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FORM OF A BEQUEST TO THE SOCIETY.

I give and bequeath to "The Newfoundland and British North America Society for Educating the Poor," instituted in London in the year 1823, the sum of Pounds sterling, to be raised and paid, for the purposes of the said Institution, out of such part only of my personal estate as shall not consist of chattels real, or money secured on mortgage of Lands or Tenements; or in any other manner affecting Lands or Tenements: for which Legacy the Receipt of the Treasurer for the time being of the said Institution shall be a sufficient discharge to my Executors.

* * * Bequests for charitable or benevolent purposes of lands or tenements, or of money to be laid out in the purchase thereof, or charged on, or otherwise affecting lands or tenements, or of money secured on mortgage of lands or tenements, are void; but money, stock, or other personality not falling under any of the above descriptions, may be so bequeathed.

LAWs AND REGULATIONS.

I. This Society shall be designated THE NEWFOUNDLAND AND BRITISH NORTH AMERICA SOCIETY FOR EDUCATING THE POOR.

II. The Schools shall be managed by Masters and Mistresses of the United Church of England and Ireland, and conducted, as nearly as circumstances may permit, on Dr. Bell's system.

III. This Society shall consist of a Patron, Vice-Patrons, President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary or Secretaries, and also of Governors and Life and Annual Members, and such other Officers as may be deemed necessary for conducting its affairs.

IV. Each Subscriber of one Guinea annually, or upwards, shall be a Member.

V. Each Subscriber of Ten Guineas, or upwards, at one time, shall be a Member for life.

VI. Each Subscriber of Five Pounds Annually, or of Twenty Guineas at one time, shall be a Governor, and entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

VII. An Executor paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds, or upwards, shall be a Member for Life.

VIII. The business of the Society shall be conducted, and all its officers appointed, by a Committee of not less than twelve; of whom nine who shall have attended the greatest number of times during the year, shall be eligible for the ensuing year.

IX. The Patron, Vice-Patrons, President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Secretaries, shall be considered *ex officio* Members of the Committee: the ordinary Meetings of the Committee shall be held once every Month.

X. Three Members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum; and in case of equality of votes, the chairman shall have a second, or casting vote.

XI. Five Auditors, three of them not being Members of the Committee, shall be appointed by the Committee annually, for the purpose of auditing the accounts of the Society, of whom three shall be a quorum.

XII. A General Meeting of the Members of the Society shall be held in London annually on such day during the months of April or May as shall be judged most convenient, when the proceedings of the foregoing year shall be reported, the accounts presented, and a Committee chosen.

XIII. A Special General Meeting of this Society may be called at any time, at the requisition of the General Committee, or any nine Members, by letter, addressed to the Secretary.

XIV. Ten days' notice of all General Meetings shall be given in at least three Newspapers. Those Members of the Society who reside within the limits of the Threepenny Post shall be summoned by letter to attend; and when such General Meetings are Special, the object of them shall be mentioned in the summons.

XV. At all General Meetings, and at those of the Committee, the Patron; or in his absence, the Vice-Patron; or should he be absent, the President; or in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list, who may be present; or in the absence of all the Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer; and in his absence, such Member as shall be voted for that purpose, shall preside at the Meeting.

XVI. None of the Laws of the Society shall be repealed or altered, nor any new Law established, but at the Annual General Meeting, or at a Special General Meeting called for that purpose.

RULES FOR AN AUXILIARY SOCIETY.

1. THAT the object and constitution of the Newfoundland and British North America Society for Educating the Poor, having the cordial approbation of this Meeting, a Society be now formed, to be called "The Auxiliary Newfoundland and British North America School Society of _____," for the purpose of co-operating with that Institution.

2. That all persons subscribing One Guinea per annum or upwards, or Five Guineas or upwards at one time, shall be Members of this Society.

3. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, Secretaries, and a Committee, consisting of not less than _____ Members; and that three Members of this Committee constitute a quorum. That the Committee shall meet once every quarter, or oftener, on some day to be fixed by themselves.

4. That the Committee divide this town and neighbourhood into districts, and appoint two or more of their members for each district, who may associate with themselves any Subscribers, for the purpose of soliciting subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants thereof; and that they establish proper agents and correspondents in different parts within the limits of the Auxiliary Society.

5. That this Auxiliary shall furnish the Parent Society, on or before the first week in March in each year, with an abstract of its cash account, &c.

6. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on such day as shall be fixed on by the Committee in each year, when the accounts (as audited by the Committee) shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year reported, and a Committee chosen for the ensuing year.

RULES FOR AN ASSOCIATION.

1. THAT we form ourselves into an Association in connexion with the Newfoundland and British North America Society for Educating the Poor, for the purpose of contributing towards its object, and that this Association be denominated "The _____ Association."

2. That all persons subscribing the sum of Five Shillings or upwards per annum, or making a donation of One Guinea or upwards at one time, or collecting to the amount of Two Pounds or upwards, shall be Members of this Association.

3. That the business of this Association shall be conducted by a Committee, to be chosen annually, consisting of a Treasurer, Secretaries, and not less than _____ other Members, and under the patronage of such other Honorary Members as the Society and Committee shall select and obtain.

4. That the Committee meet once a quarter, or oftener, if necessary, on a day to be fixed by themselves, and that three Members be empowered to act.

5. That for the purpose of soliciting and collecting donations and subscriptions, the Committee divide this neighbourhood into districts, and appoint one or more collectors from among themselves to each district; and that these contributions be paid to the Treasurer at the Committee Meetings.

6. That this Association shall furnish the Committee of the Auxiliary Society, on or before the last day of February in each year, with an abstract of its cash account, &c.

7. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on such day as shall be fixed on by the Committee in each year, when the accounts (as audited by the Committee) shall be presented, the proceedings of the year reported, and a Committee chosen for the ensuing year.

That the Report now read be received and printed ; and that this Meeting, in heartfelt gratitude to Almighty God, desires to record its sense of obligation to the Bishops of Montreal and Newfoundland, who have taken so deep an interest in the Society's Schools, and in so many ways forwarded their interests ; to His Excellency the Governor-General of Canada, for kindly consenting to become a Vice-Patron ; to His Excellency the Governor of Newfoundland, and to the Clergy and other Friends of the Society in the Colonies, for their valuable countenance and support.

THE
EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE
NEWFOUNDLAND AND BRITISH NORTH AMERICA SOCIETY
FOR EDUCATING THE POOR.

THE Committee of the Newfoundland and British North America School Society, in submitting their Report of its proceedings to its subscribers and friends during the past year, feel that on no former occasion have they had greater cause for the expression of deep and humble gratitude to that God and Father from whom cometh every good and perfect gift, for the manifest tokens vouchsafed that the Society's labours have not been in vain in the Lord.

In the last Report the Committee had the gratification to state that, in the providence of God, the island of Newfoundland had been constituted an episcopate, and that the Right Rev. Dr. Spencer, whose missionary labours for many years had eminently qualified him for the weighty responsibility, had been appointed Bishop; who, in the most kind manner, had consented to become a Vice-President of the Society,—a circumstance which led the Committee to indulge the hope that a fresh and vigorous impulse might be given towards the attainment of the Society's grand object—the education of the youth of Newfoundland in the principles of God's revealed truth, as received and taught by the Church of England.

In that hope the Committee have not been disappointed.

Soon after the Bishop's arrival in Newfoundland, he undertook a visitation of that portion of his diocese in which, for the most part, the Society's schools have been established, many of which his lordship personally inspected, and examined the children in their various branches of learning, especially as to their knowledge of the Holy Scriptures; the result of which, as furnished to the Committee by his lordship's own pen, will be read with real pleasure, being so decidedly confirmatory of numerous testimonies of the like kind to the vast benefit the Society's schools are conferring on that much-neglected and interesting people.

In a letter addressed to the Clerical Secretary, dated Trinity Harbour, Newfoundland, July 25th, 1840, his lordship says:—

“During my progress through the extensive districts of St. John's, Conception, and Trinity Bays, I have had the opportunity I so much desired of visiting many of the schools supported by the Society of which you are the Secretary; and I should be unjust to that excellent Association and the exemplary teachers it employs, if I were to withhold my unequivocal testimony to the great usefulness of these institutions, and my firm conviction that they will be, under God's blessing, the main seminaries of the Protestant faith in this desolate and benighted land. At distant stations, which, from the paucity of clergymen hitherto employed in this Colony, could enjoy but little of the ministerial care, the teachers of the Newfoundland School Society have held together the congregations of the Church of England, by acting gratuitously as readers of Divine Service on every Sabbath, and by instructing them in their religious and moral duties under the sanction of ecclesiastical authority.”

