MADE HIS WILL-BOUGHT A PISTOL

The little village of Thornbury, Grey County, was thrown into a state of great excitement last Saturday, when it became known that one of their best-known townspeople had ended his life by his own hand. It was the first suicide that ever took place in Thornbury, so far as is known. Was Well-to-Do.

On Friday night he made his will, bequeating his money and estate to his near relatives.

Fired Fatal Shot.

Shortly after midnight the following morning he arose and, hurrying to the woodshed in the rear of his home, fired a bullet through his head. His mother, on hearing the noise, rushed whence it came and found her son lying on his face on the floor in the woodshed. He was dead. Dr. Herbert, the coroner, who investigated the rase, deemed an inquiry unnecessary.

A Friend's Story.

On the night previous to the shooting Shaw sent for a friend, with whom he had not been on the best of terms. The friend on entering the house noticed Shaw fumbling about in his pocket, and on deceased asking his mother to leave the room, the stranger refused to stay. The friend is of the opinion that Shaw wanted to kill him.

The Mayor's Message.

I am glad on this occasion to again be able to congratulate you upon the prosperity of our town. I feel sure we have now entered upon another period of expansion, and that we shall, during the coming summer, see a number of new residences erected in our midst.

A year ago I called your attention to the following miatters, and let me again urge you to use every enort to go on with said works, namely: (1) A rettlement of the sewers rental with the city of Toronto upon an equitable basis; (2) the filling up of the approaches of the Weston-road bridge, thereby saving outlays for replanking: (3) the construction of gravel and cinder walks in lieu of repairing worn-out plank walks in outlying districts; (4) the appointment of an assessment commission.

The electric light plant demands your immediate consideration. This is a department that will have to be reconstructed, and great care must be exercised in so doing. My opinion is that it would be policy to discontinue the incandescent lights and replace them by are lights. The matter of removing the power house to the pumping station should be thoroughly gone into, as by so doing all night lights might be run in this manner for what we are now paying for a partial service. The matter of interior lighting must also occupy your attention, and, if it is found advisable, our citizens should be supplied with light at the lowest possible cost by the town. This would be a great boon to our churches, stores and citizens in general.

In the fire department I would recommend a reconsideration of salaries, so that those who have served the town for a number of years may profit thereby. A medical examination similar to that of Toronto should be insisted upon. The police department should be augmented by the addition of another member. The increase of our population and the fact of the street cars discharging their fares in the heart of our business centre, will entail additional work upon the police. They (the police) should be relieved of the sanitary inspection. This is a duty that a constable who patrols our streets should not be called upon to perform.

Waterworks and water rates—This department, for the first time in its history (1899), was self-sustaining, and we may now look forward for it to pay. The additional income from the C. P. R. and other sources will enable us to rearrange the water rates, and a geasonable reduction may fairly be made. This should be carried out at ones, so that our next collection may be made on the reduced rates, thereby reducing the cost of living in our town.

The balance of the \$9000 loan, on which \$4000 was paid last year, should be immediately paid off, thereby releasing \$21,000 of consolidated debentures. These could be retained by the cor-

poration, and in case of emergency could be sold or hypothecated.

I am pleased to see in the Council of 1900 so many of my old colleagues of former Councils, and I need not say that I rely with great confidence and trust upon your continued assistance and co-operation in the work of this year.



A JURY DULY CHARGED hief Justice Meredith Denounces the System of Putting Insane Persons With Criminals.

The Civil and Criminal Assizes were ened yesterday afternon by Chief Justice Meredith. In dealing with the several Meredith. In dealing with the several cases on the criminal docket. His Lordship told the grand jury that the most serious crimes against society would come under their notice. These cases included murder, shooting with intent to kill, criminal assault and an attempt to influence a municipal officer in the discharge of his duty. While making the visit to the jail, the jurors were told to investigate the circumstances under which the insane prisoners were committed. His Lordship denounced this system, which allows people deprived of their intellect to be compelled to associate with criminals, and advised wards of detention where such cases could be cealt with.

New York, Jan. 8.—The British steamer Georgian, which arrived to-day from London, rescued at sea on Jan. 6, Captain Stange and crew of 30 men, also the captain's wife, two children and a nurse, from the German steamer Ella.
