A bill has been introduced into the Colorado legislature enforcing rules of health and morality to be complied with before permission to marry is granted by law. Several of its provisions, though wise enough in theory, are an unwarrantable infringement on the liberty of the individual. But there is one which confirms and even goes beyond one of the most wholesome requirements of the Church's marriage law. "There must be," says the Colorado bill, "no blood relationship between the man and woman. nearer than the fourth cousinship." The ecclesiastical impediment only includes third cousins. 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## THE CENTENARY OF GIOR-DANO BRUNO.

As usual, the 17th of February. on which date Giordano Bruno was burnt at the stake three hundred years ago in Rome, has been the signal for scenes of rowdyism in the vicinity of the University. The less an Italian student knows of Brano, the more he admires him, and as hardly one in a thousand of those gashing young men has ever read a word of that unfortunate philosopher's works, the enthusiasm of the student class for the philosopher of Nola is boundless. In fact "Giordano Bruno" is their war-cry whenever they are "spoiling for a fight" and want to go for the clericals, which they do, however, merely in words and discordant shouts. The "Corriere della Sera," a paper which cannot be suspected of pandering to the interests of Catholicism, plainly says that these disgraceful scenes are merely the result of juvenile foolishness, and that they are inspired neither by the ideals which Giordano Bruno himself advocated nor by the wish to proclaim the liberty of religious and scientific opinion.