The duties referred to in the concluding paragraph, which most of the Society's teachers have been in the habit of discharging, have received such decided approval from the Bishop, as to obtain for each his lordship's license to continue to act in such capacity where the people are destitute of pastoral instruction; and moreover, to impart greater efficiency to their labours, the Bishop has admitted four of them into holy orders, two of whom have since been removed from all charge of the Society, whom he styles Deacon Schoolmasters: thus combining the office of a teacher of the

young and a minister of the everlasting Gospel. To use the Bishop's own words :—

“ Their ordination will materially increase their usefulness, and strengthen our hands in their respective districts : it will not withdraw them an hour from their schools, but it will give to hundreds who are willing members of our church the means of grace from which they have been too long debarred.”

To continue in full efficiency those schools, the teachers of which may be selected by the Bishop for ordination, and intended to continue as before in connexion with the Society, being a point of much anxiety to the Committee, while they fully sympathise with the Bishop in those noble plans of usefulness which he has devised, it will be gratifying to learn how completely his lordship has relieved them from all apprehension on that head. In every instance, speaking of the ordination of the teachers, the Bishop says :—

“ It shall be my effort to sustain the distinctive character of the Society as an Education Society ; but, without the least detriment to that character, I am convinced that the office of the teacher and the minister, in the same person, may be frequently advantageously combined. In many places the peculiar circumstances of this colony render such a combination desirable ; and, humanly speaking, I know of no more hopeful means of effectually propagating the Gospel of Christ, in this benighted land, than the adoption of such a measure.”

The Committee have been particular in stating their own views on this subject, as confirmed by those of the Bishop, lest, on the one hand, fears should be entertained of the scholastic character of the Society being injured, if not eventually lost ; and, on the other, objections taken that it was encroaching on the distinct and proper province of the “ Society for Propagating the Gospel in Foreign Parts.” As a *School Society*, no one acquainted with the state of Newfoundland and other of the British North American Colonies, can any more question *the necessity* for its existence than deny *the vastness of the field* for its operations.

At home, the value of the National Society is on all hands felt and acknowledged ; but whatever argument is valid on its behalf, is, with tenfold force, applicable to a

School Society on Scriptural and Church-of-England principles for the colonies.

The colonial clergy are too few in number, and too far apart; their labours of too extensive and missionary a character to enable them, with union and vigour, to establish and superintend schools where the destitution and moral degradation of the people require them: and hence it is notorious, that painfully deficient as is the provision for the ministry itself, that of the religious education of the young is much more so.

The facts have become too well known and authenticated to require to be again adduced in proof, while it will generally be admitted that, unspeakably important as is the preaching of the Word, the proper training of the young is, in most cases, an indispensable preparation for it. On this ground your Society, after eighteen years' tried and approved labour, takes its stand, and submits its important claims to the due consideration and support of the members of the Church of England and the friends of Scriptural education generally.

The Society has established fifty-two principal and branch schools, thirteen of which were *temporarily* suspended when the last report (in June, 1840) was received from the acting superintendent; besides which, the teachers conduct Sabbath and evening schools. Nearly 11,000 scholars, in the whole, have been admitted, of which 323 $\frac{1}{2}$ are now receiving instruction.

Your Committee have gratefully to acknowledge the kind interest which His Excellency the Governor of Newfoundland continues to take in the Society's welfare, and the support which is afforded it by other highly influential and respectable inhabitants in the island,—a proof the character and operations of the Society have the cordial approbation of those who are so well qualified to judge.

The following brief extracts from Reports received from

the teachers, illustrative of their duties and the Society's operations generally, will be read with interest ; others will be given in the "Occasional Paper" published by the Society.

The master of the central school, St. John's, writes :—

"The number on the books at the close of the past year was 115 boys and 81 girls, which number is now increasing by admission of the younger branches, who attend during the summer months. Sixty-one new scholars have been admitted during the past year. It is also gratifying to witness the orderly conduct of those children who have left the school, and are now filling places of trust in the town. The loan library books, so kindly granted for the use of the children by the Religious Tract Society, are eagerly sought for ; and we are not without hope that, amongst the elder scholars, the bread thus cast upon the waters will appear after many days. The girls have been engaged as usual in knitting, sewing, and marking."

"At Portugal Cove, through hunger and nakedness, as usual, in the winter months, but increasingly so latterly, our school was nearly suspended ; but as the spring has advanced they are returning, and from forty to fifty attend daily."

"On the south side of St. John's Harbour, the day-school continues to do well ; the total number admitted is now increased to 227, and the number on the books to 66.

"The Sunday school continues to prosper, and, in addition to the kind ladies who had previously attended to their duties as voluntary teachers through all the severity of a Newfoundland winter, two gentlemen have commenced their gratuitous labours amongst the boys. The Rev. Mr. Bridge, Rector of St. John's, has also taken an interest in the school, examining and rewarding the children.

"But the most gratifying circumstance remains to be noticed, namely, the arrival of the first Bishop of Newfoundland in St. John's ; his lordship arrived on Whit-Sunday morning, in her Majesty's ship the Cleopatra, and came immediately to St. John's Church, where (it being the time of our Annual Meeting) our teachers were all assembled ; and, after hearing his lordship deliver an excellent sermon, we joined in partaking of that Holy Ordinance which is the cement of the church. Oh ! may it bind us all together in one bond of sacred union never to be broken. Through the kindness of our rector, on the following Friday we were introduced to his lordship, and presented the following address :—

"To the Honourable and Right Reverend Father in God, Aubrey George Spencer, D.D., by Divine permission Lord Bishop of Newfoundland and Bermuda.

"May it please your Lordship,

"We, the undersigned teachers and catechists employed by the Newfoundland and British North America School Society in this island, beg leave respectfully to approach your lordship with the tender of our heartfelt congratulations upon your safe arrival in this part of your lordship's diocese, and the expression of our sincere gratitude for your lordship's kindness in having

condescended to become a vice-president of the Society, under whose auspices we are labouring.

“ ‘ Impressed with a deep sense of the advantages to be derived from your lordship’s countenance and ecclesiastical supervision, we thankfully embrace this opportunity of commending our sphere of employment to your favourable notice and fatherly care.

“ ‘ We humbly trust that in the course of your episcopal visitation of the several settlements in which our Society has been carrying out its objects for the last seventeen years, your lordship will find that our labour has not been altogether in vain in the Lord ; and as cordially attached members of that Apostolic Church, through whose ministrations in our native land we first drew our spiritual sustenance, we shall, indeed, rejoice to be permitted, under your lordship’s paternal inspection, to co-operate as humble auxiliaries in promoting at once its interests and the extension of the Redeemer’s kingdom in this colony.

“ ‘ Praying that an abundant blessing may be poured out upon your lordship’s person and labours, and that when it shall please Almighty God to remove you from your high place in the Church Militant, you may be admitted to a higher in the Church Triumphant,

“ ‘ We have the honour to subscribe ourselves,

“ ‘ With every sentiment of respect,

“ ‘ Your lordship’s most obedient, humble servants.’ ”

(Signed by twelve teachers.)

“ His lordship returned the following reply :—

“ ‘ *Government House, St. John’s, 12th June, 1840.*

“ ‘ Gentlemen,

“ ‘ On entering on the arduous duty of a visitation of this extensive diocese, it gives me great satisfaction to receive the congratulations and assurances contained in your address.

“ ‘ Of the strenuous exertions made by the teachers and catechists of the Newfoundland School Society, amidst privations and difficulties of no ordinary character, to fulfil the main intention of their mission, the promotion of Christian knowledge in this colony, I am fully sensible, and I am happy in the honour of connecting myself with an institution which has been so well framed and conducted for the accomplishment of this benevolent purpose.

“ ‘ In my progress, if God permit, through the several settlements in the island, I promise myself the satisfaction of witnessing in person the good effect of your zealous and pious labours, for the success of which my fervent prayers will be offered to Him who alone, whoever waters his vineyard, can give the increase.

