Enemy Launches Heavy Attacks Against The

Repulsed, But Force Slight Retirement STRIKE NOW of British in Bullecourt and Gain Footing in an Advanced French Trench

London, May 15-A heavy attack was launched by the Germans today on British positions in the Bullecourt region, on the Arras front. Today's official statement says the Germans were repulsed in Bullecourt but that the British advanced posts in the northwestern portion of the village were forced back a short distance.

FRENCH DRIVE GERMANS OFF Paris, May 15 .- An attack was made by the Germans last night on an extended front. Today's official statement says it was repulsed by the French fire. The Germans were able to get a footing only in an advanced trench.

London, May 15—The British statement says:—
"Small engagements between outposts, in which our troops were successful, took place during the night southeast of Epphy. Early this magning the greeny Epehy. yesterday on the Chemin des Dames, the Germans attacked our positions over a long front in the region northwest of Braye-en-Laonnois, between Bovettes and Epine de Chevregny. Our curtain fire and our machine guns broke up the attack. The Germans were not able to approach our lines except at one point, we ere the enemy gained a footing in one of our advanced trenches southwest of Filain. "A big shell hit about seven feet from me, and it was a dud (that is it did not explode)," writes Private Trites, "and when it struck it knocked me over." It was then that Trites' comrades thought he was dead.

"Poor Arthur McMurray fell. He was hiled by concussion, says Trites. He was not hit at all. (McMurray's home is on the North Shore.)

"I could hardly believe that I was living after the scrap. It seemed impossible to go through it; shells bursting on all sides of you, rifle fire, machine gun fire—everything. I fell head-first into a shell hole once. My rifle went into the mud and when I went to fire at a German there was too much mud on it, so I had to take the mud out. I always thought I could never have the heart to kill a man, but when you see your boy chums fall into a shell hole, dead and wounded, you just go mad. 



British Factories Able to Turn Out All Needed But Works Here Kept Ready in Case of Need-Work on Small Shells Goes on as Usual

Ottawa, May 15—The production of big shells on this continent is now at an end. The production of the national factories in Great Britain has become so great that the importation of heavy shells, that is 8-inch and 9.2 shells from the United States has ceased altogether. No further quantity is actually required from Canada. This information is authoritative.

However, in order to keep the Cana dian factories as a reserve, arrangement has been made with many of them to spread out the balance of their contracts over a longer period. This will decrease the weekly production but will keep the factories going longer, so that they will be available, if there should be a demand again for increased production, which is unlikely.

As for the smaller sizes of shells, there is no change in the situation and production of these will continue as usual.

WANT TECHNICAL **EDUCATION FOR** CITY SCHOOLS

Trustee Board Discusses Improved Methods of Practical Education -Chief Superintendent Present.

The monthly meeting of the board of school trustees, held in their building last evening, resolved itself into a round table discussion of modern educational methods; this was due chiefly to the presence of Dr. W. S .Carter, of Fredericton, chief superintendent of education, who attended the board meeting at the invitation of the chairman. Dr. Carter's remarks opened the door to an extended discussion of the school situation in St. John, and the possibilities of introducing in the near future a technical school and a more practical curriculum, replacing, what many members of the board consider, an altogether faulty system. In referring to the compulsory attendance law, Dr. Carter said that it was not so much a matter of age, as it was school accomplishment. He felt that the war will result in changing of the whole system of education, and that Canada especially must keep abreast of the times. The comparative poverty of the dominion, he said, had prevented it from keeping pace with the United States, but added that if Canada wanted to compete with American scholars, American engineers, and American merchants there must be an immediate start in the direction of technical education. One direction of technical education. One method suggested was the night school. Dr. Carter pointed out the interest that has developed in the night school in Fredericton, and felt that more enthusiasm should be snown in St. John, with its larger and more densely populated centre. He referred to the educational systems of other countries, especially in Germany, where the government under-takes the technical education of its subjects, eliminating the possibility of an unskilled labor class and keeping all males at school until they were compet-

ent to undertake some trade, and even after this the employer is compelled to allow a certain portion of the day for study.

Dr. James Manning said that this reiterated sentiments that he had already expressed to the board, that the system of education was radically wrong, and should be superseded by specialization. Bookkeeping as it is now taught in the public schools is a waste of time, he declared, and added that children should be educated along the same lines as modern business demands. 




