I am not forgetting that there are two sides to everything. But this is the description of a witness who has lived in the home for some years and who went there prejudiced in the mother's favor.

Again, a certain young man was in love with a sweet and desirable girl. His mother said he was too young to marry, and by clever intriguing actually succeeded in estranging him from the girl. Since then the girl has married another man, and the son, who never found any other woman he cared for has become a "man about town" in the very worst sense of that phrase. I think his mother would give her life now to see him marry a good woman and settle down, but he does not wish to marry, and he is certainly not fit for any good woman. And his mother is to blame.

To be sure both these experiences are exaggerated cases of the cruelty of love, but I know of many homes where this jealousy, although less acute and ruthless, still spoils infinite happiness every day.

Of course there are a great many sweethearts and wives who are selfish in their claims on their lovers and husbands. I am not condoning their faults. But we all know that sex love is inclined to be selfish and exacting. Whereas mother love is universally supposed to be the most unselfish love in the world. Is it not more sad and terrible than when we find even this holy affection tainted by selfishness and jealousy?

Besides, the mother must have known what it is to be a wife. The young wife does not know what it means to be the mother of a man. The younger woman is almost always condemned most harshly in such cases. It seems to me that the old-woman who has lived long enough to have greater sympathy and understanding, and who has a more selfless affection to live up to, is faithless to a greater trust.

GLAZED APPLES A LA ROXANE.

Choose large apples of uniform size, pare and core and cook until tender in syrup. Remove to a platter. Let the syrup boil down to a jelly. Fill the centers with spiced prunes. Dust the tops of apples with powdered sugar. Serve hot in paper made to represent lettuce.

FIG MINCEMEAT PIES.

Weigh half a pound of flour, sift it, rub in three tablespoons of butter or lard, add teaspoon of baking powder and a pinch of salt, then gradually add just enough cold water to form a stiff paste; roll out once. Line small molds with the pastry and fill with mincemeat, adding a few chopped figs. Bake in a hot oven for fifteen minutes.

MACARONI PUDDING.

Cup of broken macaroni, quart milk, four eggs, juice and grated peel of half a lemon, three quarters of a cup of sugar and two tablespoons butter. Boil the macaroni in half the milk until tender and while hot stir in the butter, sugar, lemon and eggs. Bake in a bottered mold half an hour.

ROMANCE OF WIRELESS

(Exchange).

The mighty warships of the British fleet now speak with each other across the trackless seas, putting an invisible girdle round the globe; the vast liners in midocean are as closely in touch with the world as the throbbing cities to which they are speeding; and the anxious mariner in distress may give warning of his plight with a few light finger-tape, and call rescuers to his aid. Distance, in fact, has been annihilated; and yet no mortal eye will ever see the agency by which this miracle is wrought.

Little over twenty years ago no one had even dreamed of wireless telegraphy. It was only in 1888 that Professor Hertz demonstrated that an electric discharge caused electro-magnetic waves to radiate through the ether which envelops the earth, and propelled them forward at the almost inconceivable speed of lights—some thing like a thousand million feet a second. Clever men set their wits to work under the impulse of the discovery, seeking to turn the knowledge to practical account. Sir William Prece, then electrician in the Post Office, demonstrated the practicability of sending signals by the new means; and Sir Oliver Lodge publicly exhibited his own method of utilizing the Hertz waves in satisfactory operation.



The C. P. R. paid about one million dollars for land at this place, none of which is for sale, but all of which will be used for actual railway and transportation purposes.

It is said they will spend here millions of dollars more in yards, terminals, wharfage, etc. Even if they spend ten million dollars it would not pay for one-half of the value of the grain that was lost in one way or another through inaccessibility of markets this year alone in the three Prairie Provinces.

In the first place the C.P. R. or any other railway corporation is not in the habit of paying a million dollars for a piece of land unless they are going to use it. In the second place the C.P.R. will make a profit on every bushel of grain they carry from the farms in Alberta and Saskatchewan to Coquitlam for the next hundred years. In the third place it will pay them to have better terminal and elevator facilities than the other railways.

There will be a tremendous difference between the Pitt River Harbor of today, and five or even two years hence. Everybody in British Columbia is expecting to see millions of bushels of grain shipped to Asia and Europe this way in the next few years. The C. P. R. will not be caught asleep "at the switch." It is getting ready at Coquitlam, and a few million is but a mere bagatelle of the trade that will take place when China fully awakens and the Panana is open to big and little ships.


