THE SAMOAN MEDDLE.

What Germany hopes to do in the Pacific.

BY TELEGRAPH TO THE GAZETTE.

LONDON, Feb. 18.—The Standard's Berlin correspondent says he understands that the German government is disposed to send plenipotentiaries to Samoa during the Samoan conference, but in no condition that the estates belonging to the Samoans and that boundary lines of the belligerent possessions be marked and respected. This cannot be done officially, however, because Germany regards Matafua as a rebel leader, not as a king. The Frankfort Gazette suggests that the three governments interested should send their plenipotentiaries to Samoa on the ground that they have interfered overmuch in the quarrels of the natives.

IN STANLEY DEAD?

A Report that Comes from the Congo Country.

PARIS, Feb. 18.—A correspondent of the Petit Journal, at St. Salvador, district of Salvador, Congo, says that a courier has arrived at that place from the west coast who states that the natives carried there that Henry M. Stanley was killed in an engagement with the natives near Mungu. The courier reports that several instruments which have been identified as having belonged to Stanley were sold by the natives.

AT THE POINT OF DEATH.

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LONDON, Feb. 18.—It is reported that the coming session of Parliament, the Government will propose a reduction of one hundred million pounds. The proceeds of the loan will be devoted to the construction of two ironical medals and six cruizers, and to increase the number of torpedo boats.

THE MINISTER OF TRADE AND COMMERCE.

TORONTO, Feb. 18.—It is rumored that the members of the Hamilton, Toronto and Montreal Boards of Trade will be asked to sign a petition to the government asking that Adam Brown, M. P., or N. Charles Wallace, M. P., be appointed minister of Trade and Commerce.

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MONTREAL, Feb. 18.—The Saturday's fire is causing much adverse criticism, the whole brigade having been in a demoralized condition owing to want of proper management. The total loss is now estimated at one hundred and fifty thousand dollars, with insurance of about half the amount.
