Compensation for Property Depreciated Was Asked by Deputation.

BIG PATRIOTIC FETE

Attractive Program Has Been Provided for Afternoon and Evening.

By a Staff Reporter. HAMILTON, Wednesday, Sept. 7.—For some time the city officials have been endeavoring to find a suitable substitute for macadam roadways, and "racmac" material was offered as a suggestion.

On the motion of Aldermen Holcomb and Turrell it was decided to experiment with the "racmac" material on this street, provided the work is done according to City Engineer Macallum's specifications and supervision and according to city labor regulations.

Strong objection to the city granting permission to the E. T. Wright Co. to install a railway siding into the property at the corner of Wellington and Kelly streets is being made.

Chairman Rody assured the deputation that the committee would do everything possible to protect the residents, but at the same time desired to give the company every opportunity to get facilities.

COUNCIL WILL NOT INSURE SOLDIERS

York Township Representatives Turn Down Proposal to Pay for Policies.

AN OTTAWA MATTER

Councillors Think Government Should Protect the Men at the Front.

That the York Township Council are unalterably opposed to the adoption of any plan looking to the insurance of soldiers' lives, was declared at a meeting of the township council held at the corner of King and Jarvis streets, and attended by all the members with the exception of Deputy Reeve Miller, who is absent in California.

The question was introduced by Mr. Freer and J. C. Woolner, representing the Rymynde Ratepayers' Association, each urging that if council refused to consider the matter favorably they would be least constant to the township as a whole matter on January 1st.

The estimated expenditure for the whole year for a hospital and charitable purposes is expected to total \$100,000. Council are considering the lighting of Yonge street from the city limits to the boundary line between Vaughan and Markham, and the city Hydro-Electric works ordered to prepare a report on the cost.

LIFE UNDERWRITERS' CONVENTION TODAY Ven. Archdeacon Cody Will Be First Speaker Before Insurance Men.

DUMBA EXPLAINS RECENT LETTER Claims That No Violation of U.S. Laws Was Intended. A GOVERNMENT DECREE Was Circulated Among All Austrians Working on Munition Orders.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—Dr. Constantin Dumba, the Austro-Hungarian ambassador, laid before Secretary Lansing today an explanation of a letter written by him to the Vienna foreign office, discussing plans for withdrawing Austro-Hungarian labor from American plants making war supplies for Great Britain and her allies.

Neither the ambassador nor Mr. Lansing would comment upon the interview when it was over. The impression prevailed in official quarters, however, that the secretary would submit the matter to President Wilson, with whom would rest the decision as to whether the explanation was satisfactory.

From reliable sources it was learned tonight that Dr. Dumba in making his explanation outlined the Austro-Hungarian view of the plans dealt with in his letter, contending that it contemplated no violation of laws of the United States nor offence against American institutions.
