Americans who have been lured there... WASHINGTON, July 2.—W. R. Sims, the U. S. Consul at Colon in a communication to the state department, says: "Americans who go to Central and South America in search of work are in a pitiful condition; fifty cents in Colombian silver, equal to 25 cents gold see the regular daily wages. Americans cannot live on it and not being acclimated cannot stand the heat. The Nicaragua canal has lured many of the poor people here, and they are miserably naked and starving in Central and South America, dependent on the consideration of American consuls to provide them means to get home."
