EXTRACTS FROM PROFESSOR C. F. AUSTIN'S REPORT

Chief of Department of Horticulture, Cuban Experiment Station, Santiago de Las Vegas. Three Distinct Types of Soil. In the region to which I am confining this discussion there are three distinct types of soil—the red, the black, and the sandy or loamy—with many intermediate grades. The Guines vegetable district is an example of what is known as "molitor" land, an intermediate between the black and the sandy. This is a deep soil, sticky in wet weather, but loose and mellow in the dry season. When properly

handled it gives excellent results. The sandy and loamy soils which prevail in Pinar del Rio Province are also proving well adapted to vegetable growing and seem to hold water better than either the black or the red lands, so that by thorough cultivation crops may be produced on them with less water than on soils of any other type. As a rule, the black lands are considered to be better adapted to sugar cane than to truck gardening, being very heavy and having a poor natural drainage, yet suffering badly from dry weather on account of their tendency to bake into friable crusts and clods.

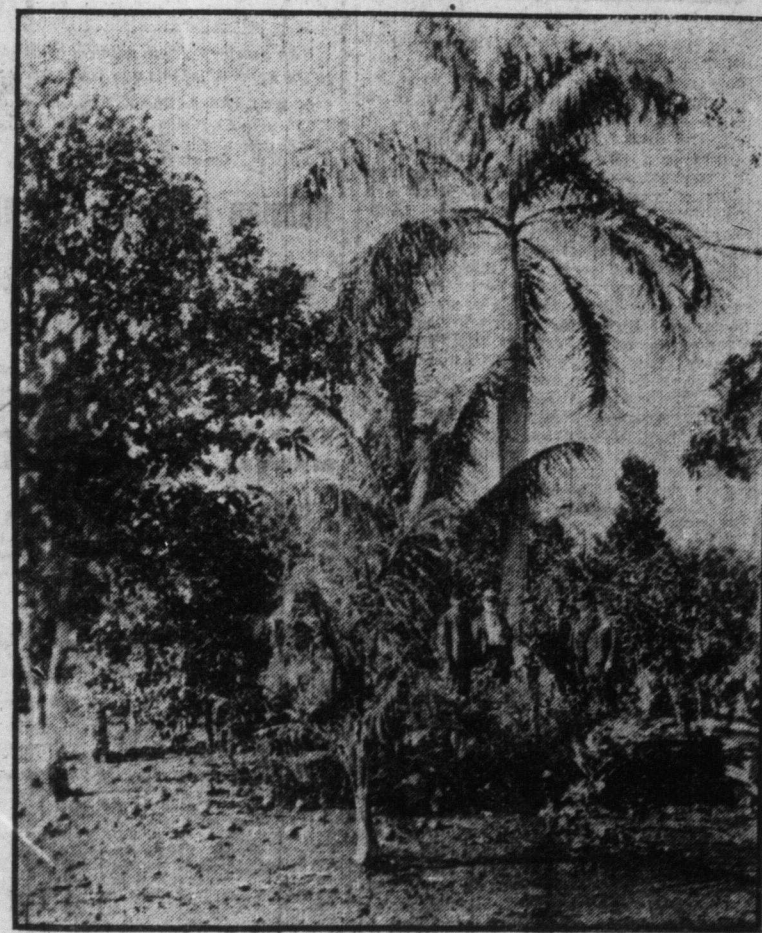

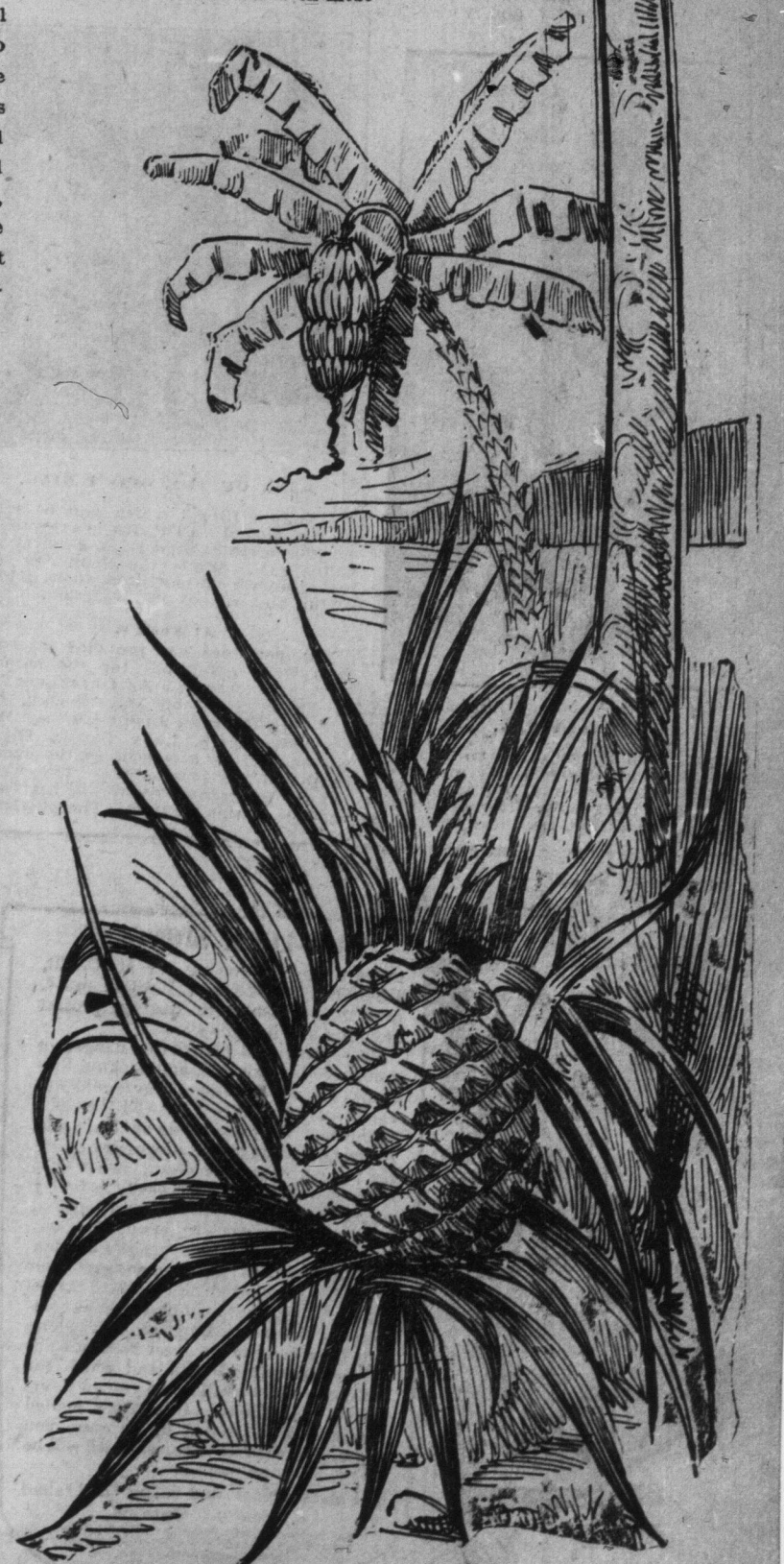
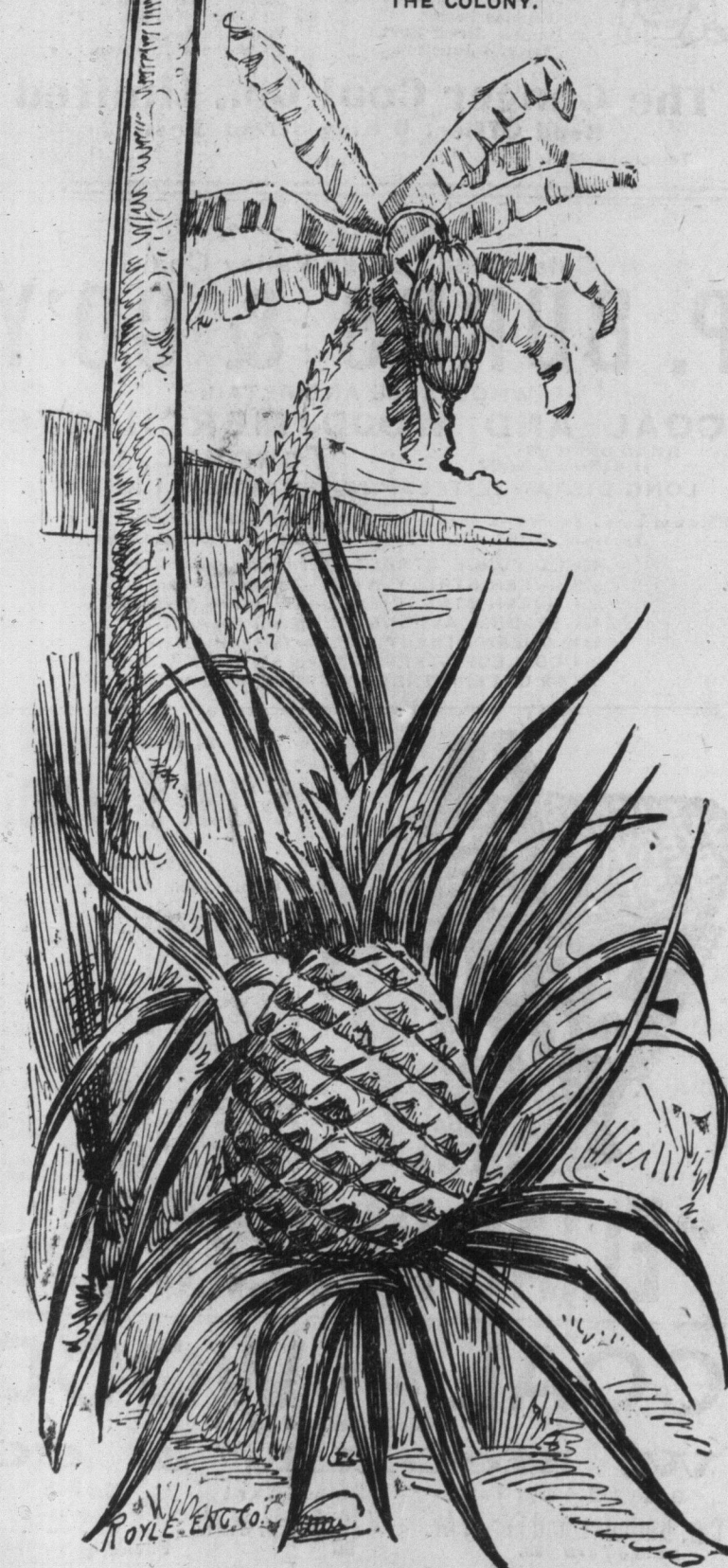

