MCCARTHY'S PASTORAL POLICY
DEFINED IN A TWO HOURS SPEECH AT OTTAWA.

Canada, in the Third Party's Opinion, can never be anything but a jumpy, confused country, and the World Wide Protection of the National Policy and the Manufactories Together.

OTTAWA, April 11.—Mr. McCarthy made his long expected speech on the tariff to-night. He had to wait several days to get it in. But he had the House just after dinner, a large attendance of members and crowded galleries for an audience. He was in good form and spoke with deliberation and care, and maintained the interest of his hearers for the two hours and more that he spoke. Toward the end he was in a hot box, with his former friends ready to jump on him, but he held his ground and made a good fight as fighting goes. He repeated his attack of a former year on the Hon. Mr. Haggart, when the latter interrupted him with a question. He did not say how he would vote, but from his speech he is bound to vote for Sir Richard's amendment, which is a direct attack on the policy of protection and proposes that its last vestige be wiped away. The Opposition applauded him throughout.

Today in the House a number of private bills were introduced, amongst them one to incorporate the Niagara Falls Electric Railway Company. Mr. Maclean introduced a bill respecting the liability of the Government and public companies for labor, supplies and material used in the construction of public works. He explained that the bill was intended to protect labor. Mr. Maclean also introduced a bill respecting the sale of railway return fare tickets. He said the bill was intended to make railway companies sell return tickets for second as well as first-class passengers. In reply to Mr. Maclean (East York), Hon. Mr. Wood said it was intended to introduce legislation for the inspection of meter and used for measuring electricity for lighting purposes only.

Mr. Cookburn resumed the debate on the budget, reviewing at considerable length the position of England when she adopted free trade, and pointing out that the conditions in Canada were altogether different. If England had been in the position of Canada not all the Brits in all creation, even if they came in the shape of the angels of heaven, would have persuaded her to admit the atrocious folly of sacrificing all her interests to free trade. He then referred to the success of the National Policy. With wages falling, prices of manufactured goods falling and shorter hours of labor which more did the Ontario manufacturer, he said had fallen in value 30 per cent. In England it had fallen 100 per cent. He could show them in within 10 miles of the city of London which was not worth a dollar an acre more than land within 15 miles of the city of Toronto. He proceeded to say a word on the National Policy, and manufacturers who were in danger of being forgotten in the prevailing notions for the farmers. He said the National Policy was worth \$30,000,000 in wages, had \$35,000,000 invested, made products \$75,000,000 and netted \$80,000,000. The products of the manufacturers were equal to the products of the farmer, and he thought were sold at equal consideration, perhaps to more, because the wealth was more readily produced, was il-limited.

Mr. McCarthy then corrected some of the misrepresentations of the Opposition. He read an extract from Sir Richard Cartwright's Budget speech in 1877, saying that savings bank deposits were the test evidence of National Policy. The comparison made by Mr. Davies as still saving one bank deposit with those of the State of Maine was unfair, because there was no analogy between the National Policy and the Canadian savings banks were Government institutions intended to receive small sums for the encouragement of thrift. The Opposition misrepresentations as to the Dominion finances were absurd in view of the fact that our stock was the best colonial stock on the market, and for every \$1 million loan \$3 was offered for every \$1 wanted.

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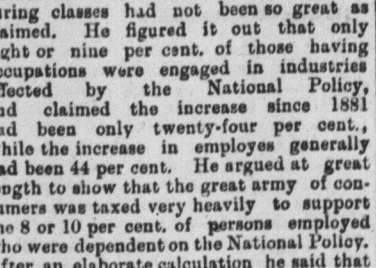
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MOWAT SHIRKED THE DEBATE

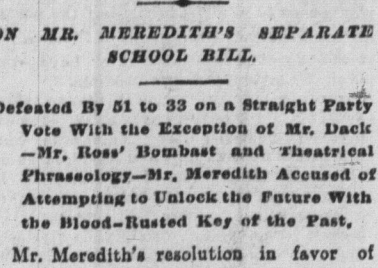
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TIME TO SHUT THE GAS OFF.

