The Made in Saint John exhibit, which made such a hit last year, has been enlarged for this year and the whole of machinery hall alloted to this feature. There will be no fewer than 110 exhibits by local industries, and the variety of goods manufactured here will, it is said, open the eyes of the visitor. The spaces have all been laid off and are now ready for the placing of the exhibits. Several process exhibits will add to the drawing power of this feature.

DAIRY SECTION.

In the dairy section plans have been made to give the people an idea of the way milk is handled from the cow to the finished article. Each day cows will be milked in the space allotted to the dairy exhibit and the milk will then be put through the various processes by which it is changed to butter and cheese. A new and larger refrigerator has been installed in which the butter and cheese will be placed for exhibition.

The space in the main buildings is all taken, and the exhibitors are now engaged in getting their booths ready. This year many are making changes in the arrangement of their exhibits and the main buildings are expected to look even more attractive than usual. Entries for the live stock and poultry section are coming in fast and present indications are that all the space allotted for these classes will be taken up.