“ ‘ I must beg you to assure your fellow-labourers of my cordial desire to assist them on every occasion when it is practicable, and of my entire reliance on them and you for a faithful co-operation with me in our common efforts to promote, in accordance with the doctrines and discipline of the Church to which we belong, the blessed interests of true religion and virtue.

(Signed) “ ‘ AUBREY, Newfoundland.’ ”

“ On the 25th of June his lordship came to visit our school ; we had 140 present (75 boys and 65 girls) : he examined them in reading, writing, arithmetic, geography, and grammar ; admired the neatness of the girls’ samplers,

inquired as to the manner of opening and closing school, and desired to see them dismissed, having first offered up that beautiful prayer, 'Grant, we beseech thee Almighty God, that the words which these children have heard this day,' &c. and pronounced the Blessing. After which he expressed himself much gratified, and his hope that he should find all the other schools equal to this."

The master of Petty Harbour School, after reporting the number of his scholars in the day and Sabbath school, writes:—

"Our loan library, consisting of nearly 200 volumes, has been in constant circulation, and it is pleasing to see the delight with which the books are sought for, and the attention with which they are read. Nor can we duly estimate the benefits which this valuable auxiliary to our work is calculated, under God's blessing, to confer. We have sold but few copies of the Scriptures during the past year, as every Protestant family here are already in possession of the precious treasure.

"About 300 tracts were distributed among the seal fishermen belonging to this settlement, beside others circulated, on various occasions, among many individuals. We also sent a quantity to the Bay of Bulls for circulation. Many copies of Common Prayer, the Religious Tract Society's Psalms and Hymns, and family prayers, have been disposed of, and we could have sold more if we had had them; and we have the satisfaction of knowing that several heads of families here assemble their households together for prayer morning and evening."

The master, of Spaniard's Bay, writes:—

"Our day school has been very well attended during the summer months. Our Sunday school was never so full as it is at present; we have now a select number of our former scholars, teachers, and, we are happy to say, they afford us very great assistance. Our congregation still continues very numerous and very attentive. In the hearts of some of them we trust there is a good work going on.

"You are already aware that our school-room has hitherto served two purposes, viz. that of a school-room for the children, and a church for the adults. But it is now much too small a hive for such a swarm of industrious bees, who are gathering that 'which is sweeter than honey or the honeycomb.'

"The people are, we are happy to say, about to commence the erection of a church, for the more commodious worship of Almighty God; which soon will, I have no doubt, be so far completed as to allow of their assembling under its roof for that sacred purpose. Your teacher for the last ten years (during which period this people have not had more than twice that number of public services from a minister), has served for schoolmaster and minister; and has, during that time, received many testimonies of the satisfaction he has been enabled to give to all parties in both these capacities.

"The bishop has paid two or three visits to this station, and spent a long time with us; he expressed himself highly gratified with our school. His lordship was, also, much pleased with their writing and ciphering, and with the girls' needlework, marking, &c., and accepted of a sampler. He left a sovereign as a donation, which enabled us to supply many of our scholars with Bibles."

The teachers, as in former years, have circulated several copies of the Bible, Prayer-book, and other religious publications. The value of this department of their labours, and the extent to which they have been enabled to carry them, by means of large grants received from the British and Foreign Bible Society, the Religious Tract Society, and other kindred institutions, may be estimated by the fact that, during the last fifteen years, the Bible Society has made grants to the amount of 2653*l.* 3*s.* 9*d.*: thus putting into circulation, through the agency of the teachers, 6695 Bibles, 9877 New Testaments, and 200 Psalters; and the Religious Tract Society has made grants of books and tracts for *free* distribution during the same period, to the amount of upwards of 600*l.* in value, exclusive of large purchases made by the Society and disposed of in the island. The simple announcement of these facts is the most powerful of all arguments, if proof were wanting, to the excellency and worth of these institutions, providing as they do, with a plentiful hand, the precious seed with which the labourers of other Societies may go forth to every part of the Lord's vineyard, sowing in faith of the promised and glorious harvest.

The Committee cannot omit this opportunity of bearing their most grateful testimony to the Christian liberality of these institutions, by means of which this Society has been so eminently and so extensively useful, in enriching thousands in a destitute land with the "words of Eternal Life."

In addition to thousands of Prayer-books disposed of in former years, 500 new copies were sent to the different schools* during the year, the munificent gift of the Noble

Chairman at the last Anniversary; and the Committee have received most gratifying accounts of their distribution.

One of the teachers writes:—

“ We desire very gratefully to acknowledge the receipt of a parcel containing fifty-four Common Prayer-books, the valuable gift of our Noble President, Lord Bexley, which have been very thankfully received by our most deserving scholars and poor people. Could the noble donor enjoy the novel sight presented every Sabbath in our school-room, by the parents and children assembled to worship their common Parent, the former crowding the body of the room and the latter loading the gallery erected for them, part of the time seated on each other's knees for want of room, and all with their neat much-prized Prayer-books open, and uniting together in repeating aloud the responses of the excellent liturgy of our Church, he would feel fully compensated for all his liberality bestowed upon our dear children, who, a short time ago, were obliged to stand silent during the time of divine worship for want of such help as they have now put into their hands by their bountiful benefactor.”

The Committee cannot draw this part of their Report to a close without adverting to the importance of branch schools in connexion with the Society. They have numerous applications from various settlements, in some of which the people, under the hope of being assisted in their endeavours, have got together the materials for building, and are ready, as far as their limited means will allow, to contribute towards the maintenance of a master.

To such applications, however, the Committee have not the funds to enable them to return an answer of encouragement; especially as at present the grant of 300*l.* sterling per annum, received from the Colonial Legislature for the last five years, has terminated, and they are not yet sure what may be the issue of their memorial for its renewal; which, should it be refused, would compel them to close many of their existing schools—a measure they cannot contemplate without deep concern.

At this very time, moreover, the Committee are most anxious to establish schools in the westward of the island, in which scarcely any thing has hitherto been done, though there are thousands of nominal Protestants earnestly calling

for help, and offering to do their utmost in support of a school for their neglected children.

Of the 1200 miles, at least, of sea-coast, along which the inhabitants of Newfoundland are scattered, it is a painful fact that Protestant churches and schools, pastors and teachers, do not extend over more than about 300, and that very inadequately; leaving 900 miles, with a large though widely diffused population, differing in no respect from the heathen except in the absence of their idolatrous rites.

The Committee have, indeed, ventured to undertake the charge of one school in Harbour Beaufit, where a school-room, which had been built by the people, was offered with its premises to the use of the Society; and a teacher has been appointed to the Bay of Islands, to which a valued friend of the Society has most liberally given a donation of 50*l.* for the first year, and 20*l.* for the next. The Committee specially notice this act of Christian sympathy, in the hope that, with the Lord's blessing, it may not be without its effect on others, to whom He has graciously intrusted the means as stewards in His household.

CANADA.

In turning to Canada, the prospects of the Society are every way gratifying and encouraging. It is little more than two years since the first school was opened by Mr. and Mrs. King, at Sherbrooke, in the Lower Province, to the support of which the government has appropriated the sum of 50*l.* currency per annum—an earnest, it is hoped, of what may be obtained on a larger scale when the Society will have to present a goodly number of its schools, conferring acknowledged blessings on the people. Already the Committee have the gratification to report no less than thirty schools in operation, containing 1331 scholars in the day-schools and

1302 in the Sabbath ; towards the support of which there has been locally guaranteed the sum of 580*l.* currency per annum.

Preparations, also, have been made for the immediate opening of thirty additional schools, as soon as an application made to the Committee by the Society's Superintendent, the Rev. Mark Willoughby, for a grant of 300*l.* shall be agreed to, the remainder of the expense for conducting each school to be raised by the inhabitants themselves, or from other local subscriptions. This will be giving to the Society one school for the trifling average cost of 10*l.* from its funds.

The announcement of so pleasing a fact, the Committee trust, will not merely excite a transient emotion, but be felt as motive and encouragement enough to all their friends to render such assistance as may speedily enable them to place the sum asked for, or even a larger, at the disposal of Mr. Willoughby. If the Society be but vigorously supported for a few years in this field of its operations, it is impossible to say to what extent an impulse and direction may be given to sound education in that important province. And be it remembered, that through a gracious Providence there is no hinderance of any kind, if only adequate pecuniary assistance be supplied at home.

