-The permanency of the free trade principle in England's commercial policy is not the subject for such general rance among the people as it was a few years ago. Now many of the authorities in matters political, prophesy a limitation to the time-honored 'free trade as it is in England" and there are indications that the time is fast ripening for a change. The war tax was, of course, a measure for rev enue only, but in its application to breadstuffs, an import duty has inci-

dentally created a very fair measure o projection to the English farmer. It wasn't meant for protection but it ap peared as a rather striking departure from free trade and when the revenue no longer requires the levy on thi class of imports it will be interesting to note what disposition will be made of this particular legislation. Then, if not before, the purpose of the gov ernment will be declared to the settle ment of a commercial policy for many years of the future. It is argued by those who advocate protection and a commercial zollverein between the British dominions, that when the war tax is no longer needed the import duty will be stricken off in so far as it ap plies to imports from the colonies but will be maintained on distinctly foreign imports. This will be a prefe ential free trade. and while the Eng lishman at home will have no advantage of protection, his colonial brother will have secured a most practical rec





Four yeats ago Reeve Coyle of Col-borne purchased an orchard containing ten acres. The price paid was \$2600. The crop gathered from that orchard in 1900 netted, after "all expenses were paid, \$2130. Mr. Coyle made the fol-lowing statement at an orchard meet-ing in Colborne last week:— P "I shipped S00 barrels of apples from my orchard two years ago. The dealer to whom I consigned them said they were the best apples he had ever sold in the Liverpool market. There were not five barrels of wormy or scabby apples in the lot.
