's stability is only ascertained  
after encountering a storm, so the  
financial soundness of a business is only  
revealed by its contact with unfavorable  
influences. Fortunately for the wholesale  
trade of Toronto its foundations have  
been so solidly laid, and the financial  
statements which have periodically swept over  
the continent have not only unimpaired  
it, but more confidence in being exhibited,  
than in any other business.

As a result of these conditions, the  
stability has been maintained, and in fact  
the claim of being the distributing centre  
is evidently becoming more firmly established.

The World has succeeded in a campaign  
which has been a success. A line has  
been established, Toronto's trade on  
the whole has been a progressive  
character. Our merchants have  
not only maintained their position,  
but have advanced it. The commercial  
interests of the Queen City are in a healthier  
condition than a year ago.

The prospects for the coming year, which  
is radiating a boom, are bright. This  
season's trade has been a satisfactory  
character, particularly during Christmas, when  
it was more than usual, and not only  
enabling merchants to run off superfluous goods  
but to leave vacancies for spring stocks.

Travelers of long experience on the road  
report that they never saw a more promising  
country or country merchants in better  
shape. They are in effect singing:

Now as the wind falls, and we will board  
A ship to sail for Europe.

The year was a trying one to the dry-  
goods trade. At the outset both the  
wholesale and retail branches were handicapped  
by the excessive drought, which, by  
the middle of 1899, had to be carried over.  
The firmness which has characterized prices  
throughout the year has, however, to a  
large extent, been maintained.

Fortunately for the welfare of the trade