The Bishop of Montreal is most anxious for a wide diffusion of the Society's schools, and is ready to afford all the assistance in his power. Lord Sydenham, the Governor-General of the Provinces has kindly consented to become a Vice-patron of the Society, and has expressed a deep interest in the furtherance of its object. The clergy generally, and other highly influential and respectable inhabitants, have proved their attachment by their ready and valuable contributions, while the people welcome its introduction among them as a real blessing. Under these circumstances, the appeal comes to the mother country from her own children, thousands of whom drew their first breath on her own shores, with

all that can impart interest, urgency, and power. Surely it cannot—it will not be made in vain!

In these gratifying movements, indeed, the Committee feel the Society stands deeply indebted to the indefatigable zeal and untiring efforts of its devoted Superintendent, the Rev. M. Willoughby, who has been instrumental in forming associations in Montreal and Quebec, &c., and in calling forth the interest and attention of the people generally to the great importance of Scriptural education.

But again must the Committee repeat, more help must be rendered him from home if the Society is to extend its useful career. Within so short a time, and with such limited means, very much has been accomplished. The teachers sent from England have all been ordained, two of whom have been removed from all charge of the Society, and districts assigned to them of an extensive character, in which, as reported last year, each will endeavour to interest the people in the establishment of a school at such places as may most require one, and select some suitable and pious individual to act as branch-teacher under his general superintendence; he being required periodically to examine, catechise, and instruct the children of each school; to have a principal school, where he will chiefly reside; and to report, from time to time, of the state of the respective schools in his district, to the Committee.

The nature, extent, and arduous character of the duties required of them, may be estimated by the following extract from the journal of the Rev. J. P. Maning. He says:

“To be brief, and state at once the deplorable want of the means of educating the poor of such settlements, which I myself have personally visited and inspected, is certainly more painful than interesting. It may be well to inform you, that within the last year I have travelled, at least, 5760 miles by land, on horseback; and by water, in canoes and boats. Most of the settlements I visited were entirely without a school, a teacher, a minister to point them to the paths of righteousness, and say, ‘This is the way, walk ye in it;’ and to speak in general terms, I could point to no less than fifty settlements where a pious teacher could be made comfortable, and have an excellent field for mis-

ationary labours, not only in teaching the children, but also in visiting and instructing the adult part of the people; indeed, if there is a zealous desire to do good in this country, I see no limits or bound set.

"My present sphere of labour is from the head of the Nore River to Lake Zelumet, a vast extent of country partially settled, being about 20 miles wide, and not less than 200 miles long. I journey up and down through this country, but chiefly along the banks of the Ottawa river."

HOME PROCEEDINGS.

Your Committee have, lastly, to report upon the financial department of the Society at home, and the prospect which a new year opens before them. It is matter for sincere thankfulness that, notwithstanding the numerous and multiplying claims in this day of Christian enterprise, most of the Society's old associations have made as large remittances as in former years, and some even larger; while in almost every place visited by the deputation, they had the satisfaction to find that the interest felt on behalf of the children of the Colonists was still fresh, though the story which first excited it had lost the charm of novelty; a circumstance which encourages the hope that the Society will not be suffered to experience a retrograde movement, which might have been apprehended had excitement, rather than principle, allured to its aid.

Several new places have been visited, and associations either formed, or preparations made for another year. And the Committee would take this opportunity to acknowledge the debt of gratitude the Society owes to its old and devoted friend, Samuel Codner, Esq., for the disinterested and valuable services which, in this respect, he has continued to render during the year. The associations in and about London have, for the most part, continued as active as in former years; and the Committee feel they cannot too strongly express their sense of obligation to those ladies who kindly undertake to collect for the Society,

and to make its claims known among their friends and circle of acquaintance.

In addition to the usual valuable remittances from these associations, your Committee have gratefully to notice a very handsome present of children's clothing, &c. intended for Spaniard's Bay School, contributed by the Misses Neele and other ladies of the Islington Association; also a valuable gift by Mrs. Simmons, and some ladies of the City of London Association, of apparel and rewards for children, and a large package of flannel from the Misses Haydon of Guildford, and several small presents from various kind friends. Such gifts, it is needless to add, will prove not only encouraging, but eminently serviceable to the poor children, whose want of clothing subjects them, in their desire to attend school, to extreme suffering during a severe and protracted winter. The Committee have, also, gratefully to acknowledge 65 copies of *Howard's Lessons on the Old and New Testament*, with a number of spelling-books, from Mrs. Luke Howard, of Tottenham, for use in the Society's schools.

Your Committee are also anxious to record with unfeigned gratitude the many liberal donations which they have received during the past year from several of the Society's earliest and best supporters, and to express their sense of obligation for the continued liberality of a valuable friend through Lord Bexley, who specially contributes to the support of two of the Society's branch schools. They have likewise received the sum of 20*l.* from a lady at Shrewsbury, on reading the Occasional Paper for February last, who has long and often befriended the Society, for the special purpose of opening a school in the midst of a population of 400 French Canadians, amongst whom a benevolent lady had circulated copies of the French Scriptures and Tracts, which were very thankfully received.

Concerning this interesting people, Mr. Willoughby writes, "I imagine that but few of those 400 French Ca-

nadians can read, but those who can, do so to the others probably. I am pressed to go down and see these people, but what can I do? I have no man to send, although I have no doubt that a teacher might be kept there at a cost of less than 20*l.* per annum, whose influence, under the Lord's blessing, on such a population, no one can calculate."

The Committee cannot but thank God and take courage on comparing the balance-sheet of the present with that of preceding years.

Last year the receipts from donations, subscriptions, and associations, were unusually large; and the Committee had their apprehensions that there might be, under this head, a falling off during the present. They are thankful, however, to report an increase, chiefly in the remittances from the associations, which (including a legacy of 45*l.* from the late Mrs. French, of Rathbone Place, London) amounts to 131*l.* 0*s.* 5*d.**

In Newfoundland the receipts have been 1036*l.* 16*s.* 9*d.* sterling, which includes the grant of 300*l.* from the Local Legislature, and the remaining part purchase-money of the Central School House; and the contributions in Canada are 255*l.* 5*s.* 10*d.*, besides the guarantee of the inhabitants for schools. The entire receipts, therefore, at home and abroad, available to the Society, have reached the sum of 4148*l.* 7*s.* 10*d.* The payments during the year, as per Balance-sheet, have amounted to 4147*l.* 11*s.* 5*d.*, leaving, on the closing of the books, a balance in the hands of the Treasurer of 16*s.* 5*d.*

It is, however, necessary to state, that this favourable position of the Society has been effected not by any adequate increase in its income, for this is more than consumed in the bills under acceptance, but partly by the

receipt of 387*l.* 3*s.*, the remaining proceeds of the sale of the old Central School House in St. John's, and partly by certain reductions of expenditure, so that, even to maintain the Society's present establishment without adding a single school thereto during the year, it will be necessary at the next anniversary to report even a still larger increase of funds. While, therefore, with thankfulness the Committee make their present Report, it is not without much anxiety as to the future, feeling most desirous that every year the Society should lengthen its cords and strengthen its stakes. The openings for usefulness are presenting themselves on every hand, and to occupy which again and again are the Committee earnestly solicited.

They feel the Society cannot much longer remain without considerably increasing the number of its schools. To say nothing of Canada, in which a grant of 300*l.* would immediately open thirty additional schools; the benefits which the Society has been conferring on those parts of Newfoundland, where, for any length of time, its schools have been conducted, have naturally excited a strong desire in other settlements to become possessed of like advantages.

That desire must in some way or other be met, if not by this Society, which has won the affections and gained the preference of the people, there is reason to fear by some other system which may prove as detrimental to the interests of the Church as hurtful to the souls of men.

In this day, when so noble and successful a stand has been made on behalf of a Scriptural and Church-of-England education at home, it cannot surely be that the same object should be one of apathy and indifference in respect to the colonies, where, if comparison be instituted, an uniform and efficient system of instruction is still more imperatively called for, by reason of the inadequate supply of clergy. The present generation of children are the destined actors

on the world's theatre, whose principles must deeply affect the well-being both of families and communities, and through whom God will accomplish His promise, or execute His threatening. "Them that honour me I will honour; and they that despise me shall be lightly esteemed."

