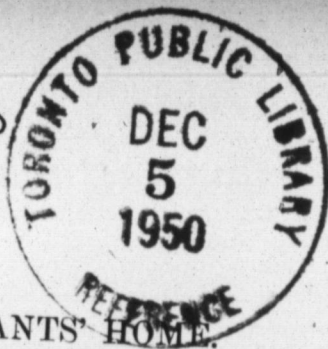

TWENTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT.

The Twenty-first Annual Meeting, was held at the Home, 21 St. Mary street, on Friday, the 16th of October.

His Honor the Mayor presided. A letter of regret was read from His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor regretting his and Mrs. Kirkpatrick's unavoidable absence.

The meeting opened with prayer by the Rev. Dr. Pearson.

After a few congratulatory remarks by the Chairman on the Institution having attained its majority, the Managers' Report was read by the Secretary, Mrs. Alfred Hoskin, the adoption of which was moved by W. B. McMurrich, Esq., Q. C., and seconded by J. K. Macdonald, Esq.

The Treasurer, Mrs. Boulton, presented her annual statement, moved and seconded by the Rev. W. F. Wilson and Prof. Mavor. The Medical Report presented by Dr. B. Spencer, was moved and seconded by Dr. James Burns and Dr. A. A. Macdonald, two of the first attendant physicians of the Home. Owing to the illness of Mrs. Hodgins and absence from the city of Miss Greig, the Work Room Report was not presented. The election of Managers for the coming year was moved by Sir William Howland and seconded by Ald. Graham.

The benediction was pronounced by the Rev. Dr. Pearson, and the large and interested meeting adjourned to inspect the Institution, and by the invitation of the Managers to partake of the refreshments provided by them.

MANAGERS' REPORT.

In this meeting of 1896, we commemorate the "Coming of Age" of the Infants' Home, founded twenty-one years ago in a small house on Caer Howell street, by a small band of brave and charitable ladies who steadily persevered through many discouragements, and much misunderstanding in their work of striving to check the evil of infanticide growing in this city, saving the helpless infants by giving a home and wise care to the poor sinning mothers who had fallen for the first time, and during their stay in the Home striving also to raise in them regret for their past and a hope of amendment in their future.

Seven months afterwards, as more general interest was being shown, the Managers felt justified in extending their work, and moved to the larger and more healthy house 678 Yonge street, known as the Infants' House in 1876. Here they remained, working quietly but surely, for six years, then the time and the way seemed open for building a proper Institution, not that the need was greater than at the first, for sin prevailed as greatly in 1875, but the public were recognizing the good being done and the funds of the Home increasing.

Acting, therefore, under the committee of gentlemen associated with the work from its inception, money was borrowed and the present large and airy building became the Home in October, 1882. A lasting memorial of the success of the so-called quixotic venture of 1875.

Of the first Managers, many are with us yet, showing how strong and untiring has been their interest. Indeed, this Home has had most faithful friends in all associated with

its work. In its managers, officers, clerical, medical and lay helpers, the few changes that have occurred have only been such as time and life must of necessity expect. Since its incorporation twenty-one years ago, this Home has been the instrument of saving from misery, if not from death, 2,835 children and 1,323 mothers. Many of these puny, almost dying babies are now grown almost to manhood and womanhood, likely to become good citizens of the world; and of the mothers, very many remember with deep gratitude the sheltering care of this Infants' Home.

So much for the past, now for the record of 1896.

On October 1st, 1895, we had in this Home 84 inmates, 24 women and 60 children. Through the year 43 women and 103 children were admitted; 11 of these children were foundlings, 5 rescued by the Children's Aid Society, 17 children of deserted wives, 22 children of widows or widowers, and 11 have one and in some cases both parents in the Hospital and 37 are illegitimate. Total number of inmates sheltered through the year, 230; 67 mothers and 163 children—monthly average of inmates 94. Remaining in the House at the present time, 21 women and 54 children.

A large percentage of our little ones of late years have been the children of the respectable married poor, who from the great depression in trade have found it impossible to keep their homes together and are thankful to have for a time the shelter of this Home for their little ones.

The health and death rate of all these charges of ours will be given in the report of our Medical Board, who as ever, have been unflinching in their care and attention.

Our adoptions are decreasing every year. Only one to report in this, the result, no doubt, in part from our rule of

not separating, whilst under our care, a child from its natural mother, limiting thereby the choice for adoptions to the foundlings, who are not as a rule attractively healthy children, but most probably for the reason that the Children's Aid Societies have greater opportunities, their charters empowering and directing them to adopt as far as possible, all children under their control. Still, during our twenty-one years, parents' love and care, has been found for seventy-eight of our little nameless ones.

