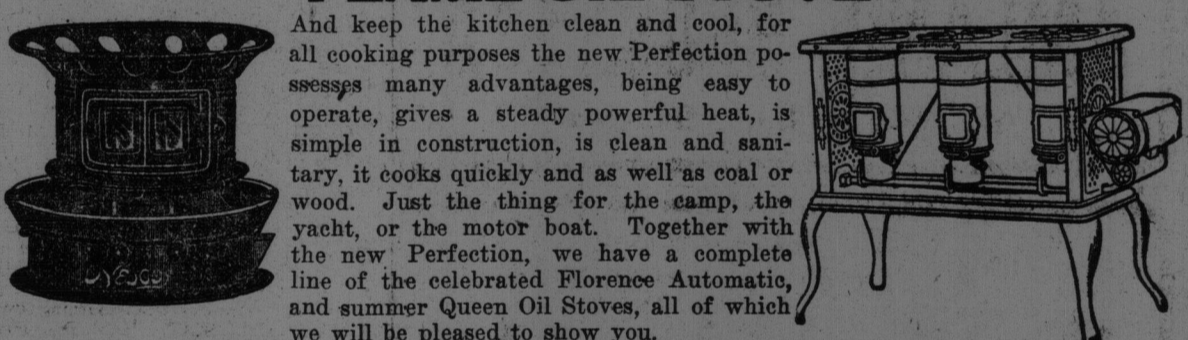

Pitt River Harbor, Coquitlam. The Pitt is from 30 to 60 feet deep at this point. Note its width, also Electric Power Lines. Coquitlam's importance as a future deep sea port, and as an outlet for the tremendous quantities of grain from the Prairie Provinces which will seek the European and other markets via Pacific ports is well illustrated by the above reproduced photograph.

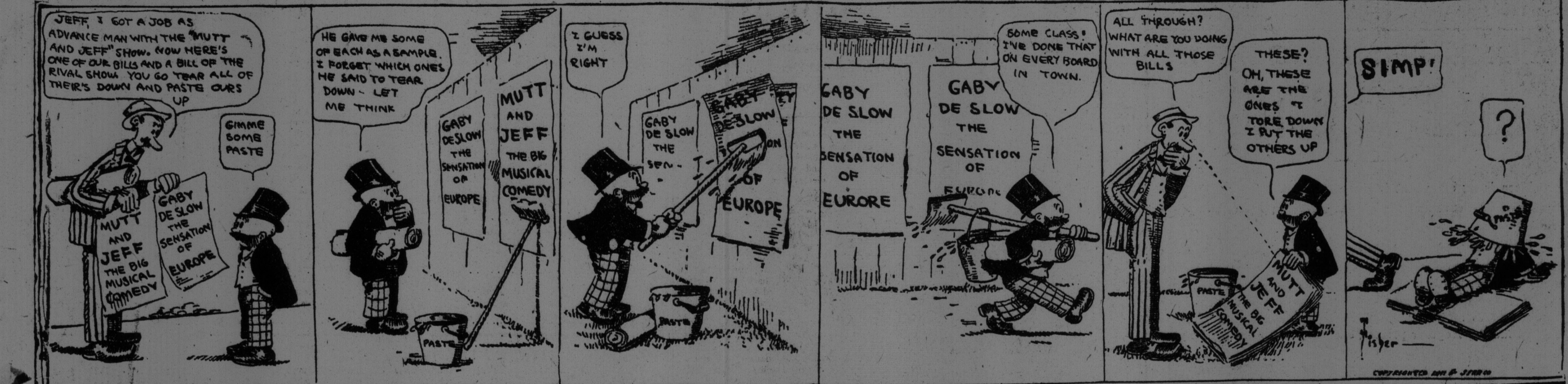