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DEATH ENDED THE DEBAUCH



THE MISERABLE FATE OF A LABORER'S WIFE.
Perished By the Wayside While Endeavoring To Walk From Toronto Junction To The Miserable Hotel in Which She Lived—A Number of Wounds Found On Her Body—An Inquest Ordered.

About three hundred yards from Fairbank Junction, on the Northern Railway, there is a wretched hotel which has been occupied by Robert McGinley, his wife and two sons, aged 11 and 15 years, and near which occurred the death of Mrs. McGinley, Tuesday, under strange circumstances. On Monday evening, Walker John McCann, who is employed as a hired man by Mr. Abraham Watts, got \$5 from his employer and proceeded to the McGinley hotel. McGinley and McCann went to Toronto Junction that night, returning about 12 o'clock considerably the worse of liquor, bringing with them a sufficient supply to keep up the debauch during the night.

McCann's Story of the Affair.
According to the statement made by McGinley and his son, he left on Tuesday morning about 5 o'clock to go to Lampier's Hotel at Carlton, and was shortly afterwards followed by McCann and Mrs. McGinley. The couple were in the hotel when McGinley saw them, and after remarking that McCann had a good deal of nerve to be going around with this wife, he returned to his room about 11 o'clock.

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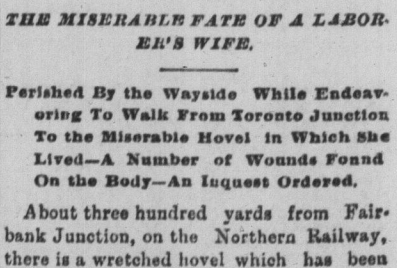

TORONTO'S BRIGHT FUTURE.

WORK FOR THOUSANDS OF MECHANICS. Issues Obstacles and Go Ahead With Public Works—The Wrong Time to Talk Economy—Give Mechanics and Laborers Work and Lots of It.

Strong and willing hands are unable to find work in this city. Why? Because we have come to the conclusion at this late time that economy in the pay scale, bonus miles of streets, laid miles of asphalt and block paving, put in miles of sewer and water works, and the like, by summing up the large amount of money expended decided to quit. Is this logical? Would it be against common sense to conclude that if there was a building on every lot inside the city and every building occupied by its owner, the money which would be required to pay twenty-five million dollars to pay ten new? Then we would receive a benefit from the money expended. How can this be accomplished? Surely not by the economy policy we are now pursuing. Cut it aside and let us issue debentures for, say, twenty or twenty-five million dollars to be used for building the Bay—build the trunk sewer, asphalt every street and lane in the city, and the water works. Let us take a few new factories, open smelting works, convert the sand desert across the bay into another Coney Island, open more parks throughout the city, purchase another zoo and have a carnival every summer; in a word, spend the twenty or twenty-five million completing the work already more than half finished. It is a suicidal way to talk economy as it would be for guano brokers, who have the room and soil stock, so that the return is bound to come. Where they could only accommodate hundreds they can now accommodate thousands, and instead of fifty thousand dollars stock they now carry a hundred and fifty thousand.

Weapons of the Esquimaux. Expert Use of Them by the Cinnamon-Looking Natives of the Far North. To the interested collection of curios gathered by Capt. Edwards and McDermott, United States inspectors of hunted and trapped animals, the last few years have lately been added a number of weapons used by the Esquimaux in the hunt and chased other articles and relics, presented by various persons in the Northwest and British Columbia. The Esquimaux's weapons were presented to the inspector by the late Capt. John M. Olsen of Astoria, master of the sloop Polar Bear, in accordance with a request which he expressed before his death. The most interesting of these curios is a spear with a poisoned arrow head, which is the most effective of all the weapons used by the inhabitants of the "land of the midnight sun." The spear enters is about five feet long. It is made of wood, mounted with bone, its point is finely beveled. The most fantastic design characteristic of the Esquimaux in this line of work. The arrow is made in three pieces, two parts wood and the third which is the head, of bone dipped in poison. The three pieces are held together by a leather thong but with a slight movement of the hand these can be disengaged, leaving the head, when it strikes the animal, curved in the manner that it is impossible to disengage it without cutting the skin.