BOMB IS SENT TO SCHIFF ENCLOSED IN WOODEN BOX

Internal Machine Delivered to Police, Who Find it Capable of Causing Death.

New York, Aug. 18.—An explosive package capable of causing death was sent to Jacob H. Schiff, the banker, today at the office of Kahn, Loeb & Co., of which he is a member. Mr. Schiff was at Bar Harbor to-day and when the machine, enclosed in a wooden box about six inches long, was received at his office, clerks immediately sent it to the police. Investigation revealed the presence of 31 grains of high explosive powder and two 22-calibre lead-cartridge. Arranged so as to fire his charge merely by ordinary stock quotations. The package was a cylinder of empty paper lying in contact with both the powder and matches. The flash of the powder would have discharged the cartridges, which had been carefully fixed at the culmination ends. Lead studs were packed in beside the bullets, evidently to make the discharge more dangerous. Through the machine there was an oily saturation to insure the flash of any one of the matches igniting the powder. The whole mechanism was concealed under a newspaper wrapping of Wall-street quotations.

RETURNS TO NEW ZEALAND.

James Travis Goes Back Heber for \$35,000 Than When He Came. Flushing, L.L. Aug. 18.—James Travis, whose relation with his brother, Ira U. Travis, of this place, took place after a separation of fifty-three years, has returned to New Zealand. Accompanied by his wife, a son and a daughter, Mr. Travis sailed for England on Tuesday, on the steamer Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse. The party is to land at Plymouth, England, and will tour Europe before proceeding to Dunedin, New Zealand. It will be remembered that the brothers were united by means of an advertisement in an English paper, inserted by Ira U. Travis, who had practically abandoned hope of ever again seeing his kinsman. As a result of reading the advertisement and coming to America James Travis received \$25,000, his share of the estate of a relative who had died while James Travis whereabouts were unknown.

READY AT RIFLE RANGES FOR MARKSMEN OF THE O.R.A.

Difficulty Over Getting Late Train From Long Branch—Other Arrangements Feared.

With the exception of some difficulty with the Grand Trunk over adequate train service, the arrangements for the Ontario Rifle Association matches, which commence on Monday at Long Branch ranges, are completed and there is every promise of this being the most successful meeting in the history of the association.

The executive officer of the ranges will be Capt. Harbottle, who, as secretary of the association, has the assistance of Col. Sgt. McNiven of the headquarters staff, and Sgt. R. Clark, R.C.I. It was hoped that Lieut. Col. Bruce, R.O., could have been secured to act as executive officer, but he was unable to accept, owing to ill health, so the executive committee chose Secretary Harbottle to act in that capacity during the meeting.

