For over 30 years he held the position of postmaster of Hamilton, and he remained in harness until Dec. 1, 1920, when he was nearing his 95th birthday. He came to Canada with his parents as a junior clerk in a mercantile house. In 1850 he moved to Hamilton, accepting a position with D. McInnis & Company, wholesale grocers. Six years later he became secretary of the Board of Trade. Cardinal Bourne Avers Church Not Aspiring to Worldly

ROME, Jan. 16 - In well-informed quarters it is said that the plan suggested by an anonymous Italian cardinal, whereby the Italian government should cede a portion of territory within the city of Rome to the Vati-can so that the Pope would again assume temporari power over a papal state, and that such be effected through the League of Nations, offers an excellent solution, considering the closer relations already existing beween the church and the Fascist

LAW LIKELY REPRALED.

This law gives the Pope a status equal to that of the King of Italy, and was intended to grant the papacy everything it could desire but the Vatican has never accepted it, the Pope preferring his voluntary imprisonment. Now, however, well informed circles consider it entirely possible that the Fascist Government will repeal this law.

The difficulty remains of finding something to replace it There is no question of returning to the situation which existed before 1870, when the church held temporal power. Even officials of the Vatican and other students of the problem say this is out of the question, at present unless a compromise like that offered by Cardinal Bourne is accepted.



Saint John is Included in Expres sion to Imperial Shipping Board

A cable received today at City Hall from P. C. Larkin, Canadian High Commissioner in London, stated that the Federal Government were sending to the Imperial Shipping Committee their thanks for the work done by the committee in having the marine insurance rates to Canadian ports reduced, and asking if he might at the same time convey to the Imat the same time convey to the Imperial Shipping Committee the thanks of the City of Saint John.

After consultation with other members of the council and the Board of Trade, Acting Mayor Frink has cabled Mr. Larkin to convey to the committee the thanks of this city. The action of the committee in investigating this matter of marine insurance rates to North Atlantic ports in Canada resulted in the rate being cut in half, which meant a saving of about \$1,000 on each cargo to a tramp steamer.
