One pint of grated cheese, 1 pint of sweet milk, 1 pint of bread crumbs, 2 eggs, ½ nutmeg grated, 1 teaspoonful of salt and 1 tablespoonful of butter. Beat the eggs well, turn them into a granite stewpan. Stir into them the grated cheese, crumbs, nutmeg and salt. Scald the milk, add the butter to it, and turn over cheese mixture. Stir well, and set in a warm (not hot) oven for three hours, stirring occasionally. The cheese should melt but not cook.

SUGAR FROM HALIFAX

A Halifax despatch says :-- The order

of 10,000 barrels of sugar recently shipped to England by the Acadia Sugar Refining Company, it turns out, is only half the full order, the company now

half the full order, the company now being engaged in the manufacture of another 10,000 barrels. This whole order is said to be worth \$370,000. The sugar is for a private concern in England, and was effected prior to the British embargo on all importations. The first lot would have gone forward a month before, but it was found im-possible hitherto to obtain freights low enough. The opportunity came when the steamer Cassandra sailed with horses for the war department, as she had cargo room for 10,000 barrels. There is no embargo on importation of sugar into France, but freights from Halifax to that country, or indeed from any part of Canada, are practically pro-hibitory, though New York is more favogably situated in this respect, and for this reason our refineries can-not touch the French market.