The train service to the ranges as far as it has been arranged is as follows: Leave Union Station 6.45 a.m., 7.15 a.m. (special), 12 noon, 2 p.m., 5.30 p.m., 11.30 p.m. Leave rifle ranges 7.55 a.m., 12.10 p.m., 5.50 p.m. (special), 6.20 p.m. In all former years there has been a later train than 6.20 p.m., and for some reason, which Secretary Harbottle says he fails to understand, the Grand Trunk officials here will not consent to a later train this year, although there is a train passing the ranges at 7.30 p.m. He had a long conference yesterday afternoon with J. P. Green of the district passenger agent's office, but could not get an understanding that this train would be ordered to stop at the ranges during the meeting. He has followed up the conference with a request to headquarters and still hopes to have the late train arranged.

The electric railway terminus is a couple of miles this side of the ranges, but next year it will be extended that far. The ties are down already. Special trains have been arranged for 1 p.m. and 3.15 p.m. on Thursday for the convenience of those who will be invited to the luncheon and those who are desirous of seeing the shooting in the final stages.

Program for Monday. Firing commences on Monday morning at 8.15, in all the extra series. The first matches, the "Canadian Club," will be commenced on the 600 yards range at 9.45 a.m., and the Canada Tyro at 10 and 300 yards at 11.30 a.m. Luncheon from 11.30 to 12.30. In the afternoon the extra series will be continued from 12.30 to 1 o'clock. The City of Toronto match at 500 and 600 yards will commence at 1 o'clock, and the cadets match at 500 and 600 yards at 1.30. Entries have arrived freely during the past couple of days and there is a grand field of competitors. The markers will be a score of boys from Mimico Industrial School, who will replace the regulars from the fort. The ladies have been marking at the ranges since July 1 and give good satisfaction. E. D. Cunningham of the school has them in charge. They have a cadet team of six members entered in the matches.

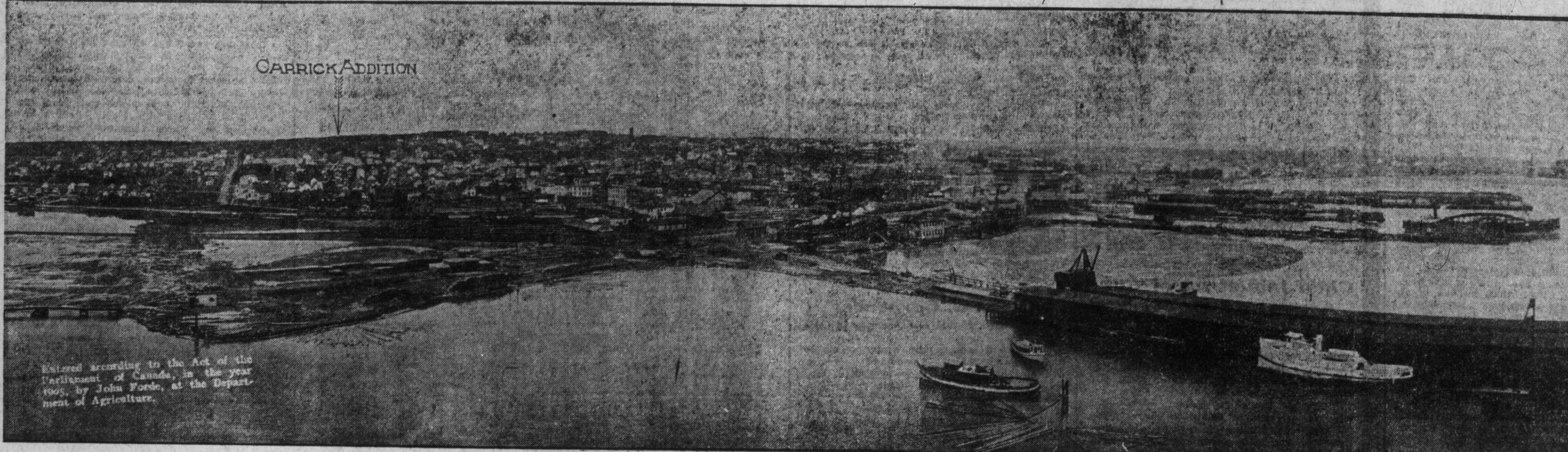

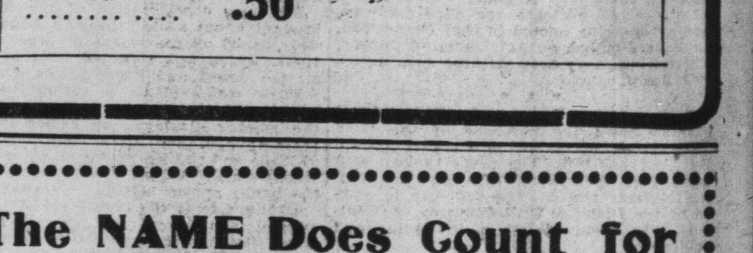