If, then, to educate in Bible principles — if to prepare the child's mind for a profitable and diligent use of the means of grace, and thus to assist the minister of God's Word in the duties of his high and holy office — if to teach the fear of God and dutiful submission to the powers that be — if to instruct in what true liberty consists, obedience to Heaven's first law and happiness its sure reward — if to do this for children, thousands of whom would otherwise, of hard necessity, be left to perish in ignorance and in sin — merit the approval and deserve the support of all who reverence the authority which commands us to bring up children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord — then your Committee must believe the Newfoundland and British North America School Society will never be allowed, for want of means, to turn a deaf ear to the earnest, affecting, and repeated entreaties from many a destitute settlement, when its holy, consistent, and unobtrusive career has gained for it the noble testimony of the revered Prelate of Newfoundland — "THAT ITS SCHOOLS, UNDER GOD, ARE THE MAIN BULWARKS OF THE PROTESTANT FAITH IN THAT DESOLATE AND BENIGHTED LAND."

THE TWENTY-SECOND ANNIVERSARY SERMON,

BY THE

REV. HUGH STOWELL, M.A.

(Of Manchester.)

PREACHED AT CHRIST CHURCH, NEWGATE STREET, ON WEDNESDAY EVENING,
MAY 7, 1845.

"For the earnest expectation of the creature waiteth for the manifestation of the sons of God. For the creature was made subject to vanity; not willingly, but by reason of Him who hath subjected the same in hope, because the creature itself also shall be delivered from the bondage of corruption into the glorious liberty of the children of God. For we know that the whole creation groaneth and travaileth in pain together until now."—Romans viii. 19—22.

WE are told, that in those countries where the night lasts for many months successively, the inhabitants have a custom, when they conclude that the day-spring is at hand, to climb the loftiest mountains, taking with them instruments of music, and on the mountain tops they wait and watch with eager eye the first streak of returning day. That first streak is the signal for a burst of gladness and melody, and they welcome the day-spring with acclamations and songs of triumph. Such was the attitude of those who "waited for the consolation of Israel;" before the Son of God was "manifested in the flesh." They were then with earnest eye looking for the coming of Him

that should redeem them. And such ought to be the attitude of soul maintained by those, who look for Christ's second coming "without sin unto salvation." Such was the attitude of the spirits of the faithful in apostolic times; and such, thank God, is increasingly the attitude of the spirits of the faithful in these later days. The hope of the Christian is not death, but life; not dissolution, but renovation; not to be "unclothed, but to be clothed upon with his house, which is from heaven."

Our scriptural Church teaches her faithful children, over the grave where the righteous are laid, thus to pray:—"That it may please Thee, O God,

shortly to accomplish the number of Thine elect, and to hasten Thy kingdom; that we, with all those that are departed this life in the true faith of Thy holy name, may have perfect consummation and bliss, both in body and soul, in Thy eternal and everlasting glory." This bright hope of the children of God is shared in by the very world that they inhabit; creation herself sympathises with them, and looks forward with longing expectation to the consummation of the saints.

It was for the purpose of enhancing the conception which believers should cherish, of the "glory that shall be revealed," that the apostle introduces the mysterious and magnificent passage that you have just heard. He is speaking of the hope of the righteous as weighed against their sorrows; and he thus writes: "I reckon that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be revealed in us." For how great (as if he had said) is that glory!—"for the earnest expectation of the creature waiteth for the manifestation of the sons of God. For the creature was made subject to vanity; not willingly, but by reason of Him who hath subjected the same in hope, because the creature itself also shall be delivered from the bondage of corruption into the glorious liberty of the children of God. For we know that the whole creation groaneth and travaileth in pain together until now."

In these times of rebuke and blasphemy and confusion, when "the foundations are out of course," "what can the righteous do?" When the present is perturbing, and the immediate future brooding and gloomy, it is indeed a time for the true servants and soldiers of Christ's cross to be looking above, and looking beyond, and deriving their strength and drawing their consolation from other than earthly sources. And, therefore, beloved brethren, the subject before us is one every way seasonable, as it is sublime.

It is not our purpose and intention to enter into any doubtful speculations, as to the personal advent and reign of Christ, pre-millennial, or post-millennial; it is not our purpose to enter into discussions with regard to the precise period or time when the great event, which prophecy foreshadows, shall be accomplished; but it is simply our purpose to endeavour to unfold to you this deep and blessed passage, with a view to the tendency that it has, to animate our hopes, to quicken our labours, and to sustain and strengthen us in this and every "work of faith" to which our heavenly Master calls us, in order that we may set forth His glory, and set forward the salvation of our fellow-sinners, and be "fellow-workers with God," to hasten on the blessed events, and the wondrous triumphs, which await the Church of the Redeemer and the Redeemer himself.

We shall, on the one hand, turn your attention to the mournful condition of creation since the fall; and we shall then turn your attention, on the other hand, to the glorious hope which animates creation in her fallen state.

May the good Spirit of God attend us; that in simplicity, and soberness, and faith, we may understand and receive the truth of His holy Word.

I. The mournful condition of creation since the fall. We say, of "creation;" and you will perceive at once that we take this to be the fitter word to convey the meaning of the apostle in the original. The translators of our Bible, indeed, seem to have felt this, because the word which they render in the nineteenth verse and in the twenty-first verse by the word "creature," they, in the twenty-second verse, render by the word "creation." There seems to be no ground for this change of word; and if the word be rendered "creation" in the last instance, it ought equally to be rendered "creation"

in the former instances. Taking, then, the word in its most obvious meaning, and taking it as our translators themselves, in this very passage, have once rendered it, we abide by this as the truest translation, "the creation." The mournful condition of the creation: by which we understand, with amplitude of signification, the visible and material heavens and earth which God made for an habitation for mankind, together with, to a certain extent, the brute creation, which have not man's reason, and therefore could not have man's responsibility. Now this "whole creation" is said to be in the "bondage of corruption;" it is said to be "made subject to vanity, not willingly, but by reason of Him who hath subjected the same;" it is said to "travail and groan in pain together until now." Such is the outline of its mournful condition.

It is in the "bondage of corruption;" enslaved, debased, burdened, enthralled through the iniquity and the abominable depravity of its inhabitant man. The mansion has been spotted and stained by the leprosy of him that dwells in it. It could not be otherwise; such is the canker, and such the defilement of sin, that whatever it touches it pollutes; and whatever it has to do with, it decays and it corrupts. Before man fell, the whole creation, as it came from God, was declared by its Maker, to be "very good;" and in the heavens above, and the earth beneath, and the mighty sea around, there was no spot or stain of pollution; all was purity, even as man was pure. The eye of the Infinite saw no fault, no blemish in His own magnificent structure; everything answered its purpose, everything served and glorified God. The whole heaven and earth were as a mirror without a stain and without the least dimness, on the surface of which was reflected the glory of God. The heavens then fully and perfectly "declared His glory," and "the firmament showed His

handiwork," and the earth adored Him, and these lifted up her voice in His praise; and all the creatures, unintelligent though they were, yet rendered their irrational, but fervent adoration to the great God of all. But when man became corrupt, creation became corrupted through his corruption; and man turned the good creatures of God into occasions of sin, and into means of sensuality, and brutal excess, and dark idolatry. The whole creation, in a sort and a sense, became partaker of the defilement of its rational inhabitants; and man forced the pure world into the service of Satan and sin. And the sun that was intended but to point the soul to God, became itself the god of the soul, hiding the great God who made it, and caused it to go forth as a giant to run its race, or as a bridegroom out of his chamber; and the moon and the stars that told of God's handiworks, became objects of dark adoration and worship; and guilty, fallen man polluted and perverted them to hide God, whom they were intended to reveal. And so man turned the brute beasts—the ox that eateth straw, and the calf that eateth hay, and the creeping thing, and the reptile, and the fish of the sea, and the flocks and the herds, into objects of idolatry; or if they were not converted into objects of adoration, they were sacrificed and slain to devils. And the whole earth became burdened, and blackened, and blighted, by the corruption and depravity of its wretched inhabitants, to whom it was intended to be a temple of the living God; it became a temple of lust, and sensuality, and abomination. And the very creatures, that were made for man's good and his enjoyment, became snares to his senses, and entanglements to his soul; and the bread and the wine, to "make glad his heart," and the "oil to give him a pleasant countenance" were turned into ministers of depravity, and made to supply the means of indulgence of his gross

appetites, which lorded it over his rational mind, and which made him the slave of Satan. Thus drunkenness and excess, and debauchery and impurity, have been made to find their fuel and their food, in the good things that God had made for man's good and for His own glory. Thus the world is brought into the "bondage of corruption;" it is enslaved, it is depraved, it is dishonoured by guilty man.