The financial state of this Institution will be fully given by our Treasurer in her report.

Changes had to be made early in the summer in the working staff of the Home, and we consider that under the superintendance and wise direction of our most valued Superintendent, Mrs. Jordan, the appointments of Miss Trowbridge, as Matron, and Miss Scott, as Head Nurse, will result in very materially increasing the efficient working of this Infants' Home and Infirmary.

The Grand Jury whilst in Session in May, paid us a visit, and they expressed themselves as so pleased with the cleanly, home-like appearance of our Institution, and the bright, well-cared for inmates; most particularly was their fancy taken by the little ones "just for all the world like other babies," one kind old farmer said.

From certain civic changes and rules, we have this year been placed more under the control of our "City Fathers." The thorough personal inspection of the Institution and close inquiries into its management by several members of the Board of Control, has been of great value, gaining for us as it has done, their entire sympathy, and their appreciative assistance in our work. Surely, with the thorough understanding, now existing between us and the city authorities,

the other city institutions and the general public, whose sympathy and interest has been reached by our system of house to house collections, our Home will, from henceforward, be recognized by all thinking people as a power, not for evil, but for good.

We cannot close our year's report without, from our very hearts, thanking the steadfast friends who have helped so faithfully, and in so many ways, in the successful working of this Home.

MEDICAL REPORT.

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—Before presenting the Medical Report for the year just closed, the Medical Staff beg to extend to the Board of Managers their warmest congratulations on their reaching this, the Twenty-first Annual Meeting; and to express the wish that the work of this Home, so humane and necessary, may be as successful in the future as it has been in the past, and that by it many young lives may be spared to become honourable, loyal, and useful members of this community.

The Medical Report is as follows:—

The number of infants in the Home on Oct. 31st, 1895, was 60; and the number admitted during the past year 103, making a total of 163 which have been under medical supervision.

The average number of infants being 63, an unusually high one.

Forty-five deaths have occurred, 12 being registered as dying on admission; 12 being extremely delicate, and of these last, 3 had been removed to the Home from baby-farms.

The remainder succumbed to various ailments common to infancy, such as bronchitis, convulsions, diarrhoea, marasmus and pneumonia.

It is of much interest to notice the extreme youth of most of these little ones.

10 were less than 3 months old.

16 were over 3, and less than 6 months old.

17 were over 6, and less than 12 months old.

2 were 18 months of age.

The youngest babe admitted was 3 hours old.

We are pleased to report that we have not, this year, suffered much from infectious diseases. One case only of measles has to be recorded, the child being sent to the Isolation Hospital, where it died.

Whooping-cough, brought to us by a child three weeks old, sent in on a city order, attacked about forty of our children; two died of pneumonia following in the wake of this disorder.

During the past twenty-one years we have been visited by two epidemics of measles, one of which was particularly malignant, that commonly known as black measles. One epidemic of diphtheria, where fifty-seven children were attacked, and our mortality was deplorable.

Two epidemics of chicken pox and two of whooping-cough. Besides these, there have, of course, been sporadic cases of infectious diseases, which have been checked by careful isolation.

Scarlet fever, fortunately, has never been among us.

The youngest infants have, as far as possible, been wet-nursed; and every variety of artificial food has been supplied to others, the managers never having spared expense to meet the suggestions of the staff in this matter.

Every care has been taken, also, to secure that which is of equal importance in the young to good food, namely, pure air. Our methods of ventilation have been revised, and open fires kept burning in the wards for a large portion of the year, during damp or chilly weather.

On the 1st October, 1895, there were twenty-four nurses in the Home, and forty-three have been admitted during the past year, making a total of sixty-seven. All of these have enjoyed excellent health.

As far as can be ascertained, during the twenty-one years that the Home has been established, over 1,300 women have been admitted, and have spent terms varying from two months to two years in the Institution.

Among this large number, two deaths only have occurred, one in the Home, of tuberculosis; and one in the General Hospital, of typhoid fever. Considering that very many of these women have come to us in a very debilitated condition, this fact is most gratifying.

We are glad to report that the appointment of a head nurse has, during the last three years, proved to be most satisfactory, the daily written reports as to the condition of the children being of much assistance to the attending physician.

CONSTITUTION
OF THE
TORONTO INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

I.

The name of this Institution shall be "The Infants' Home and Infirmary of Toronto."

II.

