New York, October 28. – Dr. Nansen, the Arctic explorer, who arrived here in the Lucania, was tendered a reception by the American Geographical society, at Chickering hall, last night. Speaking of his trip to the Arctic, Dr. Nansen said: "It turned out almost exactly as it had been planned beforehand. I may say that the polar problem is to some extent solved. 