And, being thus enthralled by corruption, it is made "subject to vanity; not willingly, but by reason of Him who hath subjected it in hope." It is a marvellous, but a common peculiarity in the government of the great God, who governs His creatures in sympathy and in union, that things should partake in each other's weal, or in each other's woe. He "visits the sins of the fathers upon the children, unto the third and fourth generation," as "He showeth mercy to thousands in them that love Him, and keep His commandments." It tends to manifest, on the one hand, His hatred and abhorrence of iniquity; and it tends, on the other hand, to manifest and magnify His delight in holiness, and in those that are holy. And God has been pleased to order that there should be this sympathetic feeling in suffering or affliction, existing not merely between intelligent creatures, but between intelligent creatures and unintelligent creation, inasmuch as God oftentimes makes the land, and makes the brute creation to suffer, in consequence of the sins of those with whom they have to do. As the psalmist expresses it, "A fruitful land maketh He barren, because of the wickedness of them that dwell therein." And if we want illustration of how He does this, and of how frequently it has been done, we need but direct your minds back to the fair plain of Jordan, over which, when Lot cast his covetous eye, he saw it well watered, as the garden of the Lord; and we need but direct your eye now on

that same plain of Jordan, and bid you stand on some eminence, and overlook this once fair and fertile landscape, and what do you now see but a waste, arid, parched wilderness, where travellers tell us not a shrub grows, and scarce a sign of life can be traced, and it stretches around a dark, sluggish lake of waters, that smells of brimstone, and tells of judgment? And why is all this? Because of the wickedness of those who dwelt on the plain of Jordan. The judgment on the sinners of Sodom and Gomorrah fell on the very land that they had polluted through their corruption; and the plain of Jordan suffered and sorrowed, with its guilty and its consumed inhabitants. Or, again, we need but bid you look back at another time, upon the land of Zion, that land which God spied out as an heritage for His chosen, the glory of all lands, "flowing with milk and honey," whose hills waved with the cedar, and whose valleys blushed with the vine; where the herds and the flocks were heard lowing and bleating on every hand. And what is it now? A rocky and arid sand, with here and there a bright patch of verdure and fertility, but to tell what once it was, and to show how fearfully it is transformed. And wherefore? Because of the guilt of its inhabitants. Zion has put on her widow's weeds, and mourns with her outcast and desolate children. But we are told that she shall again "blossom like the rose," and again her beauty shall be as Lebanon, when the captivity of her children is turned again. And what God has thus, in a smaller measure, done in individual instances, He has, on the grand scale of universal visible creation, done in regard to the fall of man. "The creation was made subject to vanity; not willingly," for it had not sinned, but unwillingly it is made to suffer with the sinner, to partake with its inhabitants in the judgments that came upon him, "by reason of Him that subjected the same." God

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brought vanity on His beautiful works, and marred, though He did not wholly deface the lovely structure He had built and furnished. "Vanity" came upon it; change, decay, desolation, death. Fruitful tracts became barren deserts, the volcano heaved with its desolating floods, the earthquake rent the bowels of the solid globe asunder; endless instability and endless vicissitude characterized the whole face of creation. Nothing stable, nothing settled, nothing solid; all is continually dying and rising again, but nothing "continuing in one stay." "The whole creation is made subject to vanity," and, on every hand, we see symptoms of decrepitude, we see the premonitions of death, we hear the groanings of the brute creation, the whole "made subject to vanity." Oh! what a change in that beautiful world, over which its Creator looked, and beheld that it was "very good!" Who can tell what was the beautiful state of this earth, ere sin entered in, to mar, and to destroy? Who can tell? Still there is so much that is bright in the noon-day sun, and lovely in the dark and silent night, rich in the varied landscape, sweet in spring, bright and glorious in autumn's plenteousness, that we sometimes are ready to forget, what a change has come over creation, and are tempted to say, 'Only man is fallen.' But, alas, these are but transient signs; and again there comes sad and sorrowful evidence, that the creation is "made subject to vanity." "Vanity of vanities, all is vanity." Creation itself never "continueth in one stay."

To complete the dark picture of creation's mournful state, "we know that the whole creation travaileth and groaneth in pain together until now." What a grandeur there is in this personification of the whole visible universe! But though it is grand, it is not extravagant; we are told in the book of Psalms, that "the earth shall rejoice before the Lord;" the sea is called

upon to "roar, with all the fulness thereof," the trees of the forest to "break forth into singing," and the waves of the sea to "clap their hands," when the approach of the great Deliverer is announced. And if the royal psalmist thus made all nature animate and vocal—all nature to praise her Creator, and await her Deliverer's coming; it is still by a similar bold flight of imagination, that the apostle personifies all creation as wearied with the bondage of corruption, mourning and woeful through the continual vanity that harasses and wastes her; "travailing and groaning in pain," waiting for the wondrous transformation that is in store for her, and striving after it as a woman in her pangs, drawing near to her delivery, longeth for the hour when it shall be said—"a man is born into the world." And it is not mere fancy, that we may seem at times to hear, in the moaning of the tempest, in the roar of the storm, in the dashing of the billows, in the sounds and the sighings that we may often hearken to from troubled, from tempest-tossed nature—it is not mere fancy to construe these into the "groaning and travailing of creation," after that great redemption and deliverance that the Redeemer hath in store for her.

Brethren, must we not be arrested with the lesson thus taught us? What a fearful and horrible thing is sin, that it casts its dark shadow over the whole universe of God! that it throws its fearful slime and poison over all that was made fair, and bright, and lovely; and it more or less pollutes and defaces and defiles all! What must be the abhorrence with which the Holy One regards that "accursed thing," that, for the sake of it, He should reduce the unerring creation into the "bondage of corruption," and make His own fair workmanship "subject to vanity," pour contempt and confusion on the world that He had formed for Him-

self, and all because of that hatred of the sins of man!

Oh! when we make light of sin, and trifle with that abominable thing that God abhorreth, let us look around us, as well as look within us, and look beneath us; see what sin is, and what sin has done, that we may be humbled, and be confounded, and hide our faces in the dust, and cry out in broken-hearted repentance, "God be merciful to me a sinner!" "Seeing then that all these things shall be dissolved, what manner of persons ought ye to be, in all holy conversation and godliness?"

II. But we turn, dear brethren, to the bright and blessed reverse of the picture; and contemplate the hope that animates creation in her mournful and fallen state.

"The earnest expectation of the creation, waiteth for the manifestation of the sons of God." That is the great epoch, to which creation turns her anxious eye, anticipating her glorious deliverance, when "the manifestation of the sons of God" shall appear. For we are hid; "our life is now hid with Christ in God." "It doth not yet appear what we shall be." The children of Zion are strangers in an evil world. "The world knoweth us not," saith the beloved disciple, "because it knew Him not." Though He hath chosen them as His children, though He hath justified them in His Son, though He hath renewed them by His Spirit, though He hath secretly adopted them into His family, though He hath made them heirs of Himself, and joint-heirs with His only begotten Son Jesus Christ, yet are they still in disguise; they are His hidden ones; the world knoweth them not, and they sometimes know not one another; and the same lot happens to them as to the ungodly. Sorrows and trials, sicknesses and death, are their portion here below; their bodies go to the grave, as the bodies of the ungodly;