The object of the Home shall be to receive and tenderly care for the children of wet nurses, the daily charge of infants whose parents labor away from home, the charge of destitute children under two years of age, entrusted to its care by any municipality in Ontario, and the care, medical attention, and nursing of sickly and dying infants.

III.

The parents or guardians of children admitted to the Home shall contribute to its funds such amount as shall be decided upon by the Committee in charge. In case of total inability of parents to pay any money the matter shall be dealt with at the discretion of the Committee.

IV.

The entire management of the Home shall be vested in a Board of Managers, consisting of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary, and thirty-five other ladies, who shall be assisted by an Advisory Board of three gentlemen.

V.

The officers and other members of the Board of Managers shall be elected at each regular Annual Meeting of the Society.

VI.

The Board of Managers shall have power to alter and amend the Constitution and By-Laws of the Society, provided one month's notice be given of any contemplated amendment. They shall have power to transact all business in the Nursery, saving the investment or sale of any property belonging to the same, for which purpose the presence of ten Managers, including three officers, shall be necessary, as well as the assent in writing of the Advisory Board.

VII.

Three gentlemen shall be elected at each regular Annual Meeting to act as an Advisory Board. They shall be consulted in all matters of finance,—especially in the investment of funds.

VIII.

In case any vacancy shall occur by the death or resignation of any officer, member of the Board, or Advisory Board, before the expiry of the term of office, the Board of Managers shall thereupon elect a person to fill such vacancy for the unexpired period of the term.

IX.

The funds necessary for supporting this Home shall be secured by annual subscriptions, donations, collections, and other means.

X.

The Annual Meeting shall be held the first Tuesday in October, or as near that date as possible.

BY-LAWS.

I.

The Managing Committee shall meet monthly, or oftener if required; shall see to the proper treatment of the children, and secure the proper discharge of their duties by the matron and nurses.

II.

The Secretary shall keep a full record of proceedings; summon meetings, and discharge the duties generally that pertain to the office of Secretary, under the direction of the Committee. She shall prepare an annual report of the condition, progress, and prospects of the Home.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive all moneys for the use of the Institution; deposit the same in a chartered bank in the city; keep an accurate account of receipts and expenditure, and pay out money on the order of the Committee.

IV.

The Physicians of the Home shall be appointed by the Managing Committee, and shall have the entire medical control of the Home. No child or wet-nurse shall be received permanently without their examination or approval.

V.

The Home shall be provided with as many healthy wet-nurses as possible, each nurse to be entrusted with two infants, the term of service to be at least six months, or as much longer as the Board may determine.

VI.

Only a certain number of babies shall be admitted to the Home to be cared for at the same time, the number to be determined by the medical officer.

RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

I.

Regular meetings of the Board shall be held on the first Tuesday of every month, at 11 a.m.

Special meetings may be called upon an order from the President, or at the request of any three members.

II.

All meetings shall be opened with prayer as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present (five to constitute a quorum), including one of the officers.

The following order shall be observed:—The Secretary shall read minutes of preceding meeting, which shall be signed by the President; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read a general report of the condition of the Institution.

The Treasurer shall present her account of all moneys received and expended during the past month, to be audited and signed by the President; or in her absence, by one of the Vice-Presidents.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping accounts of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her before the meeting of the Managers, to be signed by the President.

IV.

A Committee of five shall meet every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock, consisting of the President (or Vice-President), Treasurer, and Secretary, the Visitor of the previous week, and the Visitor of the current week, when the said Visitor shall report her experience. The Committee shall be called the Committee of Admission and Investigation, and every application for admission, both of children and nurses, shall be referred to them. This Committee shall arrange about the adoption of children from the Home, and shall report to the General Committee once a month. On these occasions three shall form a quorum. A Visitor shall be appointed by the Secretary to visit the Home daily each week, each Manager taking his duty in turn. The Visitor shall ascertain from the Lady Superintendent all about the health of the children, and the conduct of the nurses, and shall report the same to the Weekly Committee.

V.

When the Board shall have been called to order, all conversation shall cease.

VI.

One member only of the Board shall be allowed to speak at a time, and then only on the business of the meeting. The Manager having the floor shall address herself to the chair.

 RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHERLESS CHILDREN.

Application for the admission of children must be made to the Weekly Committee, which meets at the Home, St. Mary street, every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock.

No child over two years of age will be admitted, unless by special permission of the Committee.

Infants pay \$5 per month, children who can walk \$4, unless remitted by the Committee of Admission. Children from outside municipalities double fee.

Every child admitted must be examined by a physician.