their spirits are indeed with "the spirits of the just made perfect," but still it appears as if one lot happened to all; and the same grave opens for them that fear God, and them that fear Him not. But it shall not be always so. A day of manifestation cometh—a day of public adoption in the presence of the whole intelligent universe, a day of adoption in the day of "the redemption of the body;" for so it follows in the verse immediately after the passage on which we dwell—"And not only they" (the creation,) thus travail and groan, "but ourselves also, which have the first fruits of the Spirit, even we ourselves groan within ourselves, waiting for the adoption, to wit, the redemption of the body." The resurrection, therefore, of the people of God, when they shall stand forth known and acknowledged of all men; the day when He shall "make up His jewels," and show them forth before the whole of His intelligent creation; when He shall come "to be glorified in His saints, and admired in all them that believe;" when "the mortal shall have put on immortality, and the corruptible incorruption, and death is swallowed up in victory;" when the body of our humiliation shall be "fashioned like to the body of His glorification, according to the mighty working, whereby He is able, even to subdue all things unto Himself;" when, invested with the similitude of their glorious Head, not only secretly, in their souls, but manifestly and visibly, in their glorified and renovated bodies, they shall stand forth, confessed of all to be the sons of the Lord God Almighty, those in whom He delighteth, for His beloved Son's sake, and on whom He hath poured the fulness of His glory:—then, in "the manifestation of the sons of God," creation shall find her glorious deliverance:—this is that bright epoch, that period foretold by the holy prophets since the world began, the time of the restitution of all things; when

the Creator shall say, "Behold, I make all things new." This, therefore, is that period to which the whole creation directs its earnest, anxious look, and for the coming of which it "travaileth, and groaneth," and longeth, until now.

Brethren, behold the hope of the creature. It shall be "delivered out of the bondage of corruption, into the glorious liberty of the sons of God!" Who shall describe the full import of this marvellous expression? Who shall describe what is intended by being "brought into the glorious liberty of the sons of God?" Brethren, it cannot be annihilation, as many have been accustomed, as we think ignorantly, and without warrant from Scripture, to suppose. Would it be deliverance to creation, to be annihilated? Would it be any compensation for its unwilling, involuntary suffering, to be entirely blotted out as though it had never been? Impossible! The very fact that creation has suffered with man, and sympathised with man, is in itself strong presumption that it shall triumph with man, and be exalted with ransomed man; that if it were made partaker of the fall, it shall be made partaker of the redemption; that if the destroyer availed to mar it, the Restorer shall avail to beautify it, and with a beauty infinitely beyond what it had been ere the destroyer had defaced it. In the whole history of the dealings of God, as far as we can trace back that history, there is no precedent for annihilation. God is the Maker, not the destroyer. Satan is the destroyer. There is not in the visible universe at this moment, with all its fluctuations, and transformations, and desolations, one sand grain less than there was in the moment when it was finished, when the "morning stars sang over it, and the sons of God shouted for joy." There is not a grain less at this moment, than there was at that wondrous moment. There is no precedent, then, for annihila-

tion, in creation. And where do we find in revelation any anticipation of annihilation? Would not Satan have wherein to glory, if the restoration were not co-extensive with the destruction? If the new creature did not deliver all God's workmanship "into the glorious liberty of the sons of God," would not Satan have wherein to boast? Would he not have prevailed, to a certain extent, to mar and to deface God's gracious workmanship? But, brethren, we, according to the promise of God by the prophet Isaiah, repeated by the apostle Peter in the last chapter of his second epistle, look for "new heavens and a new earth, wherein dwelleth righteousness." And the parallel that St. Peter draws between the dissolution of the old earth by water, and the dissolution of the heavens and the earth that now are, by fire, bears out, I think, this reasoning most completely. For he tells us that "the heavens and the earth that were before the deluge, being overflowed with water, perished;" and that "the heavens and the earth which now are," shall likewise perish. But how did the old heavens and earth perish? Not that they were annihilated by the flood, but, as it were, altered and transformed, and, to a certain extent, purified and renovated. Such was the effect of the baptism of water, and such, though unspeakably and immeasurably more complete, and penetrating, and perfect, and transforming, will be the efficacy of the baptism by fire. For so complete shall be the purification of the earth and the heavens, that we are told that "the elements shall melt with fervent heat, the earth also, and the things that are therein, shall be burnt up, and all these things shall be dissolved," as if to burn out from the very core, and from the very first elements of creation, the stain and the canker of corruption, that it might be, by the purification of fire, completely reduced, as it were, to the first chaos; but, from the

ashes of that funereal fire of the heavens and the earth, shall there evolve a heaven and an earth, unspeakably and incomparably more glorious than that which at first the great Author of all things pronounced to be "very good;" inasmuch that the prophet declares that the former heavens and earth shall no more "come into mind;" they shall be lost in the splendour and magnificence of the second heaven and earth.

Now, brethren, the whole visible creation of God is looking forward to and anticipating this blessed hope;—when, with its renewed and ransomed inhabitants, it shall undergo renovation, and shall receive perfection. Oh! the glory of the stupendous plan of redeeming grace! How complete will it be! How infinitely will its effects transcend the glory that was lost in the fall! Then there will be "a new heaven and a new earth;" and the creature shall shine forth in the consummation of redemption, unspeakably more majestic and wondrous than in the accomplishment of the first creation, fair and goodly as it was.

Men and brethren, the subject thus feebly and faintly unfolded, is fitted to sound an alarm in the ears and in the heart of every one of us, who is making earth his portion, and the things of time and sense his being, end, and aim. They that corrupt the creature, and defile themselves therewith, shall never know the creature's promised bliss. And why set your affections on these perishing forms and semblances of things?—for there is really nothing abiding, nothing substantial. "Man walketh in a vain show, and disquieteth himself in vain; he heapeth up riches, and knoweth not who shall gather them." "Vanity of vanities!—all is vanity." What a pitiful, poor thing, then, for a man to be grovelling and doting upon things, which "perish in the using," and which soon shall be burned

up in the fire of the last day! Alas! for the man, who leaves all, when he leaves earth! Alas! for the man, who, in the fire of the great day, will see everything his heart ever treasured, consumed and gone!

Oh! brethren, is not God at this very time shaking and alarming the slumbering sons of men, and calling upon them with a voice that should melt the most hardened heart—"Prepare to meet thy God?" And when we see such signs and events coming to pass, ought we not to "give diligence, that we may be found of Him in peace?" Ought we not to "gird up our loins, and be sober, and hope to the end, for the grace that is to be brought to the righteous at the revelation of Jesus Christ?"

For those that profess to be waiting for Christ's coming, this contemplation is fitted to impart to them adoring admiration, and exalted hope. What is before us? To what have we been born, or, rather, born again? Who shall forecast what we must shortly witness, shortly partake of, shortly have our part in the midst of? Who shall forecast it? "Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, nor hath it entered into the heart of man to conceive, the things that God hath prepared for them that love Him." Redemption in all its stupendous progress, how inconceivably grand! What, then, will it be in its consummation, when the end shall come, and the whole shall be finished for ever!

Oh! brethren, and these things are nigh at hand! The people of God should look through the telescope of revelation with the eye of faith, and they would see in some sort as God sees. And how does He see? "A thousand years are with Him as yesterday, and yesterday as a thousand years." If they see with His focus, if we may venture with reverence so to speak,) time will be annihilated, and the promise of God will be at the door;

with the judge before the door, they will live as under the impression of the coming of Christ at any hour, in any moment; they will be listening for the sound of His footsteps, that when He knocketh, they may open the door to Him immediately, and the language of their hearts may be, "Even so, come, Lord Jesus, come quickly. Amen."

And may not the children of God comfort and animate themselves amidst the sorrows of the brute creation, the vanity that they track over the face of the earth on every hand, the sad confusions and convulsions that shake this poor, perturbed, tumultuous, chequered, changeful state of things—may they not take to themselves the rich and blessed consolation that the Scriptures of truth supply, when they are told that it shall not always be so? Corruption shall not always enslave; vanity shall not always wither and waste; Satan shall not always "run to and fro," scattering sin and death. But the glorious Deliverer shall come; and the time is not far off, when He shall deliver the whole creation out of the "bondage of corruption" into the "glorious liberty of the children of God." At that glorious change, there shall be no more suffering, and death shall be no more, and sorrow shall be no more; no groan shall ever be heard, no tear shall ever be shed, no pang shall ever be felt; but all shall be harmony, and light, and life, and love and glory. God shall dwell in the midst of His people, and the "new heavens and the new earth," will be worthy of their renovated inhabitants, meet for the sons of God, and meet for the presence of the Lamb, in the midst of the throne.

Beloved brethren, and ought not such bright anticipations to strengthen us in "fighting the good fight of faith," to sustain us in watching and working, till our Master come?—not fearing with the fear of the unbelieving, not sorrowing as

others without hope, not driven to our wits' end, as those that do not remember that—as in that wondrous vision of the prophet, which we had uttered this evening in our ears—the whirlwind, the earthquake, and the fire pass by, and usher in the "still small voice" of a present God, in His grace and in His peace. I say, they are not to fear and sorrow, as those that do not remember, and do not believe and know, that after the judgments that are coming to try Christendom, and desolate the earth, there shall be the blessed presence of Him who said of old, when His people knew Him not, and cried out in their ignorance and fear, as He walked on the waves of the Sea of Galilee—"It is I, be not afraid."

Brethren, in that simple, blessed, and useful work of love, to which we invite you this night to lend more of your hearts, more of your succour, and more of your generosity, we may be well animated to think, that we are "fellow workers with God," fellow helpers toward the great consummation,—“preparing the way of the Lord,” hastening, so far as human agency can do it, the consummation of bliss, both of the saints and of creation itself

The Newfoundland and British North America School Society is not a stranger among you. It has for many years pursued its simple, unostentatious, but most beneficial course; it has never deserted the principles on which it set out—that a Christian education must be an education in the knowledge of Christ, as taught in His simple, unadulterated, un-mutilated Word—that those who teach "His lambs" in that Word, should themselves be first taught of His Spirit, and should be "epistles of Christ, known and read of all men," that they may be warranted in saying, therefore, to the lambs of the flock, "follow us, as we follow Christ." And God has so enabled

them to carry out these principles, and practically to maintain them, that, as I am assured, there has been scarcely a solitary instance, (if indeed one,) in all the many years of their operations, of a teacher selected by them, and sent out to our colonies, that has either betrayed unsoundness in doctrine, or inconsistency, glaring inconsistency, in Christian conduct. What a stamp of Divine approval! What an evidence of the labour of the Spirit of wisdom and truth! What a ground for appeal to those, who love the simple truth, and are zealous for its maintenance!

This institution has supplied to our oldest colony, Newfoundland, almost the entire of the Christian instruction that its young natives have received. One hundred and twenty schools, partly there, and partly in Canada, owe their origin to this Society; and still owe, to a great extent, their maintenance. In these Schools, the children of those that have been the children of our land, have been taught the faith of their forefathers; and but for these Schools in Newfoundland, at one time antichrist would have taken possession, almost, if not altogether, of that interesting island. At a time when our Church was almost wholly denuded of her ministers, when there was no chief shepherd or bishop to watch over the scattered flock, Rome was not idle; her emissaries were all abroad; and but for the faithful band of teachers furnished by this Society, who not only trained the lambs of the flock, but in the emergency of the case, gathered together for a time in the Churches the scattered sheep of Christ, and read among them the beautiful form of Service we are privileged to enjoy, and read to them some faithful and useful discourses—but for their timely interposition, humanly speaking, true Christianity would have been almost swept from the Island, and a paganised Christianity, in the shape of Romanism,

would have overspread the whole. What a debt is due to this watchful handmaid of our Church!

And when a bishop to that Island was sent out by our Church, and, through God's blessing, rallied the Church there, and brought about a much happier, more united, and more efficient state of things, as a check to the encroachments of Rome, and gathered the Church of Christ which was "scattered up and down as sheep having no shepherd," he bore (and now that he has left this diocese he still bears,) the most direct testimony to the services of the teachers of this Institution. Suffer me to give you his former testimony:—

"My firm conviction is (he writes,) that they (the teachers) will be, under God's blessing, the main seminaries of the Protestant faith in this desolate and benighted land, pervaded as the instruction they impart is by the spirit of scriptural truth and evangelical principle. At distant stations, which, from the paucity of clergymen hitherto employed in this colony, could enjoy but little ministerial care, the teachers of the Newfoundland School Society have held together the congregations of the Church of England, by acting gratuitously as readers of Divine service on every Sabbath, and by instructing them in their religious and moral duties, under the sanction of ecclesiastical authority."

On his removal from Newfoundland, to preside over the diocese of Jamaica, the bishop writes:—

"It will give me inexpressible satisfaction to be instrumental to the extension of the agency of the Society beyond the Colonies to which it has hitherto been confined, and I shall joyfully welcome any of their teachers in this diocese. I hope that the period may soon arrive when the Society may assume a more general name and character, and be so supported by the British and Colonial public, as to become the principal Colonial School

Society in connection with the Established Church."

I will now give you the more recent testimony to the schools connected with this Society, by his successor, the present bishop of Newfoundland.

"I have made acquaintance (he says,) with most of the schoolmasters supported or assisted by your Society in Newfoundland; and I have great pleasure in bearing testimony to their zealous and faithful discharge of the duties of their important office. They have many difficulties to contend with, and great allowance must be made in examining their schools. Nevertheless, on the whole, their exertions, and the blessing of God on their exertions, will justify very strong expressions of admiration and gratitude on my part; and there are some of them, who, I believe, with God's blessing, would be highly useful in the work of the ministry, having sufficient attainments, and zeal tempered by discretion and humility."

Not only so, but in accordance with such testimony, eighteen of the teachers at least (I rather believe that the number is greater than eighteen,) furnished by the Society, were, after due examination, deemed qualified and fitted by the bishops of Newfoundland and Montreal, to be ordained; and these eighteen devoted and simple-minded ministers of Christ were added to the insufficient, the fearfully insufficient staff of clerical ministration in these our colonial dependencies. And this was all due to the labours of this Society. Nor is there any telling to what extent this Society might become the nursery for the clerical order in the colonies, were more means placed at its disposal. It is now on the eve of taking a momentous step in advance—giving itself a name which shall denote its comprehension of our colonies in general—so that being styled the "Colonial Church School Society," or the "Colonial Church Educa-

tion Society," it may fairly invite an extended and enlarged co-operation of the faithful throughout the land, for the purpose of furnishing a sound simple Christianity and an evangelical education, under the wing, and in connection with the order of our scriptural Church, to the multitudes of the rising generation of our own expatriated people, which are now strewn over almost one-fourth of the globe.

And, brethren, these have an especial claim on us. It is not for heathen we seek your sympathy, but for your own baptised brethren, "bone of your bone and flesh of your flesh," some of whom are related to you, perhaps, in the ties of blood, or known to you in the ties of acquaintance-ship and friendship; and their claim is therefore especial and pre-eminent, and paramount to the claim of the heathen themselves. Yea, if we would regard the heathen's claim most effectually, we must render more particular attention to the claim of our colonists; for while the colonists caricature and libel "the truth as it is in Jesus," how can we anticipate that that truth should tell with mighty efficacy on heathen minds? Will they not turn round and say, "Physician, heal thyself?" Will they not bid us look to our own European population, and Christianise them and evangelise them, or ever we turn to the heathen? "The name of God is blasphemed among the Gentiles through us" and our colonists; and England's name has become, in many lands, identical with a scourge, and a pestilence, not with the blessings of the Gospel, because of the way in which her colonists have desolated and defiled and extirpated, instead of coming fraught with blessings of peace and life and truth and holiness, to benefit, and elevate and spiritualise the nations among whom they have settled. Brethren, this stigma must be wiped away, before God will signalise us as a missionary land, and a missionary Church. And if the So-

ciety take this step in advance, if it thus "lengthen its cords, and strengthen its stakes," that it may afford shelter to multitudes of young wanderers that are to be found in our colonies—will you not, Christian brethren, support and second it? Will you not enlarge your contributions? and if you have hitherto withheld your contributions, will you not now, according to your ability, impart them? *It is the only educational Church of England Society for our colonies.* Our Missionary Societies and Bible Societies are quite inadequate and incomplete, unless education go along with them; and, brethren, this there-

fore, is a department, as extensive as it is open and clear.

May God dispose you, cheerfully and largely, as you may be able, to give to the service of your Saviour on this occasion. Brethren, the time is short—"whatever our hand findeth to do, let us do it with our might," that when our Master come, we may not have bitterly to bewail that we have spent so much on ourselves, so much on the world, and that we have given so little to Him who gave us all, and gave His own heart's blood, that we might have eternal life.
